Roberts comes to Ozona from San Angelo, where she recently worked with San Angelo Girl Scouts in their program for at risk students.

Roberts said the extension agency and 4-H program is a new step for her.

"I didn't grow up in 4-H, so all this is new to me. Fortunately, I have a million resources to help me," she said.

Roberts is a graduate of San Angelo Central High School, but she grew up all over Texas due to being in a military family.

She then continued her education at Angelo State University and the University of Texas at San Antonio, where she received her bachelor of arts in sociology and her masters degree in counseling.

As the family and consumer agent, Roberts is in charge of several 4-H programs, including food and nutrition and sewing.

CCCCSD employees may face health insurance increase

The CCCCSD School Board got its first look at the 2015-2016 budget during a workshop and special meeting on June 29

One of the first items discussed was the district's health insurance. Superintendent Raul Chavarria said the district's rates are expected to increase about \$50 per month for each employee.

Currently, the district contributes \$454, the state contributes \$75 and district employees contribute \$26 per month.

In order to keep the contribution the same, the district would have to make up the difference of \$50, Cha-

varria said.

"With approximately 150 employees that would mean that we would have to budget an extra \$90,000 for insurance. Without CCCCSD contribution, each employee would see a \$600 a year difference," Chavarria said.

Board members Roland DeHoyos and Orlando DeHoyos once again requested representatives from the district's insurance to come down and give a presentation.

District salaries were discussed to help with the insurance increase.

Currently, the district pays on average \$7,800 above state base.

"At this rate, we remain competitive with schools in our region. We can explore

several options to assist our employees absorb the cost of the insurance increase, or we can pass on the cost to the employees," Chavarria said.

The options include increasing the base that the district pays and passing along the insurance to employees, increasing the retention stipend to \$1,000 and given in two different increments or one or pay a portion of the insurance increase.

No final decision was made by the board on any of the options.

Also discussed was hiring an aide to assist Nurse Karen Huffman.

Last year the district budgeted \$20,000 for this position.

Chavarria said he would like to consider hiring a qual-

ified aide for this, or increase the amount and explore hiring someone to teach a nursing class at Ozona High School.

Chavarria also said there will be need to increase the woodshop budget as OHS will be offering this course to students with the addition of the new ag teacher.

In the maintenance budget, Chavarria said the district currently has \$65,000 budgeted for a new vehicle. He said the board has expressed interest in purchasing a four-door pickup for maintenance.

"We could equip our current pickup with tool box and mechanical lift and purchase

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Competition: building the better mousetrap

At the Angelo State University – Small Business Development Center, we will interact with over a thousand people each year that either want to start a business or are in business. Of those that want to start a business, a small percentage will come in and tell us they have an idea for a business but they do not know if it is a good one and want to know our thoughts about their idea.

Making the decision to start a business requires a lot more than just having a good idea. It

involves a lot of research into the industry and into the market. It involves understanding the difference between the industry and the market.

Beyond understanding that difference is that you have to decide

if the idea is an opportunity. For businesses, an opportunity is a problem for which you have found a solution. The next best situation is when your solution may not be the only solution, but it is the best solution.

When you have the only solution to a problem, you are in the position to “own” the market. If you are not the only solution, then you are in a position of having to prove that your solution is the best. Competition is good. It helps keep pricing “reasonable” in the eyes of

the customer. It helps keep the business trying to improve their service or product in order to maintain competitive advantage. But from a pure profit standpoint, competition can hurt profits. That’s why it is ideal to be the only solution. Unfortunately, you can’t always be or stay as the only solution.

What if you had an idea for a better mouse trap? According to Ruth Kassinger, author of “Build a Better Mousetrap,” the United States Patent and Trademark Office has issued over 4,400 patents

for new mousetraps. The mouse-trap has become the most invented device in United States history. You would have to ask is there a problem to solve and if so, is my solution the best one? If it isn’t, the market will not accept it.

Existing businesses must always work to keep their service or product relevant. As soon as someone sees that a business has a solution to a problem that someone will begin to offer a solution to the same problem and try to tout their solution as the best. Maybe it is and may-

be it isn’t, but now there is competition.

So, when someone asks if their idea is a good for starting a business, the real questions should be, is the idea solving a problem and is therefore an opportunity? Likewise, is the existing business offering a product or service that is still the best solution and therefore relevant?

‘Do as I say, not as I do’

After six months serving as the Representative for the 23rd Congressional District of Texas, I think I have discovered the mantra Washington bureaucrats seem to live by – do as I say, not as I do.

If you watch the news at all, you have heard that the Office of Personnel Management (OPM) was hacked (presumably by a foreign adversary) and that that the personal information of millions of current and previous federal employees was compromised – including my own.

As most of the people impacted by this hack had submitted to a security clearance process, there is some pretty sensitive data that has been exposed.

How will our attackers use this information?

We cannot be certain, but likely it will be sold and then used to discover weaknesses in the digital security of both our federal government and for the individuals involved.

While these attacks are alarming, I am even more frustrated and bewildered by the lack of action by the Director of OPM, Katherine Archuleta.

