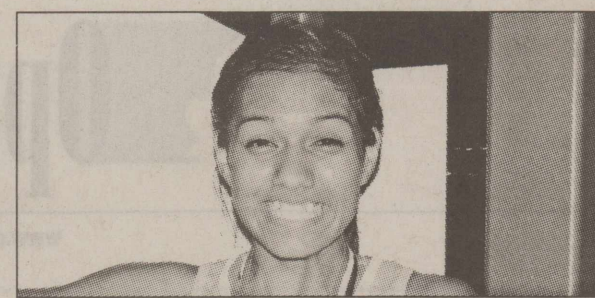

Getting ready to begin again

Educating parents and teachers is the goal this week at the new Ozona Elementary School.

The school is hosting a series of "Parent Preview Nights" this week to allow parents/guardians of the students the opportunity to get a "sneak-peek" at the new building before it opens on Sept. 7, said Principal Amanda Jackson.

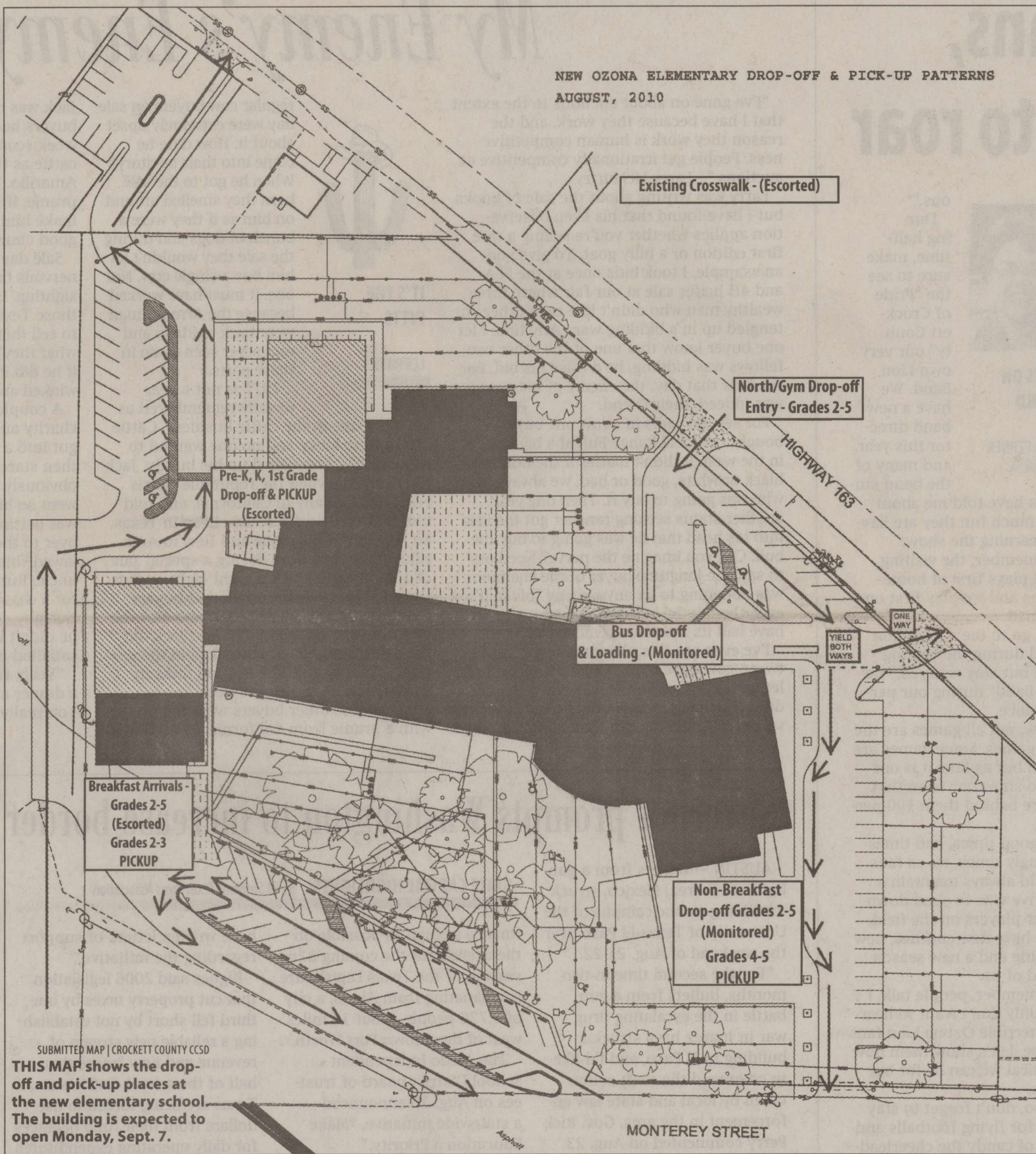
These meetings will be from 6-7:30 p.m. with first and second grades tonight (Sept. 1) and third, fourth and fifth grades Thursday (Sept. 2) at the new building. Pre-K, kindergarten and PPCD met Tuesday, Aug. 31.

