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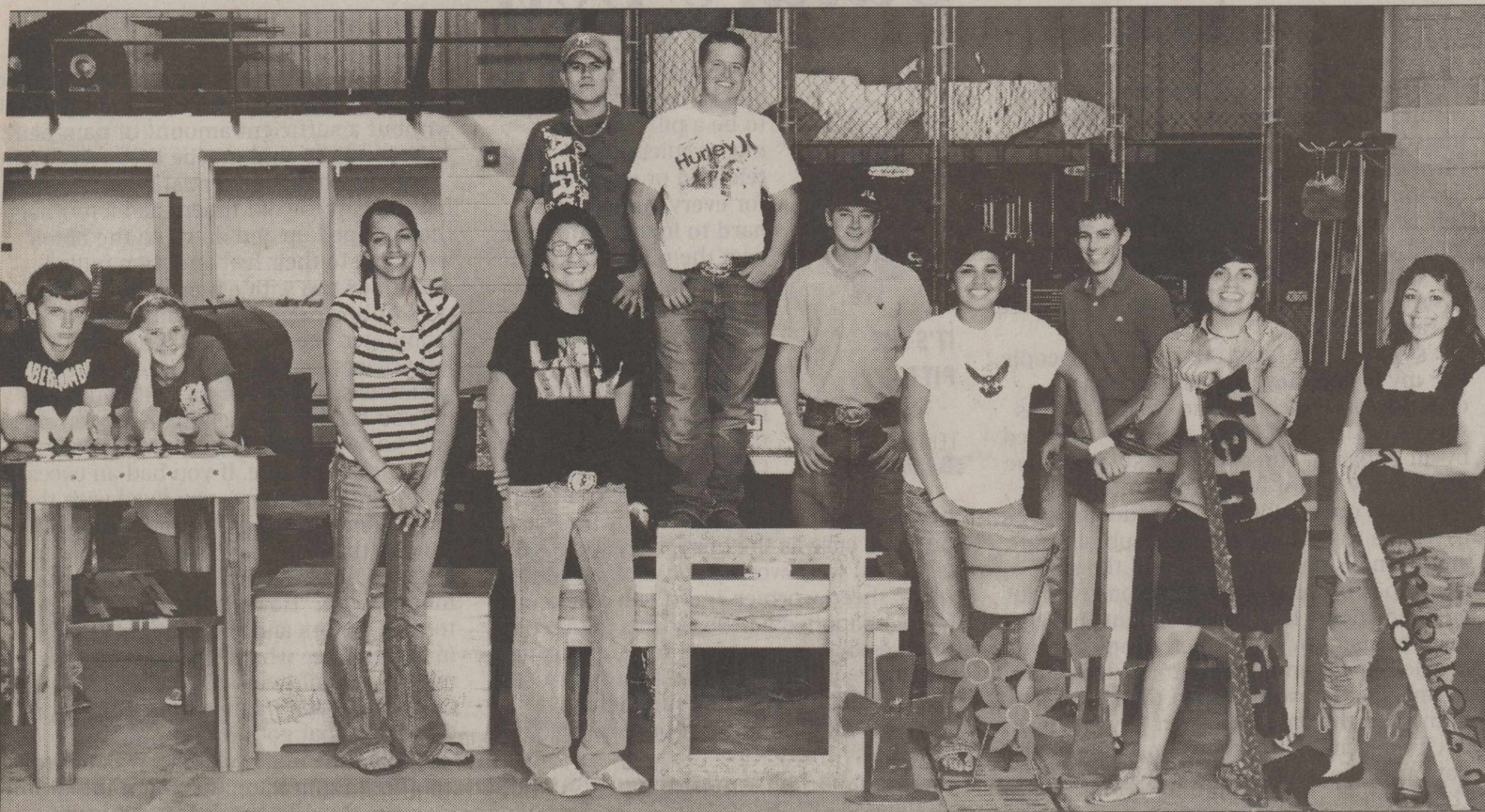

Commissioners approve juvenile curfew

Juveniles out on the street meeting, by a narrow 2-3 vote the Crockett County Commissioners' Court adopted a juvenile curfew. Commissioners Alfredo Tobar and Frank Tambunga voted against the motion.

The curfew takes effect immediately. Enforcement of the curfew will be conducted through local law enforcement. Violation of the curfew will be a Class C misdemeanor punishable up to a \$200 fine plus court costs up to \$65. Class C misdemeanors are handled in Justice of the Peace Court.

