Commissioners, school board support public notices

The Ozona Stockman would like to applaud the Crockett County Commissioners' Court and the CCCSD School Board, along with County Judge Fred Deaton and Superintendent Chris duBois, for their support in keeping public notices in newspapers.

Members of these two local government entities have signed letters to State Rep. Harvey Hilderbran, R-Kerrville, and State Senator Carlos Uresti, D-San Antonio, opposing House Bill 335.

This bill, authored by Freshman Rep. Jona-than Stickland, R-Hurst, would give governmental bodies the option of posting their public notices on their own government-controlled websites instead of printing them in newspapers.

The two main government entities in Crockett County are telling state officials that they don't want this bill to pass and that The Ozona Stockman is the best way to provide transparency to local citizens about the business of their county and school district.

Public notices let people know about meetings the county and school district are having. They keep budget figures, tax rates, accountability hearings and burn bans in front of the public eye.

Supporters of this bill claim that by posting these notices onto the government entity's website it will save taxpayers money.

Very few citizens make it a practice to go to a governmental entity's website to search out the legal notices that have been posted. Newspaper readership among voters, however, remains extremely high.

Newspapers publish the notices both in print and in their online editions (at no extra charge), and the notices

are conglomerated on a statewide website operated by the Texas Press Association.

Newspapers are required by law to charge their lowest classified rate for public notices.

Printed public notice enables citizens to keep watch on their government and tax dollars.

Printed notices raise awareness about government spending, tax rates and projects.

Restricting public notice to the internet would disenfranchise those who don't have computer access, including minorities, the elderly, the disabled and those in rural communities, like Ozona, that are statistically less likely to have online capability.

The cost of printed notice is minimal when compared to other government expenditures. For example, in 2011 Texas counties spent an average of 0.00533 percent of their budgets on legal notices regarding procurement.

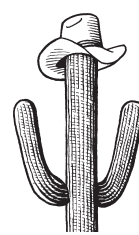
Crockett County Commissioners and School Board Members are united in supporting keeping these notices in front of the public in the local newspaper.

Now, you as citizens can also express support for keeping public notices in newspapers. Write a letter, send an email, post a comment to Hilderbran and Uresti and let them know you want to keep public notices in newspapers.

It's a guy thing; like checking a man's paws when you shake hands, testing for calluses, short fingernails and grease stains to see how manly they are. It's the same with sleep deprivation. The World Champion of this little game is Rascal, a sort-of-friend of mine who's got a heart so hard if you kicked it you'd break your toe. Rascal is a retired farmer who has nothing better in the world to do than to irritate me. Because of his constant tormenting I have no doubt that when Rascal says "good night" for the final time in this life he's going to bed down in a place where he won't need any covers.

As a former farmer, Rascal is a believer in the old adage that if the sun is up you should be too. The game starts when I answer the phone about six in the morning and hear a grating voice on the other end that would drive a wolf to commit suicide. "Morning Lee, I didn't wake you did I?" asks Rascal hoping to have caught me asleep.

The key to winning this game of "mind over mattress" is to sound real cheery when you answer the phone, even if you were sleeping as sound as a dead calf. I find it helps to clear my throat before answering. If you do manage to convince the caller that you've been up for hours their next call will come an hour earlier. And so on. "Morning Lee," says Rascal hopefully at five a.m. "You sound like you were asleep."

"Nope," I lied like a rug. "I had to get up to wake up the rooster. What exactly is it that you are calling about Rascal?"

"Oh, I hadn't talked to you for a good while and just wanted to see how you are doing."

Actually the purpose of the call was to inform me that I was going to miss the next hour of sleep.

Being an artistic liar I've developed some ready answers that really irritate Rascal. Once he called at four a.m., when it was so dark the bats couldn't even see, to ask if he'd caught me sleeping. "Nope. Actually I've been out working for several hours. I've been up so long I'm thinking of going down for my nap," I replied.

"Well, you sure sound like you were asleep to me," replied Rascal dejectedly.

Although this is a game played mostly by men it does NOT mean our wives don't suffer. This contest drives my wife crazy. "Why don't you just tell them we are sleeping?" she asks.

"I can't. Then he would win," I explain patiently.

"Well why don't you call him when he's trying to sleep at nine at night?"

"That would be cheating. Besides, it's rude to call someone that late."

