Commissioners approve COPsync program for sheriff's office

The Crockett County Sheriff's Office has a new communication system.

During a March 21 special meeting, the Crockett County Commissioners' Court approved the purchasing of COPsync hardware and software.

Cost for the program will be around \$30,000 a year. will be using laptop comput-The commissioners had to approve several motions due to financing the program.

The final approval is still camera system. pending after County Attorney Jody Upham reviews the contract.

Crockett County Sheriff Bob Rodriguez said the cost for the program is within his budget.

At the March 11 meeting, the commissioners approved line item changes within the sheriff's budget for COPsync.

Rodriguez said deputies ers that are portable from their vehicles to the office. The laptops also include a built-in

COPsync Inc. operates the nation's largest law enforcement real-time, in-car information sharing, communication and data interoperability network, according to their website. More than 320 Texas law enforcement agencies currently use the program.

Also on the agenda, the commissioners approved to allow Deaton to hire an architect/engineer to design an animal control building.

The court asked Deaton

to take the plans from the Big Lake and Junction facilities to several architects and compare prices.

Big Lake and Junction have buildings similar to what the county is looking to build in Ozona.

The commissioners also approved additional items from county departments for auction.

The next regular meeting will be at 9 a.m. April 8 at the courthouse annex. The meeting is open to the public.

Community newspapers still going strong

yet! That's right; community newspapers are still going strong, according to the latest annual survey by the National Newspaper Association and the research arm of the Reynolds Journalism Institute at the Missouri School of Journalism. The survey is in its seventh year.

The study shows that 71 percent of people in communities served by a newspaper with circulations fewer than 15,000 read a local newspaper each week.

On average, readers of the 2012 survey spent 39.92 minutes reading local news-

Other findings showed: · 75 percent read all or most of their newspaper. · 43.8 percent keep their paper for more than 10

· 77.4 percent read the paper for local news and in-

Respondents who had children were also asked wnetner tnose chiiarenbetween the ages of 11 and 21—would read local newspapers. Of the households where there were children in the age group, 18 percent read a local newspaper at

least once a week. More than half of readers (56 percent) had either clipped a story from the print newspaper or provided a link from the newspaper's website to save or send to a friend or family member in the past 12 months.

The majority of local readers continued to regard community newspapers as highly valuable and important sources information

about their communities. 92 percent of readers thought local newspapers were informative.

· 83 percent agreed that they and their families relied on the newspapers for local news and information.

· 84 percent of readers (and their families) would look forward to reading the newspapers. · 69 percent thought the

newspapers provided valuable local shopping and advertising information. 75 percent agreed that

local newspapers entertained them. Nearly half of readers

(46 percent) used the news-

papers for their political

and voting decisions. Of those who had access to the Internet, 49 percent

Of those who used online sources for local news, 59 percent "sought out" specific local news. In addition, 30 percent "happened to come across it," and 11 percent answered "both.

The survey shows that 47 percent of online users would choose a newspaper's website as their favored source of information for local news.

When asked "Do you think governments should be required to publish pub lic notices in newspapers?" 78 percent said "yes.

When asked how often they visited the website of their local Chamber of Commerce, 85 percent said they had never visited the website.

The majority of respondents said they trust their local newspaper over other media sources.

Of those who had cell phones, 69 percent said they accessed local news on the device within the last 30 days.

Who says all newspapers are failing? Each week, The Ozona Stockman continues to publisher a paper about the people and events of Crockett County and Ozona.

On most days I can look out the back windows of my house and see two ducks that mean the world to me. They are not your typical ducks in that they have taken up permanent residence in our yard, never fly away when the weather doesn't agree with them, despite the fact that I hardly ever feed them, and they don't leave behind any messes. They are the perfect pets. Did I mention they are also made of concrete?

I'm fortunate in that I got to know two of my great-grandmas. I loved them both dearly and so when their possessions were scattered to the four winds I grabbed the concrete ducks that sat in each of their respective yards. Every time I see them a smile creeps across my face and I'm reminded of the special occasions when my mom's family would gather at our house and my two great-grandmas, Nora and Grace, would sit three feet apart and not say a word to each other. If a tarantula would have been crawling down Grace's face Nora wouldn't have said a word. I don't think it was so much that they didn't like each other, I have no concrete evidence of that. (Well, maybe I do!) It's just that they came from different worlds and had nothing in common.

It's unreal how much each duck mirrors their namesake. Nora the Duck is larger than your average duck and dwarfs Grace the Duck, Grandma Nora wasn't fat. mind you, she was just a large woman, big

boned, with arms that looked like she could out arm wrestle a blacksmith. Diminutive Grace, frail as a China doll, has a chipped beak, and looks like she could break in two at any minute. So too did her her namesake.

