# Burning land



Grass fires blaze across acres

Smoke could still be seen Monday afternoon south of town. The smell of burnt brush and cedar also lingered in the air.

The difference in Monday afternoon compared to last Thursday was that at the Ozona Volunteer Fire Department, life was less hectic. For eight days, firefighters battled a mas-

sive wildfire blaze south of Ozona. The fire, which started April 10 off of Pandale Road, is now estimated at 40,000 acres. By late Monday afternoon, Fire Marshal Steve


Kenley had declared "the worst is over." "Right now, this one is not close to being finished, but things are looking better," Kenley said.

## Explanation for gas prices needed

**Dear Editor and Stripes of Ozona,** 

I don't speak for all the citizens of Ozona, but possibly the majority. I am wondering why unleaded regular gasoline in Ozona was priced at \$3.95 9/10 per gallon when in Sonora, Big Lake and San Angelo it was \$3.63 9/10 per gallon on April 8?

Could it possibly be because your company is the only public retailer in Ozona

and this allows you to charge about the gasoline business 32 cents per gallon more for gasoline here than in our surrounding communities where there is competition?

I, as an Ozona citizen for 40-plus years, would like to know if there is a legitimate reason for this or am I missing something? Maybe I should just feel privileged I have the opportunity to buy gasoline at all in Ozona.

I am curious to know more

so maybe you could enlighten me on the concept of pricing.

Since I got this letter in too late for last week's news, here is an update: Big Lake, \$3.79 9/10; San Angelo \$3.68 9/10; Fort Stockton, \$3.79 9/10. Lucky Ozona, the gas price is still \$3.95 9/10.

## Budget fix shouldn't pit vets against vets

\$3 million from the Veterans Cash ticket game. Where would that money go? Brace for the irony: The Texas Veterans Commission.

Senate Bill 1739 by Sen. Wendy Davis would forbid diverting the scratch-off ticket money. If it becomes law, the Veterans Commission could lose up to onefifth of its staff of claims administrators. If it fails and the funds are diverted, public interest in the lottery game is expected to decline, along with sales.

# My firefighter

can still smell it. Sitting in the living room Sunday night, fresh from a shower where I washed myself head to toe, and I can still smell the smoke and burning brush.

Sunday morning, I toured some of the area of the Pandale Road grass fire. Taking photos, with my shirt collar tucked above my nose, I forced my eyes to look through the lens and into the smoke and flames as I watched two volunteer firefighters from Midland County spray water on hot spot fire areas.

The smoke was overwhelming, the smell was clouding my brain and all I could do was think "how do these people do this?"

Firefighting is a calling. Once it gets into your blood, it never leaves.

when the fire started, my husband and I were on vacation. Monitoring the fire through text messages and Facebook, we quickly realized the blaze was not getting any better. My firefighter became anxious and home we came.

Immediately, when we pulled up in the driveway, he hoped out of the Jeep, into the pickup and off to the fire.

Watching him Sunday, he was like a conductor orchestrating firefighters and volunteers to the places they needed to go

Riding through burned terrain made me sad to see what extraordinary things fire can do when it is blazing.

One area would be scorched, another spotted and then another completely fine.

At the command, staging area, firefighters ate food provided by local businesses and individuals. No complaints, no griping, no mentions of being tired because they had been up for 36 or 48 hours. Only asking where they can go next, giving reports and making sure

information is given. Yes, I was tired at the

smoky atmosphere. However, complain I did not because I knew any moment my firefighter would be coming into

in the hot,

the house, and smelling of that same smoky brush and ash.

These men and women leave their families, sometimes their jobs, vacations and family time, for no money to volunteer their time to fight fires and keep us all safe.

Right now, 195 Texas counties are under a burn ban. Our state is under a massive drought. Citizens of Crockett County prayed for rain Sunday and are continuing to pray.

As you drive to work or head out to an out of town destination, think before you throw that cigarette butt out the window. Stop and look at your vehicle before you head across that pasture, or decide to skip that today. Put off that welding project when the winds begin to gust at 30 mph.

When you complain how tired you are at the end of the day, or fed up with how life is, think of our volunteer firefighters and workers keeping you safe in your bed.