"These meetings will also serve as a time to discuss traffic flow patterns, as well as point out student drop-off and pick-up designations," Jackson said.

The district is asking that these meetings be attended by parents and guardians only.

"We know everyone is excited to see the new school, but we are asking everyone to help us keep next week's tours to 'invitation only' parents and guardians. There are still a good number of technicians and workmen that will be at work even as

Trustees pass budget, tax rate

In a unanimous vote, the Crockett County CCSD Board of Trustees approved and adopted a balanced budget and a tax rate for the 2010-2011 school year.

At the Aug. 25 regular meeting, the board voted for a \$26 million balanced budget and a 1.26 per \$100 value tax rate.

With this rate, the district can pay off the remaining \$6 million on the \$10 million bond in February 2011 and save around \$425,000 in interest.

The district has two tax rates. One is 1.04 per \$100 value for maintenance and operation, and the other is \$.22 per \$100 value for interest and sinking. The I&S tax is for the bond.

The payoff schedule meets the criteria voters were presented when they approved the bond in 2008 in having it paid off in three years.

Next year, with the bond paid off, the I&S tax will go away. Bond money is not subject to state recapture, meaning the district has been able to keep all \$10 million for building the school.

The bond was passed to build the new elementary school that will house students in grades Pre-K through fifth. The new building combined the primary and intermediate schools.

However, money from the bond is not subject to recapture by the state, unlike money from the M&O fund. For the new year, the proposed amount for recapture is \$16 million, leaving the district \$10 million for operations and salaries. CCCSD is a Chapter 41 school district,

Stockman closed for Labor Day, deadline Friday

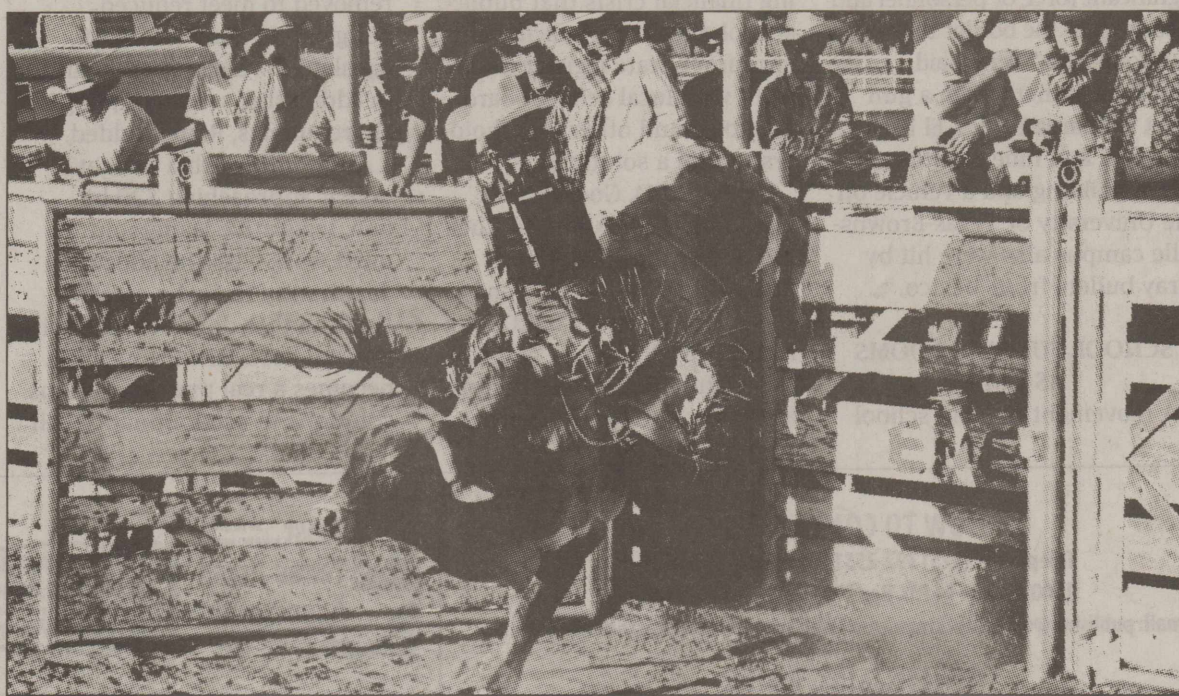
The Ozona Stockman will be closed Monday, Sept. 6, for the Labor Day holiday.

