Water system getting upgrade

Ozona water system will be receiving an upgrade, including new smart water me-

Crockett County Water Control and Improvement District #1 is beginning a \$3.5 million project next month that will include replacing six-inch water lines from 1st Street to 13th Street and Avenue G, Monterrey Street and State Highway 163 South out to Leal Street and State Highway 163 South near Southridge RV Park. Out at Crockett Heights new sewer lines and a new lift station will be installed.

All customers will also be receiving new smart water

With the smart water meters, the Ozona water department office will receive 24 hour readings, each day, through a computer. An alarm will sound when a leak is detected allowing the water department staff to contact the home, or business,

owner immediately.

"Water meters loose accuracy as they get older. These newer meters pick up small leaks," said Ric O'Conner with Master Meter, the brand of smart water meters Ozona will be using. "Water is a pre-

cious resource. The department will be able to see exactly how much water is being consumed. It will make the utility more efficient."

This means no more having to send water department employees out to read meters on a regular basis.

"The number of our staff will not change. In fact, it will free us up to do more projects," said Doug Meador, general manager of CCWCID#1.

How the school bond will impact taxpayers

Editor's note: The following is the third in a series of articles about the Nov. 7 CCCCSD \$5 million School Bond Election.

Many people do not realize how important this Bond Election is to Crockett County Schools.

The state has eliminated school funding to all Chapter 41 schools.

That means that Crockett County Schools will not receive state funding of \$2.2 million.

Over the course of the last three years we have cut our operating budget close to \$1 million. We have absorbed teaching positions, cut our budget across the board by 15 percent, cut our athletic budget by 20 percent and eliminated many stipends. However, it is still not enough to meet the state funding shortfall.

With the goal being to continue to keep taxes low and education at the forefront, the CCCCSD Board of Trustees turns to our voters to increase our community's support of the schools

in the form of a tax raise. We have chosen to raise taxes through a bond so that we do not return any of your hard earned dollars to the state. With a bond, 100 percent of the funds stay in Crockett County Schools for our kids.

In last week's edition of The Ozona Stockman, I provided our tax rates compared to those rates of many of our neighboring communities.

Early voting begins Monday in school bond election

Early voting in the Nov. 7 CCCCSD School Bond Election and the State Constitutional Amendment Election begins Monday, Oct. 23, and

runs through Friday, Nov. 3. Crockett County Voters can cast their ballots from 8 a.m.-5 p.m. Monday-Friday, including the noon hour, at the courthouse annex.

Election Day voting will be 7 a.m.-7 p.m. Tuesday, Nov. 7. Polling places are: Precinct 1 - Crockett County Courthouse Annex; Precinct 2 - Crockett County Senior Center; Precinct 3 - Crockett County Civic Center; Precinct 4 - Ozona Chamber of Commerce Visitor Center.

The Texas Secretary of State's Office reminds voters who do not possess and cannot reasonably obtain a form of approved photo ID that they now have additional options when voting in person.

Those who do not possess and cannot reasonably obtain one of the seven forms of approved photo ID may vote by (1) signing a declaration at the polls explaining why they are reasonably unable to obtain one of the seven forms of approved photo ID and (2) providing one of various forms of supporting documentation such as a utility bill or a voter registration certificate.

The seven forms of approved photo ID are:

Tax reform to put more money into your pockets

Not long ago, our president came before the American public and was blunt about the state of the federal tax code in this country. He called on Congress to "simplify the system. Get rid of the loopholes," and "lower the corporate tax rate" — one that ranks among the highest in the industrialized world.

Although the words sound familiar, the president who delivered them might not be the one you're thinking of: They're from Barack Obama, during his 2011 State of the Union address. Now, fast-forward a few

years, and a new president from a different party is saying much thing. President Donald Trump has called our tax code a "relic" and a "colossal barrier standing in the way of America's economic come-

back." He's right, of course, and so was President Obama. Tax reform doesn't have to be partisan. In fact, it shouldn't be, because the ramifications are much more than political.

Take Lisa Fullerton, for example, who owns a small San Antonio company called A Novel Idea. Fullerton, an accountant with 33 years of experience, use to handle her business's tax compliance in-house. Eventually, the code became too complex and enforcement too punitive. She says that outsourcing tax and employment functions now costs her business roughly \$280,000 more a year than it did in 2000.

Fullerton is far from the only San Antonian who's frustrated. As the Express-News reported, Bill Cox, has been manufacturing screw machine components in San Antonio since 1956, but is weighed down by capital costs and struggles to purchase necessary equipment. And, Louis Barrios, for whom lower tax rates could balance out rising food costs he's incurring at his Tex-Mex restaurants.

