## Commissioners approve AirMed service for local residents

Crockett County residents are now covered on Shannon AirMed expenses.

During Monday's regular meeting, the Crockett County Commissioners' Court approved a one-year agreement with Shannon AirMed helicopter medical services that will cover Crockett County residents on flights initiated from Crockett County. Cost will be \$15,000 for a year covering all

Crockett County households and residents.

All county residents will now be 100 percent covered if they have health insurance or Medicare. For those without insurance they will receive a bill and only pay the Medicare rate, which is a small fraction of the overall cost, said Will Winters, sale manager with the AirMedCare network.

Shannon AirMed currently offers individual memberships for around \$60.

This agreement only per-

tains to residents of the county and if the flight is initiated from Crockett County, such as EMS meeting AirMed at the Barnhart landing site.

An upgraded plan of \$35 per household a year will be offered to county residents to provide air ambulance coverage outside the county in the company's 175 locations in 26 states.

Winters said that those who subscribe to the \$35 service will face no other charges throughout the AirMedCare system.

The \$35 service fee will also cover college students that use their Ozona address as their permanent address.

"Anybody can benefit from this," Winters said.

Yoakum, Winkler, Andrews, Pecos, Reagan and Schleicher counties have also adopted agreements.

"This is very expensive on anyone who has to use this. This is one thing it appears that it might be a benefit to the people of Crockett County," said County Judge Fred Deaton.

Winters said additional information will be provided to The Stockman about the program in the future.

### TxDOT FRONTAGE ROAD

An e-mail from Elizabeth Hilton of the Federal Highway Administration stated that a partial interstate interchange would not be approved in the county's project to provide an access road in the Chandlerdale West of Ozona.

The e-mail was delivered by San Angelo TxDOT District Engineer John DeWitt. The county had asked TxDOT to look into helping them build an access road that ties into Interstate-10 to give citizens and emergency personnel better access during flooding.

The e-mail stated that the partial interchange does not meet policy requirements and that alternatives must be considered.

## Athletic Director Ray Brown leaving Ozona

After three years as Athletic Director, Ray Brown has announced that he will be leaving Ozona at the end of the 2012-2013 school year.

Brown said he had a meeting at 7 a.m. Monday with his coaching staff and then met with his players and students informing them that he will be submitting his letter of resignation to Superintendent Chris duBois at a later date. duBois will then submit the resignation to the CCCSD School Board.

"I did not want the staff or the kids to hear that from anyone but me," Brown said.

Brown said he does not have another job offer at this time. He also said rumors started circulating last week about other coaches looking at his position.

Brown's contract is good through 2014. He said his resignation will take effect at the end of May.

## Hilderbran named chair of Ways and Means Committee

State Rep. Harvey Hilderbran, R-Kerrville, has once again been named chairman of the Ways and Means Committee in the Texas House of Representatives. The committee deals with all legislation relating to the state's tax code.

Hilderbran said that his top priorities as chairman are to provide meaningful tax relief for all taxpayers, restore funding to public education and secure funding for infrastructure. As chairman of the Ways and Means Committee, Hilderbran sits on the Legislative Budget Board, which prepares the draft appropriations bill and budget estimates for each state agency. "We've need to make our tax

code fairer and simpler. During the interim, the Ways and Means Committee heard testimony from Texans and Texas businesses regarding tax policy.

I've listened to those concerns and will be introducing legislation for tax reform and relief for all Texans, including property owners and small businesses," Hilderbran said.

He said that another key goal of 2013 will be developing the infrastructure necessary for the state's growing population, particularly as

it relates to energy resources, transportation, and water supply.

"We have to develop responsible, long-term plans to address the needs of both current and future Texans," Hilderbran said. "We're in a much better place than we were two years ago, and we need to use this opportunity to focus on long-term plans."

In addition to Ways and Means, Hilderbran was also named as a member of the State Affairs committee.

