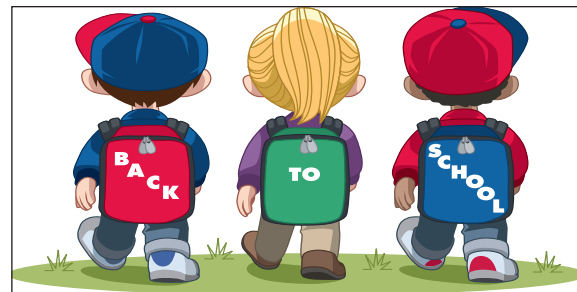

Macias pleads guilty for goat theft

An Ozona man has pled guilty for stealing livestock from a local rancher.

Joe John Macias, aka Joe Macias, 45, pled guilty in 112th District Court last month for theft of livestock, a third-degree felony.

Macias was sentenced to five years community supervision, \$9,360.61 in restitution, 160 hours of community service, \$305 court costs and a \$60 monthly supervision fee by District Judge Pete Gomez Jr., according to court documents.

Macias was indicted in April as part of a group of men accused of stealing livestock from local rancher Larry Williams.

Angel Tambunga Fierro, 58, Guillermo Tambunga Fierro, aka Willie Fierro, 61, and Polo Fuentes Sanchez Jr., aka Paul Sanchez, 53, were also indicted with engaging in organized criminal activity and theft from the elderly a first-degree felony (enhanced), which is punishable by a prison sentence of five to 99 years or life and a fine

Gallego mulling third match with Hurd

Less than a year after he lost his bid to reclaim his U.S. House seat, former U.S. Rep. Pete Gallego, D-Alpine, is seriously considering another run for Congress, citing shifting political winds in Texas' 23rd Congressional District following the election of President Donald Trump.

A 2018 campaign would be Gallego's third against U.S. Rep. Will Hurd, R-Helotes, who unseated the one-term Gallego in 2014. Gallego then unsuccessfully challenged Hurd two years later, losing by 3,051 votes — an outcome Gallego believes would be much different if the election were held today.

"It's certainly a different environment out there today than it was six

For three Texas leaders, some losses could be victories

The special session of the Texas Legislature could come out like a soccer tournament for 5-year-olds: No matter what happens, everybody gets a trophy.

The layout of this legislative overtime is familiar: 20 issues, a maximum of 30 days, one must-pass issue and 19 that would make this or that political group happy. Failure to address that must-pass issue is really the only thing that could make lawmakers look incompetent. It's about maintaining the operation of five agencies — including the one that licenses doctors to practice in Texas — for another two years.

This one is easy. Nobody's against it. Had the politics of the moment worked out differently, this special session would have lasted less than a week.

Now we're approaching the halfway point of the 30 days that the special session can last. The Senate zipped through Gov. Greg Abbott's agenda, not surprising because the big items on the list started with Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick and got a warm welcome on his end of the Capitol: bathrooms, property taxes, education vouchers and so on.

The House is moving slowly, but it's moving. Abbott is waiting for things to sign or veto, and he has apparently backed off a public threat to keep score on which lawmakers were with him, against him or uncommitted.

He wants all 20 of the items on his agenda written into the law books, as does Patrick. Speaker Joe Straus and the House have resisted some of those things and have differences of opinion about some of them. They disagree with proposals to regulate transgender Texans' use of public bathrooms; that one will have a hard time in the House, where Straus has taken a stand against it. The two chambers have differences to reconcile on legislation that attempts to slow future increases in local property taxes. There are even disagreements on trees, with the governor asking lawmakers to countermand local efforts to control when property owners can cut down big trees. The House's response was to pass legislation that the governor has previously vetoed.

Some of what the governor has asked for will make it to his desk. His chances of getting all 20 issues in a

form he likes are slim. And this is where those participation trophies come into play.

If this episode ended with no new laws other than that agency "sunset" legislation and perhaps a fix to the state's health care insurance for retired teachers, each of the state's top three officials and most of its state legislators could return home as victors.

While the governor would love to check 20 boxes on his list, one will suffice, if it's that must-do sunset legislation, because he can honestly tell voters that he did what he could with a dysfunctional Legislature. His win was in the list itself, establishing him as an incumbent governor in line politically with the most conservative statewide official in Texas: Patrick.