"I try to get their attention," said Justice of the Peace Jim Hearne about handling the cases in his court. "Those are the hours I think they should be home."

Tambunga said the curfew will give law enforcement a tool to stop anybody, anytime and sees a problem if the curfew is not always enforced. "Nobody else is here to give their opinion. They are putting it all on us. I think we should allow people to come voice their opinion on it," Tambunga said.

Before adopting the curfew, Tambunga made the motion to not have a curfew. The vote on that motion was also 2-3 with Commissioners Randy Branch and Pleas Childress III and County Judge Fred Deaton voting against the motion causing the motion to die.

"I don't think we need a curfew. I don't. We will give permission to the sheriff's of-

face to violate their rights," Tobar added.

The issue of a curfew has been addressed in commissioners' court before.

Crockett County Sheriff Roy Glenn Sutton said during the October 2009 meeting that currently the sheriff's department cannot take juveniles home that are out late at night without a curfew. Instead, Sutton said he gets the names and addresses of each juvenile, and tells them that if any vandalism or anything is broken into to, then he has reason to believe that the juveniles are suspects and they will be the first ones Sutton will talk to about any incident.

Now, with the curfew the sheriff's office can take juveniles home and issue a citation.

"It's taken me a long time to try to figure out how to deal with this. We're a backup. It's the parents' job to do the parenting. This is not geared toward anyone that is taking care of their children," Deaton said. "There are people that want it and there are people that don't want it. The only ones it will affect are the ones whose parents let them be out all night. Nobody is going to do any good in school if they are out at 2 a.m."

NEIGHBORHOOD CRIME WATCH

A Neighborhood Crime Watch program to make Ozona safer was also discussed during Monday's meeting.

Corba Jones, a resident who lives at Crockett Heights, presented information about starting the program in Ozona.

Fire department receives grant

The Ozona Volunteer Fire Department has received a \$153,615 grant through the Department of Homeland Security's Federal Emergency Management Agency in cooperation with the U.S. Fire Administration.

The grant will be used to update radio equipment and purchase 20 new self-contained breathing apparatus, said Fire Chief Bob Falkner.

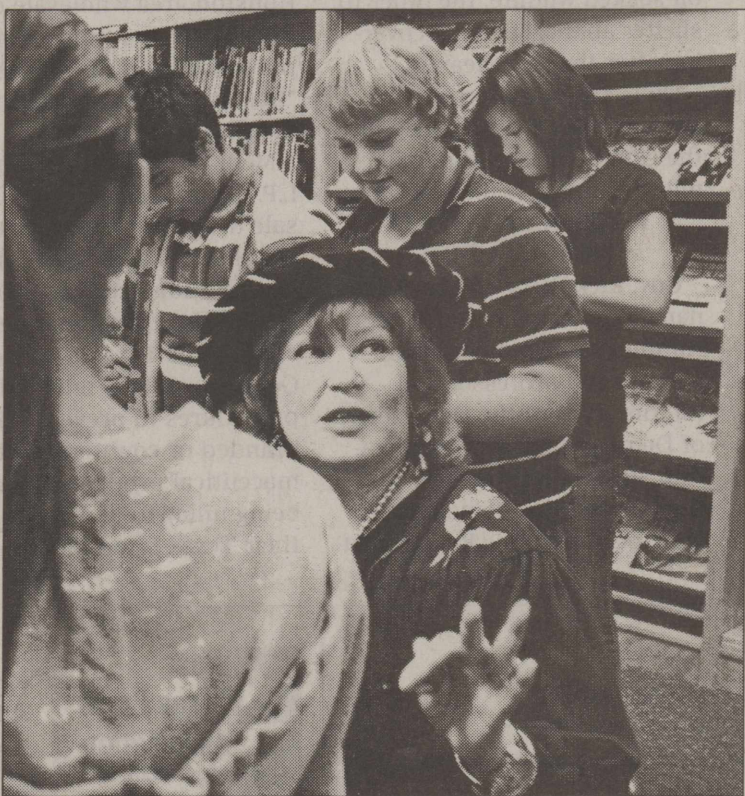
The award aims to enhance first responders' ability to protect the health and safety of the public, as well as that of first-responder personnel, with respect to fire-related hazards.

Falkner said there would be no cost to the county as well for the equipment.