Hilderbran has also filed a bill that prevents Texas courts from using foreign law to determine the outcome of family legal proceedings related to marriage, divorce or parent-child

That is most assuredly not the case. Amendment 1 concerns the establishment and exercise of religion. Indeed, the Founding Fathers wanted to be certain that there was no es-

tablished church as they had already experienced that in Europe and in other countries. This is not to say that religion has been banished from our government. Indeed, George W. Bush cloaked his "faith-based approach" to governance in rhetoric about how religion has been wrongly banished from the public square. Religious groups, he said, were then and had been targeted for no good purpose. During the civil rights era, religion certainly did play a big

role in the passing of legislation guaranteeing civil rights to all Americans, and presidents have often been at odds with religious establishments. President Bush didn't flick an eyelash when the National Council of Churches and the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops opposed the war in Iraq. 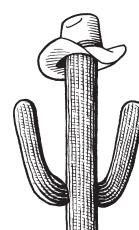

## Judge rules against school finance system

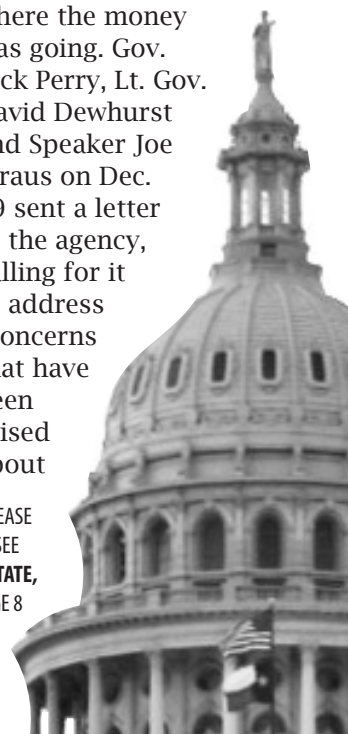
AUSTIN — Texas' current school finance system fails to provide substantially equal access to revenues needed to provide "a general diffusion of knowledge" in accordance with the state constitution, a Travis County state district court declared on Feb. 4. Judge John K. Dietz ruled in the lawsuit brought by nearly 700 school districts (as Texans for Real Efficiency and Equity in Education), three individual school districts, a group of intervenors and a charter school coalition. Named as defendants in the lawsuit are the commissioner of education, the state comptroller of public accounts and the state board of education. Major among complaints against the officials was inadequate state funding to augment local property tax levies. School districts forced to tax at the cap of \$1.17 on the \$100 valuation, in es-

sen, have been asked to do too much with too little, therefore losing "meaningful discretion" in setting their tax rates, Dietz wrote. Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst reacted, saying he expects an immediate appeal of the ruling to the Texas Supreme Court. Last session of the Texas Legislature, in 2011, lawmakers voted to cut education funding by about \$5.5 billion, part of an across-the-board effort to reduce state agency spending to compensate for a budget shortfall then calculated to be between \$10 billion and \$24 billion. Today, however, the current estimate by the comptroller indicates a multi-billion-dollar budget surplus. Educators hope to recoup billions in funding lost to those cuts made two years ago. Complaints about school funding formulas repeatedly

have been addressed in high-profile cases by state courts since the mid-1980s. Texans for Real Efficiency and Equity in Education's published goal "is not asking the court to legislate a solution to this problem, but rather to force the Legislature to do their job in creating a constitutional public school system." **CANCER AGENCY QUESTIONED** Texas in November 2007 responded to a call by the governor to create an entity that would focus on finding cures and preventive measures for cancer. It was then that voters approved a constitutional amendment to establish a state agency, the Cancer Prevention and Research Institute of Texas, and allowed the issuance of \$3 billion in general obligation bonds over

10 years to fund it. Last year, questions arose over the cancer agency's management and where the money was going. Gov. Rick Perry, Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst and Speaker Joe Straus on Dec. 19 sent a letter to the agency, calling for it to address "concerns that have been raised about