That's how Patrick gets his trophy even if the session falls well short of his and the governor's goal: He represented the stalwart culture warriors in the GOP from soup to nuts, beginning before this year's regular session with his own list of conservative issues, a promise that they would get the Senate's coveted low bill numbers and attention. Straus is Patrick in reverse. He's been the stalwart of the traditional Republican establishment, the chamber-of-commerce types noted more for economic conservatism than social conservatism. They're squeamish about the bathroom bill, protective of public education and, like almost every group in Texas, really angry about rising property taxes. Like Patrick's backers, they'll hail Straus for taking up the fight, and he can enter 2018 the same way Patrick does, calling on Republican voters to send reinforcements.

With up to two weeks of potential special session mistakes and misadventures ahead of us, this appears to be working — in a political sense.

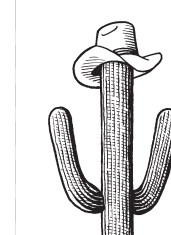
Three state leaders, three trophies. Plus, Texas might still be regulating doctors a month from now.

House, Senate have not yet engaged in back-and-forth on key bills

AUSTIN — Not a single bill had been agreed to by the state House and Senate as of July 28, exactly 10 days into the 30-day special session of the Texas Legislature.

Lawmakers have a tall order served up to them by Gov. Greg Abbott in the form of 20 must-resolve matters in the first called session of the 85th Texas Legislature. Something could be on Abbott's desk in short order if top-priority "sunset" legislation to ensure the continuation of the Texas Medical Board and several other healthcare-related state oversight boards gains approval by both chambers. The Senate's version is SB 20 by Van Taylor, R-Plano; the House has produced two versions: HB 1 and HB 2, both by Larry Gonzales, R-Round Rock. There are enough differences in the bills to spark elongated floor debates, if lawmakers are so inclined. Last week, both chambers moved beyond the as-yet un-

resolved sunset legislation.

The House approved and forwarded two bills to the Senate: HB 7 by Dade Phelan, R-Beaumont, legislation creating a tree planting credit to offset tree removal fees imposed by a municipality, and HB 13 by Giovanni Caprigione, R-Southlake, creating reporting requirements for abortion providers about surgical complications.

A number of Senate bills have gained approval and now await consideration by the House. Those bills would, for example:

- Reform how local property tax rates are set and the tax programs administered;
- Revise school finance;
- Prevent the transfer of state funding to any healthcare provider that also performs abortions;
- Amend municipal annexation laws;

- Enable a constitutional limit on the rate of growth in appropriations; and

- Add new requirements for do-not-resuscitate orders.

Along with SB 3, the "bathroom bill" by Lois Kolkhorst, R-Brenham — legislation that cleared the Senate and now awaits consideration by the House — there are a number of bills with the potential to ignite time-consuming tussles between the upper and lower chambers.

House Speaker Joe Straus, R-San Antonio, has signaled his disapproval for the bathroom bill, despite pressure from Gov. Abbott and Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick, who have more or less agreed as to how public schools might accommodate transgender students.

EDUCATION BILL MOVES

The full Senate on July 25 tentatively approved SB 2,

school finance reform legislation by Senate Education Chair Larry Taylor, R-Friendswood.

SB 2 contains \$212 million in additional spending over and above appropriations passed during the regular legislative session, to help needy school districts bridge funding gaps

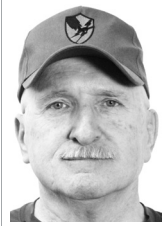

What's the deal about monitoring blood sugar?



HERE'S TO YOUR HEALTH

JIM FISH

The purpose of diabetes treatment and self-management is to bring blood sugar (BS) or blood glucose (BG) as close to optimal levels, and maintain it, as much as possible. But, what is "optimum", relative to levels of blood sugar?

First, "blood sugar" and "blood glucose" are used interchangeably and mean the same thing.

The Diabetes Self-Management website advises, "Sugar is the general name for sweet carbohydrates that dissolve in water. "Carbohydrate" means a food made only of carbon, oxygen, and hydrogen. [Note: All carbohydrates convert to glucose in varying levels, in the blood stream.]

"There are various different kinds of sugars. The one our body uses most is called "glucose." Other sugars we eat, like fructose from fruit or lactose from milk, are converted into glucose in our bodies. Then we can use them for energy. Our bodies also break down starches, which are sugars stuck together, into glucose."