Two weeks ago, a group led by House Speaker Paul Ryan, Treasury Secretary Steve Mnuchin and U.S. Rep. Kevin Brady of Texas released a unified framework that contains core principles for reform. Among them are a simplified rate structure, the elimination of the alternative minimum tax and many itemized deductions, and incentives for companies to keep jobs on American soil. And the framework recommends what's widely agreed-upon as overdue: lowering our uncompetitive corporate rate so that Texas small businesses and workers are no longer at a disadvantage.

Next week, the Senate will take the second when we consider a budget that lays the foundation for our reform bill. The tax-writing committees in both the House and the Senate will then get to work, with input and amendments from both sides of the aisle. The result will be a tax system ideally made better for all. It's time to take money out of Washington's pocket and put it back in yours.

National Disability Awareness Month

ince October is National Disability Awareness Month, it gives us the opportunity to celebrate the contributions made to the fabric of our society by our fellow Americans with disabilities. It's important to highlight people like my constituent and Helotes neighbor Stefanie Cowley who through persistence and dogged tenacity has made life better for so many people.

Stefanie's life changed forever in 2007 when she was diagnosed with multiple sclerosis (MS), a disease with unknown causes in which the immune system eats away at the protective covering of a person's nerves. Over the next four years, she struggled to find medical treatment options in the United States and her condition worsened. Relentlessly exploring all treatments, Stefanie eventually resorted to medical tourism and finally began to see progress with a stem cell treatment that was not yet available in Texas. Knowing it could help others just like her, Stefanie spent hours at the Texas State Legislature advocating for Charlie's Law to allow stem cell therapy access for patients with certain chronic diseases and terminal illnesses, like MS. Thanks to Stefanie, the bill was signed into law in June this year, allowing thousands of suffering Texans to use their own stem cells as medicine.

As treatments and therapy improved her condition, Stefanie joined groups that fight for MS treatment and research, such as Team Wingman in Helotes, and Patients for Stem Cells, who fight for access to adult stem cell therapy. She not only became a voice for those with MS, but also an inspiration to her community.

For her tireless advocacy, Stefanie was recognized as the 2017 Advocate of the Year by San Antonio Independent Living Services. Stefanie's stem cell treat-

ments became so successful that she could put her weight on her legs again and no longer needed a traditional wheelchair. The only problem

was that she could not get a standing wheelchair approved by Medicare which would help her continue to build muscle in her legs and dramatically improve her quality of life.

Stefanie was familiar with my office and district staff because we had worked through some Medicare issues for her in the past, and she approached us for some help on this latest

We pinpointed why her previous Medicare applications for a standing wheelchair were getting denied by the Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services and made the fix. She got her standing wheelchair within a week, and in the process, made it easier for people in similar situations to be successful.

I first met Stefanie during a town hall meeting in 2016. She educated me on the issue of stem cell treatments and the peculiarities of the existing law on this topic.

Witnessing what she has been able to accomplish on behalf of the MS community in such a short period of time is truly inspiring. Stefanie's story of perseverance is an example to us all on how to fight for what is right. It's an honor to have worked alongside her and to be able to call her a friend.


Perfect Nonsense

State creates mental health task force for Harvey-affected schools

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS By Ed Sterling | Texas Press Association

AUSTIN — Texas Education Commissioner Mike Morath on Oct. 11 announced the establishment of the Hurricane Harvey Task Force on School Mental Health Supports to deliver needed attention to schools and higher education institutions impacted by the storm.

The Texas Education Agency, acting on orders from Gov. Greg Abbott, is spearheading the effort in partnership with the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board and Texas Health and Human Services Commission, in collaboration with the Meadows Mental Health Policy Institute. The task force will develop a list of tiered supports and resources that can be used by school leaders to address the mental health needs of affected staff, students and families.

"As I've traveled the state following Hurricane Harvey, it is evident that addressing the mental health needs of

our students and educators is of the utmost importance," Morath said. "This coordinated mental health response will allow our state agencies to coordinate local responses that reflect the specific needs of each individual community," he added.

"The invisible wounds left behind after this storm are often the most difficult to recover from," Abbott said.

ABBOTT, SHARP **VISIT CITIES**

Gov. Abbott on Oct. 11 visited the cities of Port Arthur, Mont Belvieu, Dayton, Kountze and Orange in southeast Texas during a three-day, 16city tour of hurricane-impacted areas of the state.

