Medina wins runoff

Michael Medina Jr. defeated incumbent Commissioner Eligio Martinez Tuesday in the Democratic Primary Runoff. Medina had a total of 102 votes, while Martinez had 72.

"I just want to start off by thanking everyone that did turnout and vote in March and today. I'm looking forward to representing Precinct 4 and Crockett County as a whole. It was a team effort to get to this point, and it will be a team effort going forward everyday," Medina said.

Medina still has to run in the General Election in November. Without a Republican opponent, or a write-in candidate, Medina is expected to win and take office in January.

In state races, Lupe Valdez had a tight lead (50.4 percent) over Andrew White (49.6 percent) for the Democratic race for governor, as of press time. Locally, Valdez won with 147 votes to White's 72.

In the Democratic race for U.S. House District 23, Gina Ortiz Jones was leading 67.3 percent to Rick Trevino's 32.7 percent at press time. Locally, Trevino won by one vote with 112 ballots cast in his favor.

McWilliams named OHS Principal

Ozona High School will have new leader with a familiar face in the fall.

At a special meeting Monday, the CCCSD School Board approved Tammy McWilliams as the new OHS Principal.

McWilliams will be moving up from Ozona Elementary School, replacing current OHS Principal Rene Valeriano who has resigned.

McWilliams has been a principal for seven years in CCCSD.

She was at Ozona Middle School for six years, three years at Ozona Elementary School and two years she oversaw both OMS and OES campuses.

Prior to that, McWilliams was teacher at OHS for 14 years and OMS for 5 years.

"I appreciate the opportunity and I'm looking forward to it," McWilliams told the board.

Superintendent Raul Chavarria made the recommendation to the board.

"She has certainly earned

it. She was the best qualified applicant we had. If we can fill a position with someone in our district who has certain qualifications we want to take that opportunity," Chavarria said.

McWilliams has previously been named Principal of the Year by the Texas Association of Secondary School Principals.

She successfully led OMS out of unacceptable ratings and into met standard and receiving a two-star distinction.

At OES the campus has also maintained a met standard rating.

McWilliams has degrees from Texas A&M University and Sul Ross State University.

Chavarria said the board will begin the search for a new OES Principal.

Board members Dwight Childress, Orlando DeHoyos and Justin Morris were absent from the meeting.

Survey: Community, school district staff support conceal carry policy

The community and CCCSD teachers and staff are in favor of a conceal carry school district policy, according to a survey presented at the May 15 Regular School Board Meeting.

During his report, Superintendent Raul Chavarria presented the board with the results of a survey he conducted with the community and the district staff in regards of teachers and staff being allowed to conceal carry guns on school campuses.

In the community survey, 84.48 percent responded that they were in favor of district staff members having a concealed weapon at school, while 15.52 percent said they were against the idea. A total of 116 responses were received.

In the staff survey, 84.81 percent said they were in favor of certain staff members having a concealed weapon at school, while 15.19 percent said they were against.

On the second question of the staff survey, 63.29 percent said they were interested in participating in a training program to be able to have a concealed weapon at school, while 36.71 percent said they were not interested.

There was a total of 79 responses to both staff survey questions.

"This is a huge step, and this is a huge concern. You can see the results here. The majority of our community and our staff are in favor of something like this and this gives us information to move forward on what our district should do," Chavarria said.

There was also a comment section on both surveys. Comments were submitted anonymously.

Some of the comments submitted stated that a

Not only will Lucero be a part of the first generation of her family to go to college this fall, but also she will be the first Somerset ISD student to attend Harvard University – and on a full schol-

arship, no less. Local students like Lucero have access to the tools they need to thrive in the classroom and beyond because of programs like GEAR UP. I’ll continue to work with my colleagues on both sides of the aisle to ensure that every student in Texas has an equal chance for success for generations to come.