FYI; any micronutrient ending with the suffix "ose" is sugar. However, the food and medical industries use over a hundred different terms to denote the various sugars present in our foods. (A list of many of these terms can be downloaded from the internet or by requesting a list from me using the contact info below.)

BS/BG is usually measured in milligrams of glucose per deciliter (des-uh-lee-ter) of blood (mg/dl). When fasting the optimum BG is 70-85 mg/dl; and postprandial, 2 hours after meals, the optimum BG is 130 mg/dl or less; however, these numbers will vary throughout the day.

There is a long-term glucose test called a hemoglobin A1c (HbA1c or A1C). This test gives your average reading for the previous 2 to 3 months. HbA1c is expressed as a percentage. Normal for a person with-

out diabetes is below 5.7 percent (average of 117 mg/dl) or lower. Targets for a person with diabetes recommended by the ADA are 7.0 percent (average of 154 mg/dl) or lower

if you want tight control. If you have diabetes, the American Diabetes Association (ADA) advises you that your normal blood sugar levels before meals are from 80-130 mg/dl and your levels an hour or two after meals under 180. Since science has established the blood toxicity threshold at 140 mg/dl, people with diabetes and doctors are advised to shoot for levels closer to those of people without diabetes.

When the BG gets to 140 mg/dl, the blood become toxic (hyperglycemia) to the body's organs and tissues... inflammation becomes rampant in blood vessels and nerves. This is where all the complications of diabetes begin. To make things worse, malnutrients and toxic chemicals exact their toll by way of chronic hyperglycemia, advancing Diabetes Mellitus, cancer, heart disease and a huge number of auto immune disorders.

"In people without diabetes, normal insulin function keeps sugars in a normal range. When you have diabetes, insulin function is damaged. You need to give your body conscious help, by eating right, exercising, taking medications or herbs, and reducing stress." - Diabetes Self-Management.

"Blood glucose is commonly considered too high if it is higher than 130 mg/dl before... However, most of the signs and symptoms of high blood glucose don't appear until the blood glucose level is higher than 250 mg/dl. Some of the symptoms

have a rapid onset, while others require a long period of high blood glucose to set in."

"The classic symptoms of high blood glucose are polyuria, polydipsia, and polyphagia. In plain English, that means excessive urination, excessive thirst, and excessive hunger."

Another symptom of Type 2 Diabetes is urinary tract infections (UTIs) and yeast infections; while most common in women and more so in women with diabetes, UTIs can occur in both men and women. Other symptoms include slow-healing of cuts and wounds; dry, itchy skin; diabetic dermopathy (unique to people with diabetes) shows up as scaly circular or oval patches of discolored skin resembling age spots; blurred vision; headaches and difficulty concentrating; fatigue; chronic constipation or diarrhea; erectile dysfunction or irritability.

The message carried by the onset of all these symptoms is... "Blood glucose is too high!" They are warning signs that danger lies ahead, but the unfortunate fact is that most carbohydrate intolerant and pre-diabetic people will ignore these signs and plunge head-long into the fray we call Diabetes Mellitus.

Of course; we can get into control by educating ourselves, being mindful of the nutrients we put into our body daily, taking heed of the lessons learned by family members who have gone before us, monitoring BG/BS levels periodically with a glucometer and by enlisting those medical authorities as care-givers that support YOU... the chief advocate for your health and wellbeing and the one who stands to gain or lose the most from your health journey.

Here's to your health.

not to exceed \$10,000.

Jesse Fierro Jr., 50, has also been indicted with theft from the elderly a second-degree felony, which is punishable by up to 20 years in prison and \$10,000 fines.

According to the indictments, Angel Fierro, Willie Fierro, Macias and Sanchez worked together to allegedly steal 10 or more head of goats without Williams' consent.

Jesse Fierro's indictment states that he also allegedly steal 10 or more head of goats valued at less than \$150,000 without Williams'

consent.

Charges are still pending in district court against Angel Fierro, Guillermo Fierro, Polo Sanchez and Jesse Fierro Jr. A court date has been set for Aug. 15.

The incident was investigated by Kenneth Wadsworth, special ranger with the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association.

The Crockett County Sheriff's Office and Texas Ranger Tod Reed also assisted with the investigation.