By December 2012, radios are required to be on a narrow band, and by 2013 radios need to be digital, Falkner said.

The fire department applied for the grant in May 2009.

School board learns about new curriculum

Aligning grade levels and subjects to help teachers prepare Texas students for a competitive world is the idea behind a new curriculum program.

Crockett County CCSD Board of Trustees attended a special training meeting to learn about CSCOPE curriculum.

CSCOPE was developed by Texas Education Service Centers team of content experts and focuses on providing a consistent system of learning using common language and teaching methods from kindergarten through 12th grade.

Ozona will join about 500 schools across the state in implementing the CSCOPE curriculum with its number one aim at providing a systematic, vertically aligned method of Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills (TEKS)

mastery.

"We want to be competitive. Texas is never in the top 25 in the education realm. CSCOPE really wants to advance and bring Texas education in the top 10 and keep pace technologically in society," said Anna Bozarth, with the Region XV Education Service Center in San Angelo.

Bozarth and Dean Munn, also with Region XV, gave the CSCOPE presentation to the board.

CSCOPE is a web-based program that is used in 28 of the 44 districts in Region XV, as well as every Education Service Center Region in Texas, except Region IV, which is Houston. That region has its own curriculum, Bozarth said.

"CSCOPE gives you all the things to let you know it's guaranteed," Bozarth said. "Education is constantly changing, changing, changing. We want kids to

be successful in the technological age."

The TEKS are the lessons provided by the state, but Bozarth said what CSCOPE does is help teachers take the TEKS and breaks them down into specific instructions and information for the teachers.

"The state does not give you a lot of information as to what you teach. This (CSCOPE) narrows down what you need to do," Bozarth said.

During the presentation, Bozarth showed a sample of the lesson plans and a lesson that the teachers will be using. Teachers can look a range of lessons over several grades, gives a suggested timeline of days, performance indicators and other information needed. Bozarth even showed how teachers can implement local information.

a forced resignation and got his way with the school board.

How do all teachers feel knowing now that if your principal recommends you for a contract extension, you still could be forced to resign by the superintendent even though he does not observe your job performance on a day to day basis? Ask yourselves, why does the school board allow such unacceptable behavior by the superintendent? Does the school board work for the superintendent if they rub-

It's only in the last 100 years that people, like my friend, haven't had to be their own doctor. If a cowboy in the 1800s was seriously sick, kicked by a horse, wounded by an Indian or run over by a stampede he was simply out of luck. And out of time.

Early in our nation's history doctors were as scarce as tuba players in a submarine, and even if one could be found the sawbones performed most operations without any anesthetic. If you don't count the whiskey, that is. Now days when people go to the doctor for an ingrown toenail it's hard to imagine that women had their babies at home and the only provision for pain was a stick they could bite down on. 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'Winning' candidate's withdrawal creates unusual election situation

AUSTIN — An unusual special election situation has produced the need for a ruling by Secretary of State Esperanza "Hope" Andrade, the state's chief elections officer.

Long-time House District 66 State Rep. Brian McCall resigned from office in late March after being named chancellor of the San Marcos-based Texas State University System. McCall's resignation created the need for a special election to fill the vacated seat.

Republican businesswoman Mabrie Jackson filed as a candidate to fill the south Collin County (Plano-area) HD 66 seat, but she withdrew on April 14, too late for Collin County to remove her name from the ballot.

Jackson's withdrawal resulted in the swearing in of her special election opponent Van Taylor.

However, despite her resignation, Jackson pulled 59 percent of the vote to Taylor's 41 percent.

Something official on the situation is expected from Secretary Andrade.

LAND OFFICE SENDS HELP TO GULF

On May 3, Land Commissioner Jerry Patterson said his office would assist in the oil spill cleanup effort on the Louisiana coast.

"This could be a serious environmental challenge for the Gulf Coast," Patterson said. The General Land Office sent wildlife rescue specialists and two trailers, one for cleaning oil-soaked wildlife, the other to shelter animals while recovering after they are cleaned.

Oil is gushing from a damaged well head a mile deep in the Gulf of Mexico about 50 miles from the Louisiana shore.

PERRY NAMES STATE DEMOGRAPHER

Gov. Rick Perry on May 5 named Dr. Lloyd Potter of San Antonio state demographer.

Potter is a professor and interim chair of the Department of Demography and Organization Studies, and director of the Institute for Demographic and Socioeconomic Research at

the University of Texas at San Antonio.