Joining Abbott was John Sharp, chancellor of The Texas A&M University System, who serves as chair of the Governor's Commission to Re-

build Texas. Abbott has delegated executive authority to Sharp to marshal state agency resources to rebuild hurricane-damaged infrastructure, including roads, bridges, schools, government buildings and other public facilities.

Abbott and Sharp visited with mayors, legislators, county judges and other officials "to ensure they are getting all the help they need in the recovery effort," Abbott said.

Other cities hosting gubernatorial visits included Sugar Land, Wharton, Bay City, Angleton, and Dickinson on Oct. 10 and Aransas Pass, Port Aransas, Rockport, Refugio, Port Lavaca, and Victoria on Oct. 9.



The beliefs we form about the image we see in the mirror is important because they affect how we feel about ourselves, our bodies and how we interact with others and the environment.

Positive self-esteem can boost our physical, mental, social, emotional, and spiritual well-being.



County is one of the lowest in our entire region, and is certainly in the bottom third statewide.

As we get closer to the Early Voting date of Monday, Oct. 23, it is very important to know what a bond will cost you as a taxpayer, and the timeline involved in paying off the bond.

The information below shows the Schedule for Payment and Tax Impact if a \$5 million bond were approved by voters:

It is important to note that all of the rules and exemptions of the Homestead Exemption and the over 65 Exemption are still in effect if the bond passes. This means that those with these exemptions will not see a change in their exemptions. Taxpayers that are 65 and over will not have their taxes go above the frozen levy amount/ceiling that was established whenever the Over 65 exemption was granted. to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of part of the market value of the residence homestead of a partially disabled veteran or the surviving spouse of a partially disabled veteran if the residence homestead was donated to the disabled veteran by a charitable organization for less than the market value of the residence homestead and harmonizing certain related provisions of the Texas Constitution."

What it means: It would authorize property tax exemptions for certain partially disabled veterans or their surviving spouses — those whose homes were donated to them by charity for less than market value.

 \cdot Proposition 2 - "The constitutional amendment to establish a lower amount for expenses that can be charged to a borrower and removing certain financing expense limitations for a home equity loan, establishing certain authorized lenders to make a home equity loan, changing certain options for the refinancing of home equity loans, changing the threshold for an advance of a home equity line of credit, and allowing home equity loans on agricultural homesteads."

What is means: This would ease restrictions on borrowing against home equity in Texas.

· Proposition 3 - "The constitutional amendment limiting the service of certain officeholders appointed by the governor and confirmed by the senate after the expiration of the person's term of office."

What it means: Unsalaried appointees whose terms have ended but who have not been replaced would serve only until the next legislative

session has ended.

· Proposition 4 - "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to require a court to provide notice to the attorney general of a challenge to the constitutionality of a state statute and authorizing the legislature to prescribe a waiting period before the court may enter a judgment holding the statute unconstitutional."

What it means: This would require courts to notify the state attorney general of any constitutional challenges to state laws.

· Proposition 5 - "The constitutional amendment on professional sports team charitable foundations conducting charitable raffles."

What it means: It would expand the definition of a "professional sports team," giving more team-connected foundations the ability to hold charitable raffles.

· Proposition 6 - "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a first responder who is killed or fatally injured in the line of duty."

What it means: This would give property tax exemptions to surviving spouses of first responders killed in the line of duty.

· Proposition 7 - "The constitutional amendment relating to legislative authority to permit credit unions and other financial institutions to award prizes by lot to promote savings."

What it means: It would allow banks and other financial institutions to conduct promotional activities — such as raffles — to encourage savings.



TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held in said County as provided in an ORDER CALL-ING A BOND ELECTION duly passed by the Commissioners Court of said County, which Order is substantially as follows:

ORDER CALLING A BOND ELECTION FOR THE CROCKETT COUNTY CONSOLIDATED COMMON SCHOOL DISTRICT NUMBER 1 INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT

THE STATE OF TEXAS § COUNTY OF CROCKETT §

WHEREAS, the Crockett County Consolidated Common School District Number 1 (the "School District") is a "common school district" under the laws of the State of Texas; and

WHEREAS, the boundaries of the School District are coterminous with the boundaries of Crockett County, Texas (the "County"); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 45.001, Texas Education Code, the Commissioners Court of the County, on behalf of the School District, is authorized to issue bonds to finance the construction, acquisition and equipment of school buildings in the School District, and to levy, pledge, assess, and collect annual ad valorem taxes sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such bonds as the principal and interest become due, if the issuance of such bonds is authorized by a majority of the qualified voters of the School District voting at an election held for that purpose; and

