




Grand jury issues indictments in murder, cable office break-in

An Ozona woman has been indicted for allegedly stabbing her boyfriend.

A Crockett County Grand Jury handed up an indictment on Martha Jean Williams, 37, for murder on Sept. 9.

Williams is currently in jail in Big Lake. Her charge is a first-degree felony, which is punishable up to 99 years in prison and a fine not to exceed \$10,000.

No bond was set on the indictment.

Williams was arrested on June 25 for allegedly stabbing Rafael Benson, 47, with a knife at their residence on Blas St.

At 2 a.m. on June 25, the Crockett County Sheriff's Office received a 9-1-1 phone call with the caller telling the dispatcher that a woman was standing in the caller's yard and telling the caller she had stabbed her boyfriend, according to Chief Deputy Ron Hawthorne.

Allegedly, the couple was arguing at the time of crime.

When Captain Jimmy Gillitt arrived on scene, he saw Benson sitting on the kitchen floor of the small travel trailer, Hawthorne said.

Crockett County EMS arrived and transported Benson to the Family Health Center of Ozona. Shannon AirMed helicopter was unable to fly that night due to the weather, so the EMS transported Benson by ambulance, Hawthorne said.

Benson was immediately taken into surgery and was in the intensive care unit under critical condition after surgery, Hawthorne said. He died later that day.

Hawthorne said Benson had a stab wound in the middle of his stomach, and that when EMS arrived on scene Benson was not responsive.

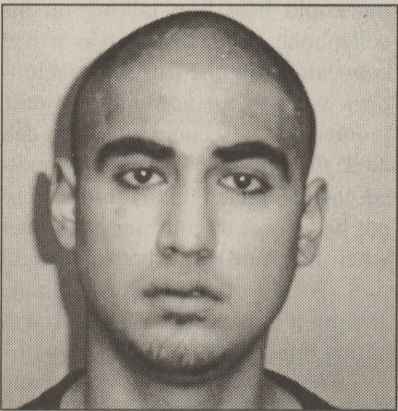
After being treated, Hawthorne said Benson was very disoriented.

Williams was arrested at the scene of the crime.

Also indicted on Sept. 9 was Daniel Raul Gonzales, 18, was for burglary of a building related to the July 25 break-in of the Circle Bar

Cable Office.

Gonzales was initially arrested on Aug. 1 after being chased by local citizens and Crockett County Sheriff's Deputies.

According to the indictment, Gonzales allegedly stole four television sets from the cable office. Gonzales's indictment is a state jail felony.

Other indictments from Sept. 9:

- Billy Burns, also known as Bill Lee Burns, also known as Bill Burns, 47, of Ozona, state jail felony driving while intoxicated with child passenger.

- Rani Davis, 24, of Ozona, third-degree felony of failure to appear.

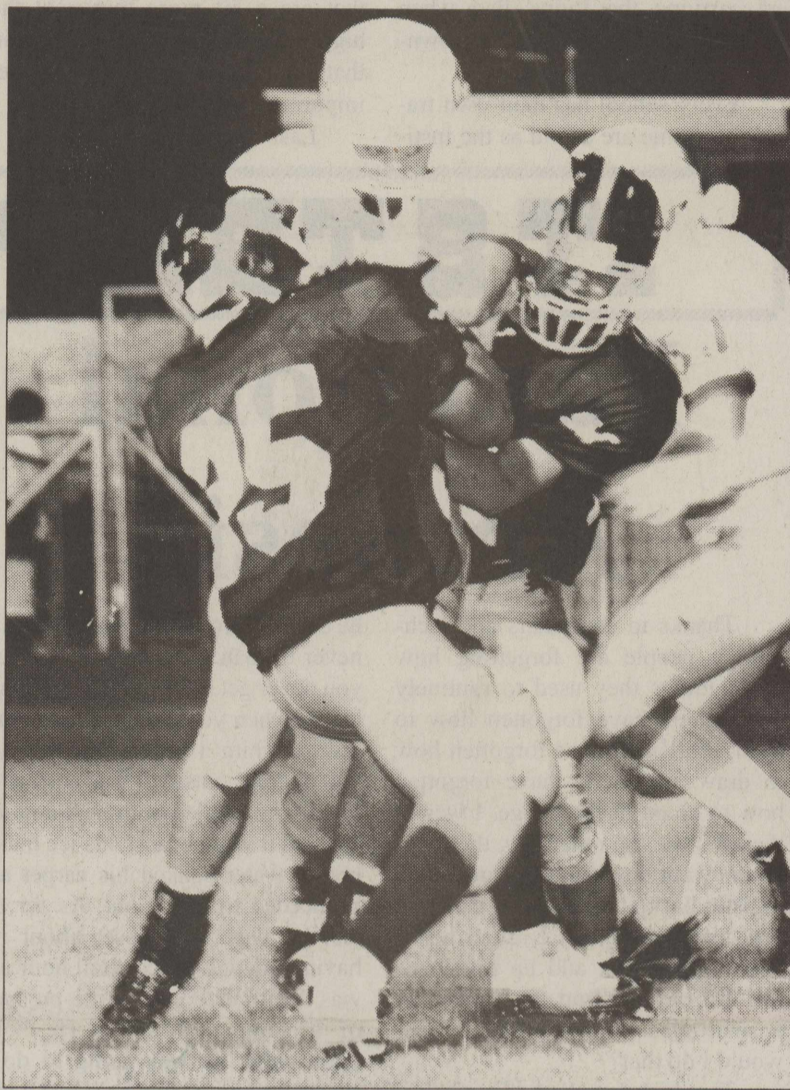
- Diana Yvette Lara, also known as Diana Yvette Lozano, 45, of Ozona, third-degree felony driving while intoxicated.

