On Monday and Tuesday, Ozona Firefighters responded to grass fires 28 miles south off of Pandale Road and out by Live Oak Road off of Interstate-10 west. The fires were caused by lightning Sunday night.

In last week's installment, we provided LOTS of information about programming and services in Ozona Schools. I understand that we presented way more information than can be easily digested in one sitting - but educating children well takes a LOT of resources, and you deserve to have a complete picture of the system we are trying to maintain for the benefit of your children.

es CCCCSD has faced for while now; look forward to some new realities; and review some strategies we are applying to meet these challenges head-on. Many people I meet in the school business ask "So what's it like to have all of that money?!" because they know CCCCSD is one of several West Texas districts known as Chapter 41 - or property wealthy, schools. My standard reply is "I'll let you know

when I find it!" Ozona School revenues for Maintenance and Operations (M&O) are subject to recapture, or wealth redistribution according to some very complex funding rules and formulas. This has been the case for many years and is not new information for any Stockman readers. I have mentioned in previous installments that it really all boils down to a pretty simple fact: For

This week, I would like to every dollar we get to keep here

- we send over \$1.50 to TEA. Our local discretion in setting tax rates to support schools is limited to a legislatively determined compressed rate of \$1.00 / \$100 valuation, plus another \$0.04 allowed at a slightly different recapture rate for a total possible M&O rate of \$1.04 / \$100. Additionally, the district can levy Interest & Sinking taxes to pay for long-term debt, generally bonded debt for facilities and capital improvements. This year we levied \$0.22 cents for I&S, paying off the bonded portion of the New Elementary school in three years at an interest savings of about \$425,000. Next year, there will be no I&S collections, so taxpayers can expect an M&O - only tax rate for school in 2011-2012.

quire but both of these apps allow you to open and edit Microsoft Word and Excel files from your phone. They also allow you to remotely access your files. If you are a writer or a lawyer, for example, these apps allow you to write and mark up drafts on the go.

2. Bump Bump is a neat application that allows you to share items such as contact information, photos, applications, music, calendar events and even social network information by simply "bumping" phones with another phone that also has the Bump application installed.

Simply bump your contact information to a new contact and they instantly have it stored. This nifty application is currently free.

3. Evernote, OneNote, or Springpad

I share these three programs because they have similar features and, depending on your needs, one better suited for you than the next. These three applications allow you to store, well, anything. Your random thoughts, pictures that inspire you, links to websites you've found helpful, etc. All three programs have a sort of "notebook" interface which allows you to

store various types of information so you never lose another recipe, idea, or link again. All the applications are currently free, however, OneNote does require the accompanying Microsoft OneNote software and Evernote has a premium package for a fee if you find yourself storing a large amount of data.

This is only a very small sample of what is available out there. I have also come across apps that can help you keep track of the hours you spend on different clients or projects, apps that can combine all of your different social media avenues into just one central hub, and apps that can help you stay on budget. Also, new apps are being released every day into the iPhone and Droid markets. Prayers for more rain needed

he heavens opened up a bit Sunday night and brought a little rain to Crockett County. However, more is still needed for our dry country.

As I travel from my house located in the southwestern part of Crockett County to town each week, along with the trips San Angelo we all make, I see brown, dry grass.

As the old joke goes: "The cows are giving evaporated milk and the trees are whistling for the dogs."

A sad Texan once prayed, "I wish it would rain - not so much for me, cuz I've seen it -- but for my 7-year-old."

A visitor to Texas once asked, "Does it ever rain out here?" A rancher quickly answered "Yes, it does. Do you remember that part in the Bible where it rained for 40 days and 40 nights?" The visitor replied, "Yes, I'm familiar with Noah's flood!" "Well, "the rancher puffed up, "we got about two and a half inches of that."

In the first four months of 2011, our local fire department has responded to more than 80 calls already with the majority of them being grass fires. Ozona Firefighters fought two fires on Monday, one they had to leave when night fell due to the

fire being in rough terrain. Out of Texas's 252 counties, 180 of them (including Crockett County) have adopted burn bans.

As of April 9, the U.S. **Drought Monitor reports** that 60 percent of Texas is under extreme drought conditions, including Crockett County and most of West Texas. The monitor also reports that 100 percent of

the state is abnormally dry. Evidence of this extreme weather could be seen this past weekend as West Texas and state firefighters battled blazes from the Panhandle on down to Alpine and Fort Davis.