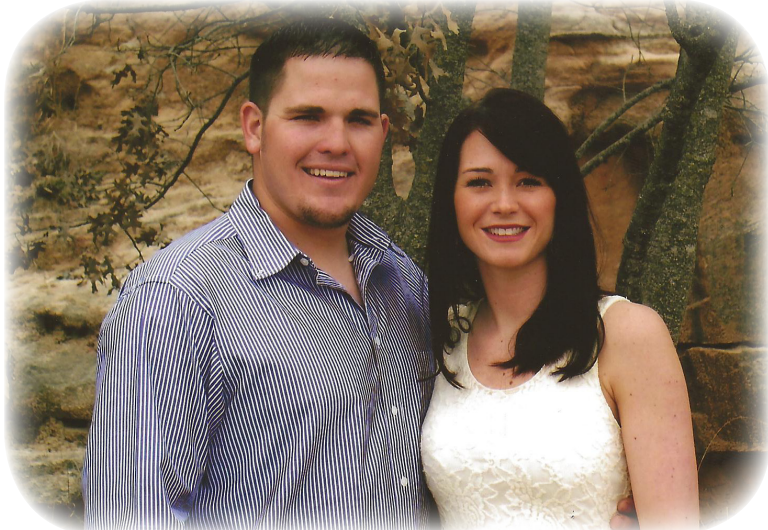
### Skinner-Kay to wed in June

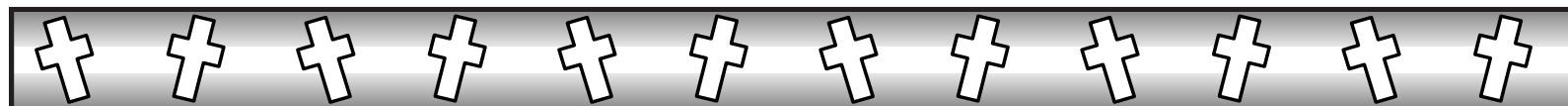

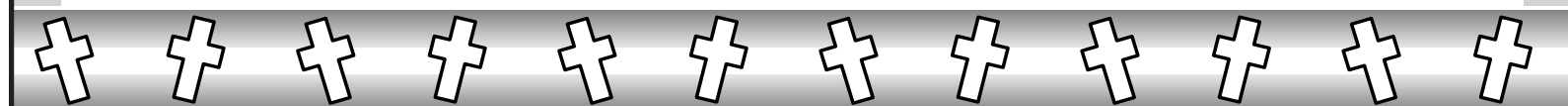

"Unless we can show some type of proof they are not interested," Deaton said. "This certainly does change up our ball plan, but we could certainly start working on something else if the players wish to play."

Discussions were made for the county to build a county road to give access. The county will have to work with the Chandler and the Black families who own the land.

Susie Black said they needed time to discuss the matter and will get back to the commissioners.

"We do have money in our budget this year to build a county road. At this point we are at a standstill," Deaton said.

**SCHOOL BALLPARKS**

Members of the CCC-SD School Board and Superintendent Chris duBois spoke to the commissioners about maintenance on the school ballparks that are located on county land.

At last month's commissioners meeting, school officials asked the commissioners if the county would be willing to help pay for renovations to the OHS Softball Field.

During Monday's meeting, school officials presented the county with budgeted maintenance figures. The county pays for the water and electricity to the fields.

duBois said most of the labor during the high school seasons is done by school district staff.

This year, the school has budgeted \$24,000 for all field and stadium maintenance. Already, the school district has spent \$40,588.

Cost to renovate the softball field will be around \$15,000.

duBois said it's important that taxpayers remember whenever the school spends a \$1 it actually costs the taxpayers \$2.50 due to money the district has to send to the state for recapture.

He also said the school board does not have a problem paying the entire bill for the softball field.

"We can't afford to go buy land for new fields. We all need to get together and put an agreement on paper. I

think it benefits both of us," said School Board President Ray Don Myers.

The commissioners and the school board both agreed that a joint meeting is needed in the near future to work on a written agreement about the fields.

**ANIMAL CONTROL**

Sheriff Robert "Bob" Rodriguez introduced the new animal control officers Joe Jurado and Janet Pullen. Jurado will be full-time and Pullen will be part-time.

Rodriguez said animal control calls are currently being taken through the sheriff's office until a separate number is established.

"Right now, we are fine tuning the system," Rodriguez said.

Training and certification has also been scheduled for Jurado.

"Right now I'm in the learning process. It's going to be a while before it all comes together," Jurado said.

Kennels are being built and Jurado and Pullen are operating out of the vet clinic on Sheffield Road.

Commissioner Eligio Martinez said he has spoken with Jurado about enforcing some codes within animal control, specifically livestock in residential areas.

Martinez said in his research he was told by state officials that the animal control officer needs TCLEOSE training and must be sworn in as a peace officer in order to issue citations.

Rodriguez said Jurado could work with the sheriff's deputies and that there are two deputies currently animal control certified.

"I've already had people removing some of their livestock from their area because they know this is coming," Martinez said. "I don't want to get pushed back to where I was originally."

