First Baptist Church celebrating 125 years

OZONA, TEXAS

The First Baptist Church of Ozona will be celebrating 125 years this weekend with two days of special events.

On Saturday, April 22, there will be a barbecue meal from 4-6 p.m. at the town square in front of the church.

At 6 p.m. there will be a "Singsperation" in the church sanctuary.

Everyone is invited to come fellowship and sing along to old hymns.

On Sunday, April 23, Sunday School will be at 9:45 a.m., followed by a Celebratory Worship Service at 11 a.m. with former preacher, Brother Bill Fuller, bringing God's word and former music minister, Nanette Verner, providing special music.

A pot luck dinner will follow the service at the Hoover Building.

Everyone is invited to attend all the events this

"We can't wait to see and meet past friends and family of FBC Ozona," said Roylan Sullivan. "Everyone is invited."

The church's history dates back to April 3, 1892. At 4 p.m. that day, a small group of Baptist people met in the old frame school house at Ozona to organize

a Baptist Church.

In the little there were two preachers, J.W. Cunningham and T.R. Legett. The former was a missionary under the Board of the Concho Valley Association, who had preached in Ozona several times before and was destined to become the first pastor of the little church. Of the latter, little is known except that he was probably a missionary under the same board with Brother Cunningham and was the Clerk of the Concho Valley Association, according to an ar-

ticle written by Mrs. James Childress and Mrs. Ira Carson in the Crockett County

History Book. Upon a call from the council, seven persons, all accredited members of regular Baptist Churches, were organized into what was known as the Baptist Church of Ozona. The members of this group were Mr. and Mrs. F.M. Drake, Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Bean. Mr. and Mrs. S.T.

Smith and Alma Vee Smith. The church called J.W. Cunningham as Pastor and elected W .B. Bean as Church Clerk. The date of regular meeting was set as the first Sunday in each month with conference to be on the Saturday preceding. The election of deacons was postponed to a future date, but the men soon elected and ordained were W.B. Bean and S.T. Smith.

The church had only 39 members when they undertook the construction of their house of worship which was to cost \$2,500.

Then in 1902, six Sunday School rooms were

Remembering a hero, and saying 'thank you' too late

I must have stared at the gray text box on my phone for a long minute trying to comprehend the message.

"You've probably already heard," my sister had written, "but Bennie Ray Ross died on Friday, 3/31."

No, I hadn't heard, and a quite inexplicable sadness came over me. I never met Bennie Ray in person, though we talked on the phone about three years ago. Bennie Ray's been an integral part of our family's story for more than a half century.

I looked at the text and though I can well recite the details of the incident Nov. 4, 1965, when my dad, former Terrell County Sheriff Bill C. Cooksey, was shot and left for dead by a Mexican bandit he was trying to apprehend a few miles outside of Dryden, it occurred to me we never said a proper thank you to Bennie Ray.

We suppose Bennie Ray was the last of the four men — five if you count the bandit — still living who were on the hill that fateful day.

As my sister would point out in another text, "if you think about it, he was a hero.

I can't recall the incident without returning to being a 13-year-old girl. My time reverse puts me back in 1965 in a split second, so adjusting to the idea almost 52 years have passed is difficult.

Therefore, I can't fathom Bennie Ray as a husband; a father, who had to bury a daughter; a grandfather and great-grandfather; a Vietnam War veteran; a 70-year-old man known for his marksmanship and good stories. Information I learned from

He will always be that "19-year-old kid" of 1965, out of school and just sort of hang-

Dryden. Even before the incident on the

hill, Dad would mention Bennie Ray now and again. Dad had a way of "being there" for guys in their boy-to-man life transitions and Bennie Ray was one he figured could use a little guidance.

He'd been 8-years-old when his mother died. The 1950s' drought had put his dad out of the ranching business.

That fall, there'd been a spree of burglaries at the ranches around Dryden. Such random things were taken, there was a theory "kids" were likely responsible and Dad asked Bennie Ray to keep watch and report anything suspicious. Bennie Ray was dedicated to the charge, and that did two things — kept him busy, and from being a suspect.