The State Demographer's Office distributes census information, population estimates and projections for the state, and information from federal, state and other government sources.

AG HALTS SALE OF MISBRANDED DRUGS

Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott on May 6 resolved the state's legal action against a Houston-area wholesale drug distributor that improperly purchased and distributed "misbranded" prescription drugs.

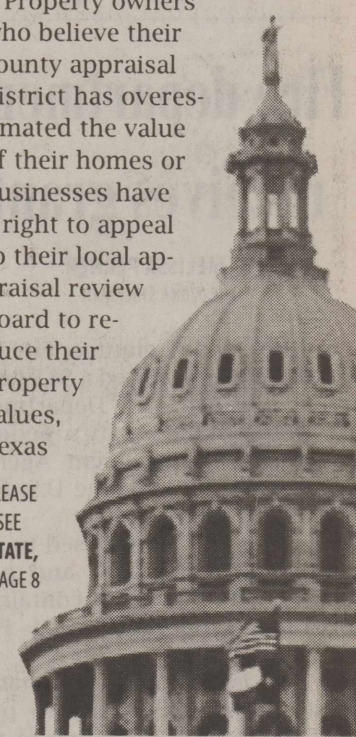
Medical Discount Pharmacy L.P., a state-licensed wholesale drug distributor that warehouses and distributes prescription drugs, under an agreed final judgment negotiated by the Texas Attorney General's Office, must adopt procedures to prevent misbranded or counterfeit pharmaceutical products from being unlawfully distributed to their Texas retail pharmacies.

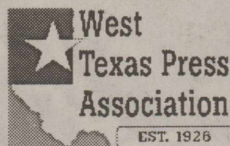

Community Center dedicates fountain to Massie Memorial Foundation

The Ozona Community Center sponsored a dedication service honoring the Massie Memorial Foundation last Wednesday, May 5, on the front lawn of the Community Center.

A plaque that reads "The Ozona Community Center Proudly Recognizes The Massie Memorial Foundation For A Lifetime Of Financial And Moral Support. The Ozona Community Center Is Deeply Grateful For This Help And Will Forever Be Indebted To This Outstanding Educational Foundation" was attached to a beautiful new water fountain constructed from native stone replacing the old and broken fountain. The fountain was constructed by Ira Childress and Ozona Remodeling and New Construction.

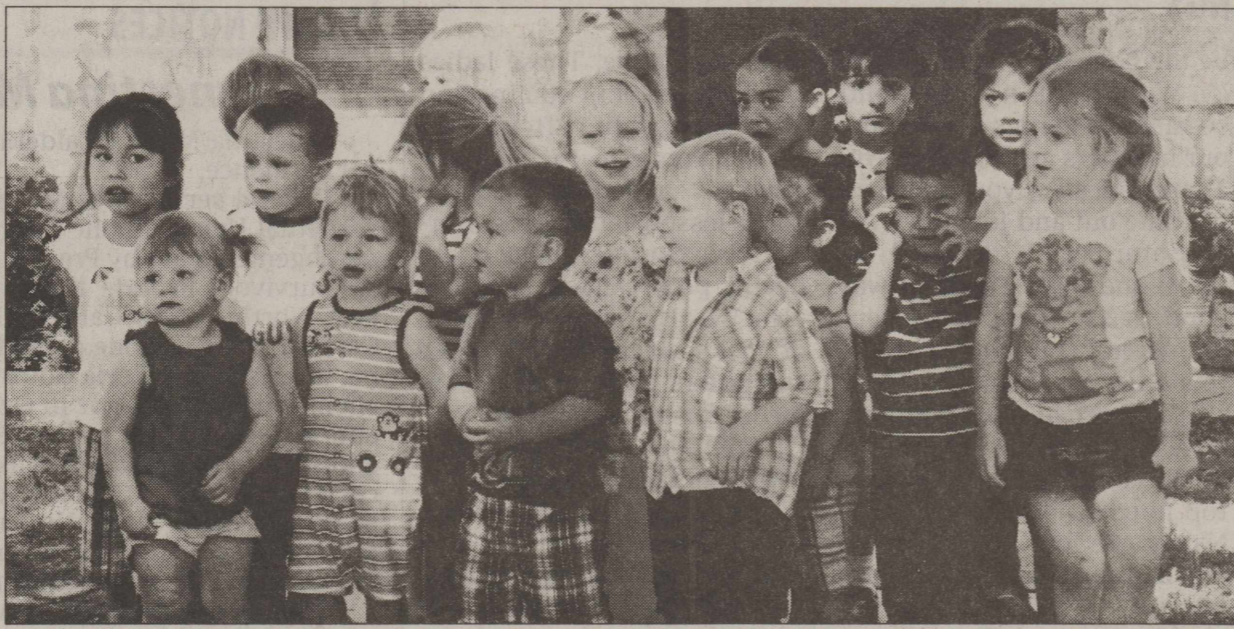
Directors for the Massie Memorial Foundation were entertained by the children who sang "There's A Dog In Class." The directors were then given a tour of the facilities by Director Lizzy Vargas and Jody Upham. After the dedication service, directors were treated to lunch at the Crockett Room sponsored by the Ozona Community Center.

