## **County seeking bids** on animal control fence

The Crockett County Commissioners' Court approved to advertise for bids for a new fence at the animal control shelter.

During their regular meeting Monday, Animal Control Officer Joe Jurado spoke to the commissioners about adding a fence to the back of the shelter.

Jurado said the fence will allow shelter employees to work with some of the more dangerous animals without fear of them escaping. It will also allow employees to keep dangerous dogs away from the public eye and give dogs a place to run and exercise.

"I think our shelter is the perfect model of what a shelter in a community our size should look like. The fence is one of the last pieces in to making it one of the best," Jurado said.

Jurado presented a quote for \$22,000 for the fence from Venegas Construction.

County Judge Fred Deaton said it would be best

## Filing begins Saturday for March Primary

Filing begins Saturday, Nov. 14, for candidates wanting to run for office in the 2016 March Primary Election.

Local offices up for election include County Commissioner seats, Precinct 1 and 3, County Attorney, Tax Assessor-Collector, Sheriff and 112th District Attorney.

Frank Tambunga currently holds the Commissioner Precinct 1 seat and Randy Branch holds the Commissioner Precinct 3 seat.

Jody Upham currently holds the County Attorney seat, Michelle Medley holds the Tax Assessor-Collector seat and Robert Rodriguez holds the Sheriff position.

Laurie English currently holds the 112th District Attorney seat.

State Rep. Andrew Murr, R-Junction, has announced he will run for reelection. His seat is up next year.

State Senator Carlos Uresti, D-San Antonio, has also announced he will be running for reelection next year.

In a race that is expected to be highly watched, U.S. Rep. Will Hurd, R-San Antonio, will be looking to keep his congressional seat.

Former congressman Pete Gallego, D-Alpine, has announced he will be running for the District 23 position as well.

Those interested in filing can do so Crockett County Clerk's Office at the courthouse annex or they can contact Sandy Stokes, local Democratic Party Chair, or Heidi Williams, local Republican Party Chair.

## Defining leadership in a small business environment

This past week I had the opportunity to spend some time defining what "leadership" meant to me and how it is important in the work environment. As business owners, we encourage our staff to be leaders, to set an example. Leadership has nothing to do with seniority or one's position in the hierarchy of a company. Leadership doesn't automatically happen when you reach a certain pay grade.

fine leadership through soft skills, mostly leadership is associated with charismatic people. We don't need extroverted charismatic traits to practice leadership. And those with charisma don't automatically lead.

Business owners need to remember that leadership and management are not synonymous. Managers need to plan, coordinate, measure, monitor, solve, hire, fire, and so many other things. Typically, managers manage things where leaders lead people. Luckily enough you might be able to hit the jack-

pot and be a manager or hire one with excellent leadership skills. What we must remember when trying to develop and embrace the idea of being a leader is that a leader overnight is not made, created or born. The definition of leadership might help you implement strategies in your business development which you can then complement with the necessary flexibility and emotional intelligence to succeed as a business leader.

The author of the book "Hacking Leader," Mike Myatt, condenses leadership very well. He states, "Leadership means many things to many people. And not all forms of leadership are created equal. Leadership can represent a pursuit, discipline, practice, passion, skill, competency, obligation, or duty. Leadership driven by any of these constructs can be effective, but where leadership really gets interesting is when it combines all of these traits to become purpose driven. The best leaders understand the critical importance of transforming personal values into a greater sense of purpose. It is only at the point

where leaders become committed to a purpose that they're able to surrender to it and let purpose guide their approach to leadership. It's often this revelation that transforms leaders in title only into passionate purpose-driven leaders."

At the end, it is a set of skills combined with emotional intelligence what molds a leader.

## Thank you for your service

have always been conflicted when someone says "Thank you for your service." To me it was my honor and pleasure to serve and I didn't join to seek recognition. I know many veterans who feel the same way, but I still feel obliged to thank them since only a small fraction of our nation has worn a military uniform.

To me there is nothing quite as unique or as fulfilling as military service. Talk to ten service members or veterans and you will hear ten different stories of how they ended up in the military, but all of their stories will have some common threads -- selflessness, a sense of common purpose, and a calling to a purpose outside oneself.

