Crockett County sees increase in 2012 rainfall

OZONA, TEXAS

Rainfall was better in 2012. The Crockett County Groundwater District reported last week that the average county rainfall for 2012 was 17.29 inches.

This number is way up from 2011's driest year total of only 5.54 inches.

The wettest month in 2012 for Crockett County was

ber was second with 3.73 inches. The driest month was June with 0.08.

The 2012 rain was enough to cause the drought to continue another year in most areas, said John Nielsen-Gammon, Texas State Climatologist.

East Texas saw substantial drought relief, but West Texas saw water levels continue to go down.

May with 4.86 inches. Septempercent of its conservation capacity, down from 75 percent at this time last year, Nielsen-Gammon said.

> "The outlook for the rest of this year is tilted slightly for below normal rainfall and above normal temperatures, so there's still no end in sight for this drought," Nielsen-Gammon said.

> The latest U.S. Drought Monitor shows Crockett County listed as abnormally dry

and moderate, which are the lowest two rankings.

During their January meeting, the Crockett County Commissioners' Court lifted the countywide burn ban for 30 days. The commissioners will discuss the ban at their Feb. 11 meeting.

"Basically, 89.62 percent of Texas is still in drought as of Jan. 29. One year ago this week, 99.48 percent of Texas was in drought," said meteorologist

Ozona Schools holding safety drills

CCCCSD campuses will be conducting specific Emergency Preparedness Drills next week.

A series of short, controlled drills will simulate lockdown conditions. The drills are 9 a.m. Tuesday, Feb. 12 at OES and Thursday, Feb. 14, at 9:05 a.m. for OHS and 10 a.m. for OMS.

Staff and students will be practicing responses and communication for a lockdown event, which means that there may be a possible on-campus threat of an uncooperative or hostile intruder or some serious physical threat to students or staff in or around the school building.

These brief drills reinforce correct response elements without creating undue stress for students. Each drill is planned for 10-15 minutes, just enough time to see that all areas are secured and following response protocols. Regular school activities will resume immediately.

Law Enforcement officials and first responders are invited to observe, but no live engagement with law enforcement or emergency personnel are planned. Parents or community observers are not allowed during these drill times.

Commissioners hold short meeting

During a short special meeting, the Crockett County Commissioners' Court dealt with housekeeping budget items and discussed a future county equipment auction.

At the Jan. 30 meeting, the commissioners approved zeroing out the EMS, Care Center and Health Services budget, moving \$390,314.94 from the Health Services payments to Shannon and creating a Rent Revenue Fund for the Family Health Center of Ozona and moving \$269,142.31 from Paving and Payments to the Equipment Replacement Fund.

The commissioners tabled changing the date on the county surplus equipment auction to their Feb. 11 meeting to give time to gather more information about items that may be included.

Also placed on the Feb. 11 agenda is to continue the discussion with officials from the Texas Department of Transportation about creating an access road in the Chandlerdale West area located in the southwest part of Ozona.

The meeting will be at 9 a.m. at the courthouse annex and it is open to the public.

Uresti files county road, end sugary school drinks bills

Bills to fund county road repairs, change the smoking age and ban sugary drinks from public schools were all filed last week by State Senator Carlos Uresti.

Uresti, D-San Antonio, filled Senate Bill 300 that would create a road improvement fund comprised of oil and gas severance taxes to help repair county roads. The fund would be managed by the Texas Department of Transportation.

"The resurgence of oil and gas production in South Texas and the Permian Basin has created thousands of jobs and spurred the state and local economies," Uresti said in a press release.

While Tx-DOT has identified some funds to help counties with road repairs, more will be needed

in the years to come. Under Uresti's bill, a percentage of oil and gas severance tax collections would be dedicated to a road improvement grant fund managed by TxDOT. A county could apply for grants for specific road improvement projects based on the amount of oil and gas severance taxes the county contributes. The county would have to contribute 5 percent in matching funds for each

project, the release stated.

"Our policy analyst on the bill says the fund would utilize the severance taxes already being paid. It is neither a new tax nor a tax increase," said Mark Langford, spokesman for Uresti's office.