WHEREAS, Section 45.003, Texas Education Code, requires the Commissioners Court of the County to call an election on behalf of the School District to authorize the issuance of such bonds for the School District; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the School District has determined that it is necessary to hold an election for the purpose of authorizing the issuance of up to \$5,000,000 in principal amount of bonds for the construction, acquisition and equipment of school buildings in the School District and for the purchase of new school buses, and the Board of Trustees of the School District has requested that the Commissioners Court of the County approve this Order for the purpose of holding an election on Tuesday, November 7, 2017, for such purposes; and

WHEREAS, based on such request of the Board of Trustees of the School District, the Commissioners Court of the County deems it advisable to call the election hereinafter ordered; and

WHEREAS, it is hereby officially found and determined that the meeting at which this Order was passed was open to the public, and public notice of the time, place, and purpose of the meeting was given, all as required by Chapter 551, Texas Government Code;

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS COURT OF CROCKETT COUNTY, TEXAS THAT:

- 1. VOTING ON ELECTION DAY. An election shall be held between the hours of 7:00 A.M. and 7:00 P.M. on Tuesday, November 7, 2017 ("Election Day") at the Crockett County Courthouse Annex, 909 Avenue D, Ozona, Texas. Said County shall constitute a single election precinct for said election.
- 2. PRESIDING JUDGES. The Presiding Judge and Alternate Presiding Judge for each of the election precincts and polling places and the Early Voting Clerk have been previously appointed by the Commissioners Court for the General Election on November 7, 2017. Such appointments, and any additions or modifications of such appointments, shall also be effective in connection with the election called under this Order.
- 3. ELECTION CLERKS. Each Presiding Judge shall appoint not less than two nor more than five qualified election clerks to serve and assist in conducting the election; provided that if the Presiding Judge actually serves as expected, the Alternate Presiding Judge shall be one of such clerks.
- 4. EARLY VOTING. Electors may cast their early votes by mail, and may request a ballot by writing to the Crockett County Clerk, P.O. Drawer C, Ozona, Texas 76943, or by personal appearance at the following locations:

Precinct 1 Crockett County Courthouse Annex 909 Avenue D Ozona, Texas

Precinct 2 Crockett County Senior Citizens Center 2 State Highway 163 North Ozona, Texas

Precinct 3 Crockett County Civic and Youth Center 103 Medical Drive Ozona, Texas

Precinct 4 Ozona Chamber of Commerce & Visitor Center 505 15th Street Ozona, Texas

during the period early voting is required or permitted by law, being Monday, October 23, 2017, through Friday, November 3, 2017, the hours designated for early voting by personal appearance shall be from 8:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M. on each day except Saturdays, Sundays, and legal state holidays; and the Early Voting Clerk shall keep the early voting place open during such hours for early voting by personal appearance.

5. EARLY VOTING BALLOT BOARD. An Early Voting Ballot Board is hereby created to process early voting results. The Presiding Judge and the Alternate Presiding Judge of the Early Voting Ballot Board have been previously appointed by the Commissioners Court for the elections held by the County in 2017. Such appointments, and any

additions or modifications of such appointments, shall also be effective in connection with the election called under this Order.

- 6. ELECTORS. All resident, qualified electors of the County shall be entitled to vote at the election.
- 7. OFFICIAL PROPOSITION. At the election the following PROPOSITION shall be submitted in accordance with law:

CROCKETT COUNTY PROPOSITION A

Shall the Commissioners Court of Crockett County, Texas be authorized to issue bonds on behalf of the Crockett County Consolidated Common School District Number 1, in one or more series, in the aggregate principal amount of \$5,000,000 for the construction, acquisition and equipment of school buildings in the School District and for purchase of school buses, with the bonds to mature, bear interest, and be issued and sold in accordance with law at the time of issuance, all within the discretion of the Commissioners Court; and shall the Commissioners Court be auth¬orized to levy and pledge, and cause to be assessed and collected, annual ad valorem taxes on all taxable property in the School District, sufficient, without limit as to rate or amount, to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds and the cost of any credit agreements executed in connection with the bonds?

