The Crockett County Commissioners' Court adopted the 2017 County Budget and 2016 tax rates during their regular meeting on Monday.

Lions tear Cranes

CRANE - In a game that came down to the last minute, the Ozona Lions grabbed their first win of the season, 24-21, over Crane Friday night.

Ozona was down 21-17 when Senior Tommy Fay scored the winning the touchdown with less than minute in the game.

Prior to the series, Senior Francisco Rivera sacked Crane Quarterback Kolton Sena, giving Ozona two points and the opportunity to get the ball back for the win. Rivera was also 2-2 on extra-point kicks.

"Overall we won the game up front on both sides. We went into the game knowing we needed to be able to do that and largely dictated the pace of the game. We played better on both sides of the ball and played more physical," said Coach Kyle Freeman.

The Lions would strike first in the game on a 21yard touchdown run by Junior Kobe Rodriquez. Rodriquez would score again in the first quarter on a 30-yard run. He would run for 99 yards on 12 carries for the Lions.

Alpine recovers after high school shooting

A 14-year-old girl shot and wounded another female student, then turned the gun on herself inside Alpine High School last Thursday.

The injured student was taken by private vehicle to Big Bend Regional Medical Center where she was treated and released, and the shooter died at the scene.

The incident occurred around 8:45 a.m. Sept. 8, and prompted a lockdown at Alpine ISD's three campuses. Authorities began evacuating the high school at around 9:15 a.m., and elementary and middle school students were released to their parents around noon.

A U.S. Homeland Security officer responding to the shooting was also injured, shot

in the leg when a U.S. marshall accidentally discharged his weapon. The officer was also taken to the medical center, then transported to an Odessa hospital. He was in stable condition at press time.

County Sheriff Ronny Dodson said of the shooting, "You can believe that we are very upset, our administrators at the school are upset, and we're still in shock."

Dodson said the dead At a Thursday afternoon girl's family had moved to press conference, Brewster Alpine about six months ago,

but declined to provide other details, and authorities haven't released a possible motive for the shooting.

Alpine police Chief Russell Scown said in the emergency's early stages, it wasn't

From the fight for Texas Independence, to the War on Terror, Hispanics have fought and died to protect our shared American values. With several military installations such as Laughlin Air Force Base and Camp Bullis, and major installations such as Joint Base San Antonio and Fort Bliss nearby, there is no better place to revere the selfless sacrifices of Hispanic service members than the 23rd Congressional District of Texas.

Heroes like Private Serna and Corporal Martinez paved the way for thousands of Hispanic service members who now make up over 12 percent of post-9/11 veterans. In 2011, almost 17 percent of all new recruits were of Hispanic descent.

To honor Private Serna and the tens of thousands

ultimate price for our country. At the age of 18, Martinez joined the United States Army and was stationed in Hawaii until the North Korean Communist Forces invaded the Republic of Korea in 1950. While deployed in Korea, Martinez's outpost was attacked by North Korean soldiers. Under heavy enemy fire, Martinez chose to stay behind alone, inflicting numerous casualties on the attacking troops before being mortally wounded, so that his unit could reorganize, counterattack, and regain their ground. Corporal Martinez was awarded the Medal of Honor for his courage and is buried with full military honors at Fort Bliss Cemetery. His memory lives on through the elementary schools that bear his name in both Fort Hancock and El Paso.

Another incredible example of heroism and uncommon valor is Private Marcelino Serna, a Mexican immigrant and the most decorated WWI Veteran from Texas. In a single firefight, Serna's exceptional heroism allowed him to single-handedly kill 26 Germans and capof Hispanic Americans who followed in his footsteps, I introduced a bill to rename the Tornillo Port of Entry after him. This bill passed the House with unanimous support and is currently awaiting action in the Senate. The Tornillo-Marcelino Serna Port of Entry will not only honor this extraordinary man's service to our nation, it will serve as a reminder of the countless Hispanic American immigrants that have fought valiantly to keep our nation safe. Their sacrifices will not be forgotten.

As Texans, we should embrace the lasting impact that Hispanic Americans have made on our lives and communities. Hispanic Heritage Month offers us an opportunity to celebrate, spread awareness about, and pay tribute to Hispanic Americans who have contributed so much to preserve our way of life. I am grateful for the future generations who will continue the tradition.

