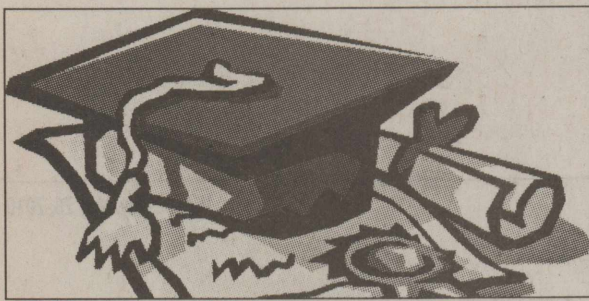

Stadium modifications approved, board to meet again Tuesday

Approval for some improvements to district facilities was made during the May 19 regular meeting of the Crockett County CCSD Board of Trustees.

In a vote of 4-2, the board approved an \$88,000 bid from Steel Stadiums in Graham for work to the home stands at Lion Stadium. Board President Dr. Marcus Sims and Laurie Hale, board vice president, voted against the motion. Board member Tom Anderson was absent.

Sims said he would have preferred to budget the expense for next year, instead of the money coming out of this year's budget.

"This is long overdue," said Board member Grizz Medina.

The work involved would take off the existing front rail and build a platform with reserve handicap seating. The platform would cover the area that gets standing water when it rains. There will still be a pathway between the fence and the front of the platform.

Instead of two walls between regular and reserved seating, there will be open air handrails. Everything will be handicap compliant and Steel Stadiums and guarantee the work will be finished by the first home football game in September.

Dear Editor,

My children have asked me to write about the events leading up to my life in Ozona to my retirement with John Stokes, CPA Accounting Firm. I moved to the ranch at Pandale at the end of 1980 after having graduated

from the University of Houston with a Bachelor of Science with a major in accounting.

I had a job waiting for me in Victoria with Harrison and Associates. I had already had my job interview and was hired. I was waiting on my graduation May 1980 to begin working there.

But God had something else for me to do. Sonny's Daddy, Carl Malone, was retiring from ranching and wanted Sonny to move back to the Malone Ranch and take over the operations. I had a decision to make. I moved back to the ranch where we began our

married life in February 1951. We had just made a circle and came back to the ranch. We raised our children in Corpus Christi and Victoria, so it was just Sonny and I coming back to the ranch.

Every rancher remembers the long trips to Ozona and just one day to get all your supplies, groceries and mail. It is now spring of 1981 and we made just such a trip to Ozona. I noticed the door on the old bank building with John Stokes, CPA on it. I asked Sonny to let me off there and I went inside to find Sandy and JoNel working very hard. It

was tax season time and I didn't know yet what all that involved. I introduced myself and told Sandy my history and how I had wanted to use my education. He told me I was just what he needed and he hired me on the spot.

I went to work shortly thereafter; three days in town and four days at the ranch and that became my life. My work was good and the clients were gracious. I enjoyed working with every one of them. Besides working on taxes, Sandy and I did audits of countries in Sonora, Leakey and Ricksprings. I became well ac-

quainted with many of the people in these offices.

Many things changed at the office over the years; Burl and Diane Myers were the first to share the offices with us. We were expecting Brock Jones to move in with us when he returned home. He was appointed District Judge and moved in to the courthouse. Bill Mason, a lawyer, moved into the offices Burl now has. I worked all over the office; then when Bill Mason left to go to the courthouse, Burl Myers moved into his office and I moved into Burl's office. There was always so much

going on. I enjoyed my work thoroughly and the clients I got to work with were the best part.

I have tried to retire several times. Sandy always told me I could work until I was 80. Well that is almost here and I know I have something else I need to do.

I don't want to say good-bye, just so long, see ya'll later, and thank you Sandy for giving me the best years of my life and thank you Lisa for your loyal support. I will miss everybody."

State Board of Education passes new curriculum standards

AUSTIN — The State Board of Education on May 21 approved new curriculum standards on a series of 9-5 votes after two days of public debate.