As I climb into my bed, my firefighter comes crawling into the house. He takes a shower and collapses into the bed.

Two hours later, the alarm sounds again. Struggling to get up, he heads to a vehicle fire on the interstate. He has to go that is his job, his calling and his duty.

As I turn over to go back to sleep, I pray he is safe. I pray for the other firefighters and the victims. I pray that my firefighter can come home.


# Seconds Anyone?

Two entomology professors from the Netherlands are happier than a centipede with new shoes that insects are starting to show up on menus at fancy restaurants in places like London and New York. ## Legislature remains focused on budget, redistricting issues

AUSTIN — Two of the Texas Legislature's toughest jobs, the passing of a state budget and the redrawing of district boundaries, remain front and center in the House and Senate.

On April 1, the House passed HB 1, the state budget for fiscal years 2012-2013, and now the Senate is inching toward debate on SB 1, its own version of the budget. The Senate version, although not yet passed out of the Senate Finance Committee, is expected to be kinder and gentler than the House version which features unprecedented cutbacks in health, education and a long list of other programs. Both bodies must agree on a final, balanced budget.

Senate Finance Committee Chairman Steve Ogden, R-Bryan, said he intended for his committee to take a vote on SB 1 before Easter weekend.

> REDISTRICTING TASKS **UNDER WAY**

Committee on Redistricting, under Chairman Burt Solomons, R-Carrollton, accepted testimony on SB 150, redrawing House districts.

A number of House members, citizens and action groups spoke against the bill, raising issues over proposed new lines. HB 150 and other redistricting bills to be considered this session are subject to challenge under the federal Voting Rights Act of 1965 and related court decisions that prescribe compact and contiguous districts that do not dilute minorities' voting power.

> DATA EXPOSURE **PROMPTS ACTION**

The Office of the State Comptroller on April 11 announced Texans whose personal information was inadvertently disclosed on an agency Internet server that was accessible to the public will receive a letter about it in the mail, with instructions.

Records of about 3.5 mil-

lion people were placed on the server with personally identifying information. Although there was no indication that any personal information had been misused after it was exposed, the Comptroller's office on April 15 said the agency arranged for a 70 percent discount on one year of credit monitoring to notify affected individuals if their information is misused.

Comptroller Susan Combs directed affected persons to visit www.TXsafeguard.org to obtain a promotion code entitling them to the discount.

Another option, Combs said, is activation of a free 90-day fraud alert that lets potential creditors and others know that you may be a victim of identity theft. A fraud alert and can make it more difficult for an unauthorized person to obtain credit in an affected individual's name. A fraud alert can be established by contacting one of three nationwide consumer credit reporting companies - Experian, Equifax or TransUnion - which will then notify the other two.

On April 15, Combs said the heads of her agency's Innovation and Technology and Information Security divisions were no longer employed by her office and two other employees were let go after the data exposure was

discovered.







## A variety of homestead exemptions could lower your property taxes!

A homestead exemption lowers the property taxes on your home by lowering its taxable value. If your home is valued at \$50,000 and you receive a \$15,000 homestead exemption, your home will be taxed as if it were worth \$35,000.

## Who qualifies for an exemption?

Anyone who owns a home on Jan. 1 and uses it as a primary residence on that date is entitled to a \$15,000 homestead exemption to lower school taxes this year...and it doesn't matter if your home is a house, condominium or mobile home. Counties, cities and special taxing districts may also offer homestead exemptions.

### Are other exemptions available?

If you're disabled—or if you're 65 years old or older—you are entitled to an additional \$10,000 school tax exemption on your home. And if you qualify for the 65 or older or disabled exemption, you're also entitled to a permanent, locked-in "ceiling" on the school property taxes on your home. (The county, city or junior college may adopt a tax ceiling to lock in 2011 taxes as the highest amount for 65 and older or disabled homeowners.) The age 65 or older homeowners school tax eciling transfers to the currients. or older homeowners school tax ceiling transfers to the surviving spouse, if the spouse is 55 years of age or older at the time of death and lives in and owns the home. The age 65 or older homeowners (or their surviving spouses 55 years of age or older) also may transfer the percentage of school tax paid, based on their former home's school tax ceiling, to a new home

If you're a disabled veteran who receives from the Veterans Affairs (VA)—(1) 100 percent disability compensation due to a service connected disability and (2) a rating of 100 percent disabled or a determination of individual unemployability, you are entitled to an exemption from taxation of the total appraised value of your resident homestead. A surviving spouse does not qualify.