Macias was also charged with assault against family member by impeding breathing. That charge was combined with this case, the documents stated.

months ago," Gallego said in an interview. "I have seen a lot of energy and enthusiasm in Democratic ranks — more than I've ever seen."

"Frankly I'm energized about 2018," Gallego added.

Gallego said he has not set a timeline for deciding whether to run, but his decision would not be tied to ongoing litigation over Texas' congressional district maps. The legal arguments over the maps, which were on trial last week, could lead to a more Democratic-friendly 23rd district, which stretches from San Antonio to El Paso and has long been the only competitive district in Texas. Hurd, himself, testified in the trial about his district on Saturday.

"That litigation has been going on forever and what the ultimate outcome is — no really knows," Gallego said. "I certainly wouldn't be dependent on an outcome that may or may not come."

Earlier this month, Gallego filed paperwork to form an exploratory committee for the seat, which he said gives him the "opportunity to travel the district and talk to people, see if they're content with the status quo, see what they're feeling and thinking."

Trump was a major issue in the 2016 race, when Gallego went after Hurd for not speaking out forcefully enough against the GOP presidential nominee. Hurd, who never endorsed Trump, fully disavowed him amid the October fallout from the release of tapes that revealed Trump making lewd comments about women.

In the interview, Gallego said Hurd would "like people to believe he's anti-Trump, but I think his voting record would show differently." For example, Gallego said, it's easy for Hurd to say he is against Trump's proposed border wall but questioned what "active steps" the incumbent has taken to make

sure the wall is not built.

"Will Hurd has been one of the most effective members of Congress since he defeated Pete in 2014," Hurd campaign manager Justin Hollis said in a statement. "The voters in this district voted for Will Hurd because he has a record of accomplishment, sending 11 pieces of legislation to the president's desk to be signed into law while Pete couldn't even get a bill out of committee. I just feel embarrassed for Pete at this point. Voters already told Gallego they didn't want a repeat of his do-nothing approach to public service, and a three-Pete is clearly something no one besides a career politician is interested in."

Gallego could have company in the Democratic primary, where Jay Hulings, an assistant U.S. attorney from San Antonio, and Judy Canales, a former Obama and Clinton appointee from Eagle Pass, are also weighing campaigns.

State Rep. Cesar Blanco, D-El Paso, was seen as a possible candidate for the seat but announced last month he will seek re-election to the Texas House.

2017-2018 Texas Immunization Requirements

Students must present proof of immunization compliance at the time of enrollment according to Texas Administrative Code, Title 25 Health Services, Chapter 97, Subchapter B, Rules 97.61–97.77. These laws may be seen in their entirety at <http://www.dshs.state.tx.us/immunize/school/default.shtm>.

CCCCSD Nurse Karen Huffman said that all students must have these required vaccinations or exemption waivers on file before they begin the school year. She also said her biggest concern is the incoming Pre-K, Kindergarten and seventh graders have the required immunizations as well as students who are new to the district, especially if they are coming from another state or country.

Sections 97.61-97.72 of the Texas Administrative Code are currently under revision. As a result, the 2016-2017 Texas Minimum State Vaccine Requirements for students in grades K-12 are not yet finalized. No new vaccine requirements have been proposed. However, please note that proposed changes to the meningococcal requirement for students entering grades 7-12 will require students in these grades to show proof of one dose of quadrivalent meningococcal conjugate vaccine (MCV4 or MenACWY) on or after the student's 11th birthday. Additionally, the graded implementation of the hepatitis A requirement will extend to grades K-7, as currently prescribed in the 25 TAC 97.63. For additional information, please contact the Immunization Branch at (800) 252-9152.

According to the indictment, Duarte allegedly on or about April 3, did then and there, having been convicted of the felony offense of failure to stop and render aid on March 2, 2010, in the 358th District Court of Ector County, Texas, intentionally and knowingly possess a firearm before the fifth anniversary of the defendant's release from confinement following conviction of said felony.

And it is further presented that prior to the charged offense on March 2, 2010, in the 358th District Court of Ector County, Texas, Duarte was finally convicted of the felony offense of manslaughter.

Dennis Ray McCoy, 44, Port Saint Lucie, Fla., was indicted for possession of a controlled substance, second-degree felony, and possession of marijuana, state jail felony.

