



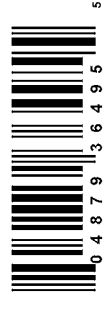

Ozona woman indicted in San Angelo policeman's death

The woman involved in a crash that took the life of San Angelo Police Sgt. Korby Kennedy has been indicted.

A Tom Green County grand jury indicted Cynthia Quigley, 46, on a charge of criminally negligent homicide, a state jail felony that carries a penalty of 180 days to two years in a state jail and a fine up to \$10,000.

Quigley was indicted in the 340th District Court of Judge Jay Weatherby. The findings of the grand jury, which convened March 15, were released Monday.

"We've been waiting for this," said San Angelo Police Chief Tim Vasquez. "This incident still has a lot of us hurting."

The indictment states that Quigley, who is from Ozona, committed criminal negligence "by failing to yield the right of way, while using a cellphone" in the crash that killed Kennedy.

A capias was issued for Quigley on March 23, and she was arrested by

School board meetings tonight, Thursday

The CCCSD School Board held a special called meeting Monday night at the Administration Building.

The only item on the agenda was executive/closed session dealing with personnel.

After meeting in closed session for 90 minutes, the board took no action when they reconvened in open session.

The meeting was originally scheduled as an emergency called meeting to be held March 21 and then rescheduled for March 23.

Both those meetings were canceled and Monday's special called meeting was set.

According to the Texas Open Meetings Act, an emergency meeting can only be called if there is an imminent threat to public health and safety, or a reasonable unforeseeable situation.

The Texas Open Meetings Act also states that the governmental body shall clearly identify the emergency or urgent public necessity in the meeting notice.

A logo is worth a million words in marketing a business

If a picture is worth a thousand words, then your logo must be worth a million. Your logo is the face of your business. It is a key element when it comes to advertising and is at the center of all of your branding. I would like to explore some of the different file types and explain why it is easier to work with some files as opposed to others. Most importantly, you need to understand the difference between a raster image and a vector image. A raster image is made up of colored pixels to create a finished or complete im-

age. These files are commonly known as a jpeg (Joint Photographic Experts Group), png (Portable Network Graphics), and gif (Graphic Interchange Format). Because a raster image is made up of a fixed number of pixels it cannot

be stretched or resized without compromising the resolution, meaning it will become fuzzy. A vector image is created using mathematical formulas as opposed to individual pixels. This allows you to resize a vector image to any size big or small without compromising the quality of your image. These files types are commonly referred to as the master or design copy of your logo. In order to create these files, you have to use special software like Adobe Illustrator or Corel Draw. These programs let you

save the image as an eps (Encapsulated PostScript) file. The key to keeping great digital copies of your logo for various uses is to have access to both the rasterized images and the original vector images. When working with a graphic artist or printing company, ask them to save your logo in different sizes and as different file types. A jpeg is usually used when working with digital media like a website or on social media. A png file is always nice because it holds any transparency in a file, this will eliminate the white box

around your logo when adding it to a colored background. The vector images or great when you need to resize your logo so you can put it on the side of your vehicle or make big enough to use on a billboard. If you are ready to create a logo, your best option is to visit with a professional graphic artist. If you already have a logo, saved as a jpeg or png, and you do not have access to the original design files then you can usually work with your printing company to have them recreate your logo as a vector image. Once you have tak-

en the steps to get a vector file created, it is imperative that you request and save your logo in its original eps file format to have for future use. In most cases you will not be able to view these files on your computer. The printing companies will be able to, and it will save you time and money if you are able to provide the original design copy of your logo.

Technology can help our veterans

A few weeks ago, my Democratic Colleague from Massachusetts, Seth Moulton, posted a video on Facebook that went viral. One of his staffers, who is also a Veteran, tried for several minutes to make an appointment with this local VA medical center on the phone, only to be pushed through a never-ending cycle of prompts that kept taking him back to the beginning. He was never able to talk to a real person and he was unsuccessful in scheduling an appointment. The reaction was universal - "That's outrageous!"