### Do I have to apply each year?

No. If you had a homestead exemption on your home in 2010, you won't need to reapply for 2011 unless your chief appraiser requires it. However, if you haven't received an exemption on your present home—or if you've moved to a new home—you'll need to file for an exemption for 2011. If you are 65 this year, you may file for the age 65 or older exemption up to one year after the date you turned 65. And if you became disabled, you need to file for the disabled person's exemption.





and Tuesday, while local firefighters were able to rest, return to work or respond to other emergency calls.

'We've had fires like this before, but we've been able to call on our neighbors," Kenley said. "The problem this time was all our neighbors also had big fires. We had three trucks the first day trying to control a fire with wind going in different directions."

Officially, lightning started the fire on April 10 as a series of showers came through Crockett County. Firefighters thought they had the fire out on April 13, but it sprang back to life on April 14 due to more high winds, hot temperatures and low humidity.

"Smoke inhalation and ash flying everywhere, as well as wind and sunburn. What a deal," said Shelly Childress, whose property was near part of the fires. "Fire was big and black and rolling, eating away at the brush as fast as it could."

The Watson, Pierce and Sutton ranches were

all affected by the blaze.

Kenley said the Watson Ranch suffered the most damage with around 25 structures and several vehicles lost. These structures include cabins, camp trailers and some buildings.

One Ozona Firefighter said he watched a new Dodge pickup and Jeeps go up in flames.

"The main problem is lots of these campers and trailers were parked next to cedar trees. Some of these fires, we couldn't defend if we had been sitting there," Kenley said.

The main Watson Ranch headquarters house was saved. Also, the fire never crossed Pandale Road and the towns of Pandale and Ozona were never threatened.

"We just had to sit there and watch the fire roll. Watching ceder, mesquite and grass burn was one thing, but watching Live Oak Trees burn was another," Childress said. "All of the local and area volunteer firefighters did as much as humanly possible to help put out this and all of the other fires."

Firefighters from all over Texas, the Texas Forest Service and the U.S. Forest Service came to Crockett County to help Ozona. Trucks and crews from Campwood, Eldorado, Midland, Frost, Lakey, Val Verde County, Uvalde, Pandale, Sanderson, Fort Stockton, Sonora, Rankin, Comstock, Melvin, Placid, McCullough County and more could be seen fighting the blaze.

Heavy equipment from the Crockett County Road Department, TxDOT, local businesses and individuals made burn breaks to keep the fire from spreading.

Forest service airplanes also made several drops of fire retardant. No injuries have been reported due to the fire.

"It was unbelievable to see all of the volunteers, not just from Ozona," Childress said. "We are not just protecting our homes, but protecting our sources of income as well, such as the land, the animals, the water, the oil and gas lines, whatever it may be. It may not directly affect you, but somewhere down the line, it will."

Along with volunteers fighting the fire, many businesses and individuals in Ozona donated supplies and meals.

Employees with Crockett County CCCSD collected nearly \$300 in monetary donations, as well as donating food and supplies. Hotels in Ozona made rooms available for out of town firefighters.

Local citizens also gathered Sunday at the

town square to pray for rain. "I am at a loss for words to express our

The Crockett County CERT (Community Emergency Response Team) was also on scene to help with food and water.

"We would like to express our gratitude for everyone's donations in support of our fire department. CERT will continue to provide the support as long as we are needed. Your donations have allowed CERT member to provide the support for our firemen," said Coordinator Frank Tambunga.

Midland County Firefighter Allen Graham said he couldn't believe the amount of support and donations by the people of Ozona.

County Judge Fred Deaton declared Crockett County as a state of disaster implemented the county's Emergency Management Plan. On Tuesday, the Crockett County Commissioners' Court extended that declaration with a unani-

"There are so many things in a fire that can happen before we know it," Falkner said.


On Sunday, Gov. Rick Perry sent a letter to President Barack Obama requested a Major Disaster Declaration for the State of Texas as a result of widespread wildfires and continuing fire danger across the state. The declaration includes Crockett County.

