

# Lions annihilate Eagles

LION STADIUM - The Ozona Lions took advantage of mistakes and rolled to another victory with a 55-14 win over Grape Creek Friday night.

The Lions put up more than 500 yards of offense, including Seniors Alex Borrego and Blake Morrow each rushing for more than 100 yards and Quarterback Glen Tinney passing for 112 yards to put the Lions at 4-0.

"Ultimately we got the desired result against Grape Creek, though at times we were a little flat due to a lack of focus. We had a pretty simple game plan going in and executed pretty well. Defensively we gave up some yards to their big receiver, but they continue to fly around and play hard," said Coach Ray Brown.

The Lions kept the Eagles behind the 50-yard line as Ozona quickly racked up

points with five touchdowns in the first quarter.

Borrego had four touchdown runs, and Quarterback Glen Tinney hit Senior Jerrod duBois with two touchdown passes all in the first half.

A bad snap on a Grape Creek gave Ozona great field position. Morrow and Borrego would get the ball to the onevard line where Borrego then hit the end zone.

It's homecoming week at Ozona High School.



# Food service again school board meeting topic

Food Service was once again the main topic of discussion at the CCCCSD School Board meeting.

During the Sept. 19 regular meeting, Superintendent Chris duBois addressed the board about the transfer of around \$200,000 from the district's fund balance to cover costs for food service.

At an Aug. 30 special meeting, the board approved an amendment for the 2011-2012 budget. duBois said the overage was due to the district not qualifying for a federal reimbursement due to low participation in free and reduce food programs and overspending on food and supplies.

During the Sept. 19 meeting, duBois said the district has a history transferring large amounts to cover food service costs.

"I was surprised you were surprised. You all have been here longer than I have," du-Bois said to the board. "It's a pattern of life in West Texas small schools. We don't like it."

Since the 2003-2004 school, the district has transferred around \$100,000 to \$200,000 each year to cover food service costs.

"When I got on the board, I asked to improve the quality of the food. Those costs went up," said Board member Dwight Childress. "If we make our schools closed campuses it will be in the black, but I don't think the public will like it.'

The board approved an increased in cafeteria prices before the start of the new school year.

Board member Tom Anderson said he the district should increase the prices again to the maximum recommended amount by the federal government, which is around \$2.55 for students.

The district charges \$2.10 for elementary students' lunch and \$2.25 for middle and high schools.

"It don't understand why we don't go up to the recommended amount. It's less than the amounts of junk food (students) are buying. I thought we were going in the right direction by offering the better quality of food."

# Texas receives clean water funds from EPA

AUSTIN — The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency last week announced its award of \$57,041,000 to the Texas Water Development Board to support the Drinking Water State Revolving Fund program.

The funds are for loan assistance to eligible water systems for infrastructure improvements needed "to ensure safe drinking water is available to Texas residents." The fund program was established under the Safe Drinking Water Act Amendments of 1996 authorizing the EPA to award capitalization grants to states, which in turn are authorized to provide low-cost loans and other types of assistance to public water systems to finance the costs of infrastructure projects needed to achieve or maintain compliance with the act's requirements.

States are also authorized to use a portion of their capitalization grants to fund a range of set-aside activities including source water protection, capacity development and operator certification. The program helps to ensure that the nation's drinking water supplies remain safe and affordable and that public water systems that receive funding are properly operated and maintained, the EPA said.

In other news, President Obama appointed Ron Curry of New Mexico to head Dallas-based EPA Region 6, which includes Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Louisiana and Arkansas. Curry is the first non-Texan to serve as director of the region since the EPA was created in 1970.

Curry succeeds Al Armendariz who resigned six months ago.

#### **TEXAS LEADS IN JOB GAIN**

Texas added 38,000 seasonally adjusted nonfarm jobs in August, leading the nation in number of jobs gained for the month, the **Texas Workforce Commission** and U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics reported last week.

Closest to Texas in monthly gains were Florida with 23,200 jobs gained, and Missouri with 17,900 jobs gained. A year ago, Texas' unemployment rate was tabulated at 8.1 percent.


