Test scores, attendance start off school board meeting

Summer school testing scores and attendance were the start of the CCCCSD School Board July 23 regular

The board was presented with the summer school report on the TAKS and End-of-Course high school retest results

OHS scores came in below the state average in the areas of Algebra and English.

Board Vice President Orlando DeHoyos asked why the scores were so low.

OHS Counselor Tisha Harrison said attendance is a big issue.

"Students need to be in class. At the beginning of the year there were a lot of absences," Harrison said.

The report stated that right at 50 percent of the students that failed an Endof-Course test had at least 10 absences or more, which

amounts to missing school for at least two weeks.

Superintendent Raul Chavarria said the district's goal is to be at 97 percent on attendance.

The district averaged 95.6 percent at the end of the 2013-2014 year. The state average is 96 percent.

"We need to get on to the parents to get their kids to school," said Roland De-Hoyos, board member.

Chavarria said the district plans on being more assertive on filing charges.

Also, the high school has incentives in place for students to be in school, such as long lunch periods and not have to be at tutorials.

Students with a semester average higher than 70 have a chance to be eligible for semester exam exemptions, as long as they do not have any absences, the report stated. Any student with an unexcused absence will not be exempt.

"Incentives for the high school during test week is the way they are going," Chavarria said.

Attendance was also discussed in the pre-k area. OES has an open enrollment pre-k policy where any student can attend.

Board member Grizz Medina asked if the district can go back to closed pre-k.

"The benefits far out way the attendance problems," Chavarria said about the prek. "This is a team effort. It takes parent involvement."

RESIGNATIONS AND HIRINGS

After meeting in closed session for a short time, the board approved the resignations of Butch Gonzalez, Kayla Graves and Esmi Barrera.

The board also approved the hiring of Christa Carrasco as the new OHS Softball Coach. Carrasco comes to Ozona from TLC Academy and is a graduate from Sul Ross State University. She also coached for Sul Ross State University.

The board also approved the hiring of Lynn Curry and Hiram Carrizalez for OES.

PEACE OFFICER

Chavarria asked the board, during his report, for permission to explore the possibility and cost of adding a resource, or peace, officer for the district.

The position would be a certified peace officer. Chavarria said he is going to talk to the county about sharing the position and having the person work for the county in the summer.

Chavarria said the principal still has more authority than anyone on the campus, and that the peace officer would report to the principal.

Orlando DeHoyos said the district needs to check with their lawyer to get the exact rules of the officer's duties.



Governor orders deployment of guard to border

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS By Ed Sterling Texas Press Association

AUSTIN — Tensions continued last week, concerning the tens of thousands of Central Americans — primarily unaccompanied minors and women with small children who cross into the Lone Star State, without documentation, to escape violence and poverty in their own countries.

Those intercepted by the authorities are moved to detention facilities and processed according to federal and state protocols. On July 21, Gov. Rick Perry ordered the deployment of 1,000 Texas National Guard members to assist in Operation Strong Safety, a state law enforcement surge on the border, under the command and control of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

"The action I am ordering today will tackle this crisis head-on by multiplying our efforts to combat the cartel activity, human traffickers and individual criminals who threaten the safety of people across Texas and America," Perry said. Border county sheriffs said, however, the pressing needs for their jurisdictions are more deputies and humanitarian aid, rather than military assistance.

Responses followed, with some lawmakers and candidates applauding Perry's decision and others calling the decision to deploy soldiers to the border a mistake, or political theater.

For example, Sen. Juan "Chuy" Hinojosa, D-McAllen, said, "We have less crime in the (Rio Grande) Valley than we do in other major Texas cities. If we were to use crime as a basis to deploy the National Guard, then we should be sending the National Guard to other metropolitan areas in our state," and, "To

call up the National Guard is a very simplistic approach to a complex problem." Hinojosa's Senate District 20 includes all or part of the highly affected counties of Hidalgo, Brooks and Jim Wells.