Robert Massie was a pioneer of West Texas even though he was born in Aberdeen, Scotland in 1867. He first immigrated to Canada when he was sixteen years old then moved to Colorado City, Texas a few months later.

Massie first worked as an apprentice to Arthur Anderson, a prominent sheep rancher in the area. While working with Anderson, Massie chose to receive part of his pay in the form of ewe lambs. This enabled him to establish the foundation of his own flock which helped him become one of the leading figures in the sheep and wool industry throughout the region. It was Massie who brought the first sheep into Crockett County and eventually put together a seventy-section ranch north of Ozona.

Robert Massie was not only identified with the sheep industry but other ventures as well. He was a founder and director of both the Ozona National Bank and the Central National Bank of San Angelo. He was instrumental in the formation of the Wool Growers Central Storage Company in 1909. In addition, he was involved in the Robert Massie Furniture Company and the Robert Massie Funeral Home.

In 1900, Robert Massie married Marylee Payne. She was born in Colorado County, Texas, the

daughter of attorney Don Fernando Payne. When her father died, the family moved to Concho County where she served as a teacher, postmistress and saleslady.

The Massies had no children of their own, but their concern for the youth of West Texas was evident in Mrs. Massie's will. Mrs. Massie dedicated \$250,000 to the Massie Memorial Foundation which would use the accumulated interest on the principal to support several endeavors exclusively in West Texas. The Foundation, which held its first meeting on May 12, 1932 at the Wool Growers Central Storage Company, was set up under the guidance of a seven-man board. The governance has not changed through the years.

Current directors serving are Roger Dolliver, Pierce Miller and Mort Mertz of San Angelo and Joe Bean, Brock Jones, Steve Kenley and Jack Baggett Jr. of Ozona.

Today, the Massie Memorial Foundation touches the lives of many through college scholarships to Angelo State University, donations to the Tom Green County Public Library, the Junior League of San Angelo, the YMCA, the San Angelo Art Club, The James Phillips Williams Memorial Foundation dedicated to helping children and adults with dyslexia, the San Angelo Museum of Fine Arts and the San Angelo Nature Center.

Crockett County, the longtime residence of Mrs. and Mrs. Massie,

has also been the recipient of the Massie's generosity. Both the Ozona Community Center and the Crockett County Public Library have received ongoing financial assistance from this foundation.

The Massie Foundation has supported the Ozona Community Center because of their dedication to education in Crockett County. The center is a nonprofit organization which relies heavily on contributions from outside sources and is committed to educating children. The Massie Memorial Foundation provides several thousand dollars each year to the Ozona Community Center to provide many deserving children a chance to learn in a clean, safe and Christian environment.

The legacy of the Massies will live on thanks to the continued

work of their Memorial Foundation. The committee's charge was to use the funds "to uplift, educate, culture and train young people." The amount of money granted by the Board varies from year to year depending on funds available and needs presented. The Foundation believed, as the Massies did, in strengthening the youth of West Texas through education and in providing opportunities in areas such as the arts and education that might not be accessible to large groups of children and adults. It is the desire of the Foundation Board that the pioneering spirit, so evident in Robert and Mary Massie, will continue in West Texas through the lives of the numerous young people touched by the generosity of the Massie Memorial Foundation.