Grandma Nora was a hardy, plainspoken country gal from hardworking farm and oilfield folk. She had an orchard before moving into town

later in life where she lived in a small, tidy house down in the valley. I got the impression she didn't have a lot of extra cash laying around. I can't ever remember her being sick, doubt that she spent two days in a hospital in her life, and lived to be over 90 years old. She wasn't what I'd call the jovial type but at least she'd wink at you once in awhile and I believe if this young teenager would have asked, she'd have given me a sip or two of beer after I mowed her lawn.

Grandma Grace, on the other hand, was pure city person, if you can call a town of less than 10,000 a city. She was the dutiful high-society wife, married to the town mayor, fire chief and leading businessman. She was a big shot in the Eastern Star, lived high on a hill and wouldn't say you-knowwhat if her mouth was full of it. She lived a much shorter life than Grandma Nora and I

always thought, a much sadder one too. Even though she was a foot shorter, I got the impression that Grandma Grace looked down her nose at Grandma Nora. It was almost palpable, as if Grace came from a higher caste. On holidays, which was the only time we dared put them in the same room, Grandma Nora would join in the penny-ante card games and would share a

mortified Grandma Grace to no end. Grandma Grace was deeply religious, the daughter of a minister who built one of the first churches in town. And when I say "built" I mean with his two hands. Grandma Nora, on the other hand, spent about as many days in church as she did in the hospital.

Grandma Nora lived a frugal life and didn't pay much when I mowed her lawn and weeded her rose garden. She was very particular about her yard and would inspect the job I did and always have a complaint, suggestion and occasionally even a compliment. Grandma Grace paid much better and seemed appreciative, but would not have come outside to inspect my work if the house was on fire.

It's spooky how much Grandma Nora and Grandma Grace were like the ducks of the same names. They remind me of country folks and city slickers who simply don't understand each other. The city lady and the country gal, side by side in our yard, and they still haven't said a word to one

Senate OKs budget, now House's turn

AUSTIN — March 18 was day 70, midpoint of the 140day regular session of the 83rd Texas Legislature.

On March 22, the Senate approved its version of the state budget, a plan to spend \$95 billion in general state revenue in 2014 and 2015. The Senate version would spend \$7 billion in general revenue more than the current 2012-2013 budget. The full budget is close to \$195 billion, counting dedicated funds and federal dollars.

Also on March 22, the Texas House Committee on Appropriations approved its \$97 billion version of the budget — Committee Substitute Senate Bill 1. This was the last step before all 150 members of the House vote on it. CSSB1 features an additional \$2.5 billion for public education on top of a base budget that already accounts for student population growth.

With the clock ticking, the two chambers must agree on a single version before sending it to the governor.

Assuming the House will pass its version this week or the following week, the next step would be for a conference committee of five House members and five Senators to work out the differences. And once again, assuming common ground will be found, the agreed-upon version goes back to the full House and full Senate for a simple majority vote to accept the changes made by the conference committee.


TERM LIMITS BILL MOVES

A constitutional amendment proposed by Sen. Kevin Eltife, R-Tyler, would impose term limits on statewide elected officials, including the governor and lieutenant governor.

Eltife's Senate Joint Resolution 13 was approved by the Senate 27-4 last week and now the House will have to consider it. If the House approves, Texas voters will have the opportunity to give it a thumbs up or thumbs down on Nov. 5, when proposed constitutional amendments approved by the Legislature will be on the statewide ballot. The four votes in opposition were cast by Sens. Brian Birdwell of Granbury, Craig Estes of Wichita Falls, Glenn Hegar of Katy and Tommy Williams of The Woodlands. In the Senate Journal, Williams explained his vote, this way: "I do not support term limits for statewide officers only."

Under Eltife's measure, voters would decide whether or not to limit statewide officials to two consecutive terms, but

officials could serve more terms non-consecutively and currently elected officials wouldn't have terms served before Jan. 1, 2014 count against them.







Jose C. Sanchez


On Friday, March 22, 2013, Jose C. Sanchez passed with this life to be with his Lord, at the age of 88.

OHS graduate discovers new scorpion species

Editor's note: The following article features Robert W. Bryson Jr., who is a 1994 graduate of Ozona High School. Bryson is now a Postdoctoral Scholar in the Department of Biology and Burke Museum of Natural History and Culture University of Washington in Seattle.

A new species of scorpion has been discovered in the mountains just outside the city of Tucson, Ariz.

The newfound creature is only about 1 inch (27 millimeters) long and sports a dapper brown color. It lives in the oak forests in the Santa Catalina Mountains, at an elevation of around 5,900 feet (1,800 meters), according to a study describing the new scorpion published recently in the journal ZooKeys.

It's the ninth new species of mountain scorpion discovered in Arizona in the past six years, more than doubling the number of known scorpion species in the area. It has been named Vaejovis brysoni, after the man who collected the first specimen, Robert Bryson, Jr., who was looking for a different animal at the time, according to a release from the

journal's publisher.