Langford also said only oil and gas producers pay the severance tax, not royalty owners.

Priority would be given to those counties that have a proven record of road maintenance, reflected by annual county road reports as specified by the Transportation Code.

Uresti noted that state leaders have advocated using the rainy day fund, which is comprised of oil and gas

Serving the distinct 23rd Congressional District

■he 23rd Congressional District is like no other. It takes nearly 23 percent of Texas by land, two time zones, and runs along 800 miles of the Texas- Mexico border. It sprawls from south San Antonio through the Trans-Pecos/Big Bend region and into the lower valley of El Paso. From the Espada Mission in Bexar County founded in 1731 to the Ysleta Mission in El Paso founded 1682. It is larger than sever-

al states combined. The district is nearly 70 percent Latino, 25 percent Anglo and 4 percent African American. It takes in urban, suburban and rural areas. All or part of 29 counties are contained in the 23rd with populations ranging from 275,373 residents in Bexar County to 82 in Loving County

No other district in the country contains as much of our nation's international border. This shared border gives the district a unique perspective on issues such as trade and commerce and immigration.

Agriculture has long been a core pillar of the local economies. As of 2007, there were 22,172 farms in the district. An estimated 40,400 jobs in the area depend on the production and sales of agricultural commodities.

Like agriculture, the local economy has also depended on a large military presence. In the 1800's, a string of forts (Fort Inge, Fort Duncan, Fort Clark, Fort Lancaster, Fort Stockton, Fort Davis, Fort Quitman, etc) guarded settlers and commerce along the difficult road from San Antonio to El Paso. Today, the district is still home to a large military population. Many residents work as civilians or serve as active duty personnel at Camp Bullis, Laughlin Air Force Base, Lackland Air Force Base, Brooke Army Medical Center or Fort Bliss. Further, many more residents have served their country honorably and well as members of the armed services.

The district is neither liberal nor conservative. It is evenly split ideologically. In the November 2012 elections, the voters in the district favored Mitt Romney by a small margin. Four years ago, the voters favored President Barack Obama by a small margin.

Perry delivers 'State of State' address

AUSTIN — Texas is stronger than ever, Gov. Rick Perry said early in his 36-minute "State of the State" address to the 83rd Texas Legislature on Jan. 29.

Perry praised lawmakers, saying the line has been held on taxes and the state is spending within its means, delivering on his priorities, by "making the tough decisions separating wants from needs."

He called for an amendment to the state constitution "so when we do bring in more than we need, we'll have the option of returning tax money directly to the people who paid it." And he said employment is robust, with nearly 1.4 million low, medium and high-paying jobs added in the last two years.

As for the environment, Perry said that from 2000 to 2011, ozone levels decreased by 23 percent and industrial nitric oxide and nitrogen dioxide gas emissions were cut by

60 percent. In a pushback statement aimed at Washington, D.C., Perry said Texas would not expand Medicaid under the federal Affordable Care Act and would not set up a state health care exchange — part of phased-in "Obama Care" intended to aid citizens in finding affordably priced health

insurance. Education, Perry said, is progressing, with graduation rates at an all-time high, the third highest in the nation. Perry noted that some higher education institutions are offering the \$10,000 four-year degree program that he asked for, and he spoke proudly of increases in charter-school enrollment, but he did not mention the \$5 billion stripped two years ago from the public education budget.

WITH SURPLUS Even though state finances are off to a running start in 2013 with better-than-expected tax collections that might allow the state to avoid major funding cutbacks like those adopted in 2011, there is room for improvement, Perry suggested.

WHAT TO DO

"We're in a position today to put our financial house in order, and it's time to do so," he said. "We have an opportunity this session, an opportunity to true up our budget and move away from the budgetary techniques we've come to depend on all too often. ... We need to make the franchise tax exemption for small businesses permanent.

... We also need to do away with the practice of using dedicated funds and specific fees for anything other than

the purpose for which they were intended. If we don't need taxpayer money for that purpose, let's not collect it at all."

Foreign persons must report U.S. Agricultural land holdings

BIG LAKE - Reagan-Upton-Irion-Crockett County USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) Executive Director Jed Hruska, reminds foreign persons with an interest in agricultural lands in the United States that they are required to report their holdings and any transactions to the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture.