According to the indictment, McCoy allegedly on or about Nov. 5, 2016, did then and there intentionally or knowingly possess a controlled substance, namely, a material, compound, mixture or preparation in an amount of four grams or more but less than 200 grams, that contained a quantity of Tetrahydrocannabinol, and did then and there intentionally or knowingly possess a usable quantity of marijuana in an amount of five pounds or less but more than four ounces.

Fausto Guillermo Lopez, 36, Santa Ana, Calif., was indicted for money laundering more than \$30,000 and less than \$150,000, third-degree felony.

According to the indictment, Lopez allegedly on or about May 2, 2017 did then and there knowingly conduct, supervise or facilitate

a transaction involving the proceeds of criminal activity, picking up money that was the proceeds from an illegal drug transaction, or money that was intended to be used for an illegal drug transaction, and transporting said money, and the value of the funds was \$30,000 or more, but less than \$150,000.

Marshall Eugene Smiling, 25, of Ozona, was indicted for burglary of a building, state jail felony.

According to the indictment, Smiling allegedly on or about May 5, did then and there enter a building or a portion of a building without the effective consent of the owner and attempted to commit or committed the offense of theft.

Westly Wade Gordon Smith, 27, of Ozona, was indicted for assault against a family member, third-degree felony.

According to the indictment, Smith allegedly on or about April 17, 2016, did then and there intentionally, knowingly and recklessly cause bodily injury to a member of his household. The indictment also states Smith has previously been convicted of an offense against a member of his family on June 25, 2014 in Crockett County.

Agustin Jerardo Dominguez, aka Agustin Jerardo Dominguez, 24, of Ozona, was indicted on six counts of sexual assault of a child, second-degree felony.

According to the indictment, Dominguez allegedly on or about Oct. 15, 2013, Feb. 14, 2014, March 14, 2014, Nov. 11, 2014 and Dec. 9, 2014 did then and there intentionally and knowingly abuse a child who was then and there younger than 17.

Dominguez also received another indictment for six additional counts of sexual assault of a child, second-degree felony.

According to the indictment, those incidents allegedly took place on March 1, 2014, March 3, 2014, May 14, 2014, June 11, 2014 and Sept. 7, 2014.

Punishments: State Jail Felony - shall be punished by confinement in a state jail for any term of not more than two years or less than 180 days and a fine not to exceed \$10,000.

Third-degree Felony - shall be punished by imprisonment in the institutional division for any term of not more than 10 years or less than 2 years and a fine not to exceed \$10,000.

Second-degree Felony - shall be punished by imprisonment in the institutional division for any term of not more than 20 years or less than 2 years and a fine not to exceed \$10,000.

First-degree Felony - shall be punished by imprisonment in the institutional division for life or for any term of not more than 99 years or less than 5 years and a fine not to exceed \$10,000.

until the Legislature devises a more broadly functional finance system. SB 2 also would create a mechanism to provide financial assistance for children with disabilities to attend private schools.

DPS REPORTS ON GANGS

The Texas Department of Public Safety on July 25 released the Texas Gang Threat Assessment, an overview and update of gang activity in the Lone Star State. Gangs are evaluated and classified according to threat level. Also, according to the report, there are as many as 100,000 gang members across Texas. "Gangs and their associates remain a significant threat to public safety in our state, not only because of

their penchant for violence and criminal activity, but also their relationships with other criminal organizations, such as Mexican cartels," said DPS Director Steve McCraw.

ZIKA INFECTION I S POSSIBLE

The Texas Department of State Health Services on July 26 announced a Hidalgo County resident who previously had a Zika infection was most likely infected in Texas. Because the individual has not recently traveled outside the area or had any other risk factors, the infection probably was transmitted by a mosquito bite in South Texas sometime in the last few months, health officials said. Texas previously had six locally transmitted cases of Zika in Brownsville in late 2016. More information on Zika is available at TexasZika.org.

AG PAXTON JOINS IN BRIEF

Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton on July 25 announced he joined West Virginia's amicus brief in Robinson v. United States, along with Indiana, Michigan and Utah in the United States Supreme Court. The case was brought over a warrantless frisk search of an individual. Paxton said an interpretation of the case by the Richmond, Virginia-based U.S. Court of Appeals for the Fourth Circuit "places an unlawful burden on Second Amendment rights." "The Constitution plainly guarantees law-abiding citizens the right to bear arms, whether through open or concealed carry," he said. "We must ensure the court continues to protect the constitutional rights of law-abiding citizens."