Using ultraviolet flashlights, researchers found members of the new scorpion tribe at night alongside the Catalina Highway.

Like other scorpions, this

species often carries its pale- on is a prime example of the colored juveniles on its back. The arachnid can carry an average of 24 baby scorpions, the study found. It's unclear how venomous the creature may be.

"This latest new scorpi-

on coaxing old boss toms season, with relatively few gullible two-year-old birds available, but will also have to contend with curious jakes, according to Texas Parks and Wildlife biologists.

Rio Grande spring turkey hunting season in the 54-county South Zone runs March 16-April 28. In the 101 counties comprising the North Zone, the season opens March 30 and runs through May 12. A special one-gobbler limit season opens April 1 and continues through April 30 in Bastrop, Caldwell, Colorado, Fayette, Jackson, Lavaca, Lee and Milam counties.

"The drought of 2011 wreaked havoc on wild turkey production," said Jason Hardin, turkey program coordinator for TPWD. "There was almost zero nesting effort and the handful of hens attempting a nest were almost all unsuccessful. This will be obvious this spring with almost no two-year-old gobblers across Texas' Rio Grande turkey range.'

Eastern spring turkey hunting in the 28 counties having an open season runs April 15-May 14.

According to Hardin, the Eastern turkey population remains stable, but is not expanding to the degree that biologists have hoped.

This method calls for flooding the best available habitat with 80 turkeys (60 females and 20 males).

Hunters are reminded all harvested Eastern turkeys must be taken to a check station within 24 hours. To find the check station nearest you, call a TPWD field office or call (800) 792-1112.







Parents enrolling their child for Pre kindergarten must bring a copy of their recent check stub. Income will be verified prior to the first day of school.

Kindergarten students must be five on or before September 1,2008. Parents will also need to bring their child's birth certificate, (not the hospital's, but the courthouse one) shot record, and social security card to registration. A copy of these documents will be made, and the originals will be returned to you. This is required by law 25.002 of the Texas Education Code.

As of August I, 1999, all children born on or after September 2, 1992 are required to have the following immunizations to begin school:







alty cases. Ellis called his bill "modest but vitally important reform" and a step toward "a more fair, reliable and just criminal justice system in Texas," and added that it will "help reduce the possibility that the ultimate mistake is made with someone receiving the ultimate penalty."

"To be certain that only guilty murderers are executed, all evidence that can be tested for DNA should be tested for DNA before the case goes to trial," Abbott said. "This will prevent endless appeals that game the system and delay justice for the families of victims."

To avoid the imposition of an unfunded mandate on local prosecutors and law enforcement agencies, SB 1292 requires that a Texas Department of Public Safety crime lab perform the mandatory DNA test at the State's expense, and provide the results of those tests to both the defendant and state prosecutors, according to the Office of the Attorney General.

CHIEF RAILS OVER EPA

Texas Railroad Commission Chairman Barry Smitherman testified before the U.S. House Committee on Energy and Commerce's subcommittee on Energy and Power on March 19 in Washington, D.C.

Smitherman told lawmakers that through horizontal drilling and hydraulic fracturing techniques developed by the private sector over the last few years, "the United States is awash in natural gas." But today, Smitherman said, "anti-fossil initiatives by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency are threatening the domestic development of abundant and affordable energy from coal

and natural gas.' The Railroad Commission, he said, is moving toward implementing industry best practices throughout the hydraulic fracturing process, such as the first "frac" fluid disclosure requirements, updating well integrity rules and working on a rule that would encourage oil and gas operations to do more recycling.

CROCKETT COUNTY ORDER RESTRICTING **OUTDOOR BURNING**

The Commissioners' Court finds that circumstances present in all or part of the unincorporated area of the county create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning; and NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED by the Commissioners' Court of Crockett County, Texas, that outdoor burning is restricted in Crockett County for 30 days from the date of adoption of this Order, unless the restrictions are terminated earlier based on a determination made by the Texas Forest Service or this Court. This Order is adopted pursuant to Local Government Code 352.081, and other applicable statues. This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Natural Resources Commission for: (1) firefighter training; (2) public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations; (3) planting or harvesting or agricultural crops; or (4) burns that are conducted by an approved Prescribed Burning Association, Natural Resource Conservation Service, the and/or Texas A&M Agricultural Experiment Station, or prescribed burn manager certified under Section 153.048, Natural Resources Code, and meet the standards of Section 153.047, Natural Resources Code.

All burns shall be reported to the Crockett County Sheriff's Office (325) 392-2661 and the Fire Chief (325) 392-2626 prior to commencing, together with the name of the landowner, location involved and expert to be on hand. This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor cooking in a properly contained area which is attended at all times. In accordance with the Local Government Code 352.081 (h), a violation of this Order is a Class C misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.