- Luciano Medellin Escamilla, 63, of Ozona, first-degree felony driving while intoxicated.

- Javier Gallardo, 32, of Ozona, third-degree felony of retaliation allegedly against Crockett County Sheriff's Deputy Jimmy Gillitt.

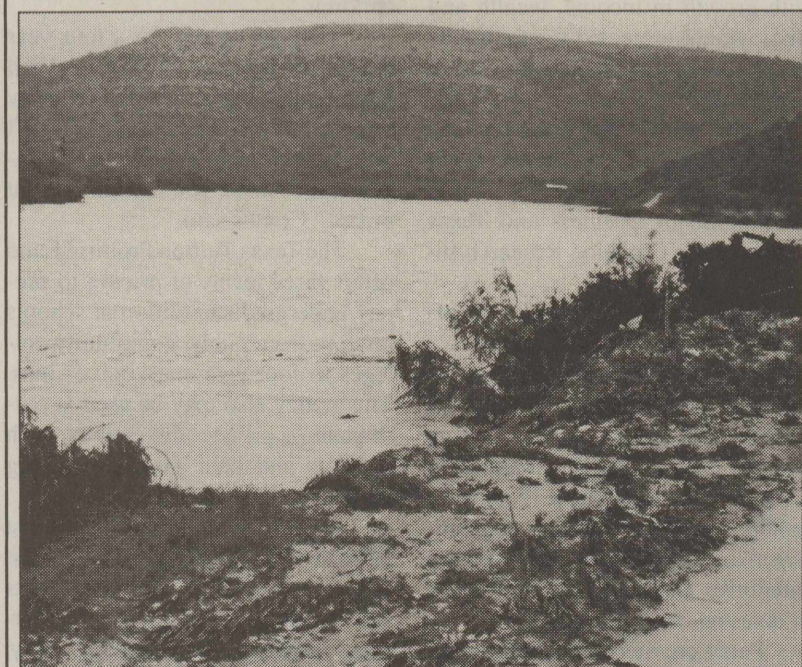

School meeting reviews policies, no questions asked

Students and parents heard about the Crockett County CCSD's cell phone policy, dress code and attendance policies at a back-to-school dinner on Sept. 9.

Around 60 people attended the dinner at the Fair Park Convention Center. The school district had advertised for around 1,000 people to attend.

The district also advertised that questions about the information presented would not be permitted at the dinner, but that parents can make an appointment with the district's administrators if they had any questions.

CELL PHONE POLICY

OHS Principal Carole Allen presented the district's cell phone policy.

The policy states: students that display cell phones or have them turned on while on school property before the end of the school day

Board approves property near primary

Additional property for the pick-up and drop-off points at the new elementary school was approved during a special school board meeting on Sept. 11.

The board approved the purchase of two lots of land owned by Arturo Lara and Esequiel Rios. The lots are located southwest of the primary school building.

The additional space will be used to provide more area for the drop-off and pick-up lines, said Superintendent Abe Gott.

