Driver's license office is officially open

Ozona residents now have a permanent place to renew their driver's license.

State and local officials held a grand opening ceremony Monday for the new Ozona Driver's License office at the Ozona Chamber of Commerce Visitor Center and the new office.

The office is located at 1503 Monterrey Street between the DPS Office and the Ozona Chamber of Commerce. Donald Gutierrez, an

Ozona High School graduate, will be running the Ozona office. He will split his time between Ozona and Sonora during the week.

The office will be open in Ozona from 8 a.m.-5 p.m. (closed from noon-1 p.m.) on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays.

Gutierrez will be in Sonora from 8 a.m.-4:15 p.m. Tuesdays and Thursdays.

The office can renew and

issue new driver's licenses, identification cards, commercial driver's licenses (CDL), as well as CDL testing and endorsements.

People can also register to vote at the new office.

"I know that Crockett County residents welcome this new driver license office to Ozona, and we are excited to see the completion of this important project, which will benefit the residents of this area," said County Judge Fred Deaton.

Monday's ceremony featured state and county officials, as well as DPS Troopers and a DPS Honor Guard.

Deaton said the office is a project the Crockett County Commissioners have been working on for a ____ years.

Prior to this new office, Ozona residents have had to travel to San Angelo or Sonora to renew their licenses.

"This project had to do with the people," Deaton said.

School board filing underway

Filing for the November 2014 CCCCSD School Board election is currently underway.

There are three single member district seats up this year. Those seats include: SMD 4 currently held by Ray Don Myers; SMD 5 currently held by Dwight Childress and SMD 3 currently held by Roland DeHoyos.

Filing runs through Aug. 18. Election Day is Nov. 4.

Prospective candidates must meet certain eligibility requirements. They must have lived in Texas for at least a year and in the school district for at least six months before the filing deadline.

They must be at least 18 years old and registered to vote at the time of election.

Anyone interested in filing for a position on the school board, can pick up a packet at the CCCCSD Administration Building at 797 Avenue D.

Registered voters can apply for a ballot by mail starting Sept. 5 and ending Oct. 24.

The last day to register to vote in the November election is Oct. 6. Early voting will take place Oct. 20-31.

County employees ask for pay raise

County employees talked to the commissioners Monday night about a pay raise for 2015.

During their called budget workshop, the commissioners heard from several county employees about the need of a pay raise in the 2015 budget.

"The county road department is still under paid," said Ninfa Preddy. "We are in dire need for a good raise for our employees. We really would appreciate you all taking this into consideration."

Last year the county gave all employees a \$150 a month pay raise.

Employees spoke about work here, but I'm proud of

spouse and family members on health insurance, along with the cost of living during an oilfield boom.

"As a person who left the oilfield, I knew I was going to take a pay cut, but I was looking at the long term. I failed to look at the now. I still have to be able to support my family," said John DeHoyos Jr.

Road Department Employee Roland DeHoyos said his paycheck barely covers his monthly bills. He also said the school district is starting maintenance employees at \$12.50, which is higher than the county right

the cost of having to include my community. We're losing people to the oilfield, but those of us sitting here are going to stay here," DeHoyos

> County Road Supervisor Jeffrey Stuart said the commissioners recently approved an increase for EMS personnel on what they make per run.

> "That doesn't look fair," Stuart said. "I have guys that have worked here 20 or 30 years.'

> County Judge Fred Deaton said the county will never be able to build up the road department personnel with an oilfield boom, but that the commissioners are in the position to look at the issue.

It's imperative to follow the law with drug offenders

The sheriff and I have been talking about our local drug problems and some of the problems he has encountered trying to eliminate some of those problems.

Sheriff Rodriguez says he has citizens ask him why he has not taken action on a local known drug offender that this citizen knows or that may be one of his neighbors. What this citizen may not know is that it is very probable that this offender has been arrested, and maybe repeatedly, but has the right to a reasonable bail. The offender's Eighth Amendment right states that "Excessive

bail should not be required..." Sheriff said there are several cases of this situation where an individual has been arrested repeatedly and has not yet been adjudicated. He said they will continue to pursue additional charges for these individuals, but that they will continue to have the right to a reasonable

bail each time they are arrested. This is not negotiable. It is

not a decision the sheriff is making, it is mandatory to making sure the offender's rights are protected and the laws are followed.

The sheriff also says that sometimes he has had people ask him why he does not arrest some known drug offenders that are believed to be involved in drug traffic in their neighborhoods. "Everybody knows" is not probable cause for a

search warrant and rightfully so. The offender's Fourth Amendment right is his "right

to be secure in his person, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by Oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the person or things to be seized." That means that the warrant must state exactlv what is to be searched for and where. It must be specific and very recent information. It is not easy to search a person's house and rightfully so.