Texas' job growth rate has been positive for 28 consecutive months and has been at or above 2.0 percent since December 2011, Texas Workforce Commission reported Sept. 21.

#### RADIOACTIVE CYLINDER **MISSING**

The Texas Department of State Health Services on Sept. 13 reported it is looking for a piece of equipment lost Sept. 11 by an oil and gas crew in a rural part of West Texas.

The stainless steel cylinder and attached plug about seven inches long and an inch across, contains Americium-241/Beryllium. The device is not considered highly ra-

dioactive but could expose someone who comes in close contact with it for an extended period of time to a harmful dose of radiation.

part of the unincorporated area of the county create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning; and NOW, THEREFORE, I' IS HEREBY ORDERED by the Commissioners' Court of Crockett County, Tex as, that outdoor burning is restricted in Crockett County for 30 days from the date of adoption of this Order, unless the restrictions are terminated earlier based on a determination made by the Texas Forest Service or this Court. This Order is adopted pursuant to Local Government Code 352.081 and other applicable statues. This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor burn ing activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Natural Resources Commission for: (1) firefighter training; (2) public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations; (3) planting or harvest ing or agricultural crops; or (4) burns that are conducted by an approved Prescribed Burning Association, Natural Resource Conservation Service, the and/or Texas A&M Agricultural Experiment Station, or prescribed burn manager certified under Section 153.048, Natural Resources Code, and meet the standards of Section 153.047, Natural Resources Code. All burns shall be reported to the Crockett County Sheriff's Office

(325) 392-2661 and the Fire Chief (325) 392-2626 prior to commencing, together with the name of the landowner, location involved and expert to be on hand. This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor cooking in a properly contained area which is attended at all times. In accordance with the Local Government Code 352.081 (h), a violation of this Order is a Class C misdeneanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.

Tinney would find duBois again as well in the second quarter. The senior receiver galloped to a 53-yard touchdown increasing the Lions' lead.


Grape Creek tried for a comeback in the third quarter, getting into scoring position several times, but the Lions defense kept the Eagles back.



# OHS, OMS Cross Country Teams stand out at Harper

More than 500 high school and junior high athletes competed at the Harper "Hoofin' It" Cross Country Meet this Saturday and Ozona stood out as the top overall small school program in attendance.

"This really says something because the quality of teams at this meet for 1A and 2A schools was unbelievable," said Coach Erik Thormaehlen. "When considering two sets of state rankings, the first from the Cross Country Coaches Association of Texas (CCCAT.org) and the other from Texastrack.com, six of the programs attending the meet have a boys and/or girls team that is ranked in the top 10 of the state."

The OHS Lady Lions stepped up and ran their best overall team performance of the year. The girls finished sixth as a team out of 22 schools.

The only schools that beat them were Harper (ranked first in both polls in 1A State), Fredericksburg (3A), Kerrville (4A), Bandera (3A) and Johnson City (ranked first in both polls in 2A State).

The Lady Lions finished points ahead of Sonora (ranked fifth and eighth in 2A State Polls), also leaving Blanco, Mason, Comfort, Nueces Canyon, Center Point and Medina in the dust.

The girls were led by freshman McKenna Moses. Moses clocked in at 13:30 and finished 21st in a field of 148 girls.

The second Lady Lion to cross the finish line was Cynthia Garcia with a time of 13:56 and a finish of 38th place. Nicole Higgins posted a time of 14:05, which was good for 49th individually.

The next Lady Lions in were Marissa Held and Ashley Tandy in 62nd and 63rd place and times of 14:32 and 14:35.

The final two girls were Alyssa Newlin with a 15:07 (77th place) and Lexi Poindexter in a time of 15:31 (91st place).

"The Lady Lions ran 15 seconds faster (on average) than they have all year. The average time was a 14:28. The Lady Lions will continue going hard in practice to work towards an average time below 14 minutes. This is the first time all season that any of these girls have broken the fourteen minute barrier. The most notable performance of the day was McKenna Moses' breakout race, and a close second goes to the duo of Marissa Held and Ashley Tandy who ran together and were critical in helping the

team post a score that placed them amongst some very well respected competition,' Thormaehlen said.

