New clinic may need petition of voters

to be circulated before the Crockett County Commissioners' Court can call a bond election for a new clinic.

During Monday's regular meeting, County Judge Fred Deaton said based on the Texas Health and Safety Code a petition of 10 percent of the county's registered voters may have to be circulated before the court can call for the bond.

According to the Texas Health and Safety Code, sec. 263.021, "10 percent or more of the qualified property taxpaying voters of a county may petition the commissioners court of the county to establish or enlarge a county hospital or any medical or other health facility."

Deaton said that voters can also circulate a petition to not build a clinic.

The firm of Bickerstaff Heath Delgado Acosta LLP is researching the issue for the county and have asked the Texas Attorney Gener al's Office for an opinion, Deaton said.

Deaton also said calling a bond for a new jail does not have to have a petition.

"We are probably going to have to call a special meeting next week to discuss this further," Deaton said.

The commissioners are aiming to have a bond election for the clinic and jail this November.

MAINTENANCE

During the Care Cen-A petition may have ter's report, Commissioner Eligio Martinez questioned why Eddie Martin was still being paid to help with maintenance issues at the center.

Martinez said several people, including ones at the clinic and care center, have talked to Martinez and "want to know how many paychecks we are giving Eddie Martin."

Last April, the Care Center, Health and Emergency Services Board of Directors approved a pilot program for Martin as the center's temporary maintenance supervisor for one year. Martin is paid stipend of \$15,000. The commissioners also gave verbal approval to this agreement.

During the year, the center hired a new maintenance director, Ray Lara, but Martin stayed on to help Lara through the center's first state inspection last month.

The Care Center Board also asked Martin to stay to help with two big projects, a new roof and new air conditioning system, for the center.

"These things are being decided by the board, but we're the deciding body. You've got yourself a maintenance guy. Why is he not in charge? At some point you are going to have to trust Ray (Lara). I recommend we stay with what the board had originally stated," Martinez said.

Kill the Death Tax

amily farms and ranches in our district are part of a cycle that is as sure as the rising sun. They prepare their fields, manage their livestock and crops to protect their growth and then harvest the fruits of their labor. While the crops and methods may change through the years, and the bounty may be unpredictable, harvest time arrives.

Unfortunately, family farms, ranches and small businesses in our district face another surety that is just as predictable, but far more insidious. Instead of bringing life, it brings destruction. It's called the

We all work hard so that we can ensure a better future for our children, and hopefully pass down the success of our efforts. Unfortunately, the Death Tax is a leading reason that many of these familyowned businesses are not successfully passed down to the next generation.

Family ranches, farms and ousinesses are sometimes heavily invested in land and infrastructure, making them 'inventory rich', but quite often, 'cash poor'. When the Death Tax hits, the inheritors find themselves facing an insurmountable tax bill, with not enough money tosatisfy the IRS.

If they want to continue to run their farm, ranch or business they can either choose to take out a loan and go into debt, or they can sell some of their assets or land, which can severely cripple their ability to continue operating. This leads to less productivity and can force them to fire some of their hard-working employees. In some situations, their only option is to sell their business, closing down completely.

And this doesn't just happen when the business, ranch or farm is passed down the first time. It happens every time. Think about that. The same land and assets are taxed at 40% over and over again simply because the current owner dies. And that's on top of all of the other sales and property taxes paid throughout the years.

While this tax is disastrous for family-owned businesses, it raises very little revenue for the federal

treasury. Over the last year, the receipts from the Death Tax was only slightly more than one half of one percent of the total revenue collected by the federal government

and it pays for less than two days of federal spending.

Read that again. Death Tax receipts equal less than two days of federal government spending.

I don't know about you, but I'd prefer to figure out how to cut out two days of spending from the already bloated and wasteful federal budget, and let these hard-working family ranches, farms and businesses keep those hard-earned dollars. That money is barely a blip in the federal budget, but it can make all the difference in the world to the thousands offamilies impacted every year -- many of them living right here in our district.

The importance of the continuation of these family ranches and farms goes beyond just our district. The United States must not be dependent on foreign sources for our food supply. This is a national security issue.