Texas deals with border as Congress departs

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS By Ed Sterling Texas Press Association

AUSTIN — Congress left Washington, D.C., Aug. 1 for a month-long recess, without having passed an immigration bill addressing the porous U.S.-Mexico border and humanitarian crisis.

Figures compiled by the federal Department of Homeland Security's U.S. Customs and Border Protection division show 57,500 "unaccompanied alien children" have been apprehended and processed since October 2013, the majority in the Rio Grande Valley. While President Obama's request to Congress for \$3.7 billion in emergency funding remains pending, the governor's office said the state of Texas will tap available funds to pay the cost of deploying 1,000 national guard troops along the border to assist in law enforcement operations. The cost to do that is estimated at \$12 million a month.

Volunteer organizations are delivering support to help

care for mothers with small children and unaccompanied minors from Guatemala, Honduras and El Salvador who have crossed the border to escape gang violence and poverty. Aid comes in the form of food, clothing, medical supplies, school supplies and legal assistance.

On July 25, U.S. Rep. Henry Cuellar, D-McAllen, sent letters to House Appropriations Chairman Hal Rogers, R-Kentucky, and Federal Emergency Management Agency Administrator Craig Fugate requesting financial assistance and reimbursement for communities affected by the current border humanitarian crisis. Included in Cuellar's correspondence to both officials were letters from the City of McAllen, City of Laredo and Webb County Sheriff's Office detailing costs incurred by each entity.

"Since the border humanitarian crisis began, local governments, non-profit organizations, law enforcement and community partners have been shouldering a large and unexpected cost," Cuellar said, adding, "These communities have expended hard-earned taxpayer dollars in support of law enforcement and community efforts to address the surge of unaccompanied minors crossing the border. These communities along the border, which I represent, have taken it upon themselves to provide support where they can. They understand these children are coming to the U.S. border and need care. Our local governments and non-profits understand our federal law enforcement are stretched thin

during this surge and they have stepped up to provide resources and assist where they can."







The 27th annual Haby, Lockhart, Ross, Speck Production sale was held Saturday, July 19, at the Hill Country Youth Exhibit Center in Kerrville, Texas. Preston Faris of Sonora served as the auctioneer. This year the goats were offered by Ross and Speck.

Interest in the sale was high. With a greater number of buyers than in previous years, the sale was the best in years.

One hundred two lots of yearling bucks and does grossed \$56,275 averaging \$551.72. Thirty eight does averaged \$494.74 and sixty four bucks averaged \$585.55.

The top doe was purchased for \$1,100 by Sterling and Summer Hall of Sonora, Texas. The second high selling doe was purchased by Jerry Don Balch of Sonora, Texas for \$1,050 The top buck was purchased by Doris Haby and Hugh and Dennette Coates from Brackettville for \$2,500. The second high selling buck was purchased by Jerry Don Balch for \$1,200.

The third high buck was purchased by Cal and Pam Hengst of San Angelo,

Texas for \$1,000. The fourth high buck sold for \$950 to John Frett of

Lamdenberg, Pennsylvania. These top selling goats were offered by the Speck family.

This year's catalog was dedicated to Hayden "Mort" Haby, Feb. 11, 1928 to Sept. 29, 2013.

Hayden Haby will be remembered as a great man for several reasons.

His life long service as a "teacher" and mentor is remarkable. One of his first jobs as a vocational agricultural teacher (Dripping Springs, then Fort Davis) was highlighted with admitting one of the first female students into the Texas FFA program. His move to Rocksprings in 1957 was to a position as a Texas Extension Service Agent (county agent) where he served until 1977. His emphasis was mentoring 4-H "kids" in many different programs, including public speaking, livestock projects, and judging of livestock, grass, wool and mohair.

His primary love, of course was his wife, Doris, and children Dennette and Hayden Jr.

and his namesake H.G. Haby III., sister Venetia Haby, and special kids Dylan and Shae Coates. In a close second was his love of ranching and raising Angora goats and Rambouillet sheep.

He ranched in Edwards, Kinney, and Uvalde counties and in Queensland, Australia. He shared his extensive knowledge and expertise with all who asked. His ability to evaluate livestock quickly and accurately was uncanny.

In his memoirs he gave credit for development of the Haby & Haby Angora goat flock to several individuals. Foremost, Doris's uncle, Brooks Sweeten. Also Fred & Armer Earwood, Joe Brown Ross, Howard Hay, Mike Pember, Arthur Davis, Bob Davis, W.S. "Bill" Orr, W.S. Hall, Leslie Pepper, James Wittenburg, Carlton Goldbold, D.L. Cloudt, Lloyd Mitchell Jr., Bill Craddock, and Werner Lindig.