On that fateful Thursday morning, a Mexican ranch hand searching for strayed goats happened on a cave with some of the oddball stolen goods stashed inside. He'd come into Dryden to report the find, and it so happened Dad was in the cafe, having lunch.

The find was considered significant, so a little posse

Bad stuff in Austin...House bills would stifle press coverage, free speech

The House State Affairs Committee heard testimony on two bills last week that would dismantle the reporter's shield law and make it more difficult for news organizations to defend defamation lawsuits.

Media outlets are up in arms about the bills sponsored by state Rep. Ken King, R-Canadian, and legal experts testified during the hearing that both measures are unconstitutional.

It would be nice if King would just say the purpose of his bill is to punish Empower Texans, the ultra-conservative political group headed by Michael Quinn Sullivan and financially backed

by Midland oil and gas billionaire Tim Dunn. It's the worst-kept

to measure if Republican legislative members are conservative enough for its liking.

If not, the group will often find a primary opponent to take on the incumbent Republican. Thus far, Empower Texans and Sullivan have been the perfect foil for Straus, who has been speaker since 2009 and has vanquished opposition from some of the more conservative House Republicans.

Empower Texans also publishes a website and newsletter, and considers itself a news organization. Even though most people consider them political advocates and lobbyists instead

of professional journalists, the group has successfully used the journalist status as a defense in several court cases.

One of King's bills would prevent a reporter from relying on the shield law if the reporter or the news organization he works for has made a political expenditure, been a treasurer of a campaign, or controlled a political action committee within the last five years.

The other bill tries to change a constitutional privilege created by the First Amendment and recognized in the 1964 U.S. Supreme Court ruling in New York Times v. Sullivan for stories about pub-

lic officials and public figures.

King's awful reporter's shield law bill has a Senate companion bill sponsored by Sen. Kel Seliger, R-Amarillo. If either bill became law, they would have a chilling effect on news gathering and likely cause a rash of new lawsuits.

No matter how you feel about Empower Texans, the Texas Legislature shouldn't be trampling on free speech rights as a way to silence critics.

As University of Texas media law professor David Donaldson testified, "I think it's a very bad idea for the Legislature to become involved in deciding questions about who a journalist is based on their political beliefs or based on their decision to become involved in politics."

This is a misguided effort to change well-established laws that allow reporters to protect their sources and encourage whistleblowers to come forward to report wrongdoing and government corruption.

It would also meddle with a long-held legal tradition that allows the press to hold elected officials and other public figures accountable.

Thriving communities depend on public libraries

ibraries are changing. While traditional activities such as borrowing books or reading still dominate use of libraries, Pew Research Institute studies show the American public today relies on libraries to teach digital skills, provide working spaces and address the disparity among citizens who have or don't have broadband internet services at home. Libraries also are breaking physical boundaries as they become more embedded in shopping malls, community centers and student unions on college campuses.

Librarians are champions for literacy of young children, adults seeking workforce readiness and seniors who are lifelong learners. They provide freedom of imagination through books and help curious minds cross the distance of the globe and experience different cultures and perspectives without leaving their chairs — using the latest technology.

The expansion of information and technological skills make librarians effective contributors to our local communities. Their skills and expertise are highly valued in the business world as well as the public sector. An increasing number of graduates with library and information science degrees are being chosen for unconventional careers. For example, recent Texas Woman's University graduates have been selected for positions such as a law librarian of a U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals, a research analyst in an intelligence agency, a records manager for a municipal government office, a knowledge manager in a financial services firm and a curator of an arts foundation, to name a few.

The librarians we educate are fierce freedom protectors. They defend citizens' rights to access information, and safeguard their privacy in choosing what they read and information they seek. And they often help citizens present this information using current technology and digital communication channels. In today's confusing public discourse, librarians know how to separate factual information from fabricated news, and help people determine what is current, relevant, authoritative, and

appropriate information for their particular purposes. Libraries are a safe haven for the community. Librarians in Ferguson, Baltimore, Dallas and other cities were "second respond-

ers" who welcomed students into their libraries when schools were closed, facilitated the space for meaningful civic dialogues among residents, and worked alongside neighbors to restore the physical and mental health of their own community.