Despite having received warnings every year from their Inspector General (IG) since at least 2010, little to no action was taken by Director Archuleta to shore up their digital security. Basic cybersecurity protection measures were simply ignored.

While Archuleta claimed to be frustrated and concerned about the attacks in recent testimony before Congress, there were no apologies offered to the millions of Americans who stand to be negatively affected by her unwillingness to do her job. The closest OPM came to an apology was to say in their letter to me and millions of others was that they had “regrets” about what happened. But of course, they also said in the same letter that they accepted

they should continue by getting out the past few years of IG reports and start implementing the suggested actions. I will not ever claim that if they had done this in the first place that the breach would never have happened. But I will assert that if they had practiced basic cyberhygiene, the breach would have been discovered much faster and the potential damage would have been minimized.

I have called for the resignation of Director Archuleta, and the OPM Chief Information Officer Donna Seymour, because I believe that federal agency officials should be held to the same standard that they hold our American business owners to.

When a breach like this happens in the private sector, the federal government levies numerous fines and perhaps even threatens criminal investigations against the owners and executive officers of that company.

But when federal agency officials are guilty of the same negligence, they seem to think that sending their regrets makes everything all right.

This ‘do as I say, but not as I do’ mentality in Washington is an affront to the American people and a serious breach of trust. I will continue to shine a bright light on this abuse of power and do what I can to stop it.

no liability either.

My father taught me that simply saying you are sorry can go a long way. He is right, and that is where OPM should start. Then

I could never be a purebred breeder because I couldn’t get all the paper work done, especially naming the animals. It’s hard enough coming up with titles to my weekly columns but to have to name 500 or 1,000 cattle every year would drive me even more crazy. And because I’ve always hated my name I’d be super sensitive about the names my animals would have to live with.

A breeder’s name or initials are usually worked into the name such as Sitz, Connealy, SAV, or Tehama. With a name like Pitts I wasn’t meant to play this game. My cattle named Peaches of Pitts, Pitts of Gold, or Underarms of Pitts would be the laughing stock of the cow business.

I don’t know how big outfits come up with 2,000 names every year. They must have a Vice President of Monikers whose only job is think up names. I’ve noticed some outfits use a different theme every year, like names of tractors, states, colors, Presidents or diseases such as ABC Eisenhower or XYZ Strangles. After you add in a herd number some of the names end up longer than the animal itself. But beef names are still not as pompous as the names of dairy cows.

I am a simple guy who likes a short song, simply sung, so when I see dairy cow names like Hanover-Hill Star Roxy EX92 2E or Oakhurst Colantha Abbekerk my first reaction is I could never be in the Holstein business because I’m a stickler for good spelling. You read a name like Bohnheur Abbekerkm Posch and you wonder if the name-dropping dairyman speaks English.

The only stockman who are worse spellers than dairymen are Thoroughbred horse breeders. For example, some of the horses originally entered in this year’s Belmont Stakes were Frammento, Materiality and Mubtaaaj. What’s up with that? High court puts Texas abortion law on hold

AUSTIN — The U.S. Supreme Court, in a 5-4 vote on June 29, granted a stay preventing revisions to the state abortion law made by the Texas Legislature in 2013 from taking effect on July 1.

The stay will remain in effect while the court is on hiatus. When it reconvenes in October, the court will decide if the issues at stake in the Texas case, Whole Woman’s Health (and others) v. Cole, merit further review. Voting to deny the stay were Chief Justice Roberts and Justices Scalia, Thomas and Alito.

Created by House Bill 2 in the second special session of the 83rd Texas Legislature, the law would further restrict abortion providers and complicate patient access to abortion services. In question are matters related to the law’s admitting privileges requirement for physicians performing abortions and the requirement that abortion-providing

facilities must upgrade as necessary to qualify as ambulatory surgical centers.

Governor Greg Abbott commented, “HB 2 was a constitutional exercise of Texas’ lawmaking authority that was correctly and unanimously upheld by the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals. Texas will continue to fight for higher-quality healthcare standards for women while protecting our most vulnerable, the unborn, and I’m confident the Supreme Court will ultimately uphold this law.”

SCOTUS RULES AGAINST EPA

The U.S. Supreme Court on June 29 ruled in favor of Texas plus 22 other states and a list of co-plaintiffs that sued the Environmental Protection Agency to stop the enforcement of rules the federal

agency adopted to reduce the release of mercury and other toxic emissions from power plants that use coal to generate electricity.

Plaintiffs claimed the EPA disregarded the cost of compliance, calculated at \$9.6 billion per year, and potential job losses that obeying the regulations would cause. The EPA cited epidemiological information in showing its proposed regulation was intended to achieve the Clean Air Act’s goal of improving public health.


Justice Scalia, who delivered the majority opinion, wrote: “EPA must consider cost—including cost of compliance—before deciding whether regulation is appropriate and necessary. It will be up to the Agency to decide (as always, within the limits of reasonable interpretation) how to

account for cost.”

