"Diversity is not just race and religion. It is a set of conscious actions that we do every day. It's about not just understanding but also respect," she said.

People with disabilities can bring a wide variety of ideas and approaches to the workplace, Pearlman said.

"People with limitations understand how to jump those hurdles," she said.

During her presentation, Pearlman said there are 54 million Americans with disabilities and only 30 percent of those are employed. Based on a U.S. Survey, two thirds say that they would like to work but could not find jobs.


It's Just US brand a rancher carves on his cows is a very spe-

I would like to say a few kind words about a group of people who not enough of us fully appreciate until we need one: brand inspectors.

Brands have been around for nearly 5,000 years; brand inspectors only slightly less. I realize that not every state has brands, or even brand laws, but where you do find brands you'll find brand inspectors. I have met dozens of them in my travels, both men and women, at purebred sales I worked and out in the country as I bought and sold cattle. And to paraphrase Will Rogers, I have never met a brand inspector I didn't like.

Did you know that with only three irons, a small half circle, a large half circle and a straight iron, you can make any brand in the world? And a brand inspector, no doubt, can interpret every one. Whether brands be walking, running, tumbling, rocking, swinging, dragging, flying, connected or lazy, brand inspectors can tell you who they belong to. To the average city dude a brand may look like Egyptian hieroglyphics, they wouldn't know a mill iron from a mule shoe, but to a brand inspector those lines, dots, circles, numbers and pictures speak volumes about history, geography and human nature. They are a rancher's coat of arms and his own unique security code and we all owe a debt of gratitude to brand inspectors everywhere who ensure that our brands our are first line of protection against theft.

It's hard to explain to a layman but the

I it merely means us. In my state, anytime you sell cattle privately off the ranch you need a brand inspector and just like a good dog, they come whenever called. If you send cattle to the auction the cattle are inspected there. Perhaps this is why my

brand inspector for many years, Jim, urged me to send my cattle to auction; not just because I'd get more money for them, but so he didn't have to come out to my place, which was always a daunting prospect. Either the cattle were late coming to

break out through my leaky corrals. For bos years I was a cattle trader, buying cheap cattle at sales I worked, and reselling them at home. So Jim had to read many foreign brands that were barely legible, on upside down, splotched or nonexistent. Brand inspectors are wise and know

what's going on in the cattle community. The thing I appreciated about Jim is that he would not spread rumors or talk behind

He knew when to keep his mouth shut... except in one case. I followed his advice and sent my cattle to auction and one load was made up of worn out roping steers, wild bulls, drop calves, one-eyed toothless cows and a gomer bull (a bull that was used for heat detection but had his plumbing rerouted so he couldn't breed a cow.) My buddy who works at the auction said that Jim, upon inspecting my load, made the comment, "That Pitts ain't too particular about what he slaps his brand on, is he?"

A couple months later Jim and I were eating some scrumptious cobbler at the auction market coffee shop. Like many auction yard cafes, it has the best food in town and attracts a diverse crowd: tourists, truck drivers, locals and ranchers. While Jim and I were sitting there a transient walked by. He was shoeless, wore long braided hair with beads in it, was wearing filthy camo pants and a shirt that exposed his chest that featured a variety of grothe corrals for inspection or they would mine tesque tattoos. In the middle of his torso, in what I'm sure was a defiant act against his government, he wore a big brass Civil War replica belt buckle with the initials "US" stamped in high relief. Jim took one look at the guy, who represented everything he detested in life, and said:

Budget-writing House committee continues work on plan for 2010-2011

AUSTIN - Through the week of March 23-27, the House Appropriations Committee and its various subcommittees toiled away at producing HB 1, a state budget for fiscal years 2010-2011. Hopes are that the budget bill may reach the House floor for debate in mid-April.

Appropriations Committee Chair Jim Pitts, R-Waxahachie, on March 27 said, "We are faced with very difficult and uncertain times in our economy. We have to make some difficult decisions."

Speaker Joe Straus said he's confident the narrowly divided 150- member House, composed of 76 Republicans and 74 Democrats, can work together to pass a budget without the necessity of a special session.