What's even more outrageous is that no one was particularly surprised. This level of customer service from the VA has come to be expected, and that is deeply unfortunate.

I am working to change that.

Fixing the VA is not a partisan issue. It is an American issue. I served alongside our men and women in uniform while in the CIA, so I've seen first-hand the level of dedication and the extreme sacrifices.

Last week, I called VA officials to testify before a hearing of my IT Subcommittee for Oversight and Government Reform. We drilled down on technical difficulties and cyber vulnerabilities that the VA is currently dealing with. Sadly, like at any federal government agency, there are many. Veterans need to know that their personal information is secure at the VA. And they should be able to have their medical records digitally transferred to the VA after leaving the service. Having to print them out and physically carry them to their doctor is ridiculous in the 21st Century. As Chairman of this committee, it is my job to hold agencies like the VA accountable for improving their cybersecurity posture and

employing new technology that allows them to be more effective and cost-efficient.

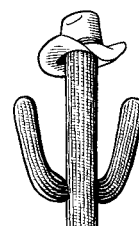
I also used this opportunity to talk about The Faster Care

for Veterans Act, a simple, bipartisan bill I and many of my colleagues have co-sponsored. It calls upon the VA to commence a pilot program that will use private-sector, self-scheduling technologies at VA facilities, giving Veterans the ability to schedule an appointment online. Not only will this improve customer service for our Veterans, it will help hold the VA accountable. Those secret, hand-written waiting lists will no longer be possible under this kind of system. Co-sponsoring this legislation was a no-brainer and I look forward to working to gather more support and get it across the finish line.

But there is always more I can do -- not just in Congress, but right here at home. Two of my staffers, Retired Air Force General and surgeon David Young and Army Veteran Jon Arnold, and I stand ready to help Veterans navigate the VA system, answer questions and expedite paperwork. We've also held several panels on the Choice Card and will hold more this year in communities across the district. DPS chief reminds citizens to be vigilant

AUSTIN — Following news reports of coordinated, terroristic bomb attacks in Brussels, Belgium, on March 22, the Texas Department of Public Safety posted a reminder to Texans to remain vigilant and to report suspicious behaviors.

DPS Director Steven McCraw said ordinary Texans "play a crucial role in helping law enforcement protect the public from groups and lone-wolf actors intent on harming others."

"Fighting crime in today's threat environment," McCraw added, "can be greatly enhanced through the combined efforts of the public and law enforcement, and we urge individuals to report any illegal or suspicious activity they witness to iWATCH or their local authorities."

The DPS's iWATCH website, www.iwatchtx.org, was created as a partnership between communities and

law enforcement and uses citizen-sourced tips related to criminal activity, McCraw said. Anonymous reports may be made by contacting the DPS at 1-866-786-5972. However, as pointed out by the DPS, iWATCH is not designed to report emergencies, so if a situation requires an emergency response, the correct procedure is to call the emergency number, 911. In addition, for "smart phone" users, reports to iWATCH can also be made through the free Texas DPS Mobile App, available in both iPhone and Android versions.

McCraw listed examples of behaviors and activities to report, such as:

- Strangers asking questions about building security features and procedures;
- A briefcase, suitcase, backpack or package left

- behind;
- Cars or trucks left in no-parking zones at important buildings;
- Chemical smells or fumes that are unusual for the location;
- People requesting sensitive information, such as blueprints, security plans or VIP travel schedules, without a need to know;
- Purchasing supplies that could be used to make bombs or weapons or purchasing uniforms without having the proper credentials;
- Taking photographs or videos of security features, such as cameras or checkpoints.