The regular monthly school board meeting will be at 6:30 p.m. Sept. 24 at the Administration Building.

(including lunch) will be required to pay a charge of \$15 after 15-day waiting period and spend one day in ISS for the first offense before the phone will be returned.

The school day begins when a student steps on campus and ends at 3:45 p.m., Allen said.

On the second offense, the district will notify the parent and com-

pany of its intent to dispose of the device after 30 days in accordance with Education Code 37.082. The student will also be placed in ISS for three days.

Any subsequent cell phone violations after the second time will result in disposal of the device and extended time in ISS or DAEP.

The use of cell phones in locker

rooms or restroom areas at any time while at school or at a school-related or school-sponsored event is strictly prohibited. Any student that displays a cell phone in a locker room or restroom at a school-related or school-sponsored event, even though the event may not be on district property, will be subject to disciplinary actions.

Any disciplinary action will be in accordance with the Student Code of Conduct and may include confiscation of the device. The school may charge the owner for the release of certain telecommunications devices.

Allen also said that on school trips the teacher or coach can take up student cell phones but will give the phone back at the end of the trip. "It is our desire for students to have phones on trips," Allen said.

Each student received a copy of the cell phone policy to be read and signed at the beginning of the school year, Allen said.

Importance of traditions

At the beginning of every Ozona Lions varsity football game the cheerleaders take their place at the end zone, form their lines and the OHS Band belts out the school song.

The cheerleaders do their routine yelling "L-L-L-I-O-O-O-N-S YEA LIONS! YEA FIGHT! YEA OZONA! FIGHT LIONS FIGHT!" People in the stands put their hands over their hearts and sing along.

This is a tradition. This has not changed probably since the founding of Ozona High School, which is as it should be.

Traditions are what make a school a school. From the singing of the school song to the football players carrying the Lions' flag when they run on to the field to the crowning of the homecoming queen.

Every school has their own traditions. Some are as old as the insti-

tutions they represent, while others may be new.

New traditions are not a bad thing. Often they complement those age-old ones.

Colleges and universities have some of the most unique traditions of all.

At Auburn University their mascot is the tigers, but before each home game they set free an eagle over the stadium and cry out "War Eagle" during the game.

During this past weekend's big matchup between the University of Southern California Trojans and the Ohio State Buckeyes, the USC Trojan marches to the middle of the field and declares battle.

Granted colleges have traditions that are a bit more theatrical than high schools, but that's not saying that high school traditions are less important.

Last week, feeling a bit of

homecoming nostalgia, I visited my old high school's website.

On the front page were photos of the most recent pep rally. I clicked through everyone and while the faces have changed, I could recognize the cheers, the song the band was playing and the traditional linking of fingers or fists in the air for our school song.

Things haven't changed in 12 years.

Traditions can be changed, but to change one to where the meaning of the tradition no longer exists is not right to the place it's representing.

Traditions are a part of a community. They get under our skin, just like footballs hanging in all the business windows. They are supposed to be there every year.

Sometimes, it's not easy keeping up with traditions and sometimes new traditions have to be formed.

However, the new traditions

have to be one that can become a part of the community.

We all have family traditions and while those may have to change from year to year we still stick to the basic format.

Can you imagine the outrage if the Texas A&M fans were told to sit down at Kyle Field during the Aggies football game?

If Bevo no longer graced the end zone at the University of Texas, then the game just wouldn't be right.

Ozona is a community deep in traditions of all kinds, including those of its high school.

New traditions have been formed but the old ones must remain.

Let's hear the band play "The Lion Sleeps Tonight," yell "Every Step Lion Pride" and end the school song with "Fight, Lions, Fight."

Functional Amnesia

I was in a craft store the other day, the computers went down and the line at the register backed up because the clerk was totally helpless. I see this phenomenon of forgetting how we used to do things all the time and I've even given a name to it: functional amnesia. Just last week my neighbor wanted to know if I had a space heater and some ice

he could borrow. I've made it a point never to loan ice to anyone because you never get back in the same shape it was when you loaned it out. But I did loan him a heater. Since it was 100 degrees outside I was curious as to why he needed both heat and ice. He said it was because his ice maker broke, water soaked his carpet and he needed to dry it out. As for the ice, he was very upset about not having any ice for cocktail hour and was demoralized about the prospect of drinking warm vodka. He didn't know what he was going to do! I swear, he looked like he'd had a revelation from God when I handed him some ice cube trays and gave him instructions on how to make ice cubes the way we used to do.