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Paxton says subpoena of corporation's records violated First Amendment

AUSTIN — Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton on Sept. 9 announced he had filed a friend-of-the-court brief "in defense of the First Amendment."

The brief, he said, explains that Massachusetts Attorney General Maura Tracy Healey "exceeded her constitutional authority by attempting to shut down a viewpoint on an issue of scientific debate climate change."

Paxton, in the brief, states constitutional objections to the Civil Investigative Demand that Healey issued to ExxonMobil Corporation for its marketing and sale of fossil fuel-derived products and securities. She demanded more than 40 years of internal company documents. Paxton supports ExxonMobil's effort seeking to block Healy's demand from being enforced.

Paxton was joined by the state attorneys general of Louisiana, South Carolina, Alabama, Michigan, Arizona,

Worth to grant ExxonMobil's motion for a preliminary injunction against the subpoena. On the other side, the at-

torneys general of Maryland, New York, Illinois, Iowa, Maine, Minnesota, Mississippi, New Mexico, Oregon, Rhode Island, Vermont, Washington, the District of Columbia and the U.S. Virgin Islands joined in an Aug. 8 friend-ofthe-court brief in support of Healey's action.

U.S. Rep. Lamar Smith, R-Texas, chair of the House Committee on Science, Space and Technology, in July subpoenaed Healey to submit documents and information to the committee pursuant to the Civil Investigative Demand. Healey responded, claiming common law and

statutory privileges in her decision not to comply with the committee's subpoena.

HEGAR DISTRIBUTES REVENUE

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar on Sept. 8 announced he would send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts \$629.2 million in local sales tax allocations for September.

The amount, based on sales made in July by businesses that report tax monthly, is 1.4 percent less than the amount distributed in September 2015.

"The cities of Houston, Midland, San Antonio and Frisco saw decreases in sales tax allocation," Hegar said. "The cities of Dallas and Plano saw noticeable increases in sales tax allocations."

DATABASE READY FOR USE

Comptroller Hegar on Sept. 6 announced the debut of a statewide online eminent domain database, a publicly available tool making it possible to identify which governmental and non-governmental entities have reported to the Comptroller's office their authority to exercise eminent

"The special tour will allow visitors to imagine what it must have been like to live and work at Fort Lancaster during the mid-1800s" said Jefferson Spilman, Fort Lancaster Site Manager.

Visitors will also participate in raising the flag over the historic fort grounds. The tour begins at the Visitor's Center at 10 a.m., visitors are asked to arrive a few minutes early. Fort Lancaster State Historic Site, a Texas Historical Commission property, spans 82 acres and commemorates the remnants of a fort built in the 1850s to protect the road between San Antonio

The site contains the ruins of what once constituted a sizable military installation as well as an interpretive trail. The site recently completed a two-year renovation that includes a new Visitors Center built from the original building with a substantial new gallery exhibit on the north side.

The new exhibit presents the story of Fort Lancaster through artifacts, images, scale models, a life-sized camel replica, and introductory video.

Wikipedia, the free encyclopedia defines an electrolyte as, "a substance that produces an electrically conducting solution when dissolved in a polar solvent, such as water... This includes most soluble salts, acids, and bases... Sodium, potassium, chloride, calcium, magnesium, and phosphate are examples of electrolytes, informally known as "lytes"."

Even when situations are less than extreme, electrolyte replacement may be warranted and is especially indicated when someone has prolonged vomiting or diarrhea, and as maintenance after strenuous, athletic-type activity. There are commercial electrolyte solutions for sick children and for athletes (sports drinks).

"The primary ions of electrolytes are sodium (Na+), potassium (K+), calcium (Ca2+), magnesium (Mg2+), chloride (Cl-), hydrogen phosphate (HPO42-), and hydrogen carbonate (HCO3-). The electric charge symbols of plus (+) and minus (-) indicate that the substance is ionic in nature and has an imbalanced distribution of electrons, the result of chemical dissociation."

Inside the body's physiology, electrolytes serve to complete electrical exchanges both inside and outside the cell, and water is the medium with which electrical interactions take place. Sodium (salt) is the main electrolyte found in fluid outside the cell and potassium is the main electrolyte inside the cell; both help to balance fluids and blood pressure.