Hayden developed the first pelleted ration for show Angoras in Texas. He gave the ration to Brooks Sweeten who had Lloyd Mitchell put it in pelleted form. Before other major companies developed rations, breeders from all of Texas were driving to the Mitchell plant in Rocksprings to obtain

their feed. Hayden was one of the founding members of the Haby Lockhart Ross (and later Speck) Sale to promote the fine haired aspect of the Angora goat industry. He was also a partner in the 1994 importation of the first stud Boer goats directly from South Africa and the first importation of Angora goats since 1925. He received multiple awards over the years.

His sheep and goats won the high indexing Ram and Buck at the Ram and Angora Goat Progeny Tests at the Texas A&M Experiment Station at Sonora, Texas. He was the only breeder to win both the sheep and goat high indexing animal.

He won the Hamanaka mohair trophy two years in a row, and the British Mohair Spinners Award four years (the industry's most prestigious event). Goats from his herd have been exported to Madagascar, France, India, Turkey, Mexico, Spain, Canada and Australia.

He judged Angora goat shows in Canada, Australia, France, Great Britain and in multiple states in the United States.

The partnership sincerely appreciates the buyers' faith in the mohair industry and their faith in the HLRS fine haired Angoras.

Sales Tax Holiday this weekend

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs reminds shoppers they can save money on certain items priced under \$100 during the state's annual sales tax holiday.

This year, the sales tax holiday is scheduled for Friday, Saturday and Sunday, Aug. 8 -10.

The law exempts most clothing, footwear, school supplies and backpacks priced under \$100 from sales tax, which could save shoppers about \$8 on every \$100 they spend during the weekend.

"Families gearing up for the new school year will not pay any sales tax for many back-to-school items ranging from pens to blue jeans," Combs said. "When the backto-school list is long and the money is short, it can be difficult for Texas families. We hope this tax break will help ease that burden."





"We're very fortunate to have the oilfield. With that it does get harder to maintain a labor force. The only thing that the counties have to offer is the benefits and retirement and a stable job," Deaton said.

Commissioner Frank Tambunga said every year he looks at budgeting pay raises, but at the same time he has people who are concerned about tax rates increasing.

"Nobody wants taxes to go up. You get what you pay for. You want good, quality employment sooner or later you're going to have to pay for it. You want people patrolling 24 hours a day that costs money. You want people picking up your trash that costs money. Everybody here, they love their jobs or they wouldn't be here, but they are not going to do it for free. We are trying to give the best we can for the county. All we're saying is step up to the driguez.

Deaton told the commissioners that by the next meeting, they will need to figure out a raise for the employees.

Tambunga said he would like to see some kind of cost of a percentage raise.

"I think this would be the year to do a percentage raise," said Commissioner Eligio Martinez.

The commissioners said they are looking at a raise for all county employees.

Commissioners will go over the 2015 proposed budget again at their regular meeting on Monday, Aug. 11. The commissioners generally approve the budget in September.

TAX RATE

Chief Appraiser Rhonda Shaw presented the county's values and tax rates.

Shaw said appraisals increased 24 percent from last year. She said minerals make up 94.9 percent of the county's values and ranch land and improvements, houses in the town of Ozona and business make up the remaining 6.1 percent.

In 2000, the county's values were at \$847,167,480. For 2014 the values are at \$2.5 million.

Shaw said due to the increase in values, the county could go above the effective tax rate and still keep the county tax rate six cents lower than last year.

The effective tax rate will raise \$205,924 more than 2013. The proposed 2014 effective tax rate is .45343 per \$100 evaluation.

If the county goes to the rollback tax rate, the increase would be around \$1.1 million. The rollback rate is .4897. The 2013 county tax rate was .55076.

For the past five years, the county has operated under the effective tax rate.

"This is a year you could go up closer to the rollback rate and make up a little bit that you've held the past five years, and still people will have a reduction in taxes," Shaw said.

Shaw also presented options of adopting a tax rate just below the rollback and moving two cents from the general to the road and bridge fund.

At their regular meeting on Monday, Aug. 11, the commissioners will vote on the county tax rate.

Dear Parent/Guardian:

Children need healthy meals to learn. <u>CROCKETT COUNTY CCSD</u> offers healthy meals every school day. Breakfast costs OHS-1.30; OMS-1.30; OES-FREE; lunch costs OHS-2.45; OMS-245; OES-230. Your children may qualify for free meals or for reduced-price meals. Reduced price is $\underline{\$.30}$ for breakfast and $\underline{\$.40}$ for lunch. The following questions and answers will provide information about the Free and Reduced-Price Meal Program.