In the past seven days, the Texas Forest Service has responded to 83 fires for 309,526 acres. On Monday, the Crockett County Commissioners' Court approved a proclamation from Bishop Michael Pfeifer declaring Sunday, April 17, as a day to pray for rain. Commissioner Frank Tambunga has asked everyone to join him at 3 p.m. Sunday at the town

square to pray. The bishop said he has written to more than 100 churches in San Angelo, and

burn ban and thinking before we decide to light any-

The burn ban states that outdoor burning is restricted except for burning related to fire fighter training, public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations, planting or harvesting of agricultural crops or burns that are conducted by an approved Prescribed Burning Association, National Resource Conservation Service, the and/or Texas A&M Agricultural Experiment Station, or prescribed burn manager certified under Section 153.048, Natural Resources Code, and meet the standards of Section 153.047, Natural Resources Code.

All burns shall be reported to the Crockett County Sheriff's Office (325) 392-2661 and the Fire Chief (325) 392-2626 prior to commencing, together with the name of the landowner, location involved and expert to be on hand.

The order does not prohibit outdoor cooking in a properly contained area which is attended at all times. That means keeping water handy when you decide to grill steaks.

The Texas Forest Service also suggests to not park or drive in dry grass, double check for loose chains hanging from a moving vehicle that may make contact with the pavement, wet down the work area when welding and keep a buck of water or a fire extinguisher nearby, clear combustible materials away from the house and always check the weather conditions before doing any outdoor burning.

Also, keep lawn mowers and agricultural equipment in proper working condition and avoid rocks and other materials which might cause a spark. Remember, humans cause

more than 90 percent of all wildfires. Just think before lighting any sparks.

State budget proposals draw stakeholders to Austin

AUSTIN - A crowd, estimated at 5,000 people from across Texas, gathered at the Capitol to participate in a "Save Our State" rally on April 6.

Participants, many of whom are state employees with jobs on the chopping block, came to protest cuts proposed in the 2012-2013 state budget approved by the House on April 3, and to ask for greater consideration as the budgetwriting process continues.

The Senate must produce its own version of the budget. Two weeks ago, Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst, who presides over the Senate, asked a subcommittee under the direction of Sen. Robert Duncan, R-Lubbock, to go on a \$5 billion revenue hunt.

This week Duncan and committee, who have been searching the state's financial woods, plains and caves, are expected to produce a report with findings that might yield a solution less painful than the House's state budget, which thins the ranks of state employees and lops off billions of dollars in education and health services.

REPORT EYES HEALTH CARE **SPENDING**

State Comptroller Susan Combs on April 6 released a new report, "Health Care Cost Drivers in Texas," examining where health care dollars go, why costs are soaring, and analyzing cost saving proposals the Legislature is considering.

Health care accounts for more than 34 percent of all Texas government spending from state, federal and other funds, Combs said in an April 6 news release. In fiscal 2009, the state spent about \$30 billion on health care, a 36 percent increase from fiscal 2005, according to Combs.

Among cost saving proposals examined in the report are these: expansion of managed care in the Medicaid program, a statewide smoking ban, requiring state employees who use tobacco to pay more for health insurance than non-users, and requiring state employees and retirees to pay a greater share of the cost of their health insurance benefits.

SPOTLIGHT TURNS

TO CATHOLICS Cardinal Daniel DiNardo and eight other Roman Catholic archbishops and bishops of Texas were honored in person in the Senate Chamber on April 6 in an honorary resolution by Sen. Ed-

die Lucio, D-Brownsville.

Sen. Judith Zaffirini, D-Laredo, coauthor of the resolution, took a turn at the microphone to speak in favor of the measure. "The state budget is a moral document that reflects the priorities and values of our state," Zaffirini said.

"And my hope, by the time we pass a Senate appropriations bill, is that it will reflect the highest priorities, the highest needs, the highest values of our state, and that the bishops who are here with us today will be proud of that document. That is my prayer, and I hope it is yours."

Zaffirini then asked Catholic members of the Senate and a large contingency of members of the Catholic Conference in the Senate Gallery to stand and be recognized.