The No-Tel Motel

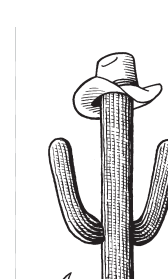
As a travelin’ man I spent my life in hotels and motels. I preferred motels to hotels because they were usually closer to my car so I was more mobile and I could escape being incarcerated, which is how I felt every time I stayed in one. Motels were cheaper too.

I live within 20 miles of the very first motel in the world, The Motel Inn. It got its name from the first two letters of motor car combined with “tel”. If you breakdown the word ho-tel in the same manor you end up with a lodging place for hookers and prostitutes.

Frequently, the lines were blurred. Was it a hotel or a motel I was staying in? Generally, at a motel there aren’t any bell boys or valet parkers you feel compelled to tip, and there aren’t exercise facilities. While a hotel has a weight room the only wait room at a motel is the lobby.

It’s harder to get a room at midnight in a motel because the manager turned on the “No Vacancy” light and went to bed two hours ago. That’s another big difference, while all motels have Vacancy/No Vacancy signs I’ve NEVER seen a hotel with one.

Annually I stayed at an old motel where you had to know the right room numbers if you wanted a hot shower. That old motel was probably the first B & B in the world, only the B & B didn’t stand for bed and breakfast but for the owners, Betty and Bill.

If you need a wake up call in a hotel you call a number and a hotel operator will take your room number and the time you want to arise. They get it right 78% of the time. In a motel an alarm clock is bolted down right next to the bed. By the time you figure out how to get it set, it’s time to get up. Now I’ll really show my age... in motels your bed may give you a massage for a quarter, but in a swank hotel you’ll have to go to their spa for that.

Hotels give you free stationery while motels give you a post card. The bars of soap at hotels are much bigger and suds-

ier. They also give you separate shampoo and conditioner bottles while in a motel it’s combined in one smaller bottle, or not at all. Due to my propensity to stay at cheap joints, I’d never had a chocolate mint placed on my pillow until I was 40 years old, and I only discovered it when I woke up with a hearing problem caused by melted chocolate in my ear.

A hotel usually has its own coffee shop and may also have a fine dining joint too. If so, they are usually very good. Governor speaks about issues related to shooting at high school

AUSTIN — Local, state and federal law enforcement on May 18 responded to a shooting that left 10 people dead and 10 others injured at Santa Fe High School near Galveston.

One of the school’s 1,400 students was taken into custody, authorities said.

Gov. Greg Abbott ordered flags to half-staff until May 22 in memory of those who lost their lives in what he called “probably the worst disaster to strike this community.”

During a news conference at the high school, Abbott said he plans to work with members of the Texas Legislature and with educators, parents and students across Texas “on swift solutions to prevent tragedies like this from ever happening again.” He mentioned background checks and “strategies to keep guns out of the hands of those who pose an immediate danger to others.” He also suggested more safety

personnel and mental health intervention capabilities on school campuses.

“In the fog of the aftermath of a catastrophe like this, the answers are not always immediate, but the answers will come by us working together,” Abbott said.

GOAL: TO END HARASSMENT

Texas House Speaker Joe Straus on May 16 established a workgroup of House members to recommend additional steps to prevent and eradicate sexual harassment in the Legislature.

Straus tasked the workgroup with reviewing existing sexual harassment policies, researching best policies and practices from other states and providing recommendations for any rule changes that would support a professional work environment.

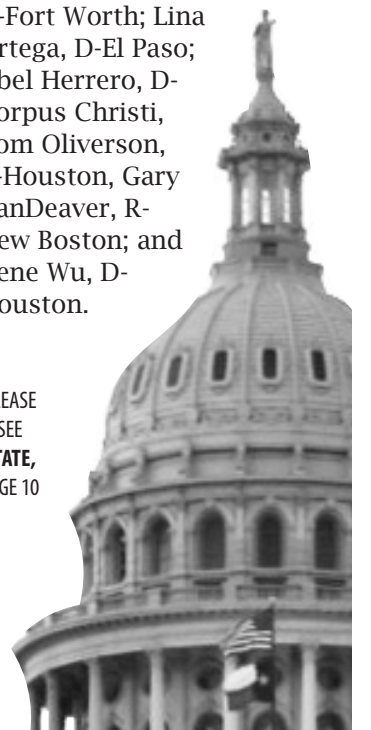
“This is the next step in our effort to make sure that sexual harassment is not tolerated at the Texas Capitol. Now that a stronger and more transparent sexual harassment policy is in place, this workgroup will recommend additional ways to make the legislative work environment safer,” Straus said.