My calling to military service began at a young age. Both of my grandfathers served in the Army during the Second World War and my father received two purple hearts during his service as a medevac pilot during Vietnam. I was honored to enlist in the Army after high school as the next generation of my family to serve. I served for just less than ten years (9 years, 10 months and 22 days to be exact) and it was the most rewarding and fulfilling job I have ever had. There is a certain camaraderie that develops among today's service members in the all-volunteer force that would be hard, if not impossible, to replicate in any other environment.

During my service, I deployed to South and Central America as part of "The War on Drugs," supported disaster relief missions, and deployed to Iraq twice with the 101st Airborne, during Operation Iraqi Freedom. I was injured in Iraq during my

second deployment and was medically retired from the military; however my dedication to service re-

mained. Following medical retirement,

it became my life's purpose to give back and assist my fellow service members still in the fight, and veterans of all eras. I have been busy volunteering with Veteran focused non-profit organizations, I have served as an amputee peer visitor at the Brooke Army Medical Center in San Antonio, and I have gone back to complete my Master's Degrees in Policy and Social Work.

Prior to joining Team Hurd, I spent three years as an Army Wounded Warrior Advocate assisting wounded soldiers and their families successfully transition back into the civilian world. It was a very rewarding position helping soldiers and families, and I soon realized that I wanted to help veterans

on a larger scale. I joined Team Hurd in August as a way to continue serving our nation's military members and veterans at the individual level, while having the opportunity to affect change at the national level. As a fellow veteran, I recognize the selfless sacrifices the veterans of the 23rd Congressional District of Texas have made for our country and want to ensure that they receive the best possible service.

## Governor conditions issuance of grants on compliance with ICE

AUSTIN — Gov. Greg Abbott says Texas sheriffs won't receive grant funds from his Criminal Justice Division unless they comply with U.S. Immigration & Customs Enforcement notification and detention requests.

In a Nov. 4 letter, Abbott wrote to sheriffs: "Beginning now, all Criminal Justice Division grant awards will require that sheriffs departments fully honor ICE's detention requests for criminal immigrants. Any applicant that cannot certify that their office will honor all ICE detainers for criminal immigrants will be ineligible for CJD funding. Further, any applicant that certifies full compliance with ICE detainer requests—but subsequently fails to honor an ICE detainer—will be subject to claw-back provisions and must refund the full amount of their CJD grant award."

"As governor," Abbott continued, "I simply will not allow CJD grant funding administered by this office to support law enforcement agencies that refuse to cooperate with a federal law enforcement program that is intended to keep dangerous criminals off Texas streets."

On Oct. 26, Abbott sent a letter to Dallas County Sheriff Lupe Valdez, calling on her to reverse her office's policy "of not detaining all criminal immigrants" pursuant to ICE's detainer program.

#### TAX REVENUE DECREASES

Texas sales tax revenue in October was \$2.28 billion, down 5.4 percent compared to October 2014, Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced.


"October state sales tax revenue was depressed, as expected, by declines in spending in oil and natural gas-related sectors," Hegar said Nov. 4. "Other major sectors of

the Texas economy, including construction, information, and services, continued to show growth in tax remittances."

But, Hegar said, he is sending cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts \$731.7 million in local sales tax allocations for November, 1.2 percent more than in November 2014. These allocations, he said, are based on sales made in September by businesses that report tax monthly, and sales made in July, August, and September by businesses that report tax quarterly.

53 join amicus brief Fifty-three members of the Texas Legislature, all of them Democrats, signed a "friendof-the-court" brief with the U.S. Supreme Court on Nov. 2, in support of the University of Texas in the Fisher v. University of Texas case that has

been in litigation since 2008. Attorneys for the plaintiff contend the university's admissions policy violates the "equal protection clause" of the Fourteenth Amendment because it allows an applicant's race to be considered as a factor in the admissions process. PLEASE STATE, PAGE 8



## 35 years a big fat lie

Back in the mid-1970s, while serving the U.S. Army in West Germany, they had a "subversive" form of healthcare called, "socialized medicine." I was sure that it would not survive to equal the American standards of medicine and the western diet. Never mind they had some form of universal health care since the 1880s, as well as most other European countries, Great Britain since 1948 and even Canada jumped on board in the 1980s.

This "communistic" form of medicine focused on preventing the cause of illness and disease, rather than a cure after it created havoc throughout our bodies. What were these "third-world," European countries thinking?

By the end of my three year tour of duty, I'd gotten the message and have been wondering why the United States "didn't get it," ever since.