The resolution passed unanimously. Then, Sen. Steve Ogden, R-Bryan, a Roman Catholic who chairs the budget-writing Senate Finance Committee, spoke up and asked for two things: that all members' names be added to the resolution, and that the bishops "keep praying for us."







The WWII Mark XIV torpedo was flawed from the beginning and was the US submarine's standard fleet torpedo. It was designed in the 1930's and not until many misses and duds that the reliability of the torpedo was questioned and even then the complaints were rejected. It looked good and in some minor tests it exploded but in combat it failed many times. One time it even sank the submarine it was fired from. Eventually it was discovered that it had many design faults and all built, were faulty. And as one stated, "The only reliable feature of the torpedo was it's unreliability". Many Submarines were destroyed and many US Sailors lost their lives to the faulty torpedo. Many of the faults were finally corrected but it was eventually replaced with the Mark 16 torpedo. That torpedo reminds me of something in the Bible. When God created man it was a unique design but there was one way it could go astray. God gave man the freedom to chose, (Genesis 2:15-17), He could either obey God or disobey, and Adam and Eve chose disobedience, (Genesis 3:10-18, 23). Every descended of Adam is flawed, (Romans 5:12). That flaw leads to sin, death and eternal separation from God. But God loves us and developed a plan to fix the problem. God's fix it plan was the shed blood of Jesus Christ, (Romans 5:16-21). See you in Church next week. Brother J

PUBLIC NUSIANCES: HEALTH AND SAFETY

CODE Commissioner Martinez presented chapter 343 of the Texas Health and Safety Code during the meeting. The chapter in the code deals with unincorporated areas of a county in prohibiting public nuisances.

The code states that a public nuisance can include maintaining premises in a manner that creates an unsanitary condition likely to attract or harbor mosquitoes, rodents, vermin or disease carrying pets.

Martinez said he has had numerous complaints about the smells of horses and livestock, as well as bugs and rodents due to this.

"People who are private property owners can't en-joy their own property because of what is going on next door. This applies to an unincorporated area of a county. Just because we are an unincorporated area doesn't mean people can go and do what they want," he said. "I want to bring public awareness that we do recognize this and that this is a law does apply. This is not an ordinance we are creating. It's just time to be considerate of your neighbor."

County Judge Fred Deaton said the code is a state law. Anyone, a citizen or a commissioner, can file a complaint to the Crockett County Attorney's Office through this code. There is a process that then takes place and can eventually land the person or persons in justice of the peace or county court. A judge can issue fines for violating the code (read the entire code chapter on page 12 under Crockett County Public Notice).

The code also states that the person, who had the complaint filed against

them, also has the right to defend themselves in court. Dr. Marcus Sims, the county health officer, said he would be in favor of helping enforce this code if the commissioners' court also

enforces the code. "This is a tool to use." Deaton said. "This has given us something to work with."

Commissioner Childress III also reminded the court that the county has a place to house and keep horses, for a fee.

Sims and Crockett County Attorney Jody Upham said they would also bring more information on the code at the May meet-



we get to keep here in Ozona Schools are based on enrollment. Services to children are accounted for on a weighted basis, with more expensive programming and services contributing to higher per-pupil allotments - but we still only get to keep finding according to how many students we serve. More students, more dollars, less students - you get the picture. Since 2000-2001, CCCCSD has experienced significant decreases in enrollment. Although we have more or less held steady the last two or three years - we still have approximately 160 fewer students today than in 2000. However, staffing has actually increased over that time. Significantly. We have 11 or so more personnel units serving in the district today than in 2000. Fewer students, but more adults. This arrangement is simply not sustainable.