My wife is simply unable to grasp the competitive nature of the game. But I must admit that even I am tiring of it. I can't even sleep when Rascal DOESN'T call because I'm laying awake listening for the phone to ring, clearing my voice for a ready response.

Senate panel holds first hearing on budget

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS By Ed Sterling | Texas Press Association

AUSTIN – A state budget gradually will be attached to the framework provided by SB 1, the general appropriations bill authored by Tommy Williams, R-The Woodlands, chair of the Senate Finance Committee.

In a hearing spread over three days last week, the Senate Finance Committee absorbed invited testimony given by officials representing institutions of higher education, the state comptroller's office, the Legislative Budget Board, the Teachers Retirement System and more.

John Heleman, chief revenue estimator with the comptroller's office, said collections from tax and non-tax revenue sources are expected to total some \$96.2 billion, minus \$3.6 billion that will go into the so-called Rainy Day Fund.

The figure Heleman gave increases to \$101.4 billion available for general-purpose spending in 2014-2015, when

a projected ending balance of \$8.8 billion from the current two-year budget cycle is added. But this is only the beginning of a long process to deliver the Legislature's most basic obligation: the budget.

BILL WOULD REFORM TESTING

Rep. Mike Villarreal, D-San Antonio, on Jan. 23 filed legislation that would cut to four the number of assessments upon which students must achieve a cumulative passing score in order to graduate from high school. The current number of assessments that students must pass is 15.

Villarreal's HB 596 also would:
 - Limit the number of school days spent on testing students;
 - Cut the requirement that end-of-course tests count for

15 percent a student's final grade in the course; and
 - End the practice of using test scores to calculate the "recognized" or "exemplary" rating of a campus.

Villarreal said his intent is to shift the state away from high-stakes testing in response to calls for education reform by parents, educators and business leaders.

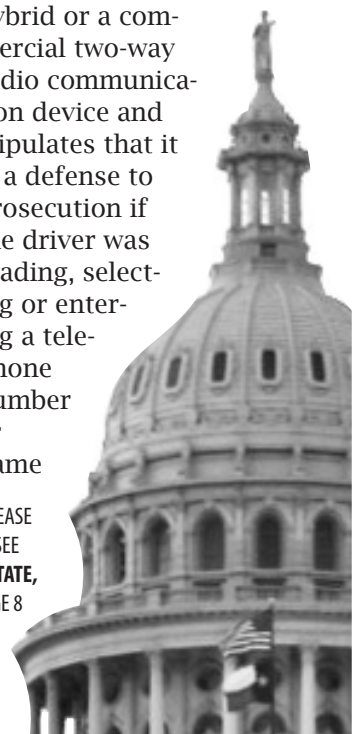
BILLS WOULD CURB TEXTING

So far, at least five state lawmakers are offering legislation to make it illegal to read, write or send text messages while driving a motor vehicle in Texas.

HB 27 by Rep. Trey Martinez-Fischer, D-San Antonio, has an exception for a peace officer or an emergency responder if the text messaging is in connection with official duties.

HB 63 by Rep. Tom Cradick, R-Midland, includes exceptions for a citizens band radio or CB radio hybrid or a commercial two-way radio communication device and stipulates that it is a defense to prosecution if the driver was reading, selecting or entering a telephone number or name

After the board reconvened in open session, they took no action on any of the items discussed in the closed session.

PUBLIC NOTICES

Ozona Stockman Editor and Publisher Melissa Perner presented the school board with information about a bill that has been filed in the state legislature wanting to take the requirement of public notices being printed in the newspaper and placing them solely on governmental websites.

Each of the board members and Superintendent Chris duBois signed letters to State Rep. Harvey Hilderbran, R-Kerrville, and State Senator Car-los Uresti, D-San Antonio, expressing

their support of keeping public notices in newspapers and against House Bill 335.

BOARD AND SUPERINTENDENT EVALUATION PROCESS

In his report, duBois asked the board to think about their goals and then revise and update the board's and superintendent's evaluation form for the February meeting.

END-OF-COURSE WAIVER

Texas Education Agency Commissioner Michael Williams has exercised his authority to grant districts discretion and waive the statutory requirement to include end-of-course test grades as 15 percent of final grades for affected high school courses in 2013-2014.

duBois said the district is affirming that unless the

board wanted to consider including end-of-course grades as part of final course grades for 2013-2014, district counsel Sara Leon advises that the district's current policy language is adequate to cover this concern pending any additional resolution for this concern beyond 2013-2014.

duBois said the board can look at passing a resolution at their February meeting.