I was overseas from 1971 until 1977, but then Senator George McGovern was heading a commission throughout the decade to standardize the American diet, which came to be known as the Standard American Diet (SAD) and, boy howdy, did it ever turn out that way.

Saturated fat and cholesterol became the "evil doers" in our ways of eating and U.S. citizens were strongly advised to eat 60 percent carbohydrate, 30 percent protein and no more than 10 percent dietary fat. It did not matter that there was no scientific evidence to support their conclusions.

Fast forward 35 years. Now, science and statistics are showing that the results of their recommendations have actually cost American lives, has brought our collective citizenry to the point that 1 in 3 of us are obese and pre-diabetic, at best; and heart disease is the number 1

killer in our country. Need I mention cancer? With the advent of fast food and ever-increasing sugar consumption, the SAD has become an acronym that has lived up to its namesake.

The Los Angeles Times published an article in their Health and Fitness section on Jan. 23 reporting the projection of several nutrition experts and writers:

"People will come to realize that they have the power to control their health with nutrition and fitness. We're going to see the ability of the individual to literally selfdiagnose and cure through low-tech strategies, by adjusting diet and lifestyle," said Mark Sisson, author of MarksDailyApple.com and

said, "What I see happening in the next year that will change our health is the continued focus in the public health community on sugars (sucrose and high fructose corn syrup, in particular) as the prime dietary suspects in the cause of obesity, diabetes and their related diseases. [I see] a continuing decrease in the amount of sugars that we consume and, more important, our children consume, particularly sugary beverages such as sodas and fruit juices."

Dr. Robert Lustig, pediatric endocrinologist at UC San Francisco and author of books including "Fat Chance: Beating the Odds Against Sugar, Processed Food, Obesity and Disease" said, "About five years from now, insurance companies are going to look at the amount of money they are paying out in treatment for chronic diseases, and they will determine that prevention pays better than treatment. They're already talking 'wellness' (although they think that means "absence of illness," which is very shortsighted). In five years, they'll realize they can make more money from healthy clients than sick ones, and they will finally take the plunge."

Well, I'm 63 years old and don't have time to wait and hope our pharmaceutical, medical and food industries, and our government health authorities tear themselves away from their profit and loss statements to begin a reformation process. They do not have our best interests at heart and we are worth more to them sick than we are healthy. For these reasons, I have taken responsibility for my own health, educated myself, tried the theories and have found what works for me and my specific genome. I'm still a work in progress but I use my dollars as votes toward the items I feel will best serve me.

## USDA commitments to help build up next generation of farmers and ranchers

Agriculture Deputy Secretary Krysta Harden has announced a commitment by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) to prioritize \$5.6 billion over the next two years within USDA programs and services that serve new and beginning farmers and ranchers. Harden also announced a new, tailored web tool designed to connect burgeoning farm entrepreneurs with programs and resources available to help them get started.

"Today's announcement is symbolic of the evolution of USDA's efforts to better serve the next generation of farmers and ranchers. What began seven years ago with the recognition that the rapid aging of the American farmer was an emerging challenge, has transformed into a robust, transparent, tech-based strategy to recruit the farmers of the future," said Harden. "No matter where you're from, no matter what you look like, no matter your background, we want USDA to be the first stop for anyone who is looking to be a part of the story and legacy of American agriculture.'

The new web tool is available at www.usda.gov/new-farmers. The site was designed based on feedback from new and beginning farmers and ranchers around the country, who cited unfamiliarity with programs and resources as a challenge to starting and expanding their operations. The site features advice and guidance on everything a new farm business owner needs to know, from writing a business plan, to obtaining a loan to

grow their business, to filing taxes as a new small business owner. By answering a series of questions about their operation, farmers can use the site's Discovery Tool to build a personalized set of recommendations of USDA programs and services that may meet their needs.


Using the new web tool and other outreach activities, and operating within its existing resources, USDA has set a new goal of increasing beginning farmer and rancher participation by an additional 6.6 percent across key USDA programs, which were established or strengthened by the 2014 Farm Bill, for a total investment value of approximately \$5.6 billion. Programs were targeted for expanded outreach and commitment based on their impact on expanding opportunity for new and beginning farmers and ranchers, including starting or expanding an operation, developing new markets, supporting more effective farming and conservation practices, and having access to relevant training and education opportunities. USDA will provide quarterly updates on its progress towards meeting its goal. A full explanation of the investment targets, benchmarks and outcomes is available at:

Harden made the announcements during remarks to more than 60,000 attendees at the National FFA Convention in Louisville, Ky. The National FFA Organization is the largest youth organization in the United States, and focuses on preparing students for a wide range of careers in agriculture, agribusiness and other agriculture-related occupations.

