

In the Democratic Primary, incumbent Karen Webb and Annette DeHoyos will face each other for the Crockett County Treasurer's race, and Wesley Bean and Max Schroeder will be on the ballot for the Crockett County Commissioner Precinct 3 race.

Commissioners pick jail construction manager

The Crockett County Commissioners' Court approved Lott Brothers for construction manager at risk for the new Crockett County Jail during a special called meeting Monday.

The Austin-based firm is currently working on a new medical office building for Shannon Medical Center in San Angelo, a new fire station for the City of Killeen, a new wellness center for Gonzales Healthcare Systems and has previously construction projects for Hayes County, Pecos County and juvenile detention centers for Bexar and Travis counties.

Representatives from

the firm gave a presentation at the meeting, as well as representatives from Huser Construction, of Kerrville, and Sedalco Construction, of Fort Worth, who also bid on the project.

Lott Brothers gave bid prices of \$15,000 for pre-construction services, \$225,000 for construction fee, \$326,119 for personnel cost and \$96,207 for support cost.

Crockett County Voters approved a \$6 million bond in November 2015 for a new jail.

Commissioner Pleas Childress said he was impressed that Lott Brothers would work with the Texas

Now is the time to start thinking about taxes

Tax season is over but now is the right time to recap and implement strategies to have an easier process during your next filing season. The beginning of the year for small business owners is usually somehow stressful mainly because of tax season. No matter whether you're a sole proprietor or corporation, if you sell goods or services for financial gain, you should have an accounting structure in place and if you collect sales tax you must send that money to the government. The first questions you will be asked when filing taxes is: What is your accounting period? For alery business it's from Jan. 1-Dec. 31 of the same

year. The year is broken down into quarters and typically you should be paying an estimated tax to both state and federal offices each quarter. But to pay taxes is necessary to keep a record of your sales as well as your expenses. The best way to keep up with it is with preparation during the year.

What is meant with preparation is to gather all of the information required to prepare and file your taxes. This can include bank statements with copies of checks, invoices, a record of the vehicles and equipment that you have bought and sold, business vehicle mileage, and the records of all other expenses. Making this a monthly habit will bring great benefits to you but mainly to your business.

Reviewing your income and expenses on a monthly basis is like reading a book about your business. By looking closely at these challenges and opportunities, you may be able to avoid making some of the same mistakes next year. Keeping track of your income and expenses will show you how much money you need to set aside to pay

your taxes quarterly. I always suggest to my clients to set up a business savings account linked to your checking account and place a percentage of all income there. Pretend it doesn't exist until is time to pay taxes.

Understanding your deductions is crucial. My suggestions for this is to label your receipts of all expenses and to keep all your income and expenses organized. Your accountant will alert you to appropriate deductions.

Your accountant charges you by time, so try to have all paperwork as organized as possible with sufficient notes for them to be able to deduct the type of expense eligible. You can also use a bookkeeping software to assist you in keeping track of all the paperwork. If you're still a small business with few expenses and invoices, you can do it yourself but if you're growing and things are getting complicated, consider hiring an expert.

If school finance system is legal, what's the incentive to fix it?

Texas Supreme Court decision saying the state's school funding system is a big, stinking mess — but not an unconstitutional one — might be just the medicine to keep things just the way they are.

One of the truisms of Texas politics and government is that it's practically impossible to pass significant school finance legislation without an open threat from a court. This is not as cynical as it might sound. The latest lesson came about a year ago, when state Rep. Jimmie Don Aycock, R-Killeen, introduced and then withdrew a sweeping overhaul of how Texas pays for schools.

This time, nearly everybody who was paying attention thought the courts would find something in the current system unconstitutional, and that the resulting ruling could have as much influence over the state budget as the trouble in the state's oil and gas sector.

State District Judge John Dietz ruled that the state's method of paying for schoois was unconstitutional in almost every way: that it didn't give every kid in public schools in Texas access to the same quality education, that it relied so strongly on local funding that it accidentally amounted to a state property tax, and that the state and local spending was too low to meet the academic standards set by the state itself.

That's just a sampling from a pile of legal hurt Judge Dietz dumped on the state of Texas: 200,000 pages of records, 1,508 findings of facts and 118 conclusions of law, according to the Texas Supreme Court.