In many instances we have improved things to the point of hopelessness. I was in an airport the other day and I couldn't help overhearing

a very angry computer repairman attempting to explain to a client how to fix his computer. I know all of this because everyone in the building could hear him talking on his cell phone. Juan was related to another much more famous Dana, Richard Henry, who wrote *Two Years Before the Mast*. (I liked Juan's book better!) Anyway, Don Diego was a rancher and like most progressive cattlemen he had to have the latest technology, which in this case, was a cigarette lighter. Oh yes, they had cigarette lighters 100 years



They were merely long tubes of glass filled with fuel and a cotton cord wound tightly in the bottom which extended up through the top of the tube. These days it may sound like a lot of work but cigarette lighters were a status symbol and the richer you were, the fancier your lighter was.

As was his custom, just before he went to sleep Don Diego lay in his bed, rolled a cigarette and tried to light the cigarette lighter. If the cord was new sometimes those old lighters could be hard to light and no matter what Don Diego did, it would not hold a flame.

Don Diego grew increasingly frustrated, just like the man with the cell phone and the clerk in the store, and he finally gave up on his much-anticipated evening smoke. The discouraged Don Diego figured that God did not wish him to smoke that night and so he put down his lighter with disgust, saved his tobacco and blew out the CANDLE that sat on his night stand.

HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN - Hurricane Ike's 40-mile wide eye crossed Galveston Island early on Sept. 13, laying waste to the city of Galveston before plowing its way north through Houston, then heading northeast and out of Texas.

Ike brought with it powerful winds and a 12-foot wall of seawater that wrecked or swamped Galveston homes, businesses and infrastructure. FEMA-directed search and rescue crews moved in to Galveston and other communities as winds and high water began to recede. An estimated 140,000 coastal residents did not obey evacuation orders. On Sept. 14, the governor's office reported more than 1,900 storm victims had been rescued.

On Sept. 15, nearly 3 million homes were still without power in scores of communities in Ike's path. Crews began to distribute water, ice and MREs (Meals Ready to Eat) on Sept. 14. Authorities asked that residents not return to stricken areas un-

til further notice.

For evacuees and rescues whose homes and businesses are still habitable, it could take weeks before power and city services are restored.

The National Weather Service on Sept. 12 had predicted a life-threatening storm surge to hit the Texas coast in advance of Ike as it spun toward Texas as a Category 2 hurricane with winds in excess of 100 mph.

SERVICE TO PROTECT IKE EVACUEES

Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott on Sept. 11 launched Operation Safe Shelter, an emergency service to provide registered sex offender information to evacuation shelter personnel.

The Office of Attorney General established a 24-hour a day, toll-free emergency hotline to allow shelter personnel to inquire whether evacuees are registered sex offenders.

When evacuation shelters contact the Safe Shelter Hotline at (866) 385-0333, officials will access and share information from the state's registered sex offender database.

Callers should be prepared to provide evacuees' names, addresses and dates of birth. Shelter managers can use this information as necessary to coordinate specialized housing arrangements or take other action as

appropriate, according to the attorney general's office.

TEXAS TOPS CALIFORNIA IN STUDY

Gov. Rick Perry and economist Arthur Laffer on Sept. 9 unveiled a study comparing Texas and California.

Laffer's study suggests that Texas' lower taxes, reasonable regulations and limited government have created a better economic climate with growth in income, wealth and employment projected to strengthen relative to California and the nation as a whole.

Perry and Laffer presented the study at a forum hosted by the Texas Public Policy Foundation, Texas Association of Business and Texas Conservative Coalition Research Institute.

A news release from Perry's office said the study compares the two states' taxes on labor income, capital income, consumption, overall tax environment, government spending policies and government regulatory policies. The study found Texas' economic environment more competitive than California's in five of the categories and equal to California's in taxes on consumption.

Perry credited "controlled government spending and a reasonable

tax environment with creating prosperity and attracting businesses to move to Texas" and expressed the value of "continued government spending restraint and transparency."

NEW PREPAID TUITION FUND DEBUTS

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs on Sept. 10 rolled out the Texas Tuition Promise Fund, a way for parents to lock in current prices for college tuition and fees for their children.

"You can prepay for a four-year degree, or you can prepay in small bites - for just a few classes or a few semesters. And, best of all, you don't have to worry about future tuition increases, because you lock in current prices," Combs said.