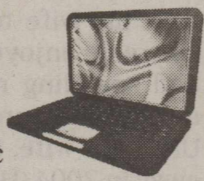

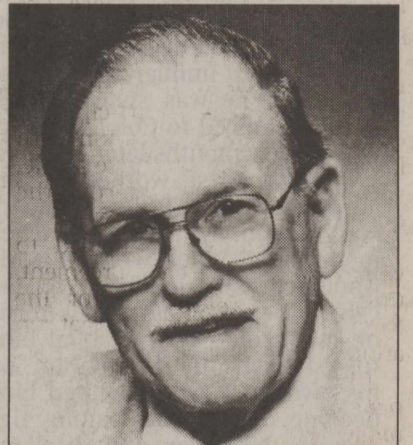

Jerry Fatout

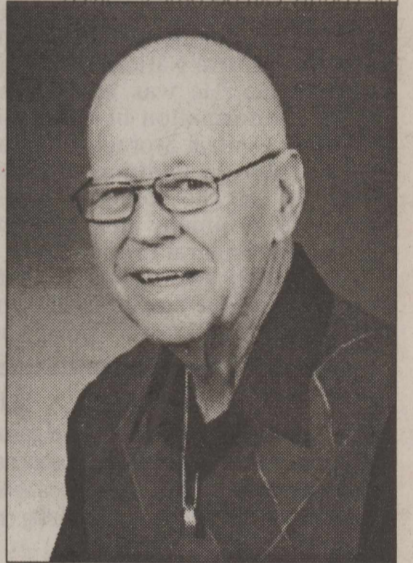
Jerry Fatout died on Sunday, May 9, 2010 after a courageous battle with lung cancer.

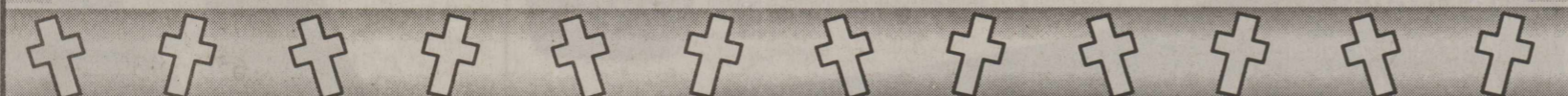

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Routine air conditioning tune-ups can save dollars

Routine air conditioning tune-ups are among the best home investments you can make. That's because tune-ups improve your system's efficiency and increase its lifespan, saving you operating dollars, postponing replacement dollars and keeping you comfortable at the same time. Not only that, you can avoid problems with mold build-up that can harm your breathing space.

It's the same principle as routine dental cleaning and annual medical appointments. Nothing's wrong, and you want to keep it that way. But some folks let the "ounce of prevention" opportunity pass right on by, thanks to a misguided impression that it's just too much trouble.

Yet tune-ups are simple and quick a very much worth a very minor inconvenience that can save you a good bit of time and money in the long run.

Basically, a licensed professional will:

- 1) Clean evaporator and condenser coils as needed,

- and straighten bent fins.
- 2) Check all electrical components and controls.
- 3) Check the Condenser.
- 4) Calibrate the Thermostat
- 5) Check to see if the system is properly charged with refrigerant and that there are no leaks.
- 6) Check Filters

Oh, and you can keep a watch on this on your own. While many homeowners choose to shade their condensers with trees and shrubs to improve efficiency, you'll want to watch to make sure

vegetation doesn't grow around the condenser to restrict the air flow.

Most tune-up tasks are too extensive for the average homeowner - because of the risk of electrical shock and the potential for shorting in the electrical components. But one of our techs can tend to these things in a very short time.

Think of it as a way to money while avoiding a whole lot more trouble later on. Equipment failure in the heat of August is never as fun as a preventive measure taken in springtime.

Before moving to Ozona, Jones said she worked on a program in New Braunfels.

Jones said the residents at Crockett Heights basically already have the program out there.

"The reason I came here first is because Ozona is not a city and the rules are all different. I'm willing to go out. I have talked to some neighborhoods. It's to make life easier and to help the sheriff's department have a better communication with the community," Jones said. "I cannot see anybody, personally, objecting to this. If I'm going to live here, I'm going to feel safe."

Neighborhood Watch is a crime prevention program that enlists the active participation of residents in cooperation with law enforcement to reduce crime, solve problems and improve the quality of life in the area.

The program is designed to work with local law enforcement. Cost in the program is for the Neighborhood Watch signs that run around \$25 per sign, Jones said.

While it was discussed that people would probably donate money to help buy the signs, Jones wanted to know if the county would be willing to install the signs on county property areas, and if the sheriff's department would be willing to work with the program.