- 1. Do I need to fill out an application for each child? No. Complete one Free and Reduced-Price School Meals Application to apply for free or reduced-price meals for all children in the household. We cannot approve an incomplete application, so be sure to fill out all required information. Return the completed application to Ludy Vargas, Box 400, Ozona, TX 76943; 325/392-5501
- 2. Who can get free meals?
 - Income—Your children can get free or reduced-price meals if your household's gross income (total, without deductions) is within the limits described on the Federal Income Eligibility Guidelines.
 - Special Program Participants—All children in households receiving benefits from the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR), or Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), can get free meals. Children attending Head Start, Early Head Start, and Even Start are also eligible for free meals.
 - Foster—Foster children under the legal responsibility of a foster care agency or court are eligible for free meals. A foster child is eligible for free meals regardless of the income of his or her resident household.
 - Homeless, Runaway, and Migrant—Children who meet the definition of homeless, runaway, or migrant qualify for free meals. If you haven't been told about a child's status as homeless, runaway, or 11. Who should I include as members of my household? migrant, please call or email Raul Chavarria.

If you have received a letter of notification that your child is directly certified for free meals, do not complete an application, but do let the school know if any children in your household who attend school are not listed on the letter.

- 3. Should I fill out an application if I received a letter this school year saying my children are approved for free meals? Carefully read the letter you received and follow the instructions. Call your child's school at 325/392-5501 if you have questions.
- 4. My child's application was approved last year. Do I need to fill out another one? Yes. Your child's application is only good for one school year and the first few days of this school year. You must send in a new application unless the school told you that your child is eligible for this school year.

- 5. I get WIC, can my child(ren) get free meals? Children in households participating in WIC may be eligible for free or reduced-price meals; please fill out an application.
- What if my income is not always the same? List the amount that you normally receive. Even if you missed some work in the last month, put down your usual pay. If you normally get overtime pay, include it. If you have lost a job or had your hours or wages reduced, use your current income.
- We are in the military. Do we include our housing allowance as income? If you get an off-base housing allowance, it must be included as income. If your housing is part of the Military Housing Privatization Initiative, do not include your housing allowance as income. Is combat pay counted as income? No, if combat pay is received because of deployment in addition to basic pay and was not received before deployment, combat pay is not counted as income.
- May I apply if someone in my household is not a U.S. citizen? Yes. You or your child(ren) do not have to be U.S. citizens to qualify for free or reduced-price meals.
- 9. Will the information I give be checked? Yes, and we may also ask you to send written proof.
- 10. If I don't qualify now, may I apply later? Yes. You may apply at any time during the school year. If your household income or circumstances change, you may become eligible for free or reduced-price meals.
- You must include yourself as well as others living in your household who share income and expenses related to you or not (grandparents, other relatives, or friends). You must include yourself and all children living with you. Do not include others who live with you who are economically independent—that is anyone you do not support, who does not share income with you, and does pay a pro-rated share of expenses.
- 12. What if I disagree with the school's decision about my application? You should talk to school officials. You also may ask for a hearing by calling or writing to Raul Chavarria, Box 400, Ozona TX 76943; 325-392-5501.
- 13. My family needs more help. Are there other programs we might apply for? To find out how to apply for other assistance benefits, contact your local assistance office or 2-1-1.

More Information on How to Report Your Income on the Application

- All Other Income—Record Worker's Compensation, unemployment or strike benefits, regular contributions from people who do not live in your household, and any other income.

Do not include income from SNAP, FDPIR, WIC, federal education benefits, and foster payments received from the placing agency.

HEALTH AGENCY

INVESTIGATES Reports of an intestinal illness that may be attributable to the parasite cyclospora have prompted the Texas Department of State Health Services to investigate, in collaboration with local health departments, to gather in-


formation and identify the cause. On July 23 the agency reported it has received reports of 77 cyclosporiasis cases from around Texas this year, including 69 in the last month. The major symptom is watery diarrhea lasting a

few days to a few months. Thorough washing of fresh produce is recommended, but that may not entirely eliminate the risk because cyclospora can be difficult to wash off.

Gov. Rick Perry on Aug. 1 renewed the emergency disaster proclamation he originally made on July 5, 2011, certifying that exceptional drought conditions posed a threat of imminent disaster in specified counties in Texas. The renewed proclamation applies to 108 of Texas' 254 counties and specifies "rules and regulations that may inhibit or prevent prompt response to this threat are suspended for the du-

ration of the state of disaster.'




