Commissioners approve new ambulance purchase

Crockett County Commissioners' Court unanimously approved the purchase of new ambulance as an emergency expenditure.

This took place after holding a called meeting on April 26 and an emergency meeting on April 27.

Along with purchasing the ambulance, the commissioners' motion also included to amend the budget of the emer- has very few transfers that gency services department to meet unusual conditions that could not be foreseen. This means funding for ambulance can now be transferred from the county's general revenue fund to the EMS budget.

The new ambulance is to replace an older model that currently has 85,000 miles on it and has been costing the county \$1,000 or more a month in repairs, said EMS that the vehicle was needed. Coordinator Eddie Martin.

As a teacher in this school system for the past 24 years and a 1974 graduate of OHS, I've decided to

write my first "letter to the editor." My late mother, a 1946 OHS graduate and secretary to the superintendent for 30 years always encouraged me not to share my opinion about school matters in the Stockman. I still believe this is the best rule of thumb. However, I am actually just clearing up misinformation given to the readers in a letter last week. I was totally offended by the

statement that one teacher was the only teacher who "voluntarily tutors students." What a ridiculous statement for anyone to make!

Since I have worked as a certified teacher for 24 years, I can tell the readers that most teachers I have worked with tutor or give extra help to students whenever it is needed. This may be before school, after school, or during school. This is decided by the student's schedule. This tutoring is done to help students who are struggling to pass classes and also to help them pass the TAKS tests. Teachers don't or shouldn't

expect a pat on the back for helping students. It is simply part of every teacher's job.

To clear up another bit of misinformation, let me start with the fact that the eighth-grade Science TAKS test had not even been administered as of last week's publication. This test was administered on Thursday, April

29, 2010. Hopefully the scores will be an improvement from last year. I hope all the TAKS scores across the district improve, because

ake up Ozona, take a good look around. I mean a good, long, look around our schools. What do you see? Students, teachers,

Do you see learning? Do you see knowledge? Not physically, of course, but I know many teachers who would love to physically see these things floating into the air and into the heads of their students.

Take another look. This time of year do you also see spring fever? Teachers are tired, administrators exhausted and all the students can think about is June, July and August.

Every spring, I have noticed this fever seems to hit our small community. It brings about angry adults and rampant opinions as to what is best for our school

system. The funny thing is there are some positive elements lurking out of this fever.

In case you missed it, our schools were engrossed in TAKS testing last week. This testing, mandated by the state, comes every spring.

To prepare for this test, a test many students must pass in order to graduate or advance to the next grade, teachers go out of their way to tutor students before and after school, to find creative methods in getting that student to remember those scientific formulas and to educate them as many different ways possible.

Early results of this test show that Ozona eighth grade students had 88 percent passing reading and 90 percent passing

However, to those who think all teachers just "teach a test" should take a look at a group of high school students that are heading to state competitions this week.

Students in woodshop and ag mechanics are traveling to Waco to display their projects, while two other students are competing in Austin in journalism events at the UIL Academic State Meet.

Our elementary school has emphasized both reading and music this year with visitors from the San Angelo Symphony. The sixth grade students just learned first-hand about natural resource conservation, which involves everything from rainwater usage to where that hamburger comes

We are fortunate, here in Ozona, to have a school system that allows our students these expe-

riences. We are fortunate that our students and teachers can work in a safe environment and bring these creative methods into their classrooms.

At their April meeting, the Crockett County CCSD Board of Trustees approved a mas-

sive technology plan. This is a plan that will implement new technology at all campuses for students, teachers and the pub-

Technology is part of the world we live in. Without it, we couldn't publish a newspaper every week, you couldn't drive a car to work or watch the big game on TV.

Auction markets solve a lot of our problems. Not only do they provide the best form of price discovery, they also give us a place to send our waspy critters. Like weary parents who celebrate when their bratty kids are old enough to send to school, (where they become the problems of some poor teacher), we celebrate when we finally get our wild cows corralled and the Gooseneck door is closed. When that trailer door is next opened the crazy cows, belligerent bulls and horny heifers become the problem of the courageous folks at the auction market. In many instances our bad actors do far more damage to the sale barn facilities than they bring in commission.

While cattlemen in northern climes may laugh at the lop earred, multicolored, horned cows of the great southwest, be advised that they are that way for a reason. These cattle have more enemies than their northern cousins and they use their horns as a weapon against pumas and people. Their hides are mobile air conditioners and their ears remind us that in many parts of cow country the best cow is a cross between two distinct species: the Bos Taurus and Bos Indicus. the sorting might get killed in the process! Years ago I got to a sale the day before and went to hang out at the auction market where we'd be dispersing a big herd the next day. Being aware of my vast judging team experience and my encyclopedic knowledge of cattle the sale manager asked if I'd be willing to help, as he was a little short handed in the labor department. I puffed out my chest, said I'd be glad to share my knowledge and was promptly told to, "Get on a gate, open it when I tell you to and try hard not to mess

The alleys that day were no place for a coward and I was put over the fence several times. The cattle weren't crazy, just a tad bit independent, I'd say. I have one memorable cow to thank for introducing me to the solar system during those festivities. I am told it's quite rare for anyone to see as many constellations of stars as I did that day, especially at three o'clock in the afternoon! That cow also taught me a valuable lesson: never get to a sale a day early. If you must, stay away from the auction

The next day, after we had sold the cows, we sold the bulls. We ran them in as groups and on the very first pair the buyer wanted to avail himself of buyer's choice. This put the auctioneer on the horns of a dilemma. Due to space limitations out back we'd expected to sell the bulls in groups but this guy was the biggest cow buyer and the auctioneer didn't want to offend him. So he caved in which meant the ring men had to sort the one bull off in the ring and in doing so they put themselves in grave danger. Emphasis on the word "grave." Then we sold the second bull to the same guy for \$25 more! Sometimes it works that way.