Deaton said on the county's side, more research is needed as to how the county can become involved.

"I'm not opposed to this at all. I know that in my neighborhood, we are a pretty close neighborhood. I would be happy to donate a sign. I really think you will have some organization on this," Deaton said.

Sutton said he hasn't had time to review the whole Neighborhood Watch process and what it entails, and the fact that there may be grants available for these particular programs.

"No use us jumping through the hoop right now, unless you have enough individuals involved in this thing. This needs to be brought up so that the whole county knows that it is being brought up," Sutton said.

Jones said she would be willing to host a public meeting to inform citizens about the program. She also said each August, the National Association of Town Watch, a nonprofit crime prevention organization which works with crime watch programs, hosts "National Night Out" in an effort to heighten awareness and strengthen local participation in local anticrime efforts.

Neighborhoods often host block parties, visits from law enforcement and local officials as well as neighborhood walks and safety fairs.

All of the commissioners agreed that they would be willing to visit neighborhoods if this event comes to place in Ozona.

"I believe in my heart it will cut back on the misdemeanor type violence," she said. "I think it will make for a better community."

The commissioners did not vote on the issue but agreed to keep the item on the meeting agenda for June.

"This is awareness for the people in the neighborhood and lets people know we are watching our neighborhood. We do need to find out all that we need to do," Childress said.

CSCOPE is also aligned for the TAKS test and the new STARR and End-of-Course exams.

Superintendent Chris duBois said CSCOPE is going to be used with the science teachers in the district.

"We've been pushing for 20 years for vertical alignment. It's met with a lot of resistance," said Board Member Dwight Childress.

Bozarth said during the first year, teachers may spend time filling in gaps with lessons that students missed or information that may have not been covered.

"It's not in a teacher's soul to skip those gaps and let a student get behind," Bozarth said. "When you get vertically aligned and done, nobody goes back and visits it. With these documents, they get vertically aligned every year. We are working with uneven playing fields. Everything in CSCOPE is also experiential learning for low, socio-economic kids."

Bozarth said school districts have paid up to \$500,000 to have a person build curriculums for the district.

"CSCOPE created by people who spend their life's work in building curriculum. The best part about it is that it gives level-footing for every district in Texas," she said.

Ozona principals and teachers attended workshops and visited other schools to see how CSCOPE works. In the past, Ozona has not had any adopted curriculum products.

"Your instructional staff has recognized the value of this and we are going to implement this for them," duBois said. "Each campus will have flexibility in how they want to use it."

CSCOPE provides flexibility, context clues are built into the instruction and teachers tailor their

lessons and customize resources, duBois said.

The program can also help teachers who change subject areas as well.

"The focus is on improving. The payoff to this is when these kids can walk out of the door with the confidence that they can do anything in life. They don't do that with a good TAKS score, they do that with a good curriculum," duBois said.

School board members also attended a District Goal Setting Retreat on May 8 at the OHS Cafeteria. Also in attendance were members of the CCCCSD District Site-Based Committee, which includes parents, teachers and community members, along with district administrators and OMS and OHS Student representatives.

The half-day retreat was also conducted by members of the Region XV Education Service Center, and featured an agenda of future ideas for facilities and programs in CCCCSD.

These priorities will now be looked at by duBois, administrators and school board members for further, possible implementation.

The school board will hold their regular meeting at 5:30 p.m. May 19 at the Administration Building.

Comptroller Susan Combs announced May 4. Two video presentations available at the state comptroller's Website, www.window.state.tx.us, inform homeowners and small business owners about protest procedures, what to expect during a hearing and how to make an effective presentation to their appraisal review board.

FUNDING FOR SCHOOL BUS RETROFITS
The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality on May 3 announced school districts may apply for funds to retrofit older school buses to in order to reduce air pollution. About \$1.7 million is available on a first-come, first-served basis. Application deadline is May 31. The funding comes from the federal American Recovery and Reinvestment Act and is administered through the Texas Clean School Bus program which provides reimbursement to Texas school districts that install pollution-control devices on diesel school buses. The devices reduce particulate-matter emissions that can aggravate respiratory problems, asthma, and allergies in children who ride the buses.

SUPREME COURT JUSTICE TO RESIGN
Texas Supreme Court Justice Harriet O'Neill, who was not seeking reelection, on May 7 announced her resignation, effective June 20. O'Neill's term would have expired at the end of the year. She was first elected to the state's highest court in 1998.