Fort Stockton man pleads guilty to capital murder

A Fort Stockton man pled guilty to capital murder Monday in Sonora.

David Michael Meyers, 32, entered the guilty plea to 112th District Judge Pedro Gomez Jr. Meyers was sentenced to life without parole prior to jury selection, according to a press release from the 112th District Attorney's office.

The case had been moved to Sutton County by a change of venue because of the pre-trial publicity. The state waived the death penalty because of the defendant's extensive psychological history, the release stated.

Meyers was charged in the shooting death of 25-year-old Drew Slater. The shooting occurred on Oct. 3, 2008 at Slater's residence in Fort Stockton.

The state was represented by Laurie English, the 112th District Attorney, and Assistant District Attorney Michael Dobbins. Meyers was represented by San Angelo attorneys Gonzalo Rios and Stephanie Goodman. The Fort Stockton Police Department investigated the case.

"All of the police officers involved are to be commended for their concerted and cooperative efforts in solving this murder. The

Dog pack leads to injured pet Chihuahua

Dear Editor,

I am writing to go on record with a complaint about Animal Control in Ozona. It is my understanding that Crockett County has a full time Animal Control Officer that operates out of the Road Department. On Monday, Aug. 23, I called the Road Department to speak to the officer and report a pack of dogs that were staying in my yard and running loose in my neighborhood. The pack

had been running loose all weekend and so I called first thing Monday morning to report the dogs and get them taken care of.

The pack was chasing a little chocolate brown Chihuahua female in heat. There were 6 dogs that I witnessed at different times in my yard both entering my dog that I kept tied on a cable in the back yard. I was worried that they would bother my dog or even attack him because he was all excited

about the little female in heat too, but he was tied up and not running loose all over the neighborhood.

I was informed that the Animal Control Officer had not come in to work Monday morning, but that my message would be given to her when she arrived. I called back on Tuesday, Aug. 24, to make sure that the officer had gotten my message and was told she had. But the dogs were still running loose and nothing had been

done. Unfortunately, no action was taken and when I came home for lunch on Wednesday, Aug. 25, I found my little Chihuahua lying in the back yard where he had been attacked and his neck and shoulder torn open. He was mauled and bleeding because he couldn't get away from his attackers since he was tied on the cable in my yard. I was able to get his neck stitched up and he is recovering, but now I am terrified to

let him out in the yard and I certainly won't be able to leave him out while I am at work. Dog owners need to be responsible for their pets. Keep them in their own yards and not running loose on the town. Dogs are wonderful pets, but they are pack animals and when they are running wild in a pack they will do vicious things that they normally would never do as an individual pet at home. That's why Crockett County

has an Animal Control Officer to make owners take care of pets and keep them at home, or face the penalty. The Animal Control Officer is not doing her job and I am formally making a complaint to the County Judge to correct this. This officer needs to do the job, or the County needs to find someone who will. Thank you for your attention to this matter,

"I've gone on about auctions to the extent that I have because they work, and the reason they work is human competitiveness. People get irrationally competitive at auctions." - Larry McMurtry

Larry was writing about the sale of books but I have found that his keen observation applies whether you're selling a rare first edition or a billy goat. To give you an example, I took bids once at the FFA and 4H heifer sale at our fair where three wealthy men who didn't like each other got tangled up in a bidding war. Any time I let one buyer know that one of the other two fellows was bidding, he'd raise his bid. For the kids that day, the enemy of his enemy was indeed, their friend.

For several years in a row one buyer bought the Ideal Range Bull at a big sale in the west. It didn't matter if the bull was black or white, good or bad, we always knew who was going to buy it. Then one year another status seeking rancher got the idea into his head that he was going to buy the bull. Can you imagine the nerve? Needless to say, the longtime buyer of the champion was not going to let anyone buy "his bull", even though the bull was so bad it should have had its manhood removed as a calf.