Despite the ponderous weight of passing a budget on House shoulders, the lower chamber did manage to vote out the committee substitute to Austin Rep. Dawnna Dukes' HB 873, a bill that recognizes Texas is behind other states in offering film incentives.

Intended to create movie industry jobs in Texas, HB 873 STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS By Ed Sterling | Texas Press Association

lowers the state grant threshold for a film or television program from a minimum of \$1 million in in-state spending to \$250,000 and lowers the percent that must be filmed in Texas from 80 percent to 60 percent.

SENATE BILLS **ADVANCE TO HOUSE**

The Texas Senate approved more than 60 bills during the week of March 23-27 and sent them on to the House for consideration.

Here are a few of those bills, to be scrutinized by House panels in the coming weeks:

· SB 158 by Rodney Ellis, D-Houston, requiring a school district to notify parents if a nurse is not assigned to a public school campus.

· SB 175 by Florence Shapiro, R-Plano, amending the "Top 10 Percent" law governing the number of students who may automatically be admitted to the University of Texas at Austin.

· SB 188 by Bob Deuell, R-Greenville, creating a hypodermic needle-exchange program to reduce the spread of communicable diseases, such as AIDS and

· SB 297 by Leticia Van de Putte, D-San Antonio, granting resident tuition rates and fees at public institutions of higher education for certain veterans and their spouses and children.

· SB 424 by Van de Putte, establishing and implementing school-based flu vaccination programs.

· SB 503 by Kevin Eltife, R-Tyler, requiring public notice of the name of each finalist for the position of superintendent of a public school district.

· SB 745 by Robert Duncan, R-Lubbock, authorizing a state agency to allow its employees to submit travel vouchers electroni-


· SB 476 by Jane Nelson, R-Lewisville, amending nurse staffing and overtime rules. SB 506 by John Carona, R-



Protect Now to Prevent Decades of Damage

While we enjoy mild, sun- or start to bleed. ny weather in West Texas, we to the American Cancer Society, exposure to ultraviolet (UV) rays is believed to be the biggest culprit. That's why it's so important to protect your skin from excessive sun exposure. It's also important to check your skin regularly for warning signs of skin cancer. If caught and treated early, skin cancer CAN be successfully treated.

Since sun exposure is most commonly linked to skin cancer, people who have a history of frequent sun exposure as well as sunburns are at a higher risk of the disease. Fair skinned individuals are more at risk, as are people with a family history of skin cancer and those who have a large number of moles.

Since the effects of sun exposure add up, our risk of developing skin cancer also increases as we get older. Anyone in a high-risk group should take extra precautions against skin cancer and talk with their doctor about regular screenings.

Skin cancer of any kind can be deadly. Although skin cancer can develop on any part of the body, it's most commonly found on areas that are often exposed to the sun.

There most common types include:

Basal cell cancer, the most common, is relatively slow-growing in many cases. It begins in the lowest layer of the epidermis, called the basal cell layer. It can first appear as a waxy bump or a flat lesion.

· Squamous cell cancer is also slow-growing but it can metastasize or spread to other body parts. It begins in the middle portion of the epidermis. This type of cancer can also start as a pearly bump or a flat lesion. It may be crusted

Malignant melanoma is the most dangerous type. It is often fatal unless caught very anocytes, or pigment producing cells of the skin. It starts as a pearly or dark bump or as a small lesion with irregular borders. About a third of the cases start in moles that suddenly change appearance 392-3788.

Actinic keratosis (AK), also face greater risk of devel- is precancerous condition oping skin cancer. According which appears as rough, red or brown scaly patches on the skin. AK's may start as small, red, flat spots then grow larger and become scaly or thick, like a wart. Most AKs form on the face or back of the hands, but can appear elsewhere.

When examining your skin for changes or growths, the American Academy of Dermatology says there are "ABCD" warning signs to be aware of:

· Asymmetry - one half of a growth does not match the other half.

· Border irregularity - the edges are ragged, notched or blurred.