"Any foreign person who acquires, transfers or holds any interest, other than a security interest, including leaseholds of 10 years or more, in agricultural land in the United States is required by law to report the transaction no later than 90 days after the date of the transaction," said Hruska

Foreign investors must

vestment Disclosure Act (AFI-DA) reports with the FSA county office that maintains reports for the county where the land is located.

"Failure to file a report, filing a late report or filing an inaccurate report can result in a penalty with fines up to 25 percent of the fair market value of the agricultural land," said Hruska.

For AFIDA purposes, agricultural land is defined as any land used for farming, ranching or timber production, if the tracts total 10 acres or

Disclosure reports are also required when there are changes in land use.

For example, reports are required when land use changes from nonagricultural to ag-

file Agricultural Foreign In- ricultural or from agricultural to nonagricultural.

> Foreign investors must also file a report when there is a change in the status of ownership such as the owner changes from foreign to nonforeign, from non-foreign to foreign or from foreign to for-

> Data gained from these disclosures is used to prepare an annual report to the President and Congress concerning the effect of such holdings upon family farms and rural communities in the United States.







I visited with him last night but that may be the last time I ever see him alive. Last summer he developed a cough and went to the doctor and was diagnosed with advanced lung cancer. He is over 6 feet tall, young, strong and in good physical shape. He works with wood and has made a lot of crosses for different churches. They are beautifully handmade with a lot of intricate carving and some over 20 feet tall. In talking with him he said he may guit the massive doses of chemo and just go on to be with the Lord. His life reminds me of something in the Bible. 
2013. Beyond that, we have to wait and see what the tropics and spring/summer thunderstorms bring to our area," Burgess said.

At the beginning of January, the U.S. Department of Agriculture declared 157 Texas counties, including Crockett County, as primary disaster counties. Fifty counties in Texas have been declared contiguous disaster counties.

These counties have reached this designation due to being under severe drought status for at least eight consecutive weeks based on the U.S. Drought Monitor during the crop year.

Producers with operations in any of these counties are eligible to apply for low interest emergency loans through the USDA. Producers have eight months from the date of the declaration to apply, according to a USDA press release.

He's only had a month in Washington, but quickly Gallego said he has noticed the city is "clearly a place where partisanship is deeply embedded."

In his 22 years as a State Representative, Gallego was considered a moderate. In Congress he has joined the fiscally conservative Blue Dog Coalition of Democrats.

Gallego voted last month with the majority in favor of H.R. 325, "No Budget, No Pay Act," which temporarily lifts the cap on the debt ceiling for four months.

The Republican-backed bill included language to withhold pay from members of Congress in the event that a budget is not passed in each house of Congress by April 15.

"Congress has used a credit card and its maxed out. You can't fight two wars and cut taxes and expect to not have a deficit," Gallego said.

Gallego has been appointed to the Armed Services Committee, where he will sit on the subcommittees for Readiness and Tactical Air and Land Forces.

The Readiness Subcommittee oversees military readiness, training, logistics and maintenance issues and programs, military construction, installations and family housing issues and the BRAC process.

The Air and Land Forces Subcommittee conducts oversight of ammunition programs, Army and Air Force acquisition programs, all Navy and Marine Corps aviation programs, and National Guard and Army and Air Force National Guard and Reserve.

"The future of this county depends on what happens in South China, the Middle East, Africa and we need our carriers and Navy force to be Johnny on the spot," said Ben English, a local citizen whose two sons are in the military. "I've never seen moral as low as this since the Carter Administration."

Gallego said he recently spend time on the USS Har-

ry Truman visiting with military service men and women. He said he is aiming for the US Military to have the equipment and supplies necessary.

"The country is in good hands. There is an incredible amount of pride and enthusiasm. I'm not unmindful of the challenges we have. Parents whose sons and daughters are serving, I don't see how they sleep. We owe them. It's a debt of honor," Gallego said.

Daryl Copeland, owner of Ozona Body Shop, talked to Gallego about increases in health insurance and keeping a small business going.