The House Committee on Administration adopted a sexual harassment policy in December, clarifying ways Texas House employees can identify and report sexual harassment and get assistance. The policy also requires House staff to undergo new anti-harassment and anti-discrimination training. All current members of the Texas House have completed that training, Straus said.

Straus named state Reps. Linda Koop, R-Dallas, and Donna Howard, D-Austin, as

co-chairs of the workgroup. Other members include Reps. Angie Chen Button, R-Richardson; Tony Dale, R-Cedar Park; Nicole Collier, D-Fort Worth; Lina Ortega, D-El Paso; Abel Herrero, D-Corpus Christi, Tom Oliverson, R-Houston, Gary VanDeaver, R-New Boston; and Gene Wu, D-Houston.

Eating for brain function and repair

Slajerova, Martina (2015-12-01). The Keto Diet Cookbook: More Than 150 Delicious Low-Carb, High-Fat Recipes for Maximum Weight Loss and Improved Health.

Bear in mind, gluconeogenesis is "demand-driven", it will produce glucagon in the liver from protein, regardless how much protein is consumed daily. The belief that all protein not immediately converted into amino acids is fictitious.

Contrary to what many health authorities have led us to believe, cholesterol is vitally important for brain function and statins are detrimental to brain health. While the brain represents about 2-3 percent of our total body weight, our brains are comprised of about 25 percent of the cholesterol in our body and is localized in the brain as myelin, separate and apart from the lipoprotein cholesterol in the body. In the brain, it plays an important role in membrane function and acts as an antioxidant. Additionally, it is the raw material from which progesterone, estrogen, cortisol, testosterone, vitamin D and other hormones are made.

In a recent study avail-

able on the NIH Public Access site, researchers showed the best memory function in the elderly was those with the highest levels of cholesterol. Low cholesterol is associated

with an increased risk for depression, stroke and even death. With this relatively new understanding of the role of cholesterol in brain function, it raises concerns in the recommendations for prescribing statin medications.

Some estimates indicate the number of individuals taking statins to lower cholesterol may actually double within the next few years and this presents a major concern for brain health in the immediate future.

Exposing the propaganda plaguing Americans regarding healthy eating and brain health. "Grain Brain", Dr. David Perlmutter, forced authorities to rethink a lot of beliefs about what our bodies require for optimal health. Then Perlmutter released his book, "Brain Maker", and it turned what we thought we understood about brain health on its ear. I highly recommend both these books to anyone who is interested in their cognitive health.

"The brain thrives on a fat-rich, low-carbohydrate diet, which unfortunately is relatively uncommon in human populations today," says Perlmutter. "Cholesterol, for example, long vilified by the media and medical community, actually promotes neurogenesis (the birth of new brain cells) and communication between neurons, to the degree that studies have shown that higher levels of serum cholesterol correlates to more robust cognitive prowess." Says Max Lugavere, "The Optimist" in

his article, "Your 'Healthy' Diet Could Be Quietly Killing Your Brain". Lugavere recently released his latest literary offering that I also recommend is, "Genius Foods: Become Smarter, Happier, and More Productive While Protecting Your Brain for Life."

For the near two-thirds of the world community who are carbohydrate intolerant, carbohydrates not "healthy". "Healthy grains" such as brown rice, whole grain bread, or quinoa; consumed over a lifetime have been linked to disorders like dementia, ADHD, autism, chronic headaches, fibromyalgia, multiple sclerosis, and Alzheimer's; just to mention a few. The grains have been found to cause inflammation, the actual cause of problems with our brains and heart health. By increasing the amount of fat and cholesterol we eat daily, we can not only protect but potentially, undo years of damage.