· Color - the pigmentation is mottled or not uniform.

· Diameter - the width is greater than six millimeters (about the size of a pencil eraser).

Evolving - a mole or growth that looks different or is changing in its size, shape, or color

In general, any unusual change in the skin, especially a new growth or sore that doesn't heal, can be a warning sign of skin cancer, and should be checked promptly by your physician. Any growth of a mole should be of concern too. When caught early, your chances for successful treatment are much higher.

The key way to help avoid skin cancer is to avoid excessive sun exposure, especially during the peak burning hours between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m.

If you have to be outdoors, use hats and protective clothing, and ask your pharmacist to recommend a waterproof sunscreen with an SPF of at least 30.

Children need sun protection as well. Roughly 80 percent of a person's sun exposure occurs before age 21.

Pre-registration for the to bring the child with you to 2009-2010 Pre-Kindergarten and Kindergarten classes will be held on Wednesday, April 15, at Ozona Elementary (Intermediate) School.

Pre-Kindergarten can register from 9 a.m. to noon and Kindergarten from 1-4 p.m. To be eligible to attend prekindergarten, a student must be unable to speak and comprehend the English language, eligible to participate in the National Free or Reduced-Price Lunch Program or is home-

The child must be 4 years old on or before Sept. 1, 2009. Parents must have their child's birth certificate, (not the one from the hospital, but the one from the courthouse) shot record, and social security card in order to register the child. If the child speaks Spanish, testing will be done to see if he or she qualifies for Pre-kindergarten; therefore you will need

registration. Parents enrolling their children for Pre-kindergarten must bring a copy of their recent check stub. Income will be verified prior to the first day of school.

Kindergarten students must be five on or before Sept. 1, 2009. Parents will also need to bring their child's birth certificate, (not the one from the hospital, but the one from the courthouse shot record, and social security card to registration. A copy of these documents will be made, and the originals will be returned to you. This is required by law in Chap. 25.002 of the Texas Education Code.

The court's decision rejected a lawsuit filed by a Dallas couple that argued that the state pledge violated the First Amendment's Establishment Clause. The Legislature addedthe words to the state pledge in 2007.

In support of the ruling, Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott said, "The U.S. Supreme Court has repeatedly held that patriotic acknowledgments of the Almighty are constitutional. Texans can rest assured that we will continue defending their children's ability to recite the state Pledge of Allegiance each morning."

SBOE ALTERS SCIENCE LANGUAGE

The State Board of Education on March 27 voted 13-2 to change teacher manual language said to cast doubt on the scientific theory of evolution with the assertion that the various schools of thought have strengths and weaknesses.

The new language promotes the use of empirical evidence, logical reasoning and experimental and observational testing, "including examining all sides of scientific evidence of those scientific explanations so as to encourage critical thinking by the students.'







ORDER RESTRICTING OUTDOOR BURNING

The Commissioners' Court finds that circumstances present in all or part of the unincorporated area of the county create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning; and NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED by the Commissioners' Court of Crockett County, Texas, that outdoor burning is restricted in Crockett County for 30 days from the date of adoption of this Order, unless the restrictions are terminated earlier based on a determination made by the Texas Forest Service or this Court. This Order is adopted pursuant to Local Government Code 352.081, and other applicable statues. This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Natural Resources Commission for: (1) firefighter training; (2) public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations; (3) planting or harvesting or agricultural crops; or (4) burns that are conducted by an approved Prescribed Burning Association, Natural Resource Conservation Service, the and/or Texas A&M Agricultural Experiment Station, or prescribed burn manager certified under Section 153.048, Natural Resources Code, and meet the standards of Section 153.047, Natural Resources Code.

All burns shall be reported to the Crockett County Sheriff's Office (325) 392-2661 and the Fire Chief (325) 392-2626 prior to commencing, together with the name of the landowner, location involved and expert to be on hand.

This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor cooking in a properly contained area which is attended at all times.

In accordance with the Local Government Code 352.081 (h), a violation of this Order is a Class C misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.