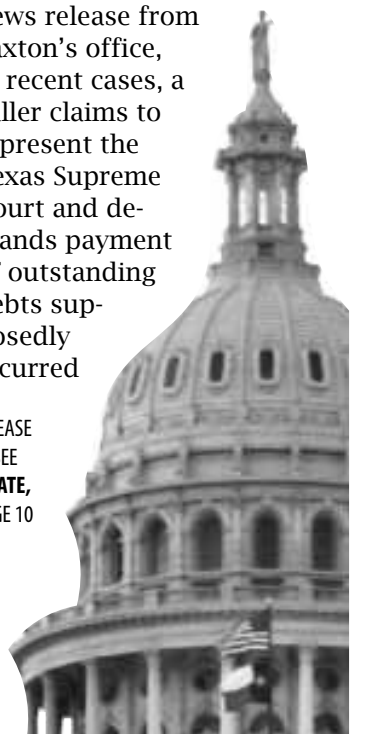
DEBT COLLECTION SCAM

Diet is key in dealing with thyroid disease

The American Thyroid Association (ATA) advises that, "More than 12 percent of the U.S. population will develop an auto-immune thyroid condition during their lifetime. An estimated 20 million Americans have some form of thyroid disease."

The thyroid is a gland located in the middle of the lower neck producing hormones to regulate the body's metabolism, which is the rate at which the body produces energy from nutrients and oxygen. However, recent scientific studies and meta-analyses indicate that phytochemicals present in grains interfere with iodine in the thyroid gland and cause goiter, hypothyroidism, hyperthyroidism, Hashimoto's Thyroiditis and numerous other auto-immune diseases; as well as cardiovascular diseases, osteoporosis and infertility.

"Hypothyroidism is a condition where the thyroid gland does not produce enough thyroid hormone. Symptoms include extreme fatigue, depression, forgetfulness, and some weight gain. Hyperthyroidism, another form of thyroid disease, is a condition causing the gland to produce too much thyroid hormone. Symptoms include irritability, nervousness, muscle weakness, unexplained weight loss, sleep disturbances, vision problems and eye irritation," as explained by the ATA.

The most important foundation for the body with

severe symptoms while the body recovers.

One's first impression of the diet for autoimmune diseases is that it is very restrictive. Don't worry, there are plenty food choices that aren't processed or come from a factory farm. Your only real concern is deciding which is the higher priority, your health or the food you eat.

Foods to eat include:
· all free ranging or grass-fed meats like beef, pork, lamb, fish and fowl. Fish should be wild raised with a low-mercury content. Assure meat are free of added hormones and antibiotics. Locally raised meats are preferred
· most organic above-ground vegetables like artichoke, asparagus, beets, bok choy, broccoli, brussel sprouts, cabbage, carrots (not an above-ground vegetable), cauliflower, celery, chives, cucumbers, garlic, kale, leeks, lettuce, mustard greens, onions, parsley, radishes, rhubarb, shallots, spinach, squash, watercress, and zucchini.

· fermented foods like sauerkraut, kimchi, pickled ginger, fermented cucumbers, coconut yogurt, kombucha, water kefir, etc. Its best to make your own or buy one of the few brands that are genuinely fermented and free of sugars or additives.

· coconut products like coconut butter, cream, milk, oil, unsweetened coconut flakes, unsweetened coconut yogurt.

· low glycemic organic fruits like apples, avocados, berries, cherries, lemons and pears.
· most herbs and spices

like basil, black pepper, cilantro, coriander, cumin, garlic, ginger, mint, oregano, parsley, rosemary, sage, sea salt, thyme.
· others like apple cider vinegar, herbal teas, olives and olive oil.

Note: Do not eat any of the above foods if you have known sensitivities or intolerances for them.

Foods to avoid are:

· sugars and sweeteners like agave, candy, corn syrup, fructose, high fructose corn syrup, honey, maple syrup, molasses, sucrose, coconut sugar, etc.

· high glycemic fruits like apricots, bananas, canned fruits, dried fruits, grapes, mango, peaches, pineapple, raisins and watermelon.