Molly Kimball, a registered dietitian in New Orleans advises, "Instead, help to boost your attention span and productivity by incorporating more of these eight foods and nutrients that can help to provide that extra mental edge... eggs... green tea... berries... fish oil, salmon, tuna or sardines... sage... turmeric, rich in curcumin... leafy greens... and protein-rich foods, lean red meat, fish, poultry, and hard cheese."

We all have brains and we all eat, so learning exactly how to feed our brain for optimized brain function, development, and repair is information that is significant to us all.

deputy or trained veteran would be a great asset for the safety of all three campuses, as well as a trained teacher.

Some also suggested a special desk with a special lock where the weapon can be placed during school hours.

The majority of responses in favor of teachers carrying emphasized they be properly trained and many suggested they also be evaluated that they are mentally capable to handle the responsibility.

One response against the policy said due to Ozona having an open campus, teachers with guns would not prevent gun violence. The person also stated that since the district is on a deficit budget money should be used elsewhere, and that parents may transfer their children to other districts if the policy is adopted.

On the staff comments, the majority also recommended proper training, or allowing those who have a concealed handgun license or are former law enforcement to carry.

One person suggested that teachers who become certified to carry should rotate the days they carry a weapon to keep awareness up on those teachers.

Securing school campuses was also discussed on both the community and staff surveys.

During the meeting, Ozona Stockman Editor and Publisher Melissa Perner pointed out the vulnerability of the high school campus being open wide with multiple buildings and no secure entrance, unlike the middle and elementary schools.

"This is a problem that this district has had for years. I'm not blaming anyone and I'm sorry I don't have a solution, but it is a problem we need to discuss while we are talking about this issue," she said.

Freeman also mentioned what happens if a student wrestles a teacher for their gun or tries to get a hold of a teacher's gun. This concern was also mentioned in the staff survey comments.

Freeman mentioned about having a safe or lock box in the room.

"I think there are more threats than about the possibility of a shooter coming in. I'm all for keeping kids safe, but I can see all sides. It's a tough problem," Freeman said.

Board Vice President Orlando DeHoyos said he was opposed to a conceal carry policy.

"We need to deal with the reality. Always the shooter is heavily armed. We need to deal with that. At some point one of the best things you can do is shut the door. They need to raise the age from 18 to 21 and do universal background checks," DeHoyos said.

Board President Dwight Childress told DeHoyos that the school board can't change federal policy.

"It's easy when you're shooting with people that don't have a gun. I'd rather go into a knife fight with a toothpick than nothing," said Justin Morris, board member.

Morris said provide teachers and staff with active shooter training and give them tools to know what to do.

"There are a lot of talking points on this. I think the best we can do to protect our students is looking at this to best train our staff, not give them a gun and you're on your own," Chavarria said.

"There are some questions we haven't had answered. That's why we are exploring all this," Childress added.

No decisions were made at the meeting. The board said they will continue discussion and research what other districts are doing throughout the state.

"Unfortunately, no one is going to know if this was a good idea or a bad idea until something happens," Morris said.

HIRINGS and RESIGNATIONS

After meeting in executive/closed session for personnel, for an hour and 12 minutes, the board approved the resignations of Misty Jurado, Frankie Kay, Susan Cantu and Beverly Emswiler.

They also approved the hiring of Debby Fricke as a teacher and Jeff Shelton as a teacher and coach.

BUDGET WORKSHOPS

In his report, Chavarria commended the district staff in fiscally responsible in spending during the 2017-2018 budget.

Next month, Chavarria said he will report to the board on where the district stands on spending as the year ends.

"The CCCCSD Board's goal was to cut our budget without affecting instruction. We will continue to explore ways to do that as we enter our Budget Workshops," Chavarria said.

Budget Workshops have been set for June 25, July 9, July 30 and Aug. 27. Time is 6:30 p.m. on all workshops at the Administration Office. The workshops are open to the public.

THE BOARD ALSO:

Approved an Application for Participation in the Local Government Investment Cooperative (LOGIC).