Standing-room-only crowds paid close attention as the ideologically divided board jostled over proposed changes to social studies and history standards. The board considered 213 amendments to standards for kindergarten through 12th grade. New standards for the high school economics course passed on a unanimous vote.

The newly adopted standards, or Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills, will be used in classrooms beginning in the 2011-2012 school year, the Texas Education Agency said. Examples of changes:

- Analyze Abraham Lincoln's ideas about liberty, equality, union and government as contained in his first and second inaugural addresses and the Gettysburg Address and contrast them with the ideas contained in Jefferson Davis's inaugural address.
- Examine the reasons the Founders protected religious

freedom in America and guaranteed its free exercise by saying that Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion or prohibiting the free exercise thereof, and compare and contrast this to the phrase "separation of church and state."

- Explain instances of institutional racism in American society.
- Discuss the solvency of long term entitlements such as Social Security and Medicare.

ORDER FOR BUDGET CUTS IS MADE

State agencies are tightening their belts enough to save taxpayers an estimated \$1.2 billion in the current two-year budget cycle, the governor's office said.

In January, Gov. Rick Perry, Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst and House Speaker Joe Straus, R-San Antonio, asked that each state agency make plans to cut general revenue budgets by 5 percent to head off a projected state budget shortfall then estimated at \$10 billion.

Straus said, "We cannot af-

ford business as usual, but must make tough choices and put every cost savings idea on the table."

On May 18, Perry, Dewhurst and Straus directed the Legislative Budget Board to tell the agencies to implement their budget-savings proposals immediately.

Budget cuts would have totaled close to \$1.7 billion, but some \$483 million in exemptions was granted to the Texas Department of Public Safety Homeland and Border Security; the Department of State Health Services, the Texas Department of Criminal Justice, the Texas Workforce Commission and the Higher Education Coordinating Board.

CAPITOL METAL DETECTORS IN USE

Screening stations with airport-style metal detectors began functioning at first-floor state Capitol entrances on May 21.

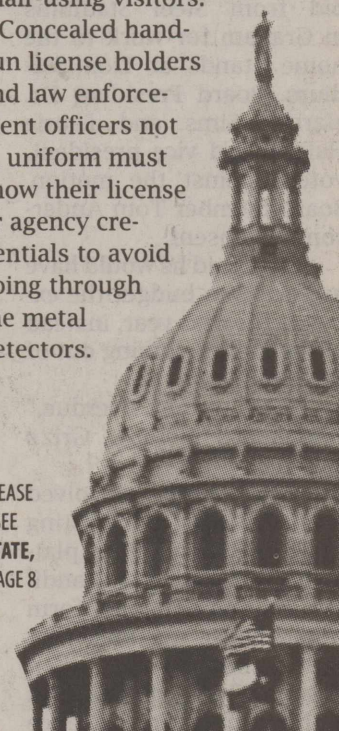
All visitors, including scheduled tours and schoolchildren, must go through the detectors, but legislators and staff will have

official access points and don't have to go through if they show their building access badge.

Capitol visitors are asked to remove metal objects before walking through the detectors. Troopers employ handheld wands to check wheelchair-using visitors.

Concealed handgun license holders and law enforcement officers not in uniform must show their license or agency credentials to avoid going through the metal detectors.

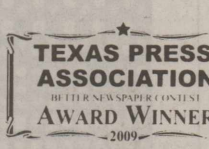
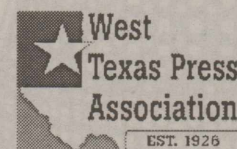

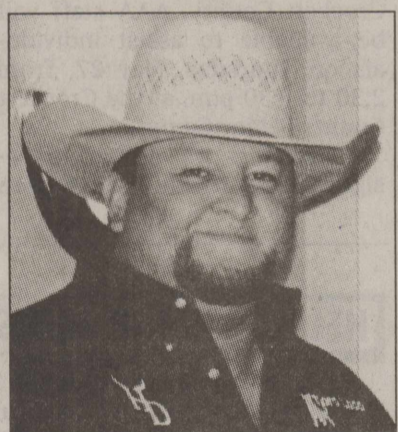
Cruz to announce several rodeos over the summer

Marguerite K. Stevenson

Marguerite Nell King Heap Stevenson, age 92, of Telegraph died Monday, May 24, 2010, in Ozona where she had lived with her daughter since 2005.