This week, the U.S. House of Representatives is voting on a bipartisan bill that will completely repeal the Death Tax. I am a proud sponsor of this legislation and I look forward to voting to pass the first law that will permanently repeal the Death Tax. This legislation is another example showing that this Congress is indeed working for the American people and we are accomplishing feats previously thought impossible.

In the United States, working hard and taking risks should be rewarded, not punished. We should do more to encourage entrepreneurship and allow families to include the next generation in theirventures. While completely reforming the tax code is an important part of that, killing the Death Tax is a great first step.



Texas House passes state budget after 17-hour debate

AUSTIN — Statewide authority to investigate and prosecute public corruption would be moved out of the Travis County District Attorney's Office under Senate Bill 10, legislation approved by

the Senate on April 9. Sen. Joan Huffman, chair of the Senate State Affairs Committee, wrote the legislation under which the Texas Rangers, a division of the Department of Public Safety, would reestablish and support the state's Public Integrity Unit and assume the initial investigatory role when a complaint is filed against a public official. Cases would be prosecuted in the county where a public official resides. "After more than three decades of accepting this cultural norm, the public has lost confidence in this tacit scheme, and Texas needs a fair and explicit process to hold wrongdoers accountable," Huffman said.

The unit has been located in Travis County since 1982, when it was created by an act of the Texas Legislature. Efforts toward stripping the unit and its authority from Travis County began two years ago when Travis County District Attorney Rosemary Lehmberg, who heads the unit, was arrested and pled guilty to drunken driving. Then-Gov. Rick Perry called for Lehmberg's resignation approaching the end of the 2013 legislative session, but Lehmberg rebuffed Perry by remaining in office. Perry vetoed the unit's \$7.5 million budget. He was later indicted on a charge of official coercion for using his veto power in an attempt to force Lehmberg to resign. Lehmberg was elected to a four-year term as district attorney in 2012.

SB 10, approved by the Senate with all 20 of the body's Republicans voting in favor and all 10 of the body's Democrats voting in opposition, has moved to the Texas House for consideration.

SENATE'S BUDGET BILL MOVES

The Senate Finance Committee on April 8 unanimously approved Committee Substitute House Bill 1, its version of a state budget for fiscal

years 2016 and 2017. Coming in a \$211.4 billion — about \$1.5 billion more than the version passed earlier by the full Texas House the legislation was authored primarily by Senate Finance Committee Chair Jane Nelson, R-Flower Mound, and Vice Chair Juan "Chuy" Hinojosa, D-McAllen. Next step in the process will be for the bill to be passed by the full Senate and then to iron out differences with the House version, be assigned to a joint House-Senate conference committee,

to be named by Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick, who presides over the Senate, and House Speaker Joe Straus.

Regarding the Senate version Hinojosa said, "We increased access and funding to services needed by our most vulnerable populations: the young, elderly, sick and poor. We invested in infra-PLEASE SEE STATE, PAGE 8





Uresti passes major alternative fuels initiative

Last week, the Texas Senate took a historic step in promoting the use of alternative fuels pro-

duced in Texas. Senate Bill 12 by Sen. Carlos Uresti, D-San Antonio, will create a program that will convert the state fleet to natural gas and other alternative fuels, as well as fund the construction of a limited number of fueling stations.

"We've spent the last several weeks talking and negotiating with stakeholders and my colleagues. I feel we have crafted a better bill because of the input we have received, and I am happy to send the bill over to the House and urge my House colleagues to send SB 12 to the Governor's desk as soon as possible." said Uresti.

SB 12 will create the program at the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality, and will use 3 percent of the unappropriated portion of the Texas Emission Reduction Plan (TERP) account. County and local fleets will also be eligible for fleet conversion funding as available.

"Natural gas is cleaner than the fuels we are using now. And importantly—it's plentiful in my district and in Texas. For the constituents I represent, that means jobs and a boost to our economy. I am excited to get this program rolling." said Uresti.

"You came to us and said it was a temporary fix. Now it's turning out to be more of a permanent type deal and I'm not sure if that is something we have agreed on," added Commissioner Frank Tambunga.

Martin, who is also the EMS Coordinator, said he has talked to Lara and that Lara said he would prefer Martin handle the projects because of all that he has to work on at the Care Center.