The governor identified 252 Texas counties presently threatened or impacted by wildfires. Since the wildfire season began, Texas has responded to 7,807 fires across the state that have burned more than 1,528,714 acres and destroyed 244 homes. Rescue efforts have saved 8,514 threatened homes.


Crockett County remains under a burn ban, which restricts outdoor burning. The National Weather Service in San Angelo is predicting a 20 percent chance of showers and thunderstorms tonight (April 20). However, winds are expected to be gusty throughout the week.

"When everyone leaves, the fire will be out cold," Kenley said.

As of Tuesday, Ozona Fire Department did not need anymore food or supply donations. Fire officials are asking people to call the department at 392-2626 before they bring donations. Monetary donations are always welcome and can be dropped off at the fire station or mailed to PO Box 269, Ozona, Texas 76943.















So the dilemma becomes clear. Either way, veterans lose

John Miterko, who represents 35 veterans groups across Texas, told the San Antonio Express-News that diverting money from the scratch off game "is going to be a disaster.

Even the executive director of the Veterans Commission, retired Army Col. Thomas Palladino, supports Sen. Davis' bill and advocates keeping the lottery game revenues intact. That's not the kind of sacrifice we're used to seeing from a state agency bureaucrat: it does reflect the attitudes commonly displayed by those who served our nation.

I have the utmost respect for Sen. Ogden and fully support his effort to find new revenues for the budget. A Navy veteran, Sen. Ogden possesses a firm understanding of veterans issues and an abiding sympathy for their needs.

His recommendation to divert veterans' lottery money to the Veterans Commission was made in good faith, but I believe there's a way to resolve this issue without having to make undesirable choices.

Let's leave the scratch-off revenue alone. That money has kept veterans in their homes and out of jails through alternative court programs. And given the vital work of the commission's claims' administrators, we can find the \$2.8 million elsewhere in the budget to keep them on the job.

Texas veterans made a choice to serve our country, keeping us strong, independent and free. Now, as state legislators, it's our turn to make a choice about supporting our veterans. There should be no dilemma in that.

single agency called the Texas Juvenile Justice Department under sunset legislation approved by the Senate on April 13.

The new agency would focus on probation, treatment and counseling for offenders in their home community, rather than institutionalizing them at a remote facility.

If finally passed, officials said the legislation would result in a drop in population at current TYC facilities, so the bill also provides for small counties to obtain ownership of unused state facilities now under TYC control.

**SENATE PASSES** 'SEXTING' BILL

Prosecutors currently charge youths caught sending sexually explicit text messages under felony child pornography laws.

The Senate voted April 14 to change the law to a misdemeanor offense under a bill by Sen. Kirk Watson, D-Austin.

Also under Watson's bill, minors caught receiving such messages would not be subject to prosecution if they tell authorities or delete the images without transmitting them again within 48 hours.





# **CROCKETT COUNTY**

## ORDER RESTRICTING **OUTDOOR BURNING**

The Commissioners' Court finds that circumstances present in all or part of the unincorporated area of the county create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning; and NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED by the Commissioners' Court of Crockett County, Texas, that outdoor burning is restricted in Crockett County for 30 days from the date of adoption of this Order, unless the restrictions are terminated earlier based on a determination made by the Texas Forest Service or this Court. This Order is adopted pursuant to Local Government Code 352.081, and other applicable statues. This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Natural Resources Commission for: (1) firefighter training; (2) public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations; (3) planting or harvesting or agricultural crops; or (4) burns that are conducted by an approved Prescribed Burning Association, Natural Resource Conservation Service, the and/or Texas A&M Agricultural Experiment Station, or prescribed burn manager certified under Section 153.048, Natural Resources Code, and meet the standards of Section 153.047, Natural Resources Code.

All burns shall be reported to the Crockett County Sheriff's Office (325) 392-2661 and the Fire Chief (325) 392-2626 prior to commencing, together with the name of the landowner, location involved and expert to be on hand.

This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor cooking in a properly contained area which is attended at all times.

In accordance with the Local Government Code 352.081 (h), a violation of this Order is a Class C misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500. ADOPTED this the 11th day of April, 2011.