· all grains like amaranth, barley, buckwheat, bulgur, corn, couscous, kamut, millet, oats, quinoa, rice, rye, spelt, wheat and wheat germ.
· nuts and seeds like almonds, peanuts, sunflower seeds, sesame seeds.

· gluten-containing items like brewer's yeast, cold cuts, condiments, emulsifiers, fillers, flour, soy sauce, malt, malt vinegar, modified food starch, monosodium glutamate, nondairy creamer, pasta, processed salad dressings, seitan, and some textured vegetable protein.

· dairy products and eggs, like cheeses, cow milk, frozen desserts, goat milk, sheep milk, whey, yogurt (except coconut).

· all soy products like edamame, miso, soy milk, soy protein, soy sauce, tempeh, tofu.

· all legumes like black beans, lentils, peanuts, peas, pinto beans and soybeans.

Once a healthy pattern of eating is established and symptoms of autoimmune thyroiditis begins to diminish it will be clear what boundaries, priorities and planning one needs to assure the chances for success.

the Library began a fundraising campaign to expand the library building and remodel for handicap access.

After 10 year of grant writing, a bond election, fundraising programs and donation drives, the successful library expansion was completed in 2000.

Game Warden Field Notes

WARDENS LEND A HELPING HAND
Two Llano County game wardens put together a food drive for a family in need after a family member contacted one of the wardens. The family member said they needed meat to feed their family of 15. Within days, the wardens delivered processed deer hamburger and steaks, cooked pulled pork, sausage, fish and other items to stock the family's freezer.

A TURKEY VULTURE DOES NOT A TOTEM POLE MAKE
While searching for an armed robbery suspect's campsite, the Mount Pleasant Police SWAT team entered a ranch on which the suspect was believed to be hiding. The SWAT team discovered the hidden campsite and found drug parapherna-

lia and a dead turkey vulture staked to the ground with its wings spread apart like a totem pole figure. The SWAT team didn't find the suspect at the campsite, but they later found him at his girlfriend's apartment. The girlfriend was arrested for harboring a felon. The following day, a Titus County game warden went to the campsite to seize the vulture as evidence. The warden researched the suspect, who did not have a hunting license, and found he had posted three photos of dead white-tailed deer on his Facebook account. The warden interviewed the suspect at the jail and identified two more suspects. After taking statements from the other suspects, the warden issued citations for hunting under the license of another, allowing another to hunt under his license, no hunter education and untagged white-tailed deer.

the Crockett County Sheriff's Office on March 24, the office of the Crockett County Precinct 1 Justice of the Peace Judge Evelyn C. Lozano confirmed Monday.

Calls to the sheriff's office requesting details of the arrest from Sheriff Robert Rodriguez were not returned Monday.

Quigley's bond is \$10,000 and a defense attorney is not listed, according to the indictment.

Kennedy, 44, nearing his 20th year of service with SAPD, died in a motorcycle crash while on duty last summer as he escorted a caravan of elite racing boats participating in the Showdown in San Angelo drag boat races.

On June 25 at 6:05 p.m., Quigley, who was driving a black 2012 Nissan Rogue SUV, was stopped in a private drive at the intersection of the 3100 block of Knickerbocker Road "awaiting to make a left turn while talking on her cellphone and being distracted by her passenger," according to a crash report

from the Texas Department of Transportation.

The passenger, Leticia Payne, 50, "was trying to get (Quigley) to look at one of the boats," according to the report.

Kennedy was northbound on Knickerbocker Road on his patrol motorcycle, a white 2009 Honda Motorcycle LTD, and had the red and blue lights activated, the report stated.

Quigley "failed to yield right of way" when exiting the private drive and pulled out in front of a pickup that was towing a boat before crossing into Kennedy's path, according to the report.

Kennedy's motorcycle struck the front left quarter panel of the Nissan, causing him to be thrown over the Nissan Rogue near Albert Street, according to the report.

