Commissioners approve title policy, appraiser for wellness center

The Crockett County Commissioners' Court approved a title policy and appraiser for the new wellness center.

During Monday's regular meeting, commissioners approved purchasing a title policy for land deeded to the county for the new J. Cleo Thompson Wellness Center.

The commissioners also approved hiring Pon Seahorn as an appraiser to determine the market value of the wellness center property, located across the street from the Family Health Center of Ozona, for purposes of obtaining a title insurance policy.

However, the commissioners could not vote to accept the property deed for the wellness center due to the paperwork not being ready, said County Judge Fred Deaton.

The commissioners also postponed any action on a geotechnical soil survey and boundary

here is an epidemic in our country that can impact anyone, regardless of race, gender, location and socio-economic status. It is called Human Trafficking and it is a modern day form of human slavery.

Worldwide, there are between 21 million and 30 million men, women and children enslaved today. As many as 800,000 people are trafficked across international borders every year. At least 80% of those are female and half are children. Up to 60,000 people have fallen victim to human trafficking in the United States, creating a \$10 billion industry, and the average age of a child that enters the sex trade in the U.S. is 12 to 14 years old. It is believed that 83% of victims of sex trafficking cases in the United States are American citizens.

To bring it home, let me share that the National Human Trafficking Hotline received more calls from Texas than any other state in the United States. There were at least 330 human trafficking cases reported in Texas for 2015, and more than 2,100 since 2007.

It saddens me to share those statistics. That's why we must look past those numbers and see the names, the faces and the families who are impacted by these terrible crimes every day.

It's also important that we work hard to stop it.
Last year, Congress

passed a bipartisan bill that will go a long way to stopping human trafficking. The Justice for Victims of Trafficking Act (JVTA):

 Helps law enforcement better target and hold accountable those who are purchasing sex or labor from a trafficking victim

· Increases criminal fines on human traffickers, directing that money to the services that help the victims

· Requires traffickers to be treated as violent criminals, deterring pre-trial release from custody

· Streamlines the process for state and local officials to obtain wiretap warrants in pursuit of traffickers

· Creates a program to help state and local governments form a local human trafficking prevention task force

· Provides authority for Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) to train military veterans to be-

come law enforcement officials focused on stopping human traffickers. The JVTA legislation

legislation also gave the U.S. Marshals Service new authority to help local law enforcement stop

human trafficking. Only a month after it was signed, teenagers in Tennessee and Virginia were returned home due to this coordination, and the criminals were brought to justice. At the state level, Texas

is taking proactive steps to combat this problem. As early as 2003, Texas passed one of the first state-level anti-trafficking laws and followed up in 2009 with the creation of the Texas Human Trafficking Prevention Task Force. Their goal is to better understand how human traffickers operate in Texas, educate others on how to identify it and facili tate cooperation between law-enforcement and other organizations at every level to stop human trafficking. They also offer legislative recommendations to our state government to help fine-tune the process and stop more criminals. This past legislative session in Texas also eliminated the statute of limitations on those who have engaged in child prostitution.

More is being done at the local level as well. The Rivard Report recently highlighted a remarkable task force in San Antonio that is focused on finding missing foster children, many of whom end up as victims of human trafficking. Their persistence and creative thinking is making a difference and I hope to see other cities use this model to combat human trafficking.

What can you do to help? January is Human Trafficking Awareness Month, so I encourage you to learn more about the signs of human trafficking by visiting traffickingresourcecenter. org. And if you think you know someone who might be a victim of human trafficking, you can call the Human Trafficking Hotline – 1-888-373-7888.

Governor proposes amendments to U.S. Constitution

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS By Ed Sterling | Texas Press Association

AUSTIN — Gov. Greg Abbott on Jan. 8 unveiled his "Texas Plan," a document promoting the passage of nine constitutional amendments "to rein in the federal government and restore the balance of power between the States and the United States," he said.

The amendments Abbott is proposing include:

- Prohibit Congress from regulating activity that occurs wholly within one state.

- Require Congress to balance its budget;

- Prohibit administrative agencies, and the unelected bureaucrats that staff them, from creating federal law;

- Prohibit administrative agencies, and the unelected bureaucrats that staff them, from preempting state law.

- Allow a two-thirds majority of the states to override a U.S. Supreme Court decision;

- Require a seven-justice super-majority vote for U.S. Supreme Court decisions that invalidate a democratically

enacted law;
- Restore the balance of
power between the federal and
state governments by limiting
the federal government to the
powers expressly delegated to

it in the Constitution;
- Give state officials the
power to sue in federal court
when federal officials over-

step their bounds; and
- Allow a two-thirds majority of the states to override a federal law or regulation.

