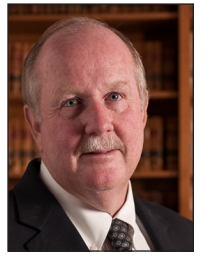

Family emergency scam making rounds in Ozona

Family emergency scams are making the rounds in Ozona. Someone with a Pennsylvania phone number is claiming to be a nephew in jail and needs \$3,000.

These types of scams prey on someone's willingness to help friends and family in need. Scammers impersonate their targets' loved ones, make up an urgent situation and plead for help - and money.

The potential victim gets a call, email or social media message from someone claiming to be a family member in distress.

They may say they've been arrested while traveling overseas, or there was an accident, medical emergency or other calamity.

They provide convincing details, such as family names and other personal information.

Thanks to social media sites, scammers can offer plausible stories and incorporate nicknames and real travel plans into the con to convince their targets.

A common version is the "grandparent scam," where the con artist contacts a grandparent claiming to be their grandchild and asking for money.

The plea is so persuasive that the grandparent wires money to the scammer, only to find out later their family member was safe and sound all along.

This scam can also work in reverse where the 'grandparent' calls their grandchild pleading for help.

Better Business Bureau serving the Heart of Texas advises the following to help limit exposure to an emergency scam:

- Recognize the red flags. Scammers posing as the victim's family member or friend will typically plead for secrecy and claim that they need immediate payment for thousands of dollars to cover such reasons as posting bail, re-

pairing a car, legal fees, or even hospital/medical bills.

- Avoid reacting immediately. Scammers hope to evoke an emotional reaction. Resist the pressure to react immediately to the caller's distress. Ask for a phone number to return their call and directly reach out to the person they are claiming to be to confirm the story first. If you can't reach this person, contact another family member or friend to confirm the individual's whereabouts.

- Do not wire money. Wiring money is like giving cash. Once it is sent, it is almost impossible to get back. If you are asked to wire money based on a request made over the phone, especially to locations overseas, consider it a serious red flag. Always make certain of the recipient's identity before using a wire service or pre-paid debit cards/gift cards.

- Communicate. Families should share upcoming travel plans with relatives before leaving the state or country. Parents are encouraged to let extended family members know when their child is traveling. Find out where they're going and how long they'll be gone. That information might prove useful as far as avoiding this scam.

- However, be cautious about the information that is posted on social media. If you come across this scam, report it to local authorities and bbb.org/scamtracker.

I wrote the following essay over 25 years ago and it's just as true today as it was then.

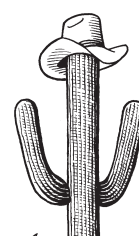
The man on the street looked out the window of his twelfth story condominium and saw air that wasn't fit to breathe, gridlocked streets and homeless people warming themselves on steam that belched from below. Hurricane recovery continues with extension of disaster declaration

AUSTIN — Gov. Greg Abbott on Nov. 20 extended the disaster declaration for counties affected by Hurricane Harvey.

Some 60 counties are included and they will continue to be eligible for assistance as they recover and rebuild.

"The most important message I want to send to the victims of this storm is that they are not alone as they continue to recover from this storm. While we still have a long way to go to return to a new normal, I have no doubt that Texas will eventually emerge from this disaster stronger than ever before," Abbott said.

Declarations must be renewed every 30 days for assistance to remain available. Gov. Abbott said he would continue to renew them as needed throughout the recovery process.

Counties covered in the disaster declaration include: Angelina, Aransas, Atascosa, Austin, Bastrop, Bee, Bexar, Brazoria, Brazos, Burlison,

AID REQUEST IS GRANTED

On Nov. 17 Abbott announced that the Federal Emergency Management Agency granted his request to extend the deadline to Jan. 16 for Transitional Sheltering Assistance for victims of Hurricane Harvey. Nearly 17,000 families are receiving this form of assistance, which is

intended to help those who have been unable to return to their homes find short-term shelter in hotels or other temporary housing locations. Abbott said he remains "committed to doing everything possible to get these families back under their own roofs."

HUD FUNDS COMMITTED

In other hurricane-recovery news, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development on Nov. 17 awarded \$5 billion through a community development block grant program supporting the repair of damaged homes, businesses and critical infrastructure. HUD Secretary Ben Carson said the agency would work with Abbott and his staff "to do whatever is needed to rebuild damaged homes and to restore shuttered businesses in some of the hardest-hit areas of the State."

U.S. Sens. John Cornyn and Ted Cruz acknowledged the importance of federal disaster aid to Texans who are continuing to suffer as a result of Hurricane Harvey and expressed support for the programs.

In September, President Trump signed legislation securing \$7.4 billion in funding for Harvey

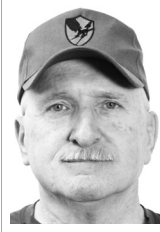

Grain consumption linked to de-evolution

Humans began consuming grains and cultivating them at an accelerating scale about nine thousand years ago to accommodate a growing population's energy requirements. Referred to as the "Agricultural Revolution," this period gave rise to man's consumption of grain, after a couple million years of very little to none.

Studies show that human brain function, physical ability and stature peaked just prior to the agricultural revolution and archeological evidence shows a gradual but steady decline in human strength and de-evolution. Yeah, but it gets worse.