I've even seen this phenomenon occur between cow buyers, men who usually don't let their egos get in the way when they're doing business. A cow buyer from Armour ventured further south than usual and the

regular cow buyers on sale day were extremely upset about it. How dare he come into their territory? When he got to the sale barn they smelled around on him as if they were a bunch of dogs and during the sale they wouldn't let him buy a single cow. Not one. It must have worked because the Armour man went back to Idaho and was never seen again in those parts.

1977 is not a year usually remembered as a banner one in the cattle business. Cattle prices were lousy and no one wanted to buy. Phil Stadler called up his buddy, Jack Harris, who owned the reputable Harris Feeding Company in California, and told him that cattle were really cheap in Texas. So Jack got in his plane and flew to Amarillo where they were having a special sale of 15,000 cattle. Jack bought eight or nine thousand of them and the other buyers didn't like it at all. The sellers did, but the other buyers, not so much. And Jack did the same thing the next week, and the next week. Then he told the auction folks in Amarillo, "I'll see ya next week."

By now the other buyers were fed up with a prunie from California, (even though

Jack was originally from Texas). So, the buyers became sellers and spent the next week scouring the country, buying as many cattle as they could and shipping them to Amarillo. They were going to teach this prunie. If he wanted cattle, by gosh they'd make him pay for them and they'd make a good chunk of change while they were at it.

Sale day came and folks started getting nervous because there'd been no Jack Harris sighting. He never showed up all day and those Texas buyers, now consignors, had to sell their cattle to each other at less than what they'd paid. I once asked Jack's widow if he did it on purpose and she smiled, winked and said, "Something came up."

A couple years ago I was working a ritzy charity auction when two multimillionaires got into a bidding war. One would bid and then stare an evil stare at the other. They obviously despised each other. The bidding went so high I could tell that one bidder was getting uncomfortable. Finally he went over to the other guy and "brother-in-lawed" him. In other words, he was crying uncle. Running up the white flag. Asking for a cease fire in the hostilities! The other rich guy evidently felt sorry for him, so he didn't bid again. "I let him have it," the satisfied mogul said to me.

"Yeah, right," I said. "Twenty grand for a dinner and a motel room for one night? You really let him have it all right!"

Governor prompts Washington to increase border safety measures

AUSTIN — Bullets from a gun battle in Juarez, Mexico, struck a building on the campus of the University of Texas-El Paso over the weekend of Aug. 21-22.

"For the second time in two months, bullets from a gun battle in the escalating drug war in Juarez have struck a building in El Paso, and I'd like to commend the swift action taken by local and state law enforcement in the area, Gov. Rick Perry commented on Aug. 23.

"We must ensure El Paso and other border communities remain a safe place for people to live, work and raise a family. It's time for Washington to stop the rhetoric and immediately deploy a significant force of personnel and resources to the border to protect our homeland," Perry said.

In June, bullets from a gun fight in Juarez struck El Paso City Hall and nine months earlier, a building and a vehicle on the University of Texas-Brownsville campus were hit by stray bullets from Mexico.

A movement to push school

finance as high as possible on the agenda for the coming 82nd session of the Texas Legislature is emanating from Aledo, a city of 1,726 people about 18 miles west of downtown Fort Worth.

The Aledo Independent School District board of trustees on Aug. 26 announced a statewide initiative, "Make Education a Priority."

Bobby J. Rigues, the school board's vice president, said he is asking other school districts to adopt a resolution lending their support to the initiative to raise awareness of the growing financial crisis that public school districts are facing and encourage state legislators to work with local school board members and other stakeholders to find a solution.

Denison ISD, Goose Creek Consolidated ISD, Round Rock ISD and Silsbee ISD are on board, and state Sens. Wendy Davis, D-Fort Worth, and Craig Estes, R-Wichita Falls, and state Reps. Phil King, R-Weatherford, and Larry Phillips, R-Sherman,

have written letters of support regarding the initiative.

Rigues said 2006 legislation that cut property taxes by one third fell short by not establishing a reliable new stream of revenue and now "more than half of the school districts in Texas are being forced to use dollars from their fund balances for daily operating expenditures — a practice that is neither financially sound nor sustainable over the long-term. In addition, teaching positions are being eliminated, salaries reduced and local educational programs removed to meet reduced budgets." In 2007 and 2009, legislators were unsuccessful in addressing school funding shortcomings, Rigues added.