8. FORM OF BALLOT. The official ballots for the election shall be prepared in accordance with the Texas Election Code so as to permit the electors to vote "FOR"or "AGAINST" the aforesaid PROPOSITION with the ballots to contain such provisions, markings, and language as required by law, and with such PROPOSITION to be expressed substantially as follows:

- 9. ELECTION CODE. In all respects the election shall be conducted in accordance with the Texas Election Code.
- 10. BILINGUAL ELECTION MATERIALS AND COMPLIANCE WITH THE HELP AMERICA VOTE ACT. All election materials (including notice of the election, ballots, instruction cards, affidavits, and other forms which voters may be required to sign) and all early voting materials shall be printed in both English and Spanish, or Spanish translations thereof, and/or other assistance shall be provided, as required by the Texas Election Code (the "Code") and the Federal Voting Rights Act of 1965, each as amended. Pursuant to the federal Help America Vote Act ("HAVA") and the Code, at each polling place there shall be at least one voting system that is equipped for disabled individuals, and each such voting system shall be a system that has been certified by the Texas Secretary of State as compliant with HAVA and the Code.
- 11. GENERAL STATEMENTS. In accordance with the provisions of Section 3.009(b), Texas Election Code, it is hereby found and determined that:
- (a) The proposition language that will appear on the ballot is set forth in Section 9 hereof.
- (b) The purpose for which the bonds are to be authorized is set forth in Section 8 hereof.
- (c) The principal amount of the debt obligations to be authorized is set forth in Sections 8 and 9 hereof.
- (d) As set forth in Sections 8 and 9 hereof, if the bonds are approved by the voters, the Commissioners Court will be authorized to levy annual ad valorem taxes, on all taxable property in the School District, sufficient, without limit as to rate or amount, to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds and the cost of any credit agreements executed in connection with the bonds.
- (e) Based upon the bond market conditions at the date of adoption of this Order, the maximum interest rate for any series of the bonds is estimated to be 5.00% as calculated in accordance with applicable law. Such estimate takes into account a number of factors, including the issuance schedule, maturity schedule and the expected bond ratings of the proposed bonds. Such estimated maximum interest rate is provided as a matter of information, but is not a limitation on the interest rate at which the bonds, or any series thereof, may be sold.
- (f) As set forth in Section 8 hereof, if the bonds are approved, they may be issued in one or more series, to mature serially, over a period not to exceed 40 years.

- (h) The aggregate amount of the outstanding interest of the School District's debt obligations (all of which are secured by an unlimited tax levied for debt service purposes) as of the beginning of the School District's 2016-17 fiscal year is \$966,795.95.
- (i) The ad valorem debt service tax rate for the School District for the 2016-17 fiscal year is \$0.0540 per \$100 of taxable assessed valuation.

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Commissioners approve road department items

The Crockett County Commissioners' Court approved several items for the road department during a special meeting Thursday night.

The commissioners approved a \$10,000 limit on purchasing equipment and \$25,000 limit on operating expenses for the road superintendent.

The limits were set due to discussions made at the Oct. 9 regular meeting about equipment purchases that Road Superintendent Jeffrey Stuart wanted to make that were not agenda items.

"If we're going to do this every time we have a road we're going to have a lot of meetings," Stuart said. "It just makes it hard."

Commissioner Pleas Childress said for basic construction road work and purchases, like fuel and diesel, those could be made without commissioners' approval, but that major equipment purchases need approval.

"I've done that," Stuart said.

The commissioners also approved the purchase of a 2009 International Pro Star for \$44,693, a skid steer for \$48,920 and a plainer for \$21,102.

No action was taken on repairing or replacing the slide at the county swimming pool.

Stuart said he had completed construction on County Road 105 and then discussed widening Ramos Street with the commissioners.

"Meter reading takes up a good amount of time each month," added Velma Fierro, office manager.

O'Conner said each meter is tested for accuracy and must adhere to American Water Works Association Standards.

"Some peoples bills may change," he said.

Meador said that the only charge being increased is sanitation due to the cost of sanitation increasing.


"We are not increasing due to this project for the upcoming year," Meador said.

In other news. Hegar on Oct. 10 announced his office's release of the Certification Revenue Estimate for fiscal biennium 2018-2019.

The Comptroller's Office expects revenue available for general spending in 2018-19 to total about \$107.33 billion, an amount that would support the \$107.23 billion in general-purpose spending called for by the 85th Legislature and result in a final balance available for certification of \$94 million.

Market turbulence, energy price fluctuations, potential changes in national economic policy and the eventual cost of Hurricane Harvey contribute uncertainty to this estimate, Hegar said. Texas is in the early stages of storm recovery, and full impacts to the state's economy and revenues have only begun to take shape and likely will change in the coming months, Hegar stressed.

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