Grains contain phytic acid, which is a mineral blocker that prevents the absorption of calcium, magnesium, iron, copper and zinc. It is found in the bran and the outer coating of all grains legumes, seeds and nuts. Phytates are minerals with phytic acid bound to them, retarding or preventing their normal absorption of that mineral, like calcium, a risk factor for osteoporosis and other bone-related problems. Unfortunately, a low-fat, high-fiber diet with a calcium supplement is prescribed for those with osteoporosis but the calcium is not being absorbed because the phytates block its absorption.

The consensus among dieticians and medical professionals seems to be that grains are not only healthy, but they are a necessary foundation of our diet. However, dietary studies suggest the opposite. The trend lately is to acknowledge that processed grains may be nutrient deficient but "healthy whole grains" should provide the bulk of our nutrition in just 6-11 servings a day... Not so!

They are a blatant departure from the way humans have eaten for almost our entire history.

"Our ability to grow and process grains more easily, allowed more people to afford grain products like flour, a "luxury" previously

reserved for the wealthy. The important thing to remember here is that just because humans seem to have no immediate negative effects from grains, it doesn't mean our bodies

can handle them on the long-term or that we can function optimally while consuming them," says Katie, of the "Wellness Mama" website.

At the root of the dilemma is the fact that some 50,000 years of development is required to effect changes in the human body at the genetic level.

Besides the phytic acid, the huge spike in insulin production soon after consumption seriously impedes hormone production in the body. Insulin production is an important process for storing nutrients and processing glucose in the bloodstream, but our bodies simply can't handle the insulin requirements we throw at them with the carbohydrate load we consume 3, 4, 5 and 6 times a day.

When we consume carbohydrates, be it grains, fruit, sugar or whatever; they quickly broken down into glucose. Extra glucose not immediately processed or used to replenish glycogen stores is stored as fat. This is a natural response of our bodies that has allowed humans to survive for thousands of years. If we don't get the chance to use up these stores, the fat accumulates. If the carbohydrate consumption is excessive the body throws in the added bonus of cortisol and adrenaline production to handle the extra load. This creates hormonal imbalance in the body's endocrine and immune systems, and inflammation throughout the body.

While the bovine species (cattle), with their five stomachs and extensive digestive

system to process and ferment the copious grains and grasses they consume daily, humans cannot. We benefit most from the nutrients in grains by consuming the cattle and other animals that eat them.

In the last 150 years, grain hybridization and consumption has increased, as have chronic disease rates, fertility has fallen, and the population's average body weight has steadily risen. The more the consumption of grains rose; the more fertility rates fell, average body weight and chronic disease rates increased. Research from the University of Missouri reveals the average sperm count of American males has dropped 50 percent since the 1930s. That notwithstanding, it is no secret that the world is facing a very real pandemic of insulin sensitivity, Type 2 Diabetes, insulin resistance, and obesity.

Other autoimmune disease and chronic illnesses linked to grain consumption are: various cancers including; pancreatic, colon, stomach and lymphoma; Hashimoto's Thyroiditis, arthritis and autism; depression, anxiety and schizophrenia; and various other allergies.

In short: Grains are not intended for human consumption and are toxic to the body. The non-digestible proteins wreak havoc in our system and the grains tend to pass undigested through the digestive tract. Studies have shown, and my own work with clients indicate a "no-grain" diet can lower cholesterol, lower blood pressure, reduce inflammation, promote weight loss, eliminate dental plaque and decay, alleviate dermatitis or acne, end digestive disturbances like heart disease, increase fertility and dramatically improve sustained energy levels.

and major disasters, such as Hurricane Irma (Florida), Hurricane Maria (Puerto Rico) and the California wildfires.

COURT BLOCKS NEW LAW

Austin U.S. District Judge Lee Yeakel, in a Nov. 22 ruling, granted permanent injunctive relief to abortion providers who have been trying to prevent enforcement of a law passed last spring by the Texas Legislature.

The law would require a provider to perform an additional procedure to ensure fetal demise before continuing a dilation and evacuation abortion. Yeakel, in finding for the plaintiffs, said the additional procedure, which involves a lethal injection to a fetus in the second trimester, would be invasive, risky and medically unnecessary.

Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton said the state would fight the injunction in

the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Fifth Circuit.

JOB GROWTH CONTINUES

The Texas Workforce Commission on Nov. 17 reported that the state's economy added 71,500 seasonally adjusted nonfarm jobs in October while annual employment growth was 2.6 percent for the month, marking 90 consecutive months of annual growth.

The agency also touted Texas' seasonally adjusted unemployment rate, which fell to 3.9 percent and set a record for the lowest unemployment rate recorded in four decades.

Notably, the agency pointed out, the leisure and hospitality employment category rebounded by adding 34,700 jobs in October after experiencing its largest monthly decline in September due to hurricane-affected business closures. Also, in 2017 to date, leisure and hospitality has gained 41,000 jobs, while trade, transportation and utilities employment grew by 10,300 jobs, and professional and business services expanded by 6,300 jobs.

The Amarillo and Midland Metropolitan Statistical Areas recorded the month's lowest unemployment rate among Texas MSAs with a rate of 2.4 percent, followed by the College Station-Bryan MSA with a rate of 2.5 percent. The Austin-Round Rock and Lubbock MSAs registered a rate of 2.6 percent for October, Texas Workforce Commission reported.