No one wants to see valuable employees let go - and for several school year cycles, CCCCSD has tried to manage staffing by attrition. It just has not been a very successful effort. For several years now, the district's Financial Accountability Rating System of Texas (FIRST) results have reflected negative ratings for high staff-student ratios and overall staffing numbers too high for our enrollment according to TEA standards. We have run out of time to address and correct this trend. The legislative debates in Austin today point to school district inefficiencies as a key target for funding reductions. The new FAST, or Financial Allocation Study of Texas, has created a new measure of school effectiveness a "bang-for-the-buck" model essentially comparing student performance to school costs. School patron Orlando De-Hoyos has recently identified CCCCSD's recent 2-Star FAST rating as unacceptable in opinion posted in this paper. I agree completely. Although the FAST system reports ratings based on three-year-average data ending several years ago (our current 2- Star rating reflects financial numbers from 2006-2009, but school performance ratings from 2009 - 2010), all districts are compared on the same measures - and we still don't stack up very strongly. Even though we are a TEA Recognized performing district now, our FAST Rating will remain low for the next several years simply because we have carried high staffing and operating expenditures through today. The highest cost driver in schools is personnel. Until our staff numbers are trimmed significantly, we will continue to fare poorly on efficiency comparisons like FAST and FIRST. Similar measures are currently under development to assist in determining future school district Accreditation status in Texas - so we definitely need to be serious about attending to staffing and efficiency concerns. But if slashing staff just to get another Star results in poor service to students, that's not a good trade-off, either.

Since before my acceptance to lead the district, I have been well aware of this particular challenge. So we got right to work on it. We reduced staffing last year by 5 personnel units while increasing services to students on many fronts. The district just completed an Early Resignation Incentive program to assist us in identifying departing staff a bit earlier than usual (CCCCSD has had an average turnover of 25 percent or so for several years - so we just incentivized folks firming up plans earlier) so that we can get started adjusting some more. I' expect that overall, CCCCSD will be somewhere around 15-17 staff members lighter than the start of 2009-2010. This is significant progress - and despite perception otherwise, no one has been fired in efforts to manage staffing. The Incentive program was voluntary and very successful. Although we won't know our financial lot in life from Austin for quite a while yet, we have got a good jump on reducing operating expenses in anticipation of grim fiscal forecasting. We may end up re-visiting staffing as a last resort after final school allocations are announced this summer, but Crockett County tax payers should be confident that we are working hard and fast

right now to improve our efficiencies in this area while preserving quality service to stu-

Another significant challenge for us will be to operate on fewer resources and still attend to several facilities and maintenance issues. We have roofing work overdue on both school buildings and school houses. The stadium track is beyond maintenance and needs re-surfacing badly (we cancelled all track meets on it this year, in fact). We have some significant facility equity concerns to address eventually as pointed out even by OHS students last Spring, and we have a variety of mechanical and energy efficiency concerns developing throughout the district. Your Board will be discussing options to get started on some of these concerns in coming weeks, and I feel very good that we have some tools they can employ and still be prepared for whatever Austin throws at us this summer. But there's no money just laying around, despite perceptions of our status as a Chapter 41, "rich" district.

The CCCCSD audited undesignated Fund Balance as of Aug. 31, 2010 has been reduced to just over \$4.8 million dollars. The district elected to use approximately \$4 million in previous reserves to supplement the cost of New OES; another \$1 million or so in badly needed instructional technology and technology infrastructure improvements last year; and current year liabilities give us an as-of-today undesignat ed Fund Balance of about \$4.2 million or so. However - in the

Chapter 41, no-state-paymentsto-start-the-school-year world we live in, school operating bills for the first several months get paid directly from the cash reserves that the bulk of your Fund Balance represents. Tax collections really don't start coming in until later Fall, so we have to have about \$3.6 - \$4 million to operate on until December or so. TEA knows this, and so for districts like us - they recognize that a \$4 million Fund Balance is really just our grocery money - it's not disposable. Now amounts beyond that that's the Fund Balance portion that TEA would come looking for eventually (if it existed), just as Mr. DeHoyos and other concerned taxpayers suggest. We just don't have it to take. It may sound like a good thing to be lean and mean in Fund Balance, since they can't take it away - but it also means we haven't much of a cushion against unexpected cost increases like fuel and energy price spikes. Even groceries will cost more as world events impact domestic prices of all types. Bottom line we have a healthy Fund Balance - but barely. I for one do not want the district to be borrowing money to make Novem-

ber payroll next fall. These are just a few of the issues facing us squarely as we make decisions now for teachers, their families, and our students. There is so much we don't, and won't know for while. Anyone who thinks CCCCSD will get off with a few hundred thousand dollar financial ding in Austin this summer really needs to listen and watch carefully to a variety of sources. I shared legis-