Manny Garcia, executive director of the Texas Democratic Party, said Abbott's proposals would "tear apart the Constitution and take America back to an equivalent of the Articles

Garcia added: "America added 292,000 new jobs in December. But under Abbott, Texas fell to sixth in job creation, remains the uninsured

of Confederation."

capitol of the nation, wages and incomes remain far too low for hardworking families, our neighborhood schools are still underfunded, and college education is slipping out of reach.

"Texas families deserve serious solutions, not Tea Party nonsense," Garcia said.

GUN PLAN DRAWS REACTIONS

In a Jan. 7 White House address, President Obama said he would take executive action to reduce gun violence in America, primarily by keeping guns "out of the wrong hands through background checks."

Gov. Abbott reacted, saying, "Despite the president's latest attempt to undermine our liberty, Texas will take every action to protect the Second Amendment rights of lawabiding citizens."

Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton also reacted, saying, "I stand ready to fight back against any overreach that will deny or infringe on (gun owners') rights."



Whole eggs are a "superfood," though not as significant in fat as other foods but they are nutrient-rich, inexpensive and research has linked egg consumption to improved heart health. Cheese is a healthy saturated fat that is also a real treat for many people. Those with dairy issues need not worry about the fermented curds' rich nutrient source. The lactose most people have problems with is in the whey.

In addition to it containing Medium Chain Triglycerides (MCT), which support fat loss and build lean muscle tissue, coconut oil may help to regenerate and heal nerve function inside your brain. Olive oil is commonly used in the Mediterranean diet, and we've all heard that olive oil reduces the risk of heart disease, blood pressure and

certain types of cancer. A recent study published in "Neurology," found that cooking with heart-healthy olive oil and using it for salad dressing may cut stroke risk.

The term "fatty fish" may sound unappealing, but are among the healthiest and most delicious foods from the sea. It is suggested one should consider 2 servings a week of oily fish like salmon, tuna, sardines, mackerel and trout, which are full of omega-3 fatty acids like DHA and EPA (two kinds of omega-3 fats) can reduce inflammation, lowering risk of skin cancer and heart disease.

Some plant-based sources of healthy fatty acids include; algae such as seaweed, walnuts, flaxseed, Brussel Sprouts, kale, spinach and parsley.

These are just the main good fat sources and should be healthy choices for most. Always be willing to try new and different foods on yourself and pay attention to what your body is trying to tell you. It's your body, your life and certainly your right to choose the elements to enhance your existence.

finding a very small costof living bonuses.But this month for only the third time in 40 years, none of us will be seeing an extra penny. Meanwhile, CEOs of our top corporations are amassing some nest eggs that are larger than they could hope to spend in one life CEOtime. A think tank-the Center for effective Government reveals that the 100 largest CEO retirement accounts are equivalent to the entire retirement savings of the bottom 41 percent of American families. And the average CEO retirement fund in this top tier is worth over \$49.3 million. There is assuredly a connection between the retirement insecurity experienced by millions of Americans and the huge nest eggs enjoyed by CEOs. Executives are richly rewarded for slashing worker retirement benefits.

This is seemingly how it works today. The executive with lots of fanfare scraps his employee pension plan in favor of a much less generous and less generous and boosts 401(k) plan-or possibly no benefits at all. This cost cutting measure boosts company profits and stock prices, which in turn booststhe the value of the executives's based pay. There are lots of examples of how a CEO froze employee pension funds if not totally closing it to new employees. But the flip side of this maneuver has been to launch lavish executive pension plans. And under this scheme, millions of dollars get accumulated in company retirement a very

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these top brass decide to re-At General Electric CEO Jeff Immelt closed the com-

pany's pension plan in 2011, substituting it with a lot riskier 401(k)plan.Immellt's company sponsored retirement kittry has ballooned to more than \$82 million. It is nauseating to contrast this CEO accumulation with the average social security benefit, which runs less than \$1,400 per month. The point is that the lack of a cost-ofliving increase for 2016 will hit hardest the roughly twothirds of retirees who rely on Social Security for half if not more of their income.

Retirees have been flooding congressional offices with angry phone calls. and letters. They have admittedly worked hard for these benefits. And many have painstakingly pointed out that while there have been well-publicized falling gasoline prices have in fact lowered expenses for many Americans, older people the do not drive as much as regular commuters and thus are getting whacked by expenses pharmaceuticals and other brutally by rising prices. Many will feel severely whacked in 2016.