FSA County Committee Nomination period in Reagan County now open

Reagan-Upton-Irion-Crockett County USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) Executive Director Jed Hruska, announced that the nomination period for local FSA county committees began on June 15, 2015. Nomination forms must be postmarked or received in the Reagan-Upton-Irion-Crockett County FSA Office by close of business on Aug. 3, 2015.

"County Committees are unique to FSA and allow producers to have a voice on federal farm program implementation at the local level," said Hruska.

To be eligible to serve on the FSA county committee, a person must participate or cooperate in an agency administered program, be eligible to vote in a county committee election and reside in the Local Administrative Area (LAA) where they are nominated.

This year, nominations and elections will be held in LAA 5, which includes the northern portion of Reagan County, including the area north of Strawberry Patch Road, north of Stout Lane and north and east of FM 1357.

Producers may nominate themselves or others as candidates. Organizations representing minority and women farmers and ranchers may also nominate candidates. To become a nominee, eligible individuals must sign form FSA-669A. The form and more information about county committee elections is available online at: www.fsa.usda.gov/elections.

Elected county committee members serve a three-year term and are responsible for making decisions on FSA disaster, conservation, commodity and price support programs, as well as other important federal farm program issues. County committees consist of three to 11 members.

"It is important that county committees are comprised of members who fairly represent the diverse demographics of production agriculture for their community," said Hruska. "All producers, including women, minority and beginning farmers and ranchers are encouraged to participate in the nomination and election process."

FSA will mail election ballots to eligible voters beginning Nov. 9. Ballots are due back in the Reagan-Upton-Irion-Crockett County Office by mail or in person no later than Dec. 7, 2015. All newly elected county committee members and alternates will take office Jan. 1, 2016.

"Nominating potential county committee members, voting for candidates and serving on the committees are truly services to your community and the agriculture industry," said Hruska. "County Committee members make important decisions on how federal farm programs are administered locally to best serve local needs and interests."

a pickup for district use that would include hauling the band trailer," Chavarria said.

The budget also includes two lines that are designated for the work study program for high school students to work in the maintenance department. Chavarria and board members both said they want this program to continue.

"This has allowed us to cut back on overtime and eased the load that our maintenance crew such as washing vehicles and mowing. We have also used office help to assist in filing and other office work," Chavarria said.

The budget for the work study program is around \$50,000.

The budget also shows an increase to repair school housing. The budgeted amount is \$100,000.

"We do have bond money dedicated for this that we will use," Chavarria said.

There is also \$100,000 budgeted for renovations to the OHS Softball Stadium.

The district will have to approach the Crockett County Commissioners' Court with the program.

The final budget item discussed was keeping the \$15,000 for student drug testing.

Chavarria said this will allow the district to increase the number of times and the number of students tested.

The drug testing is ran-

dom and Chavarria said he will be in charge of the program from now on.

The board is expected to have several more budget workshops before the final budget is approved in August.

NEW HIRES and RESIGNATIONS

After a two hour closed session on personnel, the board voted to hire Guy Barnett as a high school social studies teacher and coach.

They also accepted the resignations of Brittany Allen, Misty Moellendorf and Chans Moellendorf.

FITNESS CENTER

The board voted to officially close the public fitness center.

The board agreed to close the center at their June 10 regular meeting.

Orlando DeHoyos voted against closing the center. He said the fitness center set CCCSD apart from most schools.

Chavarria said he had received three phone calls since the center had been closed. He also said he knew it was an unpopular decision, but a lot of money had been invested into the center.

At the June 10 meeting, Chavarria said the district had spent \$7,000 in the past two years to repair equipment in the center.

Chavarria said the district wants to turn the center into a technology office and classroom for career and technology classes.

Alabama, Florida, Louisiana, Mississippi, Texas and the federal government.

As part of the agreement resulting from the Deepwater Horizon offshore oil spill in 2010, BP will pay \$20.2 billion in damages and penalties with Texas receiving more than \$750 million.

Gov. Abbott commented: "After five years, I'm proud

to announce that Texas, along with the other Gulf States, has reached an agreement in principle with BP to resolve all the states' claims. This settlement will allow Texas to reinvest in the Gulf community and reinvigorate the economic and environmental health of the region."

TCEQ said the money would be included in a 15-year pay-out plan starting in 2017.

SPEAKER REFLECTS ON SESSION

Texas House Speaker Joe Straus on July 1 praised the state House of Representatives for a successful regular session that began on Jan. 13 and ended June 1.

Straus highlighted the approval of "a balanced two-year state budget that grows less than 2 percent per year and allows for almost \$4 billion in tax relief" which he said also puts additional resources into public education and higher education.

He also mentioned strides made in "oversight of taxpayer dollars" particularly in regards to how agencies award and administer private-sector contracts.

Finally, Straus noted, "For decades, the state has collected fees for a stated purpose, but withheld the money from that purpose so that it could be counted to certify the rest of the budget. The House reduced that practice in 2013 and further reduced it this session. As a result, hundreds of millions of dollars in fees were reduced, while additional resources flowed to transportation, hospital trauma care and state parks."