The state was clearly in for a financial storm, just as soon as that high court reviewed Dietz's ruling and handed down its own. The court heard arguments last September, and the looming school finance decision has been a centerpiece of political and budget presentations ever since.

Those storm preparations were apparently for naught: Hurricane Dietz never made landfall.

In their decision, announced on Friday, the Supremes said the funding system for public schools in Texas is totally fouled up. They detailed some of the troubles. They called it names. They made their plea for change.

But they didn't give re-

found no violations of the Texas Constitution that would force lawmakers to make changes Legislators are running

around like the owner of a smoking, rattling jalopy who has just learned that the car passed a vehicle inspection. The justices could have learned this trick from one of those mechanics who details everything your car needs and then says, "But you can still drive it out of here if you'd like to skip these repairs."

The justices talk fancier than some mechanics, but the message is familiar. "Texas's more than five million school children deserve better than serial litigation over an increasingly Daedalean 'system,' Justice Don Willett wrote for the majority. They deserve transformational, topto-bottom reforms that amount to more than Band-Aid on top of Band-Aid. They deserve a revamped, nonsclerotic system fit for the 21st century.

So here's what happens when the Legislature isn't staring down a muscular court opinion. Aycock, in a Facebook post (he was unavailable for interviews after the court ruling), described what happened to his last effort: "Even the proposed \$3 Billion funding increase left districts divided about how to distribute the money. All wanted the dollars. None wanted the pain of the needed corrections. When added to those who wanted to wait for the court, and those who don't support school funding in general, there was simply no way to get the bill passed. I was probably foolish to try."

He won't be back — he's not seeking another term. He offered some advice. though, writing that the schools shouldn't expect big changes and that the Legislature will never do anything unless the schools can get a consensus of their own.

The courts aren't going to do it. Maybe somebody else will step up.

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High court rules school finance method is constitutional

AUSTIN — The current method devised by the Texas Legislature in 2011 to fund public education does not violate the state constitution, the Texas Supreme Court unanimously ruled May 13.

The lawsuit challenging the state's educationfunding method originally was brought in 2011 by more than 600 school districts identifying themselves collectively as the Texas Taxpayer and Student Fairness Coalition. Lawyers for the coalition argued that the state falls short of the constitution's imperative of equitable funding by failing to provide enough money for school districts' classroom instruction, maintenance and operation and other critical budget areas.

Article 7 of the constitution says: "A general diffusion of knowledge being essential to the preservation of the liberties and rights of the

people, it shall be the duty of the Legislature of the State to establish and make suitable provision for the support and maintenance of an efficient system of public free schools."

In a 100-page ruling, the court said the current system ensures that "all Texas children have access to a quality education that enables them to achieve their potential and fully participate now and in the future in the social, economic, and educational opportunities of our state and nation." The court agreed that the current funding system, while imperfect, is "good enough" to satisfy the constitutional mandate, and going forward, it is up to the Legislature, not the courts, to amend the funding formula.

Gov. Greg Abbott called the ruling "a victory for Texas

taxpayers and the Texas Constitution." Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick, House Speaker Joe Straus, Attorney General Ken Paxton and many Republican lawmakers joined the governor in welcoming the ruling. Paxton echoed the ruling in saying school finance "must be debated and shaped by the Texas Legislature, not through decades' worth of ongoing litigation in the court system."

In contrast, organizations such as the Texas Association of School Boards, the Mexican American Legal Defense and Education Fund, the Texas Democratic Party and a number of Democratic lawmakers expressed disappointment over the ninemember, all-Republican court's ruling.

Sen. Royce West, D-Dallas, said, "The Texas Supreme

Court's ruling held that the state's school funding system met 'minimum constitutional requirements,' turning a cold shoulder to at least twothirds of Texas school districts that were desperately seeking relief from an inequitable, inefficient and unsustainable school PLEASE STATE, PAGE 10


Letha Loudamy Allen

The politics of meat is a 'hot potato'

The World Health Organization (WHO) released a two-page report last October entitled Carcinogenicity of Consumption of Red and Processed Meat. It warned that processed meat categorically causes colorectal cancer in humans, and red meat "probably" does.

Does it matter what the WHO says about meat and cancer? Yes!