She was born March 2, 1918 near Segovia in Kimble County, Texas, the daughter of Rufus Roy King and Eva Ellen McMillan King. After graduating first in her class at Junction High School in 1934, she attended Baylor University. She returned to Kimble County and taught one term at the Allen rural school, then was employed by the Junction National Bank. In early 1937 she was appointed Junction City Secretary, but was unable to accept the position because she was under the age of 21. Instead she became a personnel clerk for the Texas-New Mexico Pipeline Company in Junction, later transferring to the Midland office of that company.

Marguerite married Gordon Marshall Heap of Tulsa, Oklahoma on July 27, 1941. Marshall served as a B-17 pilot in World War II and was killed in action in August 1944. After his death, she returned to Junction and served as District and County Clerk of Kimble County. On Jan. 16, 1954, she married Coke R. Stevenson, who served as Governor of Texas from 1941 until 1947. Following their marriage, she assisted Coke in his law practice in Junction and in their ranching operations in Kimble and Edwards Counties. He preceded her in death in 1975.

A descendant of several pioneer Texas families, Marguerite was a member of the Daughters of the Republic of Texas, serving several years on the committee that governs the Alamo. She was a lifelong member of the Trinity Episcopal Church and a charter member of the Daedalian Study Club in Junction.

She is survived by her son, Dennis Marshall Heap and wife Jayne of Junction and her daughter Jane Stevenson Chandler and husband Fred of Ozona. She is also survived by six grandchildren, Robin Heap Jetton and husband Sam, Marshall Heap and wife Lisa, all of Junction, Holli Heap and J. P. Gabriel of San Angelo, Kelli Heap Kirk and husband Kyle of Midland, Andrew Murr and wife Lacey of Junction and Rachel Murr Bean and husband Ryan of Ozona; 12 great-grandchildren, Kristin Kothmann of Waco, Andrew Heap of Lubbock, Katy Heap and Leacy Heap, of Junction, Erin Bynum of San Angelo, Kole Kirk, Kori Kirk, Kyler Kirk and Kase Kirk, all of Midland, Coke Murr of Junction, Claire Bean and Wyatt Bean of Ozona and two step great-grand children Shannon Jetton of San Antonio and Mike Jetton of San Angelo.

What does it take to be a journalist?

You have to have knowledge and understanding of the community you are covering. You need computer, interview and copy editing skills.

What do you like most about your job?

I enjoy taking pictures and covering events. The greatest part of my week is spent going from event to event and meeting to meeting. I enjoy seeing and interviewing people. I like that there is something different every day and that news can happen at any time.

What do you like least, and what is the hardest part of your job?

Anyone that knows me will tell you that it's the paperwork required to run a business that is my least favorite. The hardest part is being objective regardless if your friends and relatives are on

opposite sides of the issue. **How do you decide what is run in the paper?**

We discuss it as a staff. **What do you feel is the most important news to relay to the community?**

Depends on the time of year, but I feel the school board meetings are very important. I also feel that because Ozona is unincorporated that it is important to also cover the Commissioner Court meetings to keep the public informed. I try to cover and include as much local news as possible and any state or national news that might affect Ozona.

What would you like the community to know?

What type of feedback do you get about your paper?

Along with the stadium, the board approved a \$60,000 bid from Eyeful Art out of Houston for new artwork at the new elementary school, Davidson Gym, middle school, high school cafeteria and field house.

Sims voted against the motion and board member Dwight Childress abstained.

"It's just too much money," Sims said.

The Davidson floor is scheduled to be sanded the second week of June. Eyeful Art will come in third week of June and start work.

Cost for the elementary artwork will come out of the construction contingency fund, while the rest to come from the maintenance budget.