Attorney General Greg Abbott, a Republican running for governor, praised Perry's decision and said, "This crisis is a public safety priority and deploying the National Guard to the border is crucial to address the organized criminal activity by cartels and international gangs.'

On July 22, the Texas Catholic Conference announced it had issued a letter signed by bishops from each of the state's 15 dioceses to the Texas Congressional delegation urging members to find a consensus "that compassionately and effectively addresses the humanitarian crisis along the

southern border." On July 25, President Obama and Vice

President Biden met with the presidents of Guatemala, Honduras and El Salvador to discuss how their governments "are cooperating to disrupt smuggling organizations and promote PLEASE STATE, PAGE 8







Texas Tech law school offers taxpayer assistance

Over four percent of all taxpayers that have an adjusted gross income of less than \$25,000 will be audited each year. This doesn't sound like much but if you are faced with an IRS audit, it can be very stressful.

Low-income taxpayers facing an audit situation, seldom have the resources to hire an attorney to assist with preparing for the audit, but the Texas Tech University School of Law offers assistance. The Low-Income Tax Clinic (LITC) through the Community Outreach Program at the School of Law offers free assistance for anyone facing federal tax issues such as audit appeals, examination notices, collection notices, earned income credit controversies, dependency issues, non-filer issues, identity theft issues and innocent and injured spouse issues.

Nancy Mojica, LITC Community Outreach Coordinator said, "We are glad to offer assistance to any qualified individual in our area. We provide our services free to anyone in over 75 counties in the Panhandle, South Plains, Permian Basin, Rolling Plains of West Texas, Far West Texas and Eastern New Mexico."

The clinic is open all year, Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. except during Texas Tech University holidays. In addition to the clinic, tax law students are available to provide free educational workshops and short presen-

"We can teach small or large groups and the workshops can be taught individu-

ally or in a short series," Mojica said. "Our law students are under the supervision of a law professor for handling any cases but we do not prepare returns or handle crimi-



When attending your appointment, you must bring any tax bills or letters from the IRS, any letters you have written to the IRS and any federal individual income tax returns that are part of your tax problem. The LITC offers Spanish translators for those whose native language is not English.

Workshops available to be presented include 'Who needs to file and penalties for not timely filing;' 'How IRS collections work;' 'Earned Income Tax Credit pitfalls;' 'Innocent Spouse;' and 'Injured Spouse.' Also, the LITC conducts workshops for high school aged persons who are working for the first time and who will be filing their first tax returns. Educational workshops can be customized according to the needs of the organization

The LITC and its employees and volunteers are not affiliated with the IRS and a tax-

Sales Tax Holiday is Aug. 8-10


Texas Comptroller Susan Combs reminds shoppers they can save money on certain items priced under \$100 during the state's annual sales tax holiday. This year, the sales tax holiday is scheduled for Friday, Saturday and Sunday, Aug. 8 -10.

The law exempts most clothing, footwear, school supplies and backpacks priced under \$100 from sales tax, which could save shoppers about \$8 on every \$100 they spend during the weekend.

"Families gearing up for the new school year will not pay any sales tax for many back-to-school items ranging from pens to blue jeans," Combs said. "When the back-to-school list is long and the money is short, it can be difficult for Texas families. We hope this tax break will help ease that burden."

This year, shoppers will save an estimated \$82.7 million in state and local sales taxes during the Sales Tax Holiday. The tax holiday weekend has been an annual event since 1999.





To some, an orphaned well is thought to be an abandoned well that does not have a responsible party. Technically, as stated in Chapter 89 of the state's Natural Resources Code, "orphaned well" means a well: (A) for which the Railroad Commission has issued a permit; (B) for which production of oil or gas or another activity under the jurisdiction of the commission has not been reported to the commission for the preceding 12 months; and (C) whose operator's commission-approved organization report

has lapsed. The commission said its goal for the remainder the fiscal year is to plug 111 more wells and remediate and clean up 130 additional sites. Funded entirely by the oil and gas industry at a cost of \$219.5 million since 1992, the agency has plugged more than 30,100 wells.

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