WHO's report cited 20 observational or epidemiological studies and made headlines around the world. It had a very significant impact on the status quo about the consumption of meat and health. Most pro meateater critics find the report unconvincing and recognize the statistical information is faulty, and there is very little risk of getting cancer by eating meat, processed or not.

In May 2015, Dr. David Klurfeld, National Program Leader, USDA Agricultural Services, investigated the gaps in understanding the relationship between meat and health. In his published review he states, "Meat is one of the most nutrient dense foods, providing highquality protein, heme-iron, zinc, and vitamins B6 and B12. Despite these advantages, epidemiological studies have linked consumption of red and processed meat with obesity, type 2 diabetes, cardiovascular diseases, and cancers.

Most observational studies report small, increased relative risk. However, there are many limitations of such studies including inability to accurately estimate intake, lack of pre-specified hypotheses, multiple compari-

confounding from many factors including body weight, fruit and vegetable intake, physical activity, smoking,

and alcohol.

sons, and

these can limit the reliability of conclusions from these studies. This observational research is heterogeneous and does not meet the standards to infer cause and effect."

In November 2013, twenty-three cancer experts from eight countries gathered in Norway to look at the science relating to colorectal cancer and lean or processed meat. They concluded that "...the interactions between meat, gut and health outcomes such as CRC [colorectal cancer] are very complex and are not clearly pointing in one direction... Epidemiological and mechanistic data on associations between red and processed meat intake and CRC are inconsistent and underlying mechanisms are unclear...Better biomarkers of meat intake and of cancer occurrence and updated food composition databases are required for future studies."

The truth be known, the WHO looked at over 800 epidemiological and observational human studies of red or processed meat and cancers of all kinds. It chose to base its apocalyptic declaration on studies of CRC alone, out of sixteen types of cancer studied. One can only as-

sume the evidence relating to the other types of cancer was lacking.

Dr. Georgia A. Ede, MD, is a psychiatrist, psychopharmacologist and nutrition consultant. On the epidemiology of red meat and cancer, she states; "Of those 800+ epidemiological studies, a mere 29 were put forth by the WHO as "informative" about the connection between unprocessed red meat and colorectal cancer.

"Of those 29 studies, 14 suggested that red meat was associated with a higher risk for colorectal cancer in humans; 15 of them did not.

On the epidemiology of processed meat and cancer, she adds; "As for processed meat, the WHO chose 27 of the 800+ studies to make its case for the cancer connection.

"Of those 27 studies, 18 suggested that processed meat was associated with a higher risk for colorectal cancer in humans; 9 did not."

For me, it's very simple. Meat has been the major element in our way-of-eating and present in every generation throughout the evolution of humanity; some 2.5 million years. It has enabled us to survive through countless genetic metamorphoses. All our body's systems, faculties and functions evolved and are powered by the nutrients in meat.

Think; if meat gave us cancer, we would not have survived even our first generation. Here's to your health.

The new visitors center and the annual Western Frontier Days will feature appearances and comments by THC Commissioner Gilbert E. "Pete" Peterson, III, THC Executive Director Mark Wolfe, Crockett County Judge Fred Deaton, and others.

"The Fort Lancaster visitors center project highlights the commitment of the Texas Historical Commission and the State of Texas to historic preservation and education," said Jefferson Spilman, site manager, Fort Lancaster. "This renewed building will provide a 21st century experience and ensure the history of Fort Lancaster continues to inspire people of all ages."

The THC recently completed a two-year renovation that includes a new visitors center built from the original building with a substantial new gallery exhibit on the north side.

The new exhibit presents

the story of Fort Lancaster through artifacts, images, scale models, a life-sized camel replica, and an introductory video.

This project marks the first major site improvement since the 1970s, and reflects the THC's commitment to protecting cultural resources while providing enjoyable educational opportunities for the public.



and finished my senior year on the medal stand. These two girls were the two girls that placed with me last year as well, in the same places. I'm so proud of them and glad to say we all competed," Moses said.

Moses followed up with another silver medal later that evening in the 1,600 meters.

She finished with a personal record time of 5 minutes, 20.11 seconds.

"I came in with the third-best time and I ended up PRing by 10 seconds so I was really excited about that," Moses said. "Around the second lap, my legs started feeling heavy and I thought, 'Oh, I want to slow down,' but I knew my coaches were going to kill me if I did so I kept pushing through. About the last 10 meters I knew I had

to go so I gave it everything."