The Texas Tuition Promise Fund offers three levels of pricing to prepay undergraduate tuition at schools ranging from public community colleges to four-year state universities. The money also may be used at out-of-state or private universities, with students and their families making up for the difference in cost.

Prepaid tuition accounts must be paid in full and open for at least three years before tuition benefits can be paid, a feature that encourages parents to begin saving early, the comptroller stipulated.

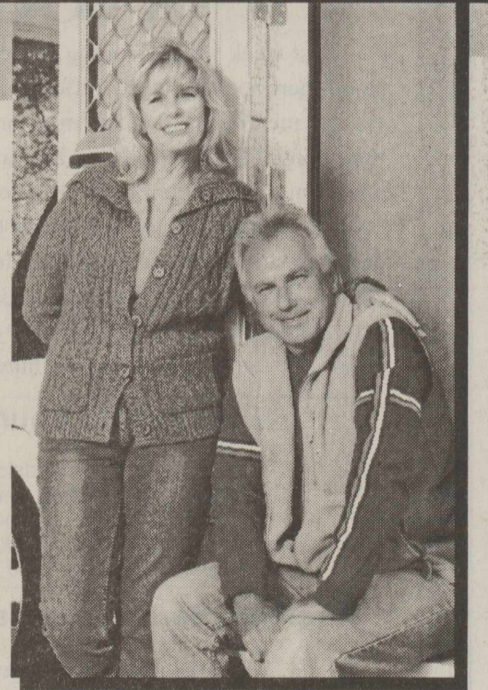

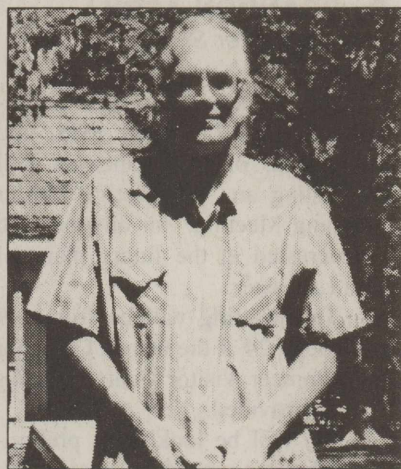

"The lack of a signature does not exclude the student from the policy," Allen said.

DRESS CODE

OHS Principal Benny Granger presented the district's dress code.

The code states:

- Hair must be clean and groomed. Boys' hair can be no longer than the bridge of the nose and sideburns cannot extend below the bottom of the ear. In the back, hair cannot fall below the collar. Facial hair will not be permitted.
- Boys will not be permitted to wear earrings.
- No body piercing or accessories will be permitted.
- Third through 12th grade boys' shirts must be tucked inside the pants/shorts. No excessively baggy pants and/or shorts will be worn. "Sagging" is not allowed. Belts must be an appropriate length and worn with belt loops.
- Boys are not permitted to wear sleeveless shirts.
- Girls are allowed to wear sleeveless shirts, but tank tops or shirts with spaghetti straps are not permitted.
- Shirts or tops which expose the midriff are not permitted.
- Shoes must have strings and be tied where applicable.
- No caps or sunglasses will be worn in school buildings. Students will not be allowed to wear wallet chains or other chains. The bills of caps worn on district property must face the front.
- Not item of clothing will be worn that displays or insinuates an obscene, sexual or profane message.
- Hair styles, accessories, clothing or lack of clothing that are extreme or disrupt, distract or interfere with the learning process (determined by faculty, staff or administration) will not be permitted.

Elementary principal Dan Webb spoke on attendance.

"As a parent, one of the most important things you can do for your child is to make sure they attend school," Webb said. "It has been proved that students who are in school more often do better on tests."

According to the Texas Education Code, a child who is at least six years of age, or who is younger than six years of age and has previously been enrolled in first grade, and who has not yet reached the child's 18th birthday shall attend school.

If a student fails to attend school on 10 or more days or parts of days within a six-month period in the same school year or on three or more days or parts of days within a four-week period, then the school district can file charges in the county court or justice of the peace court, the code states.

Excused absences from school include observing religious holy days,

attending a required court appearance or a temporary absence resulting from health care professionals.

"It's important to be in school right up to the last day," Webb said.

TIPS FOR PARENTS

Elementary counselor Janina Savala and high school counselor Amanda Jackson presented tips to help students get ready for school.