Deaton said the county operates under the Rabies Control Act and the Litter Abatement Act when it comes to public nuisances and health and safety issues.

"To me that's part of the

job description and that's what I'm going to enforce," Jurado said.

The commissioners looked at plans to an animal control facility from Del Rio. The city is currently building a new facility.

They also looked at photos of the Junction animal control facility and kennel photos from The Mason Company.

The county is looking at building a facility near the collection center.

Commissioner Pleas Childress said the commissioners need to come up with a floor plan.

"We have to make a decision of where we want to go and how we want this facility to be," Deaton said.

The commissioners decided to hold a special meeting at 6 p.m. Feb. 20 at the courthouse annex to discuss the facility further.

**OTHER ITEMS APPROVED:**

- Rejection of the Preliminary Draft Environmental Assessment for the implementation of a Southwestern Gray Wolf Management Plan for portions of Arizona, New Mexico and Texas due to the harm it would bring to Crockett County's property owners.

- Reinstating the burn ban for 30 days.

- Verbal agreement was made on Edwards County transferring membership to the Concho Valley Council of Government from the Middle Rio Grande Development Council. Deaton said a vote on the transfer was expected at the CVCOG meeting this month.

- Commissioners discussed utility fees with NAT-GAS officials and County Road Supervisor Jeffrey Stuart. More research is needed and the item was placed on next month's agenda.

- Advertising for asphalt bids.

- Setting March 30 for a county auction of surplus property.

relationships when those foreign laws conflict with constitutional rights.

Hilderbran said House Bill 750 will ensure foreign law doesn't violate the fundamental constitutional rights of Texans, such as freedom of speech, freedom of religion, freedom of the press, equal protection, the right to keep and bear arms, and the right to due process.

"There are concerns that our basic freedoms guaranteed by the Constitution could be side-stepped if a state judge were to base a decision on foreign laws, foreign legal doctrines, or foreign judgments," Hilderbran said. "This bill just ensures that foreign law never trumps our rights guaranteed under the U.S. and Texas constitutions."

Hilderbran cited 2010 case in which a New Jersey judge ruled that a man accused of sexually assaulting his wife should not be subject to a restraining order because the man was acting in accordance with his religious law. Although a higher court later overturned this ruling, Hilderbran said the case proves some judges will willingly base decisions on non-American laws.

Hilderbran's bill does not single out any specific religion or foreign nation, and it does not apply to corporations or affect international contracts or international trade law. The legislation has already garnered support from local, state, and national groups, including the Oak Initiative.

Other members of the Texas Legislature are already on board, as well, with Sen. John Carona, R-Dallas, filing a companion bill (Senate Bill 285). Representatives Dan Flynn, R-Canton, and Bill Zedler, R-Arlington, have also filed similar legislation in the House - HJR 43 and HB 288, respectively - although both representatives have announced that they will sign on as co-authors to Hilderbran's legislation.

Texas State and Texas Tech. Angelo State and Midwestern State, both in the Lone Star Conference with West Texas A&M, also made scholarship offers to duBois.