"All known higher lifeforms require a subtle and complex electrolyte balance between the intracellular and extracellular environments... Such gradients affect and regulate the hydration of the body as well as blood pH, and are critical for nerve and muscle function. Various mechanisms exist in living

Calcium - helps muscle to contract, nerve signaling, blood clotting, cell division, and bone and tooth formation and maintenance;

Potassium - helps keep blood pressure levels stable, regulates heart contractions, helps with muscle functions;

Magnesium - is needed for muscle contractions, heart rhythms, nerve functioning, bone-building and strength, the reduction of anxiety, in digestion, and keeping a stable protein-tofluid balance;

Sodium - helps regulate fluid balance and nerve signaling, and is used in muscle contractions;

Chloride - regulates fluid balance.

With so many varying roles in the body, even minor disparities can cause changes that will be readily apparent. The type of electrolyte deficiency and its level of presence in any given combination of other electrolyte deficiencies can cause numerous symptoms to occur - muscle aches, spasms, twitches and weakness; restlessness; anxiety; frequent headaches; feely very thirsty; insomnia; fever; heart palpitations or irregular heartbeats; digestive issues like cramps, constipation or diarrhea; confusion and trouble concentrating; bone disorders; joint pain; blood pressure changes; changes in appetite or body weight; fatigue (including chronic fatigue

White said they received good participation in the bid process, with multiple bids for electrical, mechanical and plumbing. He said they received less bids on concrete.

White said Ozona's location made it difficult to solicit bids. He said a typical project bids \$150,000 on utilities and the bids for the jail came in at \$295,000 on utilities.

"I think we've reached all the sub-contractors that would come here. We can work through these items and give you all a product that still meets all the standards," White said. "There needs to be some substantial change in the design in order to get the project to the budget."

County Judge Fred Deaton said bids on the new health clinic came in lower than the \$3 million budget.

"This is hard for me to understand now. Those contractors were certainly willing to build," Deaton said. "We don't believe being a rural area has hurt us this bad before.'

Gondeck said the clinic is not a jail, which has heavier construction and more concrete.

Gondeck said he could work with White and Sheriff Robert Rodriguez and look at cutting areas of the building and design that are not requirements and then bidding the project again.

"We put it out to the public, we voted on a certain price and that is what we are trying to hit," said Commissioner Pleas Childress. "We don't want a substandard jail."

Rodriguez said he was disappointed in the whole process.

"I went door to door, coffee shop to coffee shop and I had a hard time selling this. We've got to find a way to make it work. I don't want a butchered down building that within a few months the jail commission will come and shut the jail down. I want to fix it the best way I can. I'm the one people are looking at," Rodriguez said.

The commissioners approved to authorize Lott Brothers and DRG Architects to revise and re-solicit pricing on new jail project.

WELLNESS CENTER

Architects Rick Burnight and Sarah Bowers presented drawings and floor plans about the wellness center.

The commissioners, along with members of the wellness center board, offered suggestions for interior colors, flooring, as well as type of equipment to be used. The proposed exterior will match the new clinic being built across the street.

In November 2015, Crockett County Voters approved a \$4 million bond for the new wellness center.

The building will include an indoor swimming pool, open gym with various exercise equipment, two open exercise rooms with one that can be divided, locker rooms and a .1 mile walking trail on the outside of the building.

In the open gym, the architects showed room for six treadmills, five stationary bicycles, a utility bench, four elliptical machines, 12 strength equipment machines, three adjustable benches and two dumbbell racks.

Pricing for exercise equipment ranges from \$71,000 to \$108,000 depending on the type of equipment. The project has \$175,000 budgeted for exercise equipment.

Construction budget is estimated at \$2.9 million.

is clearly an area in which transparency is absolutely essential," Hegar said. "Knowing who can use eminent domain is the first step to ensuring that this potentially oppressive power is used wisely."

The database was created to comply with Senate Bill 1812, legislation approved during the 2015 legislative session. The bill requires public and private entities with eminent domain authority to report certain information to the Comptroller's office.

Currently, the database contains 5,042 entities, including cities, counties, school districts, special purpose districts, pipeline and energy companies, water supply corporations, telecommunications companies and other public and private entities.