Savala said it's important to get clothes ready, look over homework and prepare lunch the night before.

She also said establishing a sleep routine and developing a morning routine are both important.

After school, Savala said it's important to let the child choose their homework time and then help them to stick to it. Also, a quiet, organized study place is also needed.

"It's important as parents for you to stay in touch with the school and let us know what happens at home. Things at home do affect your child at school," Savala said. "We are with

you. We are on the same team and our goal is your goal and that is to see your child succeed."

Jackson said that when students reach high school, it's important that parents continue to be involved.

"Know your child's teachers, your student's schedule, their activities, and tutorial times and ask them about their homework," she said.

"Be a pro-active parent. It's okay to say 'no' sometimes. It may help your child out of a difficult situation. Talk to your children. It's okay to be a little nosy."

Jackson said OHS offers several opportunities for students to earn college credits, receive certification in the health science field and the school started offering a course in criminal justice this year. Technology courses are also available at OHS.

"Challenge your student to be the best that they can. High school is a very important time in their lives," Jackson said.

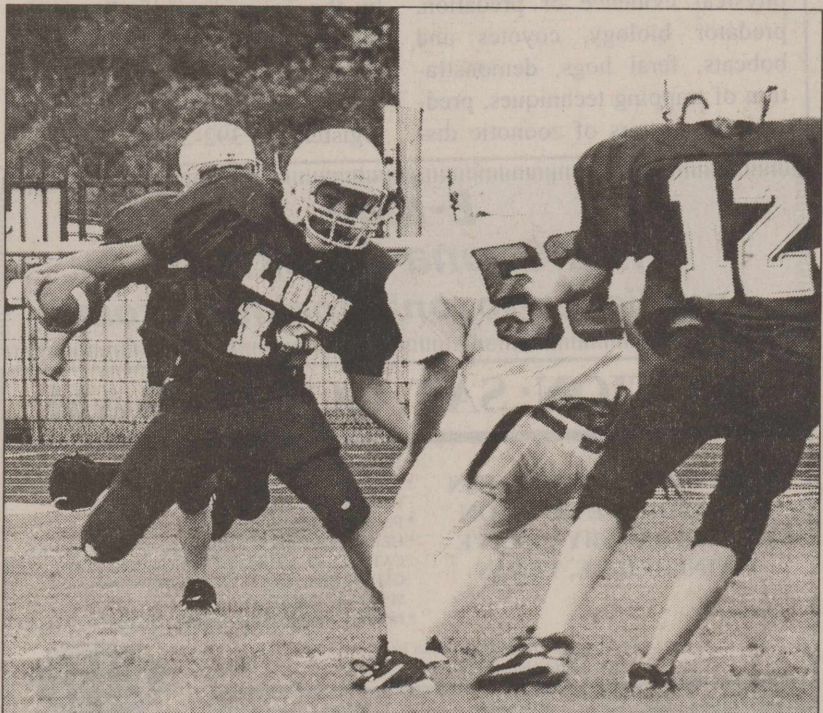

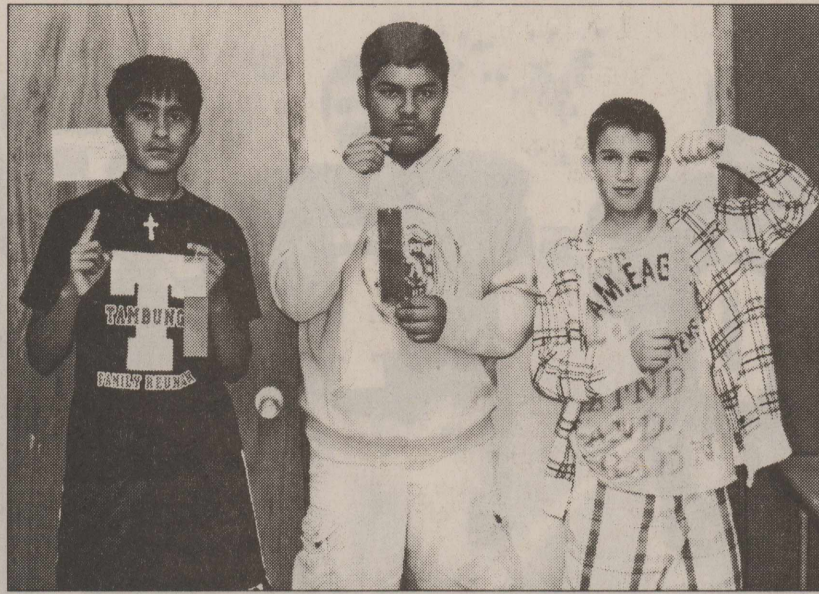

OZONA ELEMENTARY SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION UPDATE and ASBESTOS REPORT