The No. 2 and No. 10 state-ranked OHS Lions finished in third place out of 16 schools.

"As a team, this was the worst the boys have looked all year. That's not bad considering that they beat multiple state ranked team," Thormaehlen said.

The Lions finished only behind Fredericksburg (3A) and Kerrville (4A). They were victorious over Bandera (3A), Comfort (ranked 10th in 2A State), Sonora (ranked 7th in 2A State), Ingram, Harper (ranked 4th and 8th in two separate 1A State polls), San Antonio Cole (ranked 9th in 2A State), Johnson City, Brackett and Center Point.

The lead Lion was Omero Rodriguez in fifth place (out of 141 runners) with a time of 17:46.

Saul Vargas finished in 13th place overall with a time of 18:25. Josiah Jurado was the third boy in for the Lions with a time of 18:41, which was good for 18th place.

Noe Medina and Ryan Porras were the next two boys in for the Lions, as they finished in 31st and 40th place overall, with times of 19:25 and 20:05.

Alex Hopper and Leonel Rodriguez finished close together with times of 20:38 (56th) and 20:39 (58th). Alan Landa and Ben Badillo were the final two boys in for the Lions as they finished with times of 20:51 (65th) and 23:18 (112th).

"Six of the nine boys needed ice after the race, numerous struggled throughout the week with practice as they coughed their way through quarter-mile repeats, etc. I was proud of the way the boys fought through the pain and other issues, and still found a way to come out and assert their dominance over the small schools in our area," Thormaehlen said. "Omero Rodriguez had the breakout race of the day beating several kids that are returning 2A all-region runners."

The OMS teams were equally impressive.


The Lions were fourth place overall out of 19 schools, only finishing behind three schools with much larger student populations (Kerrville eighth, Bandera, and Fredericksburg).

The Lady Lions finished fifth out of 20 schools, trailing the exact same three schools as the boys (Kerrville seventh and eighth, Bandera and Fredericksburg.)

"The impressive thing to notice when viewing those results is that the middle school teams are a healthy distance ahead of solid 1A and 2A programs like Harper and Sonora. Hopefully as we continue to build this program, we can look back over the years and see that the middle school results were a clear indication of what the future looks like for the Lions and Lady Lions cross country teams," Thormaehlen said.

One that I don't agree with is hiring an outside company to do our maintenance and cafeteria work. I believe our support staff and maintenance should be done by locals and not outsiders. The district should be working handin-hand with the community and not against it. Once again, thank you for your consideration.

of our students here and believe they deserve the very best that we can possibly give them, whether it is the opportunities they receive from being educated here or the example they see in their community. We have some critical financial issues that are needed to be addressed and facility issues. These are critical in many districts and we have ours that have to be addressed with concern for all of our community, students and adult members. I feel my experience as an educator and my understanding as a taxpayer are paramount to being an effective board member.

#### WHAT IS THE MOST **IMPORTANT ISSUE FACING CCCCSD AND** WHAT IS YOUR PLAN TO **RESOLVE IT?**

Finance is our most critical issue. To be able to provide our students with the best education we can offer takes money. Right now, we are doing an excellent job of providing what

our students deserve. However, we have issues concerning our Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) ranking and that is putting a lot of time consuming paperwork before our teachers and administrators. It is not just paperwork but mandated meetings, seminars, visitations and curriculum monitoring. It simply takes money to provide services and take care of all the state and federal government's mandates. In addition, the state uses specific criteria to determine how much money will be sent back to our district. One of the factors is our attendance. Each one percent of attendance drop equates to \$183,000 to the district.