Designated the Superintendent, Business Manager and the Board President to make final budget amendments for the 2017-2018 school year. Chavarria said he would keep the board informed on all budget items.

Authorized Chavarria to hire personnel during the month of June and July 2018. After that date, Local Policy DC will continue to be followed.

The next regular school board meeting will be held 6:30 p.m. June 20 at the Administration Building. The meeting is open to the public.

Extension office hosting Food Handlers Course May 31

The "Texas Food Establishment Rules (TFER)" now requires all food employees to complete an accredited food handlers training program within 60 days of employment, effective Sept. 16, 2016.

A food handlers course accredited by the Texas Department of State Health Services is being offered by Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service, Crockett

County. Food Safety: It's In Your Hands is scheduled for Thursday, May 31, starting at 9 a.m. at the Extension office at 1301 Avenue AA.

This 1-2-hour course will now be required for all food service employees to help promote the service of safe food. The certificate is good for two years and is valid anywhere in the State of Texas. The course is a basic

overview of food safety practices that are necessary to ensure that safe food is served at your establishment. Practices discussed include good personal hygiene, cross contamination, and time and temperature abuse.

To register for the course, call the Extension office at (325) 392-2721. The cost is \$20 per person (check or money order only) and

must be paid in full before the course begins. Those unable to attend the in-person class may also take the course online at foodsafety.tamu.edu for a \$15 fee.

Individual with disabilities who require auxiliary aid service or accommodation in order to participate in the event are encouraged to contact our office within

5 working days prior to the program. Educational programs of Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service are open to all people without regard to race, color, sex, disability, religion, age, national origin or genetic information or veteran status.

The class is taught in English but Spanish handouts are available.

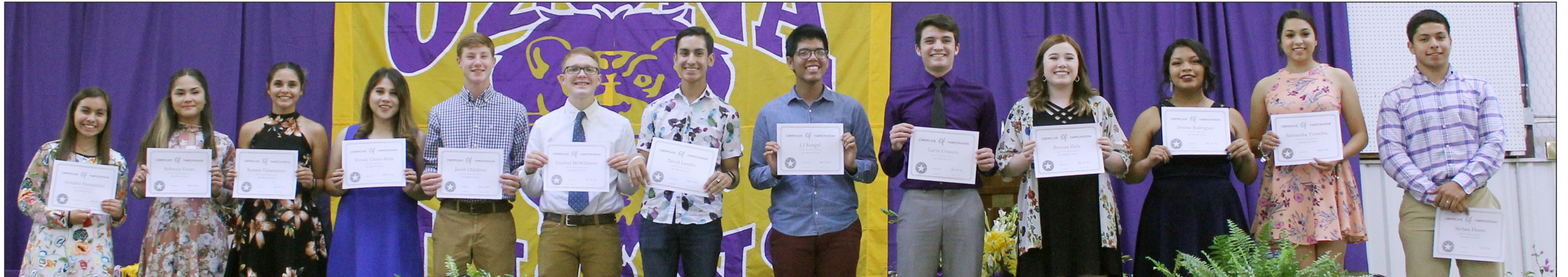

TxDOT launches 'Click It or Ticket' campaign

AUSTIN - Statewide seat belt use continues to increase, reaching nearly 92 percent for 2017, yet 929 unbuckled Texans still died in traffic crashes last year.

TxDOT's "Click It or Ticket" campaign reminds drivers and passengers that wearing a seat belt is the single most effective step they can take to protect themselves in a crash.

Wearing a seat belt reduces the risk of dying in a crash by 45 percent. That number jumps to 60 percent for pickup trucks.

While daytime seat belt usage continues to increase, nighttime use remains lower, leading to a higher rate of fatalities.

Last year, the Texas A&M Transportation Institute found the number of drivers and front seat passengers observed in 18 cities not wearing seat belts increased by almost 50 percent from day to night.

In 2017, 57 percent of all crashes where occupants died and weren't wearing a

seat belt happened at night (between 6 p.m. and 5:59 a.m.).