The remaining days in September are scheduled to be busy ones at the Ozona Primary School site. The district's maintenance staff has been steadily removing all remaining furniture and other keepsakes from the building and putting them into storage. On Thursday, September 18, Waldrop Construction is scheduled to host a walk-through of companies who are interested in demolition and dirt work. Bids will then go out and be scheduled to be back by Sept.30 – hopefully right before asbestos removal ends. AAR, Inc. is scheduled to begin removing asbestos on Monday, Sept 22. They indicate that it will take two weeks for all asbestos to be removed from the site. By law, demolition cannot begin until all asbestos is properly removed. What is asbestos what is its history in the Ozona Schools? Asbestos is a group of minerals that have the ability to withstand heat and has resistance to electrical and chemical damage. It was widely used in construction due to these properties. However, after it was discovered in the 1980's that inhaling the fibers could produce harmful illnesses; its use was banned in many projects. In 1988, CCCCSD had an asbestos study completed to identify where asbestos existed in the school buildings. CCCCSD's management plan was approved on October 12, 1988. The district had some asbestos abated (removed) in 1989 from the high school and junior high. In September of 1994, the district switched environmental services companies to the Texas Association of School Boards. Under this management plan, asbestos was inventoried and checked each 6 months by the district's asbestos coordinator /Maintenance Director. Then, in 1999, the district had additional asbestos removed from Ozona Middle School. However, asbestos at remaining sites was left undisturbed. The next change for the Ozona Public Schools was in 2008 when the current maintenance director/asbestos coordinator left the district. Since the district has no asbestos coordinator as of that date, the district contracted with King Consultants of San Angelo to assess and inventory remaining asbestos. After all asbestos is removed from the Ozona Primary School building and the building is demolished, there will still be asbestos in some district buildings. However, as long as it is left undisturbed, it is considered safe by the Environmental Protection Agency. Any citizen wishing to view the district's asbestos management plan or any other related documents may come by the district's administration building during regular business hours. Finally, please remember that the district is not expecting to occupy the new elementary school building until fall of 2010. Thanks for your support and patience.