And today, with a budget deficit approaching \$20 billion, legislative leadership must work with the education community to find a creative solution that does not incur significant cost. "Until education becomes a real priority, serious solutions to school finance will

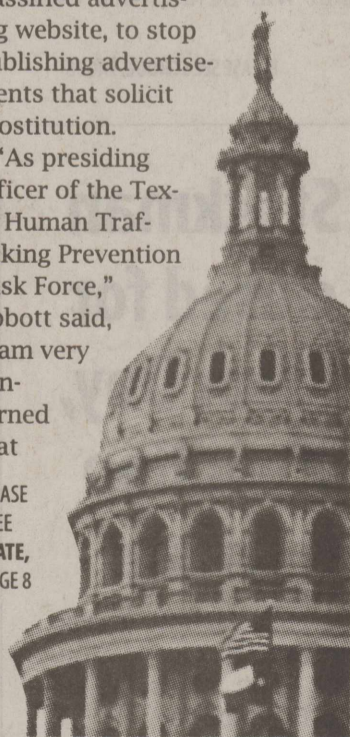
never be found," Rigues said.

"As presiding officer of the Texas Human Trafficking Prevention Task Force," Abbott said, "I am very concerned that

Clary, who has a mechanics business at the field, bought the business with the agreement that Mary Jo would work part-time for him.

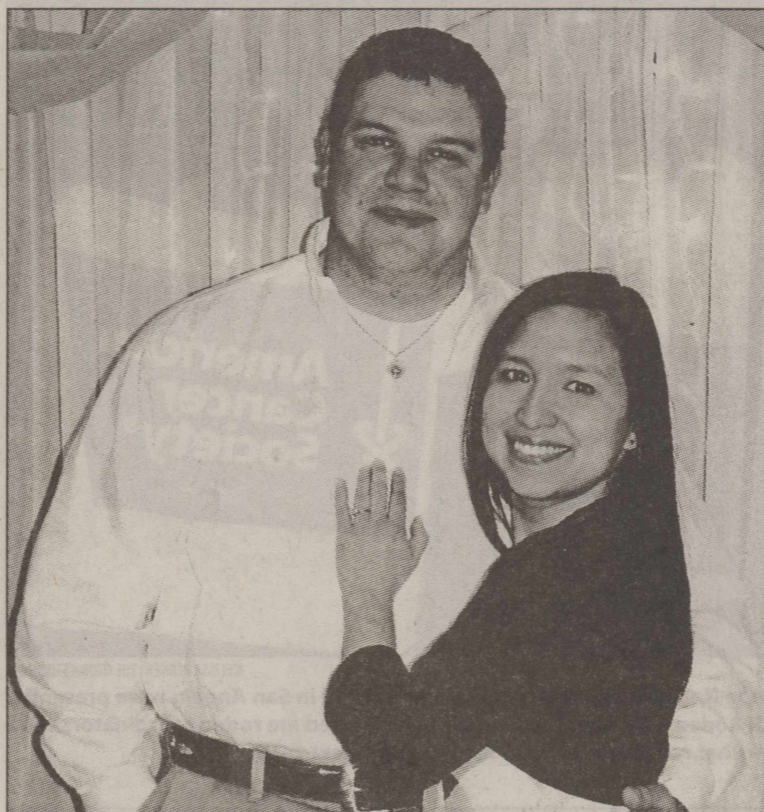
"I did this until July of this year. I decided to retire for health reasons," Mary Jo said.