TEXAS LEGISLATURE

duBois gave the board an overview of topics expected to be discussed during the 83rd Texas Legislature that started this month.

He said bills are being filed and discussions have been made on standardized testing, different models of graduation plans and school vouchers and funding.

"In everything we're

hearing there is no material with the intent to replace the money they took away from education last time," duBois said.

Permit is a key component of a pilot program designed to provide opportunities for responsible, resource-compatible public use of the Devils River, while respecting private landowner rights and protecting the ecological health of the river and its fragile ecosystem.

Implementation of a permitting system was one of the key recommendations of the original Devils River Working Group that endeavored to strike a balance between private landowner rights and recreational river use by the public.

"We believe that with this new permitting process the department has done due diligence in following the recommendations of a diverse group of landowners, conservation organizations and paddling groups," TPWD Executive Director Carter Smith said. "The permit system helps strike a balance between private landowner rights and the rights of the public to ac-

cess the river for recreation. We will monitor how this pilot works and can make adjustments if needed."

TPWD will issue up to 12 day-use launch permits and 12 overnight-use launch permits per day. Before launching a kayak or canoe on the Devils River, each paddler must obtain a permit, although the trip leader of a paddling group may obtain all permits for members of the group.

Permits will cost \$10 per person and may be obtained 11 months in advance.

Permits will be needed by any paddler planning to access the river at either of the two Devils River State Natural Area units, as well as Baker's Crossing. The Baker's Crossing bridge area on State Highway 163 is being managed by TPWD under an agreement with the Texas Department of Transportation. Most lands adjacent to the approximately 37 miles of Devils River from Baker's Crossing to Amistad Reservoir are privately owned and off limits to paddlers.

The Devils River State

Natural Area consists of the original 20,000-acre state natural area that's now called the Del Norte unit, the newly acquired 17,000-acre lower river area that's been designated as the Big Satan unit and the Baker's Crossing unit. The primary purpose of the state natural area is to protect natural and cultural resources and provide opportunities for limited, resource-compatible use.

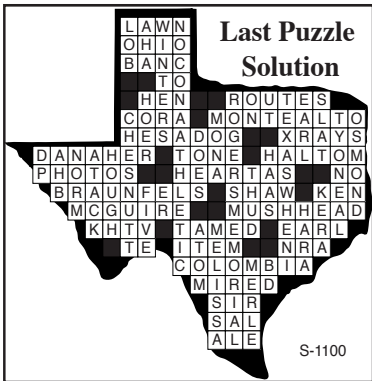

to make a phone call or to navigate using a global positioning service.
HB 69 by Rep. Eddie Lucio III, D-San Benito, is much like the others, and Lucio has signed as joint author of Craddock's bill.
HB 108 by Rep. Patricia Harless, R-Spring, would ban reading, writing or sending a text-based communication - including instant messaging, e-mail and text messaging, unless the vehicle is stopped.
SB 28 by Sen. Judith Zaffirini, D-Laredo, creates an exception allowed use of a handheld wireless communication device to report illegal activity or summon emergency help, and allows a political subdivision to adopt a local ordinance or rule that is more stringent than the various changes in the law she is proposing.
"Ensuring the safety of our loved ones is a paramount is-

sue," Lucio said. "The texting and driving ban will prevent the fatal accidents too many families have experienced."

ABBOTT LAUDS EPA RULING

The U.S. Court of Appeals for the D.C. Circuit on Jan. 24 denied the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's petition for rehearing of the Court's August 2012 decision to vacate the Cross-State Air Pollution Rule.
The rule was meant to cause states to do a better job of containing toxic emissions originating mostly from power plants and drift into other states, negatively affecting air quality.
Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott on Jan. 25 issued a statement welcoming the action, saying, "The court agrees that the EPA acted lawlessly and violated federal law in its zeal to inflict job-killing regulations on the state."
On Dec. 30, 2011, the D.C. Circuit Court issued an order stopping the enforcement of the cross-state air pollution rule and in August 2012 vacated the rule. The state of Texas, the National Mining Association and the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers filed suit against the EPA, arguing that enforcement of the rule presented unfair financial burdens and would have forced the closure of older power plants.