Copeland said health insurance for him and his wife is expected to increase almost 30 percent by March 1. His carrier is Blue Cross Blue Shield.

"My biggest fear is being able to survive," Copeland said. "We are only on a group plan of two but we have to have it."

Gallego, whose parents ran a restaurant in Alpine while he was growing up, said people should not have

to choose between health insurance and food.

One of Gallego's concerns is the lack of options available to people in rural areas.

"I'm still in the process of learning and making an effort to learn more about health insurance. We have to figure a way out of this. People need health insurance," he said.

Border security was also a topic of discussion with local citizen Ginger Perner providing videos and photos of illegal aliens coming across her ranch.

Gallego said he has visited with people in his district about the border and the challenges they are facing with the drug cartels.

Gallego will also sit on the Agriculture Committee where he has been assigned to subcommittees on General Farm Commodities and Risk Management and Livestock, Rural Development and Credit.

"I want to bring members of congress with me and let them see how our issues are different," Gallego said.

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
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

severance taxes, for both water and transportation projects. In his State of the State address on Jan. 29, Gov. Rick Perry called for investing \$3.7 billion from rainy day fund, also known as the Economic Stabilization fund, for such projects.

County Judge Fred Deaton and Crockett County Commissioners have been invited to the State Capitol on Feb. 25 for Crockett County Day. Deaton said this bill will be one of the priorities they plan on speaking to Uresti about.

The State Senator also filed bills to raise the legal smoking age in Texas to 21, ban the sale of sugary drinks at public schools and stem the abuse opioid drugs.

Senate Bill 313 would increase the legal age to purchase, possess, or consume tobacco products in Texas from 18 to 21 years of age.

Responding to the epidemic of childhood obesity in Texas, Uresti filed Senate Bill 317, which would prohibit the sale of sugary drinks in public schools.

Under the bill, drinks provided to students on school campuses would be restricted to water without added sweetener, 1 percent fat-content milk, fluid milk substitutions, 100 percent vegetable juice, 100 percent fruit juice, 0-calorie electrolyte replacement or 0-calorie vitamin enhanced water.

Coaches would be allowed to provide students with any electrolyte replacement beverage after physical activity of at least one hour. The act would not apply when school is not in session, before the breakfast period, or after the last class period.

Senate Bill 316, designed to curb the rampant abuse of prescription opioids such as OxyContin and Opana. Uresti's bill stipulates that when a physician prescribes an opioid analgesic drug that incorporates a tamper resistant technology, no substitution

or interchange shall be permitted for that drug unless the pharmacy verifies that the substitute provides substantially similar tamper resistance properties, or obtains the prior consent of the prescribing physician.

Uresti also filed bills that would allow online voter registration, provide assistance to pregnant teenagers and teen mothers in danger of dropping out of school; and prevent corporations from skirting payment of the hotel/motel tax.

Senate Bill 315, allowing online voter registration in Texas. Under the bill, eligible voters could register online if they possess a driver's license or identification card issued by the Department of Public Safety. For those who do not have such documents, a website would provide a convenient way to register that minimizes typographical and transcription errors by prepopulating the voter's information on a mail-in card.

Senate Bill 314, providing child care for teen mothers identified as high risk for dropping out of high school. Texas has the highest teenage birth rate in the country, a major factor in the dropout problem. One study showed that up to 67 percent of teen moms never obtain their high school diploma.

Uresti's bill would permit existing funds to be to be used to allow teen moms to pursue their education, which would benefit the mother, her child, and the larger community as well. Senate Bill 319, amending

a provision in the tax code regarding exemptions from paying the hotel/motel tax. Under current law, individuals and corporations can escape the tax by renting a room for months at a time. The law has allowed energy-production related companies — particularly in Eagle Ford Shale counties — to avoid the tax by renting rooms indefinitely and rotating workers who are staying as guests.

Uresti represents Senate District 19, which includes Crockett County.



the state's Economic Stabilization (or "rainy day") Fund - a savings account to be used for emergencies, disaster relief and to maintain a high credit rating. He said the fund will soon hold nearly \$12 billion, and he supports the use of \$3.7 billion from the fund for a one-time investment in infrastructure programs, which he defined as "critical water and transportation systems."