With the new elementary school, the board approved a \$30,316 roofing request, which will align parapet walls with steel in order to keep leaks out. The money will come out of the construction contingency allowance.

The board discussed pricing requests for the new elementary school on the roofing, fencing and electrical work.

For the electrical, it would be around \$40,000 for a lightning protection system and a surge protection system will come out of the contingency allowance for the school.

Three options were presented on fencing, with prices ranging from estimated \$68,000 to \$134,250. This would provide ornamental fencing at the perimeter of the school property and at playground areas.

Board members wanted more information on the lighting and surge protection systems, as well as the fencing before voting on any items.

The board will meet during a called meeting at 6:30 p.m. Tuesday, June 1, to address construction items.

Architect Douglas Koehne presented designs for a rainwater harvesting system. The system would include a 7-8-foot tall above ground tank that would hold 40,000 gallons. Koehne worked with Ty-Williams, Crockett Soil and Water District Conservationist on the project. More discussion on this project and landscaping will also be discussed at Tuesday's (June 1) meeting.

"It's a unique system. It's not something you will find at every school, but it will be a great benefit."

Bill Baker, project manager from Waldrop Construction, said the building will be "really tight" in making the August completion date.

"We still think we are going to make it," Baker said.

Baker said the kitchen is the main priority in getting complete, since it will become the main kitchen and cafeteria for the district with equipment being moved from the high school cafeteria. Baker also said they

are working to get the majority of the school finished by early August.

GIRLS' BASKETBALL COACH, OHS BAND DIRECTOR HIRED

After meeting in executive/closed session for two hours, the board unanimously approved the following contracts for professional staffing as recommended by the superintendent: Cristy Isenhower from Van Alstyne ISD as head girls' basketball coach and high school math teacher, Van Alstyne is located around the Dallas/Fort Worth area; Stephen Martin from Ropesville as the OHS Band Director; Whitney Brockman from Conroe as elementary special education teacher; Vicky White of Ozona as elementary teacher and Amaro Villarreal of Ozona, middle school P.E. teacher and coach.

This was the only motion made by the board after reconvening in open session. On the meeting agenda, the board was also to re-consider administrator contracts and consider professional resignations as well during executive session. No motion was made by the board on either item.

Prior to executive session, Coach Ray Ramos Jr. and Roland De Hoyos both spoke to the board in open forum.

Ramos brought a documented complaint which he presented to the board with documentation he said he has noted throughout the year about his position and work environment.

"I realize that I may not be welcomed back. My sole purpose to come here tonight is to stand up and tell the truth," Ramos said.

The board accepted Ramos's resignation during the March regular meeting, where several citizens spoke on behalf of Ramos.

De Hoyos once again spoke on how important it was for Ramos to stay, especially as a coach in the district.

"I don't want to go somewhere else where all my life I've dedicated my life to my kids in Ozona. We are the laughing stock of sports right now. I personally would want nine Rays here," De Hoyos said. "I will not stop at this. This is my town, my territory."

READ RIGHT PROGRAM

Sarah Gonzalez, Read Right Aide, gave a presentation on the new program and how Ozona students have done during the first year.

The program is for students up to eighth grade. It will expand into high school next year, Gonzalez said.

Around 114 students were tutored 3,069 hours with an improvement of 8.6 hours on elementary campus and 8.5 on the middle school campus.

"I believe it is helping the students and they are verbal about it helping them," Gonzalez said.

STUDENT PRESENTATIONS

Several students made presentations to the board during the meeting.

Ronny Clayton's high school geometry class showed their project on improvements to district athletic facilities, including the girls' field house, AstroTurf on the football field, tennis courts and a new concession stand.

FFA Student Russel Komechak presented his cutting board made in woodshop and talked about the importance and need of the new technology the program will be receiving this fall.

Senior Class President Alex Macias spoke on a painting the class is donating to the new elementary school.