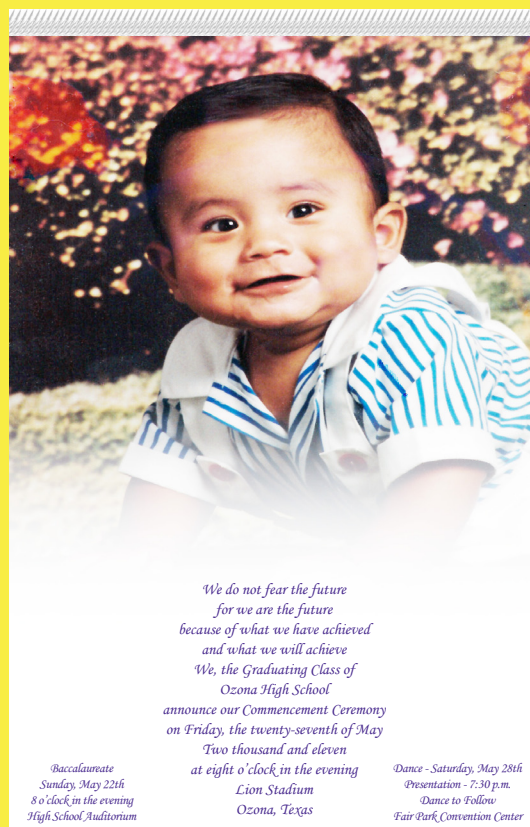

its processes and operations before any future grants are awarded." Cancer agency officials testified in a daylong hearing before the House Appropriations Committee on Feb. 6, answering questions about grant management, property leases, executive salaries, and more.  
**PERRY TAKES CALIFORNIA TRIP**  
Gov. Perry traveled to San Francisco, Silicon Valley, Los Angeles and Orange County on a three-day mission to meet with high tech, biotechnology, financial, insurance and film industry leaders. In a pre-trip "California regulates... Texas innovates" marketing blitz, Perry invited California businesses to relocate in the Lone Star State. Perry's office said Texas-One, an economic development corporation based in Austin, is paying for the trip and no tax dollars would be used for the governor's travel or accommodations.

Brown has coached the Lions for the past three seasons. He is leaving with an overall 18-15 record in Ozona. This past season he led the Lions to a Bi-District Championship.  
"The kids have done everything I have asked of them. They have been wonderful, tremendous kids. I feel like we've made great progress in our program," Brown said. "My leaving does not have anything to do with the kids. They have brought me so much joy over the last three years."  
Brown came to Ozona after a three-year stint as offensive coordinator at Pflugerville Hendrickson. He grew in Big Lake, attended Angelo State University and was head coach at Robert Lee and an assistant at Llano, Monahans, Reagan County and Big Spring.  
As head coach at Rice ISD near Houston, Brown led the team to two district championships and was twice chosen Coach of the Year.

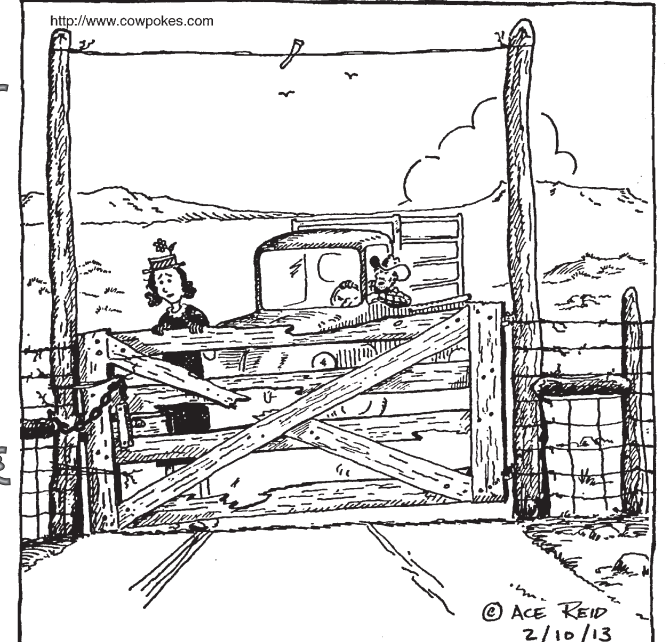

**ORDER RESTRICTING**  
**OUTDOOR BURNING**

The Commissioners' Court finds that circumstances present in all or part of the unincorporated area of the county create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning; and NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED by the Commissioners' Court of Crockett County, Texas, that outdoor burning is restricted in Crockett County for 30 days from the date of adoption of this Order, unless the restrictions are terminated earlier based on a determination made by the Texas Forest Service or this Court. This Order is adopted pursuant to Local Government Code 352.081, and other applicable statutes. This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Natural Resources Commission for: (1) firefighter training; (2) public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations; (3) planting or harvesting or agricultural crops; or (4) burns that are conducted by an approved Prescribed Burning Association, Natural Resource Conservation Service, the and/or Texas A&M Agricultural Experiment Station, or prescribed burn manager certified under Section 153.048, Natural Resources Code, and meet the standards of Section 153.047, Natural Resources Code.

All burns shall be reported to the Crockett County Sheriff's Office (325) 392-2661 and the Fire Chief (325) 392-2626 prior to commencing, together with the name of the landowner, location involved and expert to be on hand. This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor cooking in a properly contained area which is attended at all times. In accordance with the Local Government Code 352.081 (h), a violation of this Order is a Class C misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.