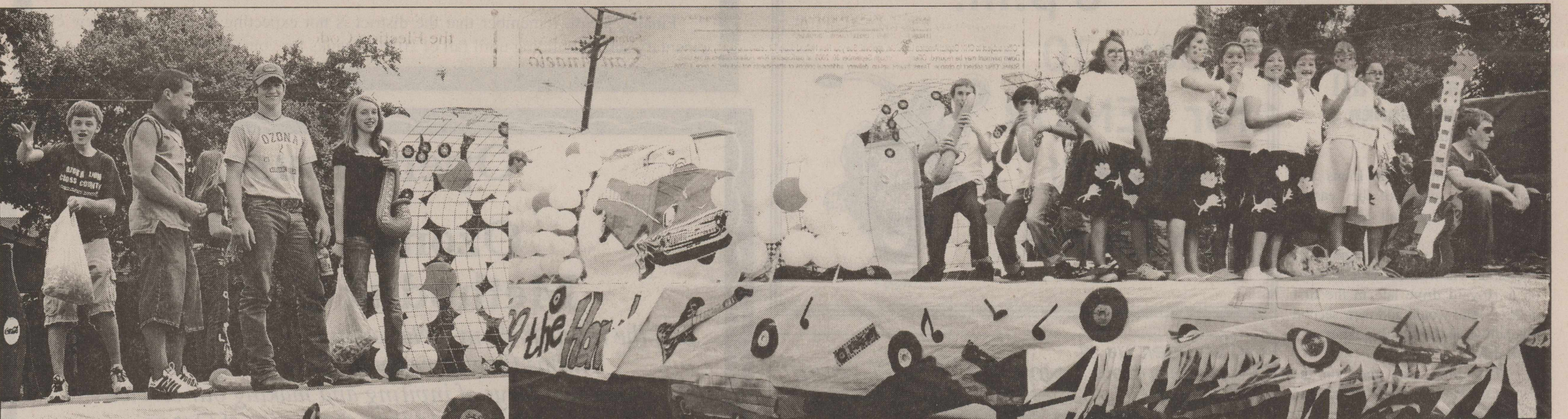

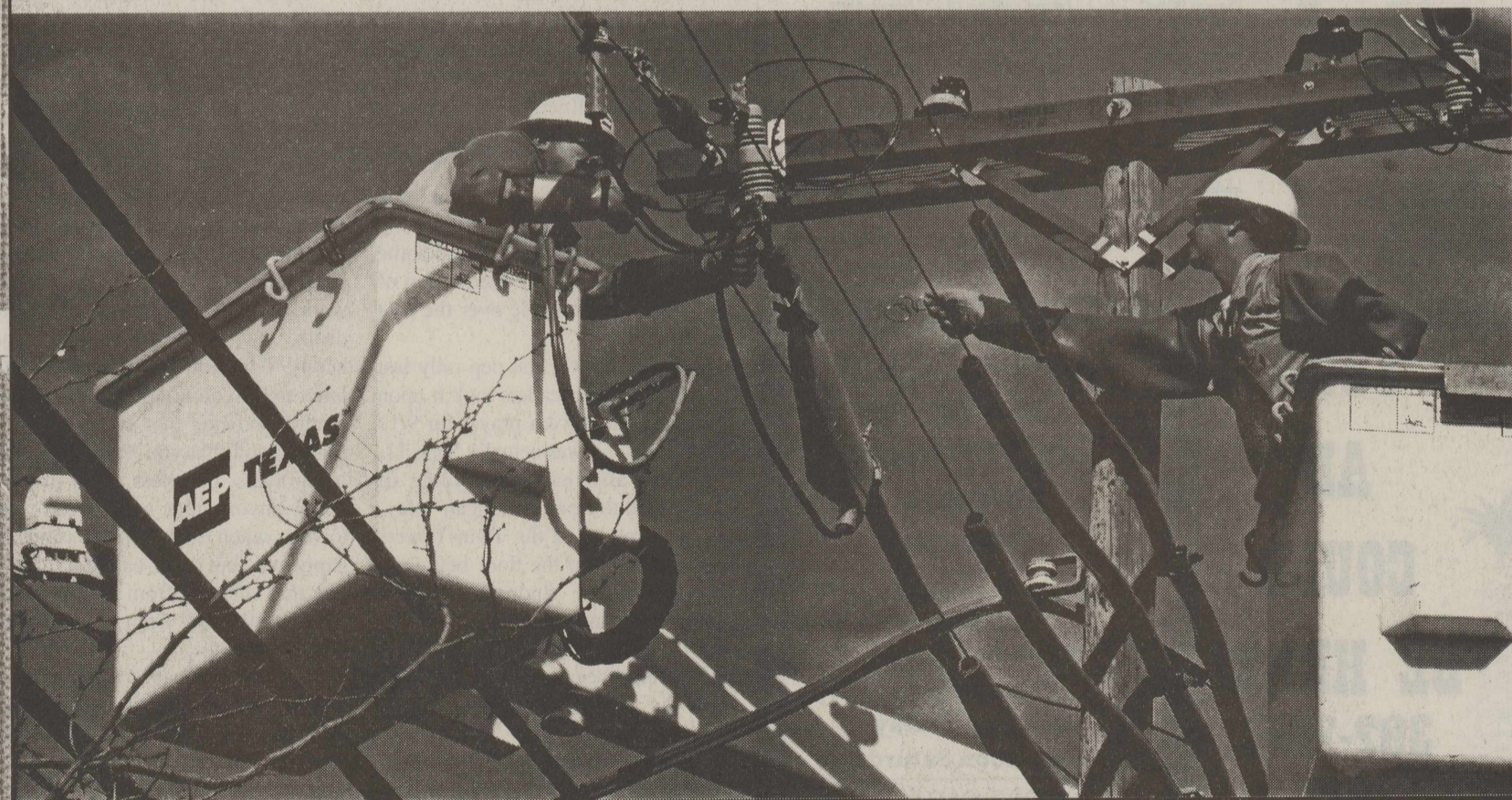

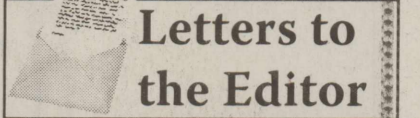