lative financial runs related to the proposed House budget this week with CCCCSD staff and Board members. I have faith there will be some middle ground gained - but HB 1 as proposed today would take \$3.4 million away from Crockett County schools each of the next two years. I have to believe reason will prevail - but I wouldn't stake a whole lot on it. There is a strong fiscal conservative current in Austin this year - and districts everywhere are planning for the worst, hoping for the best. The best news we could get from the legislature now would be talk of recognizing that if they can't fund us - then they need to return some discretion to local boards to make up some of the difference if needed to

avoid truly harmful cuts. Please watch the news from Austin seriously. Contact our representation and let them know that we are doing all we can on our end to be efficient and effective - but voices of reason need to prevail and allow school boards to help themselves some also. salary, up to a maximum payment of \$8,000. At-will employees received 15 percent of base salary, up to a maximum payment of \$5,000.

Employees will be ineligible for rehire with the district for a period of 12 months after receiving resignation compensation.

The resignation incentive program was available on a first-come, first served basis. Administrators, employees with a bilingual certification and employees on probationary contracts were excluded from the incentive.

Cost of the incentive payment at 15 percent of base salaries for the 13 employees is \$83,769. The salary and benefits associated with these employees is \$616,485.

Like other school districts across the state, CCCCSD is facing the possibility of a budget shortfall due to a \$15 billion to \$27 billion deficit in the Texas Legislature. The incentive was the district's way of possibly facing state funding cuts.

As of right now, school districts will not know final funding numbers until late May or June.

"This was a good stepping stone. I know we will have to make a couple of replace-

ments," said Superintendent Chris duBois.

The resignation from Amaro Villarreal, OMS physical

education and coach, was also approved at the meeting. All resignations are effective at the end of the 2010-

2011 school year. In a separate motion, the board approved the termination of Maria Hendryx, elementary counselor. The termination takes effect at the end of the 2010-2011 school year.

Once again, Childress abstained from voting.

Along with resignations, the board unanimously approved renewal on teacher contracts for Elizabeth Bouquin, Whitney Brockman, Autumn Brown, Kristin Bunger, Dottie DeLeon, Vance Gohlke, Kimberly Harris, Karrah Iglehart, Ariel Kellogg, David Kennedy, Rita Kennedy, Eugene LaFitte, Ethan Lunn, Rob Phillips, Allison Vasquez, Erica Venegas and Vicky White.

A new high school science teacher was also approved. Zachary Youngblood will be moving to Ozona from San Angelo. Youngblood is a 2010 graduate of Angelo State University and a 2005 graduate of Lake View High School.

The regular board meeting will take place April 27 with a workshop at 5:30 p.m. and the meeting at 6:30 p.m. at the Administration Building.



Don't get hit with a penalty! "Render" your taxable property by April 15.

A "rendition" is a report to your county appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you owned or controlled on Jan. 1 of this year.

Who must file a rendition?

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income—such as the inventory and equipment used by a business. If you render late, don't render or file an incomplete or false rendition, a 10 percent to 50 percent penalty may be imposed.

Are there any advantages to you?

The advantages of filing a rendition are:

- You give your opinion of your property's value. The appraisal district must notify you in writing of any value change and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.
- You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.
- You can also file a "report of decreased value" to notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation of the value of your property in 2010. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 2011.

What's the deadline?

The last day for filing 2011 renditions is April 15. You can get an automatic extension to May 15 (or the next business day if a weekend) if you ask for it in writing on or before the April 15 deadline. The chief appraiser may grant an additional 15 deriting. shows good cause in writing.

projects: one for preliminary engineering and environmental studies and one for safety improvements.

About \$18 million of the requested funding is for preliminary engineering and environmental studies for the proposed Dallas/Fort Worth to Houston High Speed Rail Line, a corridor that would connect two of the nation's most populated metropolitan areas. Proposed speeds would be up to 150 mph, TxDOT said.

Some \$2.4 billion in federal grants for such projects is available to the states.