Middle school students Noel Fierro and Madison Childress presented class project programs on Belize and Israel. Eighth-grade student Vivian Medina spoke on her Holocaust project and about the eighth grade trip to Corpus Christi and their stay on the USS Lexington, along with OMS Teacher Leanna Childress. Childress said the students' behavior was exceptional on the overnight trip.

Third grade teachers, Melinda Moran, Christina Rodriguez and Kari Hale talked about their class play, how 90 percent of the students have learned their multiplication tables and showed one of the science fair projects.

TASB COMPENSATION WORKSHOP

Luz Cadena a Texas Association of School Board Compensation Consultant presented a Pay Plan Design study to the board in a workshop before the regular meeting.

The study compared Ozona's salaries and stipend pay with other school districts in the area and with similar makeup. The average starting salary of the 12 districts Ozona was compared with was \$37,000. Ozona's starting pay is around \$35,000.

The study recommended starting pay to \$37,000 for teachers, along with recommendations on other pay structures for all employees and stipend changes throughout the district.

The board took no action on the plan. This was a proposal to the district. District officials will take this study and use it in preparing the budget this summer, as well as discuss it further in budget workshops.

OTHER ITEMS and FUTURE MEETINGS

The board approved Education Service Center Region XV Contracts for the 2010-2011 year.

The board will hold a called meeting at 6:30 p.m. Tuesday, June 1, for budget workshop, construction and maybe personnel at the Administration Building. The next regular meeting will be 6:30 p.m. June 16 at the Administration Building.

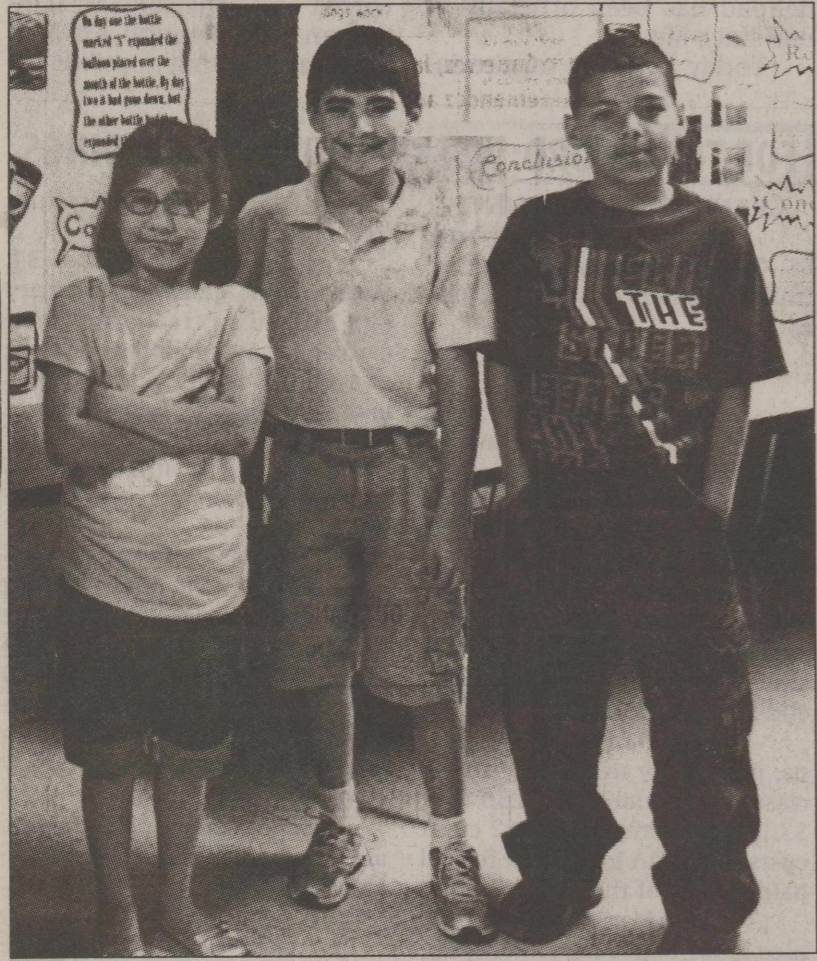