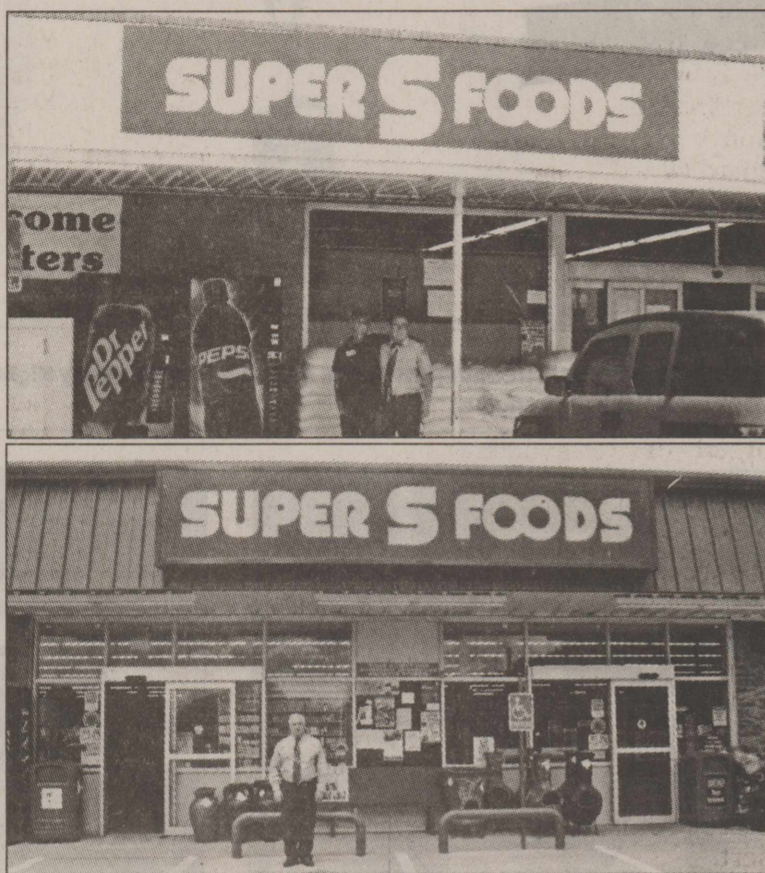

which means the district is a property wealth district and is subject to recapture, or having to send money to the state for other "poorer" districts.

The district is also estimating it will have around \$4 million in fund balance. Fund balances, or reserve balances, are established by school districts to function similarly to a savings account. Fund balances serve as an emergency source of funds; a source of cash to pay bills in case the outflow of cash for expenditures temporarily occurs faster than the inflow of revenue; or as a place to build up savings to make large purchases not affordable within a single year, such as facility improvements.

The budget also includes step increases for teachers, as required by House Bill 3656. Texas school districts received specific clarification from Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott regarding the requirements to pass along a step equal to whatever was considered a step on salary scales from 2008-2009, said Superintendent Chris duBois.

"We made a few market adjustments to a handful of other positions as a result of recommendations from our recently conducted Compensation Study from TASB, but non-exempt (hourly) employees did not receive raises this year. When we started balancing this budget, we had an almost \$700,000 difference between projected revenues and requested allocations. We trimmed all general expenditure requests by 15 percent to get closer, and then tweaked individual areas to balance," duBois said.

This budget also contains very little attention to facilities concerns or big-ticket maintenance, but some attention was given to increasing energy costs due to the district not having a firm basis to estimate the impact of the new elementary school on energy bills, duBois said.

"Although we will be out of Intermediate on a day-to-day basis, and new OES is very energy efficient for its size and air volume, we still expect increases in energy costs because it is so tech-rich. The bills we have seen for that meter have really been surprisingly low during construction, but it doesn't have kiddos and computers in it yet," duBois said.

The board held two budget workshops, including one that included a three-hour executive session on personnel, before voting on the budget and tax rate.

In future meetings, the board will be discussing long-range options for tackling present maintenance concerns, duBois said.

TAMBUNGA SPEAKS IN OPEN FORUM

Frank Tambunga spoke in open forum about helping the school district in retaining students and lowering the district's dropout rate.

Tambunga said he attended the West Texas Legislative Summit in San Angelo a few weeks ago where many college and university officials spoke on how education is key to the future of our country. However, Tambunga said the officials could not come up with answers on how to get students into a higher education.

Children and students that are running around, not in school, is Tambunga's concern.

"What I ask of all of you is to let me know what we need to do in this county. I want to be able to come in and say we didn't have any dropouts and all our graduates are going to a community college or four-year college. Anything is possible," Tambunga said. "Maybe we can come up with a plan here. If there is something I can do locally to bring these kids back in school. If I have to go around knocking on doors, I will do it and not wait for our state representatives to tell us how to do it."

Tambunga said he would like to sit down with OHS Principal Benny Granger and duBois about the issue.

duBois said he and Granger have several new and existing strategies on how to focus on this issue, as well as others in this area, and Tambunga's help would be welcomed.

"We are hitting it hard. We have a lot of new options to share with you. Community and parental involvement is the next big key in all this," duBois said.

TRANSPORTATION and MAINTENANCE

duBois said the handicap access work in front of the OHS special education building is compete, as well as the Davidson Gym floor.

"We should be able to have our first pep rally on it and it is gorgeous," duBois said of the new gym floor.

PRINCIPAL REPORTS

Granger said students and teachers were adjusting to the new high school schedule. He also said they are working on some strategies to try and help out some of the teachers with the schedule.

