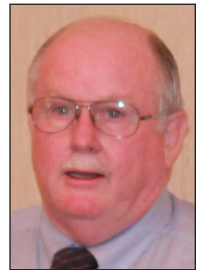
Preparing for a disaster

Whatever path you choose remember you are the author of your own book of life. What theme it will be depends on which choices you make.

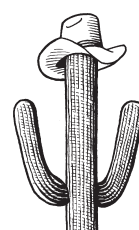
As the Class of 2013 heads out into the world, I want to remind you of some advice from a good doctor named Seuss:

End comes to Legislature's regular session

AUSTIN — Texas lawmakers finally passed Senate Bill 1, a state budget for fiscal biennium 2014-2015, on May 26, the 139th day of the 140-day regular session of the 83rd Texas Legislature.

Next stop will be Gov. Rick Perry's desk for the \$197 billion budget - which came in at about \$7 billion more than the estimated budget for the current fiscal biennium. Perry had asked lawmakers to make about \$2 billion in tax reductions, but the budget he will be looking at brings in cuts totaling an estimated \$1 billion.

Various other legislation also on the way to Perry, for example, changes student testing requirements, benefits charter schools, increases Medicaid funding, allows issuance of campus "carry" permits and much more. Among bills Perry already has vetoed was one that would have

identified individual citizens who donate to so-called "dark money" organizations. The veto period will end June 16.

In passing the budget on the Senate side, Senate Finance Committee Chairman Tommy Williams, R-The Woodlands, credited his committee and each member of the Senate for producing a "fair and reasonable" document. House Appropriations Chairman Jim Pitts, R-Waxahachie, who along with Williams was the main architect of the budget on the House side, credited his committee for its work.

One of piece of legislation that passed in the final week of the session does not require any action by the governor is Senate Joint Resolution 1, a proposed amendment to the state constitution that will appear on the Nov. 5 statewide election

ballot. Voters will decide if they want to finance water infrastructure improvements by amending the constitution to create a state water implementation fund in the state treasury, outside of the general revenue fund. The money, \$2 billion initially, would be withdrawn from the state's so-called Rainy Day Fund, a savings account built up primarily from natural gas tax and oil production tax revenue, that may be used to respond to emergencies such as those caused by wildfires, hurricanes and drought. The transfer of funds out of the Rainy Day Fund requires enabling legislation, in this case, HB 1025.

SUPPLEMENTAL BILL PASSES

House Bill 1025, the supplemental appropriations bill, covers various funding

shortages in the current state budget until Aug. 31, the last day of the fiscal year. The bill, heavily amended in the Senate, is undergoing scrutiny in the House.

Authored primarily by Chairman Pitts and Chairman Williams, HB 1025 includes \$450 million to repair, maintain and improve

Knox wins summer Fulbright

Duncan Knox, a sophomore in Angelo State University's Honors Program, has been selected for a 2013 Fulbright Summer Institute for Young American Student Leaders at the University of Bristol in the United Kingdom.

A history major with primary interests in colonial America and European history, Knox is one of just nine students chosen from throughout the U.S. for the four-week institute, which is themed "Slavery and the Atlantic Heritage" and will run June 1-29. Activities will include academic lectures and discussion, cultural site visits, interaction with Bristol University students and faculty, and volunteering with a community service organization in Bristol.

Staffed by scholars from Africa, North America and the U.K., the institute offers American students an unprecedented perspective from all three continents in the notorious Triangle Trade. Participants will gain appreciation for the complexity and commercial relevance of the 18th-century smuggling and slave trade, as well as the contrasting legacies of the slave trade between the U.K. and Africa. They will also gain greater insights into the history and culture of the U.K. in general.

"I am excited to have this amazing opportunity to study at prestigious Bristol University and to learn from noted scholars," Knox said.



DUNCAN KNOX, a sophomore in Angelo State University's Honors Program, has been selected for a 2013 Fulbright Summer Institute for Young American Student Leaders at the University of Bristol in the United Kingdom.