Texas law requires everyone in a vehicle to be properly buckled up or face fines and court costs up to \$200.

Children younger than 8 must be in a child safety seat or booster seat unless they're taller than 4 feet 9 inches. If they aren't properly restrained, the driver faces fines of up to \$250, plus court costs.

As part of the "Click It or Ticket" campaign, Texas law enforcement officers will step up their enforcement of the state's seat belt laws from May 21 to June 3, including the Memorial Day weekend.

According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, the "Click It or Ticket" initiative in Texas is estimated to have saved 5,473 lives, prevented more than 95,500 serious injuries and saved more than \$20.7 billion in related economic costs from 2002 through 2017.

SALES TAX HOLIDAY IS SET

Texas families and businesses can save on the purchase of certain water and energy efficient products during the state's "Water-Efficient Products" and "Energy Star" sales tax holidays.

The state comptroller's office estimates that shoppers will save more than \$10 million in state and local sales tax during the Memorial Day weekend May 26-28.

As of May 1, more than 60 percent of the state was in abnormally dry or drought conditions, and the upcoming summer heat puts a strain on the power grid. Those factors make it a good time to

upgrade outdated water systems and inefficient appliances, Hegar said.

PROGRAM FUNDS REPAIRS

Gov. Abbott and Land Commissioner George P. Bush on May 15 announced more than 15,000 Hurricane Harvey-stricken homes have received repairs through the Partial Repair and Essential Power for Sheltering program in coordination with the Federal Emergency Management Agency.

The program provides basic repairs that allow homeowners to live in their homes and their communities as they make more permanent repairs to their homes. Up to \$20,000 in repairs, including restoring electricity, air conditioning/heating and hot water, debris removal, limited drywall and insulation and restoring functional bathroom and kitchen facilities, have been provided to return the homes to safe, sanitary and secure standards, the officials said.

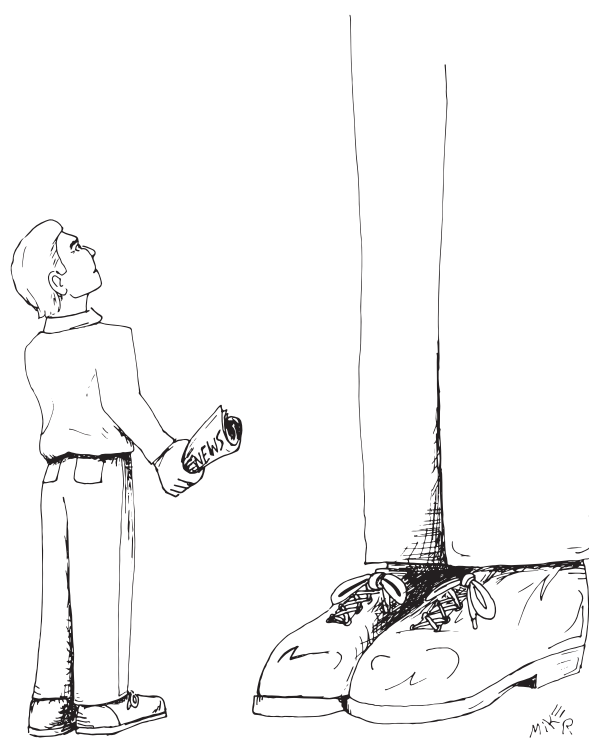
PAXTON FILES OPIOID SUIT

Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton on May 15 announced that his office had filed a consumer protection lawsuit in a Travis County state district court alleging that Purdue Pharma violated the Texas Deceptive Trade Practices Act relating to the company's manufacturing and marketing of prescription opioids, including OxyContin.

The attorneys general of five other states took similar legal action on May 15 against the Stamford, Connecticut-based company.

"My office is holding Purdue Pharma accountable for fueling the nation's opioid epidemic by deceptively marketing prescription painkillers including OxyContin when it knew their drugs were potentially dangerous and that its use had a high likelihood of leading to addiction," Paxton said.