As a possible reprieve, Senator Elizabeth Warren, a domocrat, has introduced the Seniors and Veteran Benefiuts Act. The primary purpose behind this proposed piece of legislationwould provide to seniors and veterans a one-year increase worth 3.9 percent of the average annual benefit (amountinbg to just a bit more than \$580. Warren has picked an ingenious way to pay for this increase closing a loophole that encourages excessive CEO pay. Specifically this Warren bill would eliminate.the amendment to the tax coidethat allows corporations virtually unlimited deductions for executive compensation as long as that pay is in the form of stock options and the catchall category "performancebased pay.'

Support for this proposed legislation has been partisan. The Joint Congressional Committee on Taxation estimates that eliminating this loophole would generate more than \$50 billuon in ten years. Some estimates are higher. The odds of this legislation passing in time to make a difference for retiring or just retired are slim. Not a single Republican has signed on as a cosponsor. For this retiree, the issue boils down to having a discussion on a serious level about who has contributed most to this country of ours over the last generation-really a rather small handfull of people at the top, who now are those of us or othersin the country who get up every single day w.ho now are grandparents.In the sembblance of a this the wealthiest country in the world there is really no excuse for denying one soul a dignified life in their retirement years. And yet what is transpiring,we are witnessing a growing divide with millions of us older people at the bottom of the heap of humanity having to scrap just to get by while those at the top are sitting on retirement accounts so obsenely large that they lose out being dignified. This should

Game Warden Field Notes

COMPLIED FROM TEXAS PARKS AND WILDLIFE DEPARTMENT LAW ENFORCEMENT REPORTS.

INTO THE NIGHT

As two Val Verde County game wardens conducted their nightly patrol, they came upon a vehicle that failed to stay in its lane. While the game wardens tried to read the vehicle's license plate, the vehicle quickly accelerated and almost lost control of the car on a curve.

The wardens activated their emergency lights to stop the vehicle, but it only went faster. After following the vehicle for a short time, the wardens saw the vehicle stop and the driver disappear into the darkness. The wardens pulled up beside the vehicle and secured the scene. However, when back up arrived, they were unable to find the driver. The wardens impounded the vehicle and the case is pending further investigation.

IT'S YOUR OWN FAULT

As a Hudspeth County game warden patrolled an area of the Rio Grande River, he encountered some waterfowl hunters. After talking with the hunters for a few minutes, the warden discovered that one of the individuals did not have a valid hunting license.

The hunter admitted to taking several birds. When the warden asked him why he didn't have a license, the hunter tried to blame an El Paso sporting goods store for not issuing him a proper li-

When the warden questioned the other hunters, he

found they all had the correct licenses, state stamps and federal duck stamps, all of which were issued by the same El Paso sporting goods

The warden found an illegally taken coot and three cormorants in the unlicensed hunter's possession. The warden issued citations for the violations and civil restitution is pending.

A Henderson County game warden received a call from a pump technician who was checking well sites about a man dragging a deer off private property to a nearby wooded area.

When the hunter noticed the pump technician, he ran to a nearby house and iumped into a truck and sped off. The warden arrived at the house and talked to a woman who lived there. She said her husband just left for town to buy tractor parts.

When the man returned to his house a few minutes later, he denied hunting or being on the private property. However, ne then said ne shot a buck on his property, but the buck jumped the fence to the private property, so he simply went to retrieve it. After the warden questioned him some more, the man confessed to shooting the deer on the private prop-

He said he got scared when he saw the pump technician, so he left the scene quickly to buy a hunting license in case a game warden showed up. Cases and civil restitution are pending.

that sales tax revenue for the state in December was \$2.33 billion, down 1.1 percent compared to December 2014.

"As with the previous two months, December sales tax revenue was down largely due to spending reductions in oil and gas-related sectors," Hegar said. "This was expected, given ongoing weakness in oil and natural gas prices. Remittances from other sectors, such as construction and information, continued to grow."

Also, Hegar said, the Office of the Comptroller is sending cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts \$617.2 million in local sales tax allocations for January, 0.1 percent less than in January 2015. The allocations are based on sales made in November by businesses that report tax monthly.

'DON'T MESS' TURNS 30

The Texas Department of Transportation on Jan. 3 announced the "Don't Mess With Texas" anti-litter campaign had reached its 30th anniversary.

For more than 30 years, according to the announce-

ment, the iconic Don't Mess With Texas campaign has reminded people to put litter in a trash can instead of tossing it out of their vehicles.

"Researchers estimate that nearly a half a billion (435 million) pieces of visible litter pile up along state-maintained highways annually. Small bits of trash can add up to one big litter problem, especially when napkins, wrappers and cigarette butts make up 70 percent of all litter found along Texas roads. In 2014 alone, the state spent \$35 million in highway cleanup costs," TxDOT said.

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