"I believe that this will not only enrich my understanding of the Atlantic slave trade by exposing me to continental and African perspectives, but also expand my cultural horizons by allowing me to travel abroad for the first time and learn more about our British heritage. I hope to gain knowledge, contribute my ideas and collaborate with others in a unique learning experience."

Knox is an OHS Graduate and son of Bobby Knox, of Ozona.

Knox was selected for the institute by the U.S.-U.K. Fulbright Commission through a rigorous application and interview process. Criteria included academic excellence, focused application, a range of extracurricular and community activities, demon-

strated ambassadorial skills, a desire to further the Fulbright Program and a plan to give back to the recipient's home country upon returning. Each year, the commission supports about 50 U.S. and U.K. undergraduate students for the Fulbright Summer Institutes at leading institutions in the U.K. and U.S., respectively.

Created by treaty in 1948, the U.S.-U.K. Fulbright Commission is part of the Fulbright Program conceived by Sen. J. William Fulbright in the aftermath of World War II to promote leadership, learning and empathy between nations through educational exchange.

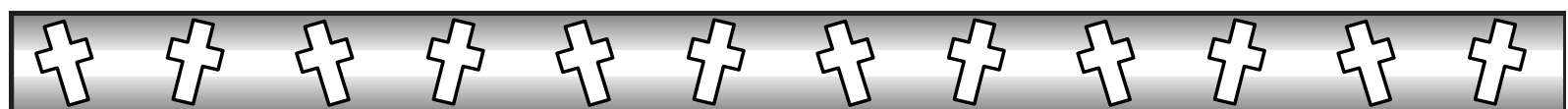
We still have the exercise on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday at 8 a.m. Balance exercises are on Tuesday and

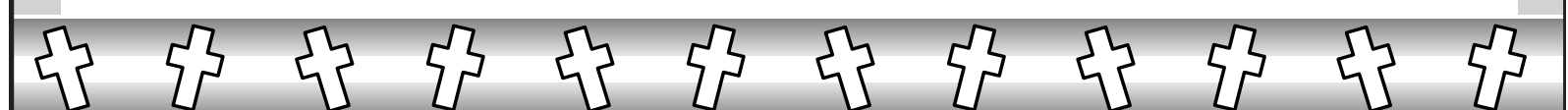

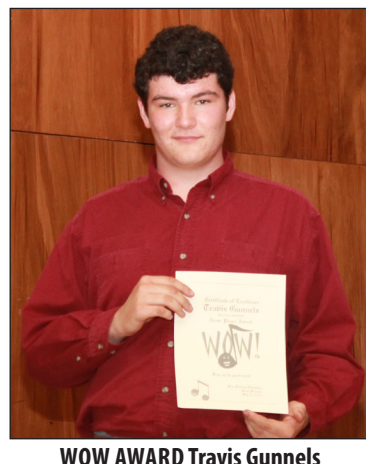

The Ozona Volunteer Fire Department is headed by Fire Chief Bob Falkner, has 31 volunteers and Steve Kenley is the county fire marshal. Deaton also mentioned local ranchers that use sprayers during wildfires.

On the EMS side, the county has three ambulances. EMT Coordinator is Eddie Martin. He is also the assistant emergency management coordinator. There are 19 volunteers in the EMS.

The county also works with the Family Health Center of Ozona through the Shannon Health System and the Texas Department of State Health Services.

There is also the Citizens Emergency Response Team (CERT) that is a group of local volunteers that works with emergency personnel. It is headed by Commissioner Frank Tambunga.

"We live on one of the most dangerous stretches of Interstate-10 in the United States. We have the best emergency personnel to take care of us," Deaton.

WARNING SYSTEMS AND PREVENTION

The county has a reverse 911 phone system. When an emergency hits, the county puts out a message through the system that calls all listed local phone numbers.

People can also register on the county's website at www.co.crockett.tx.us to put their cell phone and unlisted numbers. The system was used in the 2011 wildfires.

"We can send a message to every phone and business in Ozona listed in the system," Deaton said.