During an interview with investigators, Quigley stated that the driver of the pickup pulling the boat "motioned for her to pull out of the parking lot," according to the report.

Quigley was taken to Community Medical Center by SAPD and Payne was taken to Shannon Medical Center by ambulance.

Kennedy was taken to Shannon Medical Center by ambulance and died at 6:39 p.m., according to the report.

"It's a sad thing that this had to happen," said Vasquez, adding that the indictment "doesn't bring Korby back and it doesn't take away the pain...but the driver needs to be held accountable."

Thousands of people attended Kennedy's memorial service at Foster Communications Coliseum in early July.

Kennedy's was the first death of an active SAPD officer since Apprentice Officer Paul Book was killed in an off-duty crash in October 2008.

by consumers sometime in the past.

According to complaints, the person calling says the consumer can either appear in court and pay the alleged debt — which varies from \$1,000 to \$7,000 — or resolve the matter immediately by sending funds directly to the scammers.

How the debt was incurred is never explained. The form of payment requested by the caller is either through prepaid cash cards or wired funds through Western Union.

"Every day, Texans unfortunately lose money to scams and frauds, and my office is committed to protecting consumers by spreading the word about such fraudulent activity, and informing them about what to do if they fall victim," Paxton said. "The first line of defense against scammers and con artists is education and a wide variety of important topics are addressed in the consumer protection section of our website."

Crockett County Appraisal District Reminds Businesses to Render their Taxable Property by April 15

If you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income, you must file a rendition with the Crockett County Appraisal District by April 15, 2016.

A rendition is a report that lists all the taxable property you owned or controlled on Jan. 1 of this year. Property includes inventory and equipment used by a business. Owners do not have to render exempt property, such as church property or an agriculture producer's equipment used for farming.

"The appraisal district may use the information submitted in the rendition to set property values," said Rhonda Shaw, Chief Appraiser.

You can also file a report of decreased value to notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation of your property. "For example, if your property was damaged by a storm, flood or fire last year, you should file a report of decreased value. The appraisal district will look at your property before assigning a value in 2016," said Shaw.

The last day to file a rendition or report of decreased value is April 15, 2016. If a rendition is filed late or incomplete or not at all, a 10 percent to 50 percent penalty may be imposed. Property owners who need more time to file their renditions may file a written request with the chief appraiser on or before April 15 to receive an automatic extension to May 15 or the next business day. The chief appraiser may also grant an additional 15 days after the postponed deadline, if necessary.

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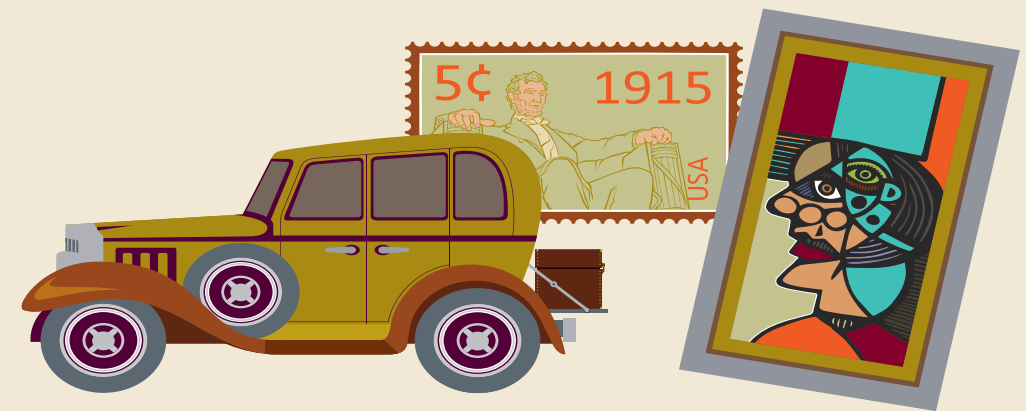
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