As the average age of the American farmer now exceeds 58 years, and data shows that almost 10 percent of farmland in the continental United States will change hands in the next five years, we have no time to lose in getting more new farmers and ranchers established. Equally important is encouraging young people to pursue careers in industries that support American agriculture. According to an employment outlook report released by USDA's National Institute of Food and Agriculture (NIFA) and Purdue University, one of the best fields for new college graduates is agriculture. Nearly 60,000 highskilled agriculture job openings are expected annually in the United States for the next five years, yet only 35,000 graduates with a bachelor's degree or higher in agriculture related fields are expected to be available to fill them. The report also shows that women make up more than half of the food, agriculture, renewable natural resources, and environment higher education graduates in the United States. USDA recently released a series of fact sheets showcasing the impact of women in agriculture nationwide.

The announcement builds on USDA's ongoing work to engage its resources to inspire a strong next generation of farmers and ranchers by improving access to land and capital; building market opportunities; extending conservation opportunities; offering appropriate risk management tools; and increasing outreach and technical support. Commissioner Pleas Childress III, who is also a board member of the Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District, said it's a joint effort between the county and the conservation district to take

care of the draws.

"It's our responsibility to keep that water way in good shape. When horses eat the grass we have erosion problems," Childress said.

"I think it's a matter of people being aware again," Jurado added.

#### ROAD BUILDING

Deaton said the new road department building is sustainably completed with a few items that still need to be corrected.

He also said the final American Disabilities Act inspection will be around Dec. 15 or sooner, if the county can get an inspector.

"We will not accept the building or release the final amount of money until we've been approved by the engineer and the ADA inspector," Deaton said.

The commissioners took a tour of the building on Oct. 14. Cost for the building is around \$900,000. The building replaces the old office and vehicle maintenance facility that burned down in a massive fire last year.

The commissioners accepted the building on Oct. 14 as substantially complete excluding some items on the punch list that still need to be completed.

#### ALLEY

The commissioners approved having the alley surveyed going north and south from Ramos Street between Encino Street and Avenue A.

It was listed on the agenda to discuss closing the alley.

Deaton said the alley has a lot of utility lines that go to resident's houses.

"There is a lot of infrastructure that someone would miss someday if that is closed off," Deaton said.

Residents that live in the area voiced their concerns about property boundaries in

Commissioner Frank Tambunga said he would like to get the area surveyed.

"There are a lot of utility easements. All the lines would have to be moved if it's closed. In my opinion, it would probably be the best interest to just leave it alone," Tambunga said.

#### PRECINCT 1 VOTING PLACE

The commissioners approved moving the Precinct 1 voting location from the Crockett County Courthouse to the courthouse annex.

The workshop is a collaborative effort among the AgriLife Extension offices in Schleicher, Sutton, Edwards, Irion and Crockett counties.





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

#### LAWMAKERS TO STUDY ISSUES

Texas House Speaker Joe Straus on Nov. 4 assigned interim charges to several Texas House committees that will study issues in preparation for the next regular session of the Texas Legislature, which convenes in January


with other states, the impact of declining oil prices, school finance, college funding and governance, education and career opportunities for veterans, government transparency, money sitting in accounts, state water plan funding, emergency preparedness, cyber security, the repair of state parks from flooding and wildfires, and more. In other news, on Nov. 5,

Speaker Straus announced the formation of a House Committee on Federal Environmental Regulation "to take a comprehensive look at how an array of rules from the Obama administration will affect Texas and its economy."

Straus said the committee will look at recently proposed or finalized rules from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, including the Clean Power Plan, the National Ambient Air Quality Standards, the "Waters of the United States" rules and new standards regulating methane emissions from the oil and natural gas sector.

#### **ELECTION RESULTS POSTED**

Voters approved all seven ballot measures in Texas' 2015 Constitutional Amendment Election. Total turnout on Nov. 3 was slightly more than 11 percent of the state's nearly 14 million registered voters. Election night returns were posted on Nov. 4.

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