PUBLIC NUISANCES

Texas Health & Safety Code Chapters 341 and 343 SUBCHAPTER B. PUBLIC NUISANCE PROHIBITED § 343.011. Public Nuisance

(a) This section applies only to the unincorporated area of a county. (b) A person may not cause, permit, or allow a public nuisance under this

section. (c) A public nuisance is:

(1) keeping, storing, or accumulating refuse on premises in a neighborhood unless the refuse is entirely contained in a closed receptacle;

(2) keeping, storing, or accumulating rubbish, including newspapers, abandoned vehicles, refrigerators, stoves, furniture, tires, and cans, on premises in a neighborhood or within 300 feet of a public street for 10 days or more, unless the rubbish or object is completely enclosed in a building or is not visible from a public street;

(3) maintaining premises in a manner that creates an unsanitary condition likely to attract or harbor mosquitoes, rodents, vermin, or disease carrying pests; (4) allowing weeds to grow on premises in a neighborhood if the weeds are located within 300 feet of another residence or commercial establishment; (5) maintaining a building in a manner that is structurally unsafe or constitutes a hazard to safety, health, or public welfare because of inadequate maintenance, unsanitary conditions, dilapidation, obsolescence, disaster, damage, or abandonment or because it constitutes a fire hazard;

(6) maintaining on abandoned and unoccupied property in a neighborhood a swimming pool that is not protected with: (A) a fence that is at least four feet high and that has a latched gate that cannot be opened by a child; or (B) a cover over the entire swimming pool that cannot be removed by a child; (7) maintaining a flea market in a manner that constitutes a fire hazard; (8) discarding refuse or creating a hazardous visual obstruction on:

(A) county-owned land; or

(B) land or easements owned or held by a special district that has the commissioners court of the county as its governing body; or

(9) discarding refuse on the smaller of:

(A) the area that spans 20 feet on each side of a utility line; or (B) the actual span of the utility easement.

(d) This section does not apply to:

(1) a site or facility that is;

(A) permitted and regulated by a state agency; or (B) licensed or permitted under Chapter 361; or

(2) agricultural land.

(e) In Subsection (d), "agricultural land" means land that qualifies for tax appraisal under Subchapter C or D, Chapter 23, Tax Code.

§ 343.012. Criminal Penalty

(a) A person commits an offense if: (1) the person violates Section 343.011(b); and

(2) the nuisance remains unabated after the 30th day after the date on which the person receives notice from a county official, agent, or employee to abate the nuisance.

(b) An offense under this section is a misdemeanor punishable by a fine of not less than \$50 or more than \$200.

(c) If it is shown on the trial of the defendant that the defendant has been previously convicted of an offense under this section, the defendant is punishable by a fine of not less than \$200 or more than \$1,000, confinement in jail for not more than six months, or both.

(d) Each day a violation occurs is a separate offense. (e) The court shall order abatement of the nuisance if the defendant is

convicted of an offense under, this section.

§ 343.024. Authority to Enter Premises (a) A county official, agent, or employee charged with the enforcement of health, environmental, safety, or fire laws may enter any premises in the unincorporated area of the county at a reasonable time to inspect, investigate, or abate a nuisance or to enforce this chapter.

(b) Before entering the premises, the official, agent, or employee must exhibit proper identification to the occupant, manager, or other appropriate person. § 343.025. Enforcement

A court of competent jurisdiction in the county may issue any order necessary to enforce this chapter.

ORDER RESTRICTING OUTDOOR BURNING

The Commissioners' Court finds that circumstances present in all or part of the unincorporated area of the county create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning; and NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED by the Commissioners' Court of Crockett County, Texas, that outdoor burning is restricted in Crockett County for 30 days from the date of adoption of this Order, unless the restrictions are terminated earlier based on a determination made by the Texas Forest Service or this Court. This Order is adopted pursuant to Local Government Code 352.081, and other applicable statues. This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Natural Resources Commission for: (1) firefighter training; (2) public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations; (3) planting or harvesting or agricultural crops; or (4) burns that are conducted by an approved Prescribed Burning Association; Natural Resource Conservation Service, the and/or Texas A&M Agricultural Experiment Station, or prescribed burn manager certified under Section 153.048, Natural Resources Code, and meet the standards of Section 153.047, Natural Resources Code.

All burns shall be reported to the Crockett County Sheriff's Office (325) 392-2661 and the Fire Chief (325) 392-2626 prior to commencing, together with the name of the landowner, location involved and expert to be on

This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor cooking in a properly contained area which is attended at all times.

In accordance with the Local Government Code 352.081 (h), a violation of this Order is a Class C misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed


