The Crockett County Commissioners' Court approved a new Rental Contract for the Fairgrounds Park Arena Slab Area during their regular meeting Monday.

Lions named to All-West Texas Football Team

Six Ozona Lions have been named to the San Angelo Standard-Times Class 2A All-West Texas Football Team.

Utility Back Kobe Rodriquez 5-11, 180, Sr.

Senior Kobe Rodriquez was also named to the All-West Texas Super Team, which is comprised of players from 6A-1A.

Rodriquez didn't have the same kind of stats he had last year when he was a running back on the 2A AWT Team, but it was still a very productive senior season. He had 885 yards rushing on 115 attempts and 225 yards receiving on 19 receptions, finishing with 13 TDs.

> **Quarterback Alec Lara** 5-5, 145, Soph.

Sophomore Quarterback Alec Lara was a dual-threat with 770 yards rushing on 124 carries, averaging 6.2 yards per carry. He also threw for 1,072 yards and accounted for 18 TDs.

Linebacker **Abraham Rodriguez** 5-8, 160, Soph.

The District 3-2A Division I Defensive MVP had a stellar season for the Lions as just a sophomore. He accounted for 115 tackles, six tackles for losses, two sacks and one interception.

Defensive back Sebastian De La Cruz 5-9, 155, Soph.

De La Cruz really made a name for himself as just a sophomore and opposing offenses will have to deal with him two more years. He recorded 75 tackles, 11 pass deflections, one interception and two caused fumbles.

Defensive back Marcus Perez 5-7, 150, Jr.

Perez was a first-team selection in district. The Lions' junior defensive back turned in 36 tackles, 10 pass breakups and one interception and was one of Ozona's top players on that side of the ball.

Punter Dario Rodriguez 6-0, 180, Jr.

Also a standout at tight end for the Lions, Rodriguez was very reliable when called on for a big punt. He finished with a 36-yard average and was a first-team selection in district.

Email was invented in 1971 and its use has continued to grow year after year since. So let's discuss some ways to utilize email as a source of delivering targeted content to your customers.

wants to see. If you are sending your entire catalog out in every email it may not be as effective as sending an email with a specific product or service.

Building your email list is twofold. One, build your list by using opt-in features. This means the individuals you are emailing have requested information or have given your permission to contact them. Begin building your list by advertising an opt-in link on social media and your web page. You can also ask current customers to join your mailing list. Purchasing a generic email list is not advised and can cause a huge increase in your opt-out numbers. Second, you want to organize that list based on customer preferences. Most advance email services provide built-in ways for you to accomplish these goals. Constant Contact, a major email marketing service, uses "tags". These tags are a built-in labeling system. You can use them for frequency preferences, such as weekly, or monthly. They can also be used for product or services preferences.

This can be an easy task as

you add new contacts to your email marketing list. If you have an existing list it may be more of a challenge. Some email services have tools to help you create specific segments. These tools work based on clicks. So if someone clicks a certain link within the email campaign it will automatically a tag to that contact grouping them together with others. So the next time you are ready to advertise that particular service or product you have a list of individuals who have already shown interest. If you don't have tools

to help it is as simple as manually reviewing previous emails and going through your contact list. This option is more time intensive but can boost your overall satisfaction of customers in your email marketing because you are able to give the people what they want.



By utilizing experts from the public and private sectors, we will be able to develop tangible, implementable cybersecurity recommendations.


Emerging technology is an exciting thing. It allows us to travel faster, live longer, and communicate more efficiently.

FEMA clears way for public assistance to churches that aid in disasters

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS By Ed Sterling | Texas Press Association

AUSTIN — Gov. Greg Abbott and Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton on Jan. 3 announced the Federal Emergency Management Agency's approval of their request to allow churches and religious organizations to receive the same public assistance available to other nonprofits aiding in Hurricane Harvey relief efforts.

FEMA's Public Assistance Program and Policy Guide previously offered assistance to private non-profit organizations, including zoos, performing arts centers and museums, and excluded facilities established or primarily used for religious activities. The revised policy is in force for any major disaster declared on or after Aug. 23, 2017.

Abbott and Paxton sent a letter to President Donald Trump in September urging him to authorize this assistance.

"When Harvey moved across the Texas Gulf Coast, churches across the state opened their doors to those in need," Abbott said. "Churches and other houses of worship continue to play a vital role in the ongoing recovery effort, and their ability to receive the same assistance available to other nonprofits should never have been in doubt. I thank FEMA and the Administration for their commitment to helping Texans and the churches that have helped their communities throughout the recovery and rebuilding process."

"FEMA's policy change averts the federal government violating the constitutional rights of those who continue to play a vital role in helping Texans get back on their feet after Hurricane Harvey," Paxton said. "Many churches and other houses of worship suffered damage from Harvey, and now they can seek FEMA

assistance so they can continue serving their communities."

OATHS ARE ADMINISTERED

Now-former Texas Supreme Court Justice Don R. Willett, nominated by President Trump and approved by the U.S. Senate to fill a vacancy on the Fifth Circuit U.S. Court of Appeals, and James Davis Blacklock, Willett's replacement on the Texas Supreme Court, both were sworn in on Jan. 2.

Texas Supreme Court Chief Justice Nathan Hecht administered the oath to Willett, who served more than 12 years on the Texas Supreme Court. Willett will take his place on the Fifth Circuit, the New Orleans-based federal appellate court with jurisdiction over appeals from U.S. district courts in Texas, Louisiana and Mississippi.

Gov. Abbott swore in Blacklock, who he appointed to succeed Willett on the state's high court. Prior to the appointment, Blacklock served as the governor's general


The year was 1961, and the tides of humanity which ebbed and flowed into the lower reaches of the Big Bend were at their historical nadir.

It was a vast, empty land spotted by isolated ranch headquarters, a national park with few visitors, and the many ruins of a past shrouded in legend, lore, and improbable truths. There was no television, no daytime radio, few telephones, and very few people.

Ben H. English came to the Big Bend at the age of two, the fifth of six generations of his family to call this enigmatic region home.

With his family headquartered at the old Lajitas Trading Post, he worked and lived on ranches and places

now little more than forgotten dots on yellowing maps. He attended the oneroom

schoolhouse at Terlingua, prowled the banks of the Rio Grande, and crisscrossed the surrounding areas time and again on horseback and by foot.

Some 50 years later he writes about those many decades ago, as well as the history and legends of this singular land he knows so well. Ben separates fact from fiction and brings the reader into a world that few these days can ever imagine, much less experience. He also writes about the lower Big Bend as it is found now, and what one can still rediscover just over the next rise.

English also served in the United States Marine Corps for seven years, taught a Criminal Justice program at Ozona High School and retired after 22 years as a trooper in the Texas Highway Patrol, serving in Ozona. He is also an honors graduate of Angelo State University with a BA in Government. Currently he lives in Alpine and writes on a variety of subjects.

Ben and his wife, Cathy, has two sons, Levi and Ethan, both of whom graduated from Ozona High School and the United States Naval Academy at Annapolis.

English to sign books | Food Handlers Class **Jan. 17**

The "Texas Food Establishment Rules (TFER)" now requires all food employees to complete an accredited food handlers training program within 60 days of employment, effective Sept. 16, 2016.

A food handlers course accredited by the Texas Department of State Health Services is being offered by Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service, Crockett County.

"Food Safety: It's In Your Hands" is scheduled for Wednesday, Jan. 17, 2018 starting at 9 a.m. at the Extension office at 1301 Avenue AA.

This 1-2-hour course will now be required for all food service employees to help promote the service of safe food.

The certificate is good for 2 years and is valid anywhere in the State of Texas. The course is a basic overview of food safety practices that are necessary to ensure that safe food is served at your establishment.

The changes in the rules came due to complaints recently of loud music at rodeo slab events.

Eligio Commissioner Martinez and Road Department Supervisor Jeffrey Stuart worked together on the rules.

Larry Walker spoke before the commissioners about the loud music the comes from slab during some of the events, specifically the bass sound.

"You can't go to sleep," Walker said.

County Judge Fred Deaton said the county has the convention center for music and dances, and that instead of having a dance on the slab it could be put in the convention center.

"We're going to get complaints either side," Deaton said. "We provide plenty of services for people of what they need."

tax revenue totaled \$2.75 billion in December, 12.3 percent more than reported in December 2016.

"Double-digit growth in sales tax revenue was fueled by collections from oiland gas-related sectors as well drilling and completion continued to rebound, but growth in tax receipts was notable across all major economic sectors, including retail trade and restaurants," Hegar said.

Total sales tax revenue for the three months ending in December 2017 was up 10.2 percent compared to the same period a year ago. Sales tax revenue is the largest source of state funding for the state budget, accounting for 58 percent of all tax collections.

Revenue from other major taxes on motor vehicle sales and rentals, motor fuels and oil and natural gas production also rose in December 2017, according to the Office of the Comptrol-

For example, motor vehicle sales and rental taxes totaled \$414.3 million, up 16.1 percent from December 2016, and vehicle purchases to replace cars damaged by Hurricane Harvey continued to boost those tax collections, the agency noted. Also, motor fuel taxes, at

\$303.7 million, were up 4.9 percent from December

production taxes, at \$396.4 million, were up 73.4 percent from December 2016.

ABBOTT ISSUES PROCLAMATION

Gov. Abbott on Jan. 5 proclaimed January 2018 to be Human Trafficking Prevention Month.

"The State of Texas will not tolerate the inhumane practices carried out by coercive and manipulative criminals. We provide serious penalties for human traffickers, and we continuously look for ways to better serve the victims," Abbott states in the text of the proclamation.

Abbott urged Texans "to learn more about the risks and indicators of human trafficking and to do their part in helping end this atrocity."

FORMER FIRST LADY DIES

Rita Crocker Clements, a force for decades in the Republican Party, died Jan. 6 at her home in Dallas. She was 86.

Clements was first lady of Texas twice, serving alongside her husband, Gov. Bill Clements, from 1979 to 1983, and again, from 1987 to 1991. Gov. Clements died in 2011 at age 94.

Mrs. Clements was noted for her role in renovating the governor's mansion in Austin, for her service on the boards of several major corporations and as a member of the University of Texas System Board of Regents.