The audience was like a bullfight crowd, seeming to love every second of the ring men's dance with death that day. After the sale I asked one of the brave ring men if he wasn't a little upset at the crowd for being so bloodthirsty. He looked up to the sky where a band of buzzards were making their daily rounds and said, "Those people on the seats came to see a show and they are just like those buzzards in many ways. They don't care if the ring men or the cattle die, just as long as something does!"

Governor: Texas cannot commit to funding high-risk health care pool

AUSTIN — The Patient Protection & Affordable Care Act, signed into law by President Obama on March 23, requires states to establish within 90 days "high risk pools" for people with a preexisting medical condition who have been uninsured for at least 6 months when they apply.

The pools would allow enrollees to pay standard market premium rates with their coverage not subject to any preexisting condition exclusion.

But on April 30, Gov. Rick Perry sent a letter to U.S. Health and Human Services Secretary Kathleen Sebelius notifying her that the state of Texas cannot commit to operating "a new temporary high-risk pool program due to the lack of program rules or reliable federal funding."

"I do not believe the aggressive implementation and the lack of assurances on financial solvency of the program are in the best interest of Texas taxpayers, families, patients or health care providers," Perry wrote.

ON BIG OIL SPILL

Crews from the Texas General Land Office Oil Spill Prevention and Response Program deployed with 1,000 feet of fire boom to help corral and burn the oil slick spreading from the damaged Deepwater Horizon oil rig off the coast of Louisiana.

A damaged wellhead on the ocean floor more than a mile beneath the surface is discharging an estimated 5,000 barrels of oil each day.

The spill threatens human health, wildlife and commerce along the Gulf coast. BP Plc, manager of the leaking oil facility, said it would pay clean-

STATE DEFENDS 'UNDER GOD' IN PLEDGE

Texas Solicitor General James Ho on April 27 defended the constitutionality of the Texas Pledge of Allegiance before the U.S. Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals.

The pledge, as amended in 2007, reads: "Honor the Texas flag: I pledge allegiance to thee. Texas, one state under God, one and indivisible."

After the Texas Legislature added the words "under God" to the Texas Pledge in 2007, a Dallas couple filed a lawsuit arguing that the amended pledge violated the First Amendment's Establishment Clause. At trial, the Office of the Attorney General successfully argued that patriotic acknowledgments of the Almighty are consistent with the U.S. Constitution. The federal district court agreed, ruling that the revised state pledge is constitutional.

After the federal district judge issued its decision rejecting the plaintiffs' challenge in 2009, the plaintiffs appealed the adverse ruling to the Fifth

Circuit. "As the U.S. Supreme Court has repeatedly acknowledged, reciting the U.S. Pledge of Allegiance is an appropriate and constitutional way to begin each school day on the right note," Solicitor General Ho said. "The Texas Pledge of Allegiance serves precisely the same function — to give students an opportunity to engage in a patriotic acknowledgement of the religious heritage of our state and our nation.' 



A circular-ceiling pattern, which will be seen throughout the building, will greet visitors. Tile will be on the hallway floor. The office will be a combination of carpet and concrete or tile. Also, near the office area will be a mailroom and conference room.

The first rooms on the main floor will be for the assistant principal, counseling center, nurses' station with restroom, facility restrooms, copy machine room and aides' offices and stations and the lounge area.

The first classrooms will be for speech, dyslexia and special education. The special education room also has a restroom.

Second grade classrooms are next. Each classroom will have a set of cabinets, around sevenfeet-tall on one side, with adjustable shelving for storage. The other side of the room will have divided lockers.

"They seem so square," said Stacy Mecke, first grade teacher. Marker boards, a projector and mounted flat-panel televisions will also be in each room.

Shades will be on all windows. Teachers will also be receiving laptops with docking stations in their classrooms, The laptops can interact with the projectors and the televisions.

"The message system will be like a convention center. The kids could even have a morning show, and you can select which classrooms to show it in," duBois said.

The teachers also noticed that the hallway was narrower than what they had been accustomed to. Walls in the hallway will have a textured finish, which means no nails or staples, but some bulletin or tack boards will be placed to show off news and information.

In the middle of the hallway are the students' restrooms. No doors are on the restrooms. Boys go around a corner one direction and girls go around another corner in the other direction. Sinks are in the middle.

At the south end there will be a computer lab and science labs. Around the corner and there are first grade classrooms. Many of the teachers were excited to see their larger spaces.

From the first grade, the group moved into what will become an enclosed atrium or vestibule space with a door to another playground area. This is the pre-K and kindergarten wing.


Pre-K classrooms are the former first grade classrooms from the old primary school. The kindergarten rooms are also large.

The old primary school gym is now filled with kitchen appliances ready to be installed to become the new Cafetorium. Risers

and a sound system will be installed, along with a suspended ceiling to let in lots of light.

There will also be a "playful" wall with graphics and designs, duBois said.

Along with the new cafeteria equipment, the district will also be using some used equipment from the high school cafeteria, which is currently the main cafeteria. Once the new elementary school is complete, it will become the main cafeteria.

The space will be able to seat 200 for lunch and more during performances.

Some of the windows on the second floor are frosted in classrooms, due to the fact they overlook the air conditioning units. There is also a skylight area along the second floor hallway, filled with windows above the classrooms.

The elevator, which is located near the entrance, will be on a key-operated system, duBois said.

Security cameras will also be located throughout the building, including the two stairwells.