"I don't think the board expects it to be permanent. I'm at the mercy of the court. I'm at the mercy of the board. By all means, I'm okay with that," Martin said.

Care Center Administrator Robert Stecher said the Care Center building is 60 years old in one area and 45 years old in another, and that it's a building that needs lots of work. Stecher said Lara was at the Care Center twice over the weekend.

He also said the center went six to eight months without a maintenance director putting projects behind schedule.

"There is no one that has a higher regard for Ray (Lara) than I do. You want to take people away from the situation, that's fine, but the work is still going to be there. Every time it rains we are running around to find every bucket we can find. The air conditioning unit freezes up to three or four times a day. It's got to be done," Stecher said. "This should be Ray's decision. Not the community. Not the other people that work in the care center. I am asking as an administrator that we continue that pilot program because it's working.

Martinez said Lara has not complained to him about the situation. He also said that it is up to the commissioners' court to speak for the community.

"We represent the community. We get those complaints," Martinez said. "These are concerns being brought up. We are elected to make these kind of deci-

Martinez also questioned ow Martin was being paid, since he was already a fulltime employee, and if the county would owe him benefits for this position.

Commissioner Pleas Childress said the Care Center Board needs to be part of this discussion, and told Martinez that these issues need to be discussed with the board present. No members of the board were at the meeting.

"I understand it as being a pilot program. Pilot doesn't mean temporary, it just means how it's working. Seems to me it's working really well," said Commissioner Randy Branch.

Deaton said the commissioners were not fully prepared to deal with this issue Monday and that more research is needed.

"I'm not a micro manager. I expect you (to Stecher) to take care of the issues. I'm not going to get into how you do it. I expect you to run a good, clean Care Center and provide a service to the people in the community," Deaton said.

RODEO ARENA AND HORSE BARNS

The commissioners have also received complaints about the 4-H Horse Barn and enforcing of the rules.

Tambunga said David McGuire has expressed interest in overseeing the barns, and asked only to be paid the horse stall rent.

If every horse stall is full, that would be \$1,350 a month.

Currently, the horse barns are overseen by Aaron Renfroe, the county extension agent, but that Renfroe has said he doesn't have time.

Road Supervisor Jeffrey Stuart said the commissioners need to talk to Renfroe because the horse stall money goes back into the 4-H budget.

"You already have someone who is supposed to be doing it," Stuart said.

Deaton said they would have to research how the county could pay a person for this, and to visit with Renfroe about issue.

The item will be placed on the next meeting agenda.

I-10 ROAD SIGNS

TxDOT will be changing signs on Interstate-10 that will no longer have the road names, but will have the number of the road.

For example, the sign at Exit 360 the sign that states "Pandale Road" will be changed to FM 2083.

SENATE PASSES **RIGHT TO TRY**

SB 694, legislation to give terminal patients quicker access to experimental treatments, unanimously passed the Senate on April 9.

Freshman Sen. Paul Bettencourt, R-Houston, said he offered the legislation because he believes the current system is too cumbersome and slow to help people who need treatment fast.

Bettencourt said his bill would create a "framework to help those with a terminal disease get access to drugs and treatments still in the federal Food and Drug Administration trial process quickly and safely."


Health and Human Services Committee Chair Charles Schwertner, R-Georgetown, raised a concern that families and patients facing dire circumstances could be easily deceived by people making false promises for profit. Language in the bill was amended so that a company offering a drug covered under the bill or a doctor administering the treatment must agree to do so at no cost to the patient.

SALES TAX REVENUE INCREASES

State Comptroller Glenn Hegar last week said state sales tax revenue in March totaled \$2.12 billion, a 1.5 percent increase compared to March in the previous year.

"State sales tax collections have now grown for 60 consecutive months despite weakening in the energy sector. This moderated growth was expected and is currently in line with estimates presented in January," Hegar explained in an April 8 news release. "Receipts in the construction, services and restaurant sectors remained relatively strong. We will continue to monitor the state's economic activity and its impact on key revenue sources."

Cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts will receive their April local sales tax allocations totaling \$576.6 million, up 4 percent compared to April 2014.