"It's going really good. I'm having a blast. We are working on some strategies to make sure we reach all our students have struggled with TAKS," Granger said.

Assistant Band Director Elizabeth Bouquin gave a report on the OMS Band Program. Every student in OMS is taking band this year.

Boquin said the sixth-graders are very excited to start playing after they finish

reviewing musical terms. The seventh and eighth grades have started playing. Some students the school is still getting instruments for, and others have rented instruments, Boquin said.

The high school band has 57 students is "doing fantastic," Boquin said.

"We are working on getting the show on the first by the first game. We expect fans to be able to hear the first song and see the first half of the show," Granger said.

At the elementary school, Principal Amanda Jackson said two teachers in the Pre-K area are sharing a room right now until they move to the new building, which is going along very well.

A meeting was held with Pre-K parents, which emphasized attendance and curriculum, including the new dual-language program, she said.

"We are getting lots of positive feedback from parents on the dual-language program. We are getting global in Ozona," Jackson said.

Athletic Director Ray Brown said he has 46 players in the football program and that they performed well in the two scrimmages.

"I thought our kids competed pretty well. I'm glad to have this extra week," he said.

He also said Coach Kristie Williams took 25 runners to their first cross-country meet in San Angelo on Aug. 28.

BOARD CONTINUING EDUCATION CREDIT HOURS

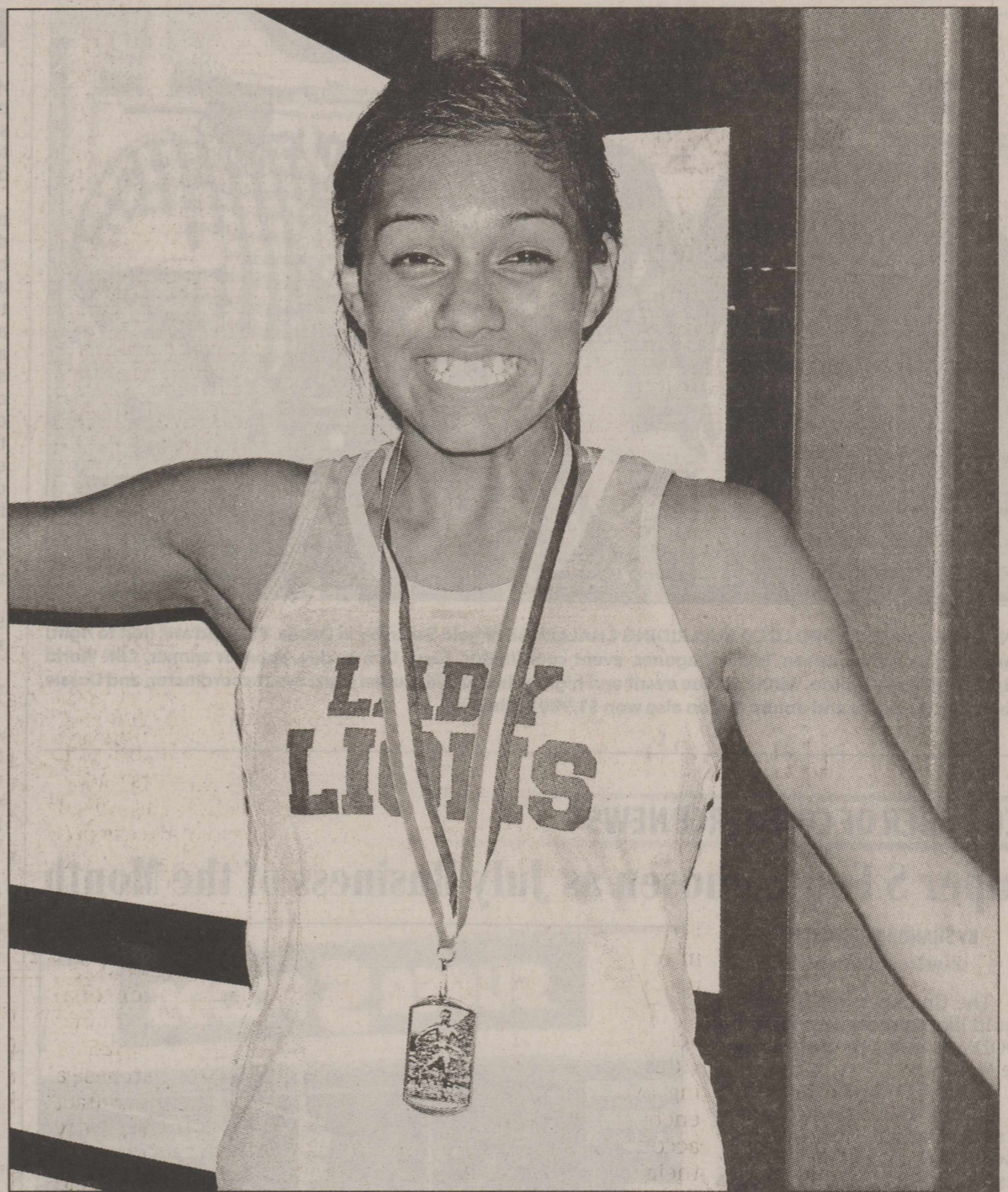

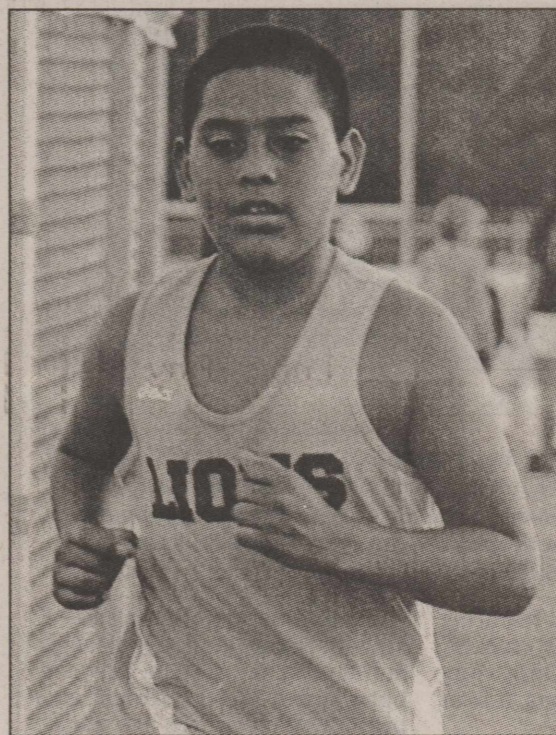

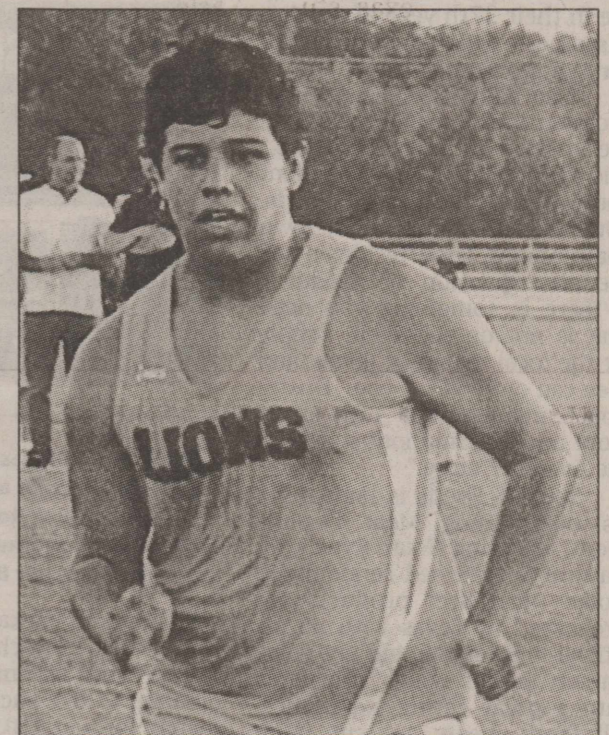

Criminal Investigation Division (CID) officers Will Jackson, Lisa Tarango and Adrian Marquez were exceedingly persistent in gathering evidence and following leads until the case was complete," English said. "The Investigators' past training and experience culminated in the speedy apprehension of Meyers. The extra time and attention these officers give to routine cases provided the opportunity to hone skills which proved invaluable in this investigation."

The City of Pecos CID and Texas Rangers assisted Fort Stockton Investigators with techniques and mate-

rials necessary to recover bloody hand prints and to illuminate other blood evidence in the Slater home, the release stated.

"The Criminal Investigation Division is a necessary and integral division of the Fort Stockton Police Department. We are fortunate to have officers so dedicated to excellence. The evidence they collected in this case was overwhelming and led to the successful prosecution of the defendant," English said.