Librarians are among the strongest advocates for our local communities. They are trusted and resourceful, and they identify community assets to build coalitions with colleges, schools, business and other organizations.

Funding from the federal Institute of Museum and Library Services alone helps more than 500 public libraries in Texas improve the quality of technology, keep children reading through summer months and provide free internet services to those who otherwise might not be able to afford the basic technology.

Federal and state funding for libraries is an essential public tax investment for our local communities. A study by the Bureau of Business Research IC2 Institute at the University of Texas at Austin found that Texas public libraries provide a return on investment of \$4.64 for each dollar invested. This data-intensive research determined that, collectively in FY 2015, public libraries provided \$2.628 billion in benefits while using only \$566 million of public tax investment.

It is the collaborative efforts of librarians working with residents to care for our communities that keep Texas strong. It's the collective voice of all who stand together to protect the soul of our communities that makes America great. Libraries deserve our continued support.

Federal judge says again, Texas voter ID law is discriminatory

AUSTIN — U.S. District Judge Nelva Gonzales Ramos of Corpus Christi on April 10 ruled the State of Texas has failed to prove that the voter identification law was not written with discriminatory intent and purpose.

The ruling came in response to a charge by the New Orleans-based U.S. Court of Appeals for the Fifth Circuit that Judge Ramos re-examine the evidence and her 2015 findings in Veasey et al., plaintiffs, v. Greg Abbott et al., defendants.

Plaintiffs alleged racial discrimination in violation of the U.S. Voting Rights Act of 1965 in response to the passage of Senate Bill 14 by the Texas Legislature in 2011. The law changed the list of acceptable forms of identification voters may use at polls and enacted other restrictions. The State of Texas argued that the law was passed not with a discriminatory purpose, but to combat voter fraud at the polls.

Ramos wrote that lawyers for the State of Texas failed to demonstrate that the law would have been enacted without a discriminatory purpose. Ramos said SB 14 violates Section 2 of the Voting Rights Act, a provision that generally prohibits the enforcement of discriminatory voting laws.


Ramos, under a directive issued by the Fifth Circuit last summer, prescribed an interim voting plan for Texas to overcome discriminatory effects in the voter ID law in time for the November 2016 general election. It is up to the Texas Legislature to craft a state law that does not violate the federal voting rights law.

Meanwhile, legislation filed in the current session of the Texas Legislature by Sen. Joan Huffman, R-Houston, addresses federal court issues with the voter ID law. Huffman's SB 5 was passed on March 28 by the Republican-dominated Senate on a 21-10, party-line vote and now awaits a hearing by the House Elections Committee.

HEGAR DISTRIBUTES REVENUE

"The cities of Houston, San Antonio, Dallas and Austin saw noticeable increases in sales tax allocations," Hegar said. "The cities of Sugar Land, McAllen, Irving and Grand Prairie saw noticeable decreases."

consisting of Alfredo Gallegos, the ranch hand; Lewis Cash, a former border patrolman; and Dad, who invited Bennie Ray to come along for the ride, was formed.

Well, the story's become a West Texas legend. The short of it is, when the four got to the cave, the bandit was hiding inside. They thought the bandit would go peacefully, but in a surprise move, he shot Dad and took his gun from his belt front; then marched the other three up the hill and ordered Gallegos to tie up Lewis and Bennie Ray before making Gallegos drive him toward the border.

Bennie Ray wriggled loose from his bindings and untied Lewis, who got busy hot-wiring the second pickup while Bennie Ray checked on Dad, who was badly wounded. They devised a plan for Bennie Ray to try and stop a train they suspected would be passing soon on tracks about a mile away.

The fact Bennie Ray got the train to stop was quite a feat, and — in retrospect — vital in saving Dad's life. The engineer's radio equipment could send the call for help farther and faster. But, of course, there were several heroes on that hill that day.