The fire department also uses warning sirens.

The siren that has three tones of different volumes is the signal for firefighters to come to the station for an emergency.

The siren with one continuous tone is a signal for all citizens to take cover due to bad weather.

The sirens are silent after 10 p.m. and during church services and funerals, unless there is a major emergency.

Firefighters are also trained as weather spotters and are called out in bad weather.

Crockett County CCSD also has lightning warning systems in place at Lion Stadium and the north baseball parks.

"It's important for you to have a plan and a place to go in bad weather," Deaton said. "Your car is not a safe place."

Crockett County also has seven flood-control dams that were built by the Army Core of Engineers after the 1954 flood that killed 20 people and destroyed 300

homes.

These dams are inspected every year and maintained by the county and the Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District.

In 2007, the county received a grant from the Concho Valley Council of Governments to purchase a generator. This generator is on top of Waterworks Hill to provide water if the electricity goes out for long periods of time.

The Fair Park Convention Center is also supplied to house people if needed as a shelter.

Crockett County also has interlocal agreements with all surrounding counties for emergency services.

WHEN DIASER STRIKES

Deaton said 72-hours is the key when a disaster hits. At this time, Deaton declares the county a disaster area and calls for help.

Deaton used the 2011 wildfires that hit the county as examples throughout his presentation.

After 72 hours, Deaton said that is when the state was called in to help through the Texas Department of Public Safety and the National Incident Management System.

An emergency operations center is set up at the fire department or EMS building.

"It takes a lot of coordination to make this work. After three days, our local volunteers are tired. It's hard on them. The state and federal officials start coming in and a lot of toes can get stepped on," he said. "We keep local officials in the operations center with state and federal officials."

Deaton said local officials explain about private property issues, the disaster or situation at hand and the terrain or area that is being dealt with.

"There's a lot of emotion at this time. We practice so we can prepare for this," Deaton said.

The Chandlerdale West area on the southeast part of Ozona has been discussed lately by commissioners due to heavy flooding that has occurred in that area.

Deaton said the commissioners are still working on a plan and that an emergency gate has been put in place in that area.

Falkner also said the fire department does yearly drills with local oilfield companies as well. Falkner said this is to help officials in case an explosion, like the recent one in West, Texas, happens.

HOW TO HELP

When a disaster strikes, it's best to check with the fire department on how to help during that time.

Deaton said people are always needed to help.

"Don't think that just because you don't have any firefighting skills, you can't help," he said. "I've never seen any place pull together like this town does."

DISASTERS ARE PROCLAIMED

state roadways in areas impacted by energy exploration and development, such as the Barnett Shale in North Texas and the Eagle Ford Shale in South Texas. Money to repair county roads, however, is not included in the legislation.

HB 1025 also would put \$200 million in new money into public education. Combined with the education funding increases already in the budget bill, that works out to between \$80 and \$400 more per student in nearly every district in the state.

Lawmakers also passed HB 500 by House Ways and Means Committee Chairman Harvey Hilderbran, R-Kerrville. The bill revises exemptions and deductions under the business franchise tax and expands the kinds of businesses that qualify for a reduced-tax rate for retail trade. HB 500 also excludes a number of expenses from being counted as revenue and revises "cost of goods sold" deductions.

In a disaster proclamation he signed on May 21, Gov. Rick Perry certified that the severe storms and tornado outbreak that occurred on May 15 have caused a disaster in Ellis, Hood and Johnson counties.

The proclamation directs that all necessary measures both public and private as authorized by state law be implemented to meet the disaster.

On May 20, Perry renewed the emergency disaster proclamation he originally issued on July 5, 2011, certifying that exceptional drought conditions posed a threat of imminent disaster in specified counties in Texas. The number of specified counties in this 30-day extension of the proclamation was 201, or nearly 80 percent of Texas' 254 counties.

Meanwhile, a federal, state and local investigation of the April 17 deadly fire and explosion at farm supply and fertilizer facility in the small town of West continues.