This demands all the time for teachers and administrators. It is difficult to stay on top of the attendance problems. Sometimes we don't understand the need for all the administrative staff we have. However, if we can raise our attendance rate by one percent, we have more than covered the cost of the administrator. In addition, any discipline issue now requires more time of principals. Compounded

throughout the year, that is a lot of time that could be used for education management and fiscal planning. The state also puts our

staff ratio to students into a formula for funding. The more aides and teachers to students, the less money we receive. Therefore, informed difficult choices must be done to meet fiscal responsibilities of the district. Choices must be made with acute knowledge of staff's responsibilities and how they relate to our district's fiscal responsibilities. Kneejerk choices and personal agendas will not keep our district on course.

I am willing to make informed choices and not to follow anyone's personal agenda. I have chosen Ozona as my home and I want our students to have every opportunity we can afford without the taxpayers taking a hit during these difficult economic times.

#### WHAT UNIQUE **CONTRIBUTION WILL YOU** MAKE TO THIS BOARD?

My experience in the education profession is my strongest

contribution. I also understand having to work within the parameters of a budget. I understand the taxpayer, teacher and administrator. In addition, I have a lot of experience working with students from each aspect of the educational environment.

#### ANY ADDITIONAL **COMMENTS TO VOTERS:**

I believe in the youth of our county and all that they accomplish. I believe it is important that our students view the adults of this community as positive role models, so one day they too will give back to their communities. I would invite all community members to become involved in our schools to truly understand what is being accomplished by our students and staff. Not all things are perfect, but the best efforts are being provided and all things can be improved.

If a person approaches any concept with a positive attitude, it is better to iron the kinks out that are present. I would appreciate the community's vote this November for the CCCCSD School Board.

Last year, the district hired Walker Quality Services to come in and consult and improve the food service.

duBois said the district never followed all of the company's recommendations, but that participation and cash sales increased.

The district chose not to work with Walker Quality Services for the 2012-2013 year.

Also, Food Services Manager Ludy Vargas had not been able to monitor her budget in prior years. duBois said that is changing this year.

He also said that the district is watching more tightly the federal programs and look-



"We are throwing everything we've got at it and improving it," he said.

duBois said the board has told him that job preservation is a concern, and that the board also wants to keep campuses open for lunch.

"There are ways to be smart. I'll do whatever you tell me to do," he said. "We are going to find out this year what it's like to take in more revenue."

Board President Ray Don Myers said it would be best if the board knew a little bit beforehand about the money. 'We have to live within our

means, but I know we will have to go over," Myers said.

#### PRINCIPAL REPORTS Board member Grizz Medina addressed two of the princi-

pals during their report. Medina asked Elementary Principal about not hiring a new elementary librarian. Former librarian Dora Aiguier resigned earlier this month.

"We have absolutely no room in this budget. Everyone is trying to pitch in and see if we can make it last," duBois said.

Jackson said the reading and language arts teachers are helping out in the library and using the time for instruction. She also said she has people lined up to help with shelving books and that OHS Librarian Debra Bangeman has offered to help.

Suggestions of using parent and high school student volunteers has also been made, Iackson said.

"I understand about being

frugal and not stretching our teachers to the limit, but I'm trying to cover all the bases before it turns into chaos," Medina said. "It's not going to be cha-

os," Jackson added. Medina then asked OHS Principal Josh Carty about the high school band program.

Carty said there have been several parent meetings, but that all of the meetings have ended well.

"We are encouraging parents to visit with us," Carty said. Changes are hard for peo-Some of those changes could have been communicated a little sooner. I haven't had a re-

## peat complainer," duBois added.

**OHS ATTENDANCE** In his report, duBois said he was surprised that attendance is already an issue at the high school.

Enrollment as of Sept. 19 was 810 students district-wide, with around 200 in the high school.

Carty said the problem is with a handful of students that are choosing not to come to school. duBois said the State Leg-

islature passed a law last session exempting 18-year-old students from compulsory school attendance. Some of the students not coming to school are 18, duBois said.

Every student that withdraws from the district and doesn't enroll in another school is counted as a dropout for the district, duBois said.

OHS officials are making efforts to get the students into school

"Three weeks into school and we've got kids that don't want to come to school. We've got some frustrated parents. There are parents just as frustrated about it," duBois said. "Attendance is important. If tney want to finish school, they can finish school. There are solutions if a student wants to study part-time.'