Dad's recovery took months, and in August 1966 the bandit, Alfredo Hernandez, was captured in a shootout in Dryden. Until then, the random burglaries continued and in Dad's absence, Bennie Ray was questioned and made to take a lie detector test. He wasn't involved, but to even be questioned was a bitter pill for Bennie Ray to swallow. Amends should have been made.

It's too late to make the apologies now, or say thanks properly. But maybe there are those who knew Bennie Ray — or didn't — who will stop for a moment and remember a good man who did the right thing at the right time.

We are — and will always be — grateful.



added to the building and the entire structure was repainted. This building served the congregation well for 28 years, but on Sunday morning, June 2, 1928, the Baptist Church voted unanimously to enter into a new building program. A building committee was appointed composed of the following members: Ira Carson, chairman, A.C. Hoover, Mrs. Laura Hoover, Ray Dunlap, J.T. Keeton, F.A. Gray and Mrs. S.L. Butler.

The present building was formally opened for regular worship on May 5, 1929 with the Rev. M.M. Fulmer as pastor.

As the church grew, two annexes were added. The north wing annex had its formal opening on Sept. 30, 1951, when Clifton Tennison was pastor, and consists of a fellowship hall, kitchen and classrooms. The west annex to the church is known as the Education Building, and houses classrooms, nursery, church office and the pastor's study. This building was erected in 1960 during the pastorate of Harry Trulove.

Mark Fricke is the current pastor of the church. He started in November 2016.







Texas landowners need fairness and transparency in eminent domain proceedings was the statement from Texas Farm Bureau President Russell Boening as he testified in support of HB 2684 before the House Land and Resource Management Committee.

The bill, filed by Rep. De-Wayne Burns (R-Cleburne), outlines requirements that would make eminent domain a more fair process for private property owners.

"We feel like there are too few checks and balances in place to ensure the eminent domain process is exercised appropriately," Boening said. "We've heard it from our members before where landmen admitted they were authorized to make that initial offer 'low enough.' If that initial offer had not been so low, maybe that awarded offer would not seem so high."

Texas landowners face a future of continued demand for their land. With many potential projects on the horizon, proponents of the bill are looking for a legislative fix.

"When offers are too low, the landowners' only choice is to settle or be sued," Boening said. "If you don't have the money to hire an attorney, you settle. Those who hire an attorney and win, you're still not going to be adequately compensated. You pay your attorney."

HB 2684 would provide a disincentive for condemning entities to provide landowners with lowball offers, and therefore offering a fair market price up front.

The condemnation process is not a willing buyer and a willing seller," Boening said. "Landowners are often land rich and cash poor. It's important that their land be thought of in its full value.

Emergency preparation supplies sales tax holiday April 22-24

BY LAUREN WILLIS AND CHRIS BRYAN TEXAS COMPTROLLER OF PUBLIC ACCOUNTS

With the potential for severe weather approaching this spring, Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar reminds Texans they can purchase certain items tax free during the state's sales tax holiday for emergency preparation supplies, April 22-24.

"Unfortunately, we can't predict when the next fire, flood or tornado may strike," Hegar said. "But we can be prepared, and this tax holiday helps Texans save money while stocking up for emergency situations before they happen."

There's no limit on the number of qualifying items you can purchase. These include:

· batteries, fuel containers and flashlights priced at less than \$75;

· hurricane shutters and emergency ladders priced at less than \$300; and

· portable generators priced at less than \$3,000. Purchases that do not

qualify include:

· batteries for automobiles, boats and other motorized vehicles;

· camping stoves and camping supplies;

· chainsaws;

· plywood;

· extension ladders and stepladders; and

tents

seat belts.

A list of emergency preparation supplies that may be purchased tax free can be found on the Comptroller's website at https://comptroller.texas.gov/taxes/publications/98-1017.php.

The Comptroller's office estimates shoppers will save \$1.5 million in state and local sales taxes during the tax holiday, approved by lawmakers during the 2015 Texas Legislature.




