## Early voting continues this week

Early voting continues in the Nov. 6 General Election.

Early voting will run through Nov. 2. Crockett County Voters can cast their ballots from 8 a.m.-5 p.m. each day at the courthouse annex. Voting is open during the noon lunch hour.

As of press time Tuesday, the Crockett County Clerk's Office had reported 100 people voted Monday and 100 had voted so far Tuesday.

The Texas Tribune reported that Texas counties, large and small, saw substantial voter turnout on the first day of early voting.

About 15.8 million Texans are registered to vote in this year's mid-term elections, according to the Texas Secretary of State's website.

Election Day voting will be from 7 a.m.-7 p.m. Local polls are: Precinct 1 - Crockett County Courthouse Annex; Precinct 2 - Crockett County Senior Center; Precinct 3 - Crockett County Civic Center and Precinct 4 - Ozona Chamber of Commerce Visitor Center.

# Buckets instead of biology

## Rain, leaks forces OHS to relocate out of main building

As rain flooded draws and roads, Ozona High School dealt with water falling inside their building and the OHS Auditorium.

With more rain expected, OHS Principal Tammy McWilliams has moved classrooms and the OHS Office.

For now, the main office will be located on the middle floor of the OHS Heritage Building, McWilliams said.

The public entrance will be at the north end of the Heritage Building facing the OHS Cafeteria.

"All the classes in the main building have been moved to other areas on our high school campus. We are all in places that we can stay for an indefinite time. We still have some things to square away for the office areas, but our classrooms are out of the main building," McWilliams said.

McWilliams also closed the OHS Auditorium earlier this school year due to water damage around the windows, and parts of the auditorium ceiling falling.

The auditorium also has holes in the ceiling that have been there for years, one at least for nine, according to one teacher. With each rain, more damage occurs.

Water has run down walls in the OHS Office and underneath the flooring causing the floor to start to buckle. The OHS Office was also freshly painted over the summer.

In the second and third floors of the Main Building, water collects in trash cans and puddles in the middle of classrooms as ceiling tiles are covered with brown splotches from water falling. Some classrooms, the tiles have been removed.

McWilliams said some of the ceiling tiles were recently installed.

Water has also run down bookcases and walls in classrooms, and the rooms smell musty.

Outside of a third floor science lab is a bulletin board that states "In this School We Stick

## Lions edge out Buffaloes for district win

FORSAN - The Ozona Lions got their first district win Friday night as they held on to defeat the Forsan Buffaloes, 28-20.



Both teams would bounce back and forth with the Lions maintaining the lead the entire game.

Abraham Rodriguez once again was the leading scorer and rusher for Ozona, with four touchdowns, including one for 73-yards late in the third quarter. He had 258 yards total for the game on 26 carries.

Aiden Fuentes rushed for 50 yards on five carries. Joe Salas had 26 yards on four carries. Marcus Perez rushed for 23 yards and passed for 64 yards.

Offensively, the Lions would have 371 yards rushing and 436 total yards with 18 first downs.

"The boys played well and came away with the win. The offense controlled the ball all night," said Head Coach Kyle Freeman.

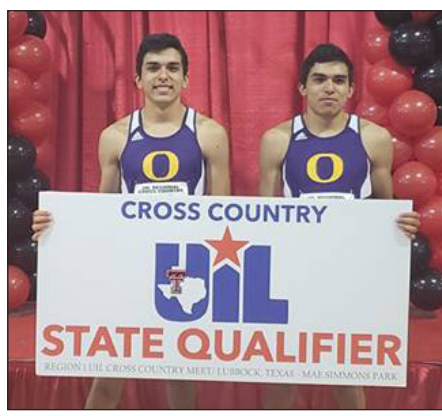
While the offense made their mark on the scoreboard, it was a defensive move that helped

between G.L. Bunger and Slate Williams.

Crockett County Commissioner, Precinct 4 between Michael Medina Jr. and Rudy Martinez.

The Crockett County CCSD is also asking voters for a bond election that will move funding from the district's Qualified School Construction Bond loan from the maintenance and operation budget to the interest and sinking budget in order to pay off the loan faster, and not subject the loan payment to recapture under the Robin Hood plan.

If approved by voters, it would add \$231,000 a year to the maintenance and operations budget, save taxpayers \$446,511 in interest and there is no tax increase to the taxpayers of Crockett County, said Superintendent Raul Chavarria. A vote for the bond would allow the district to move the money. A vote against the bond would keep the money where it is in the M&O budget.

 · U.S. Senator's race between incumbent Republican Ted Cruz and Democrat challenger Beto O'Rourke. Also included in that race is Libertarian Neal M. Dikeman.

· U.S. Representative, District 23 between Republican incumbent Will Hurd, Democrat Gina Ortiz Jones and Libertarian Ruben Corvalan.

The Texas Secretary of State's Office reminds Texas voters who possess one of the seven approved forms of photo ID that they must present that ID at the polls. Voters who do not possess and cannot reasonably obtain one of the seven forms of approved photo ID may execute a Reasonable Impediment Declaration form, available to them at each polling location, and provide a supporting form of identification. Additionally, certain voters may qualify for certain exemptions to presenting an acceptable form of photo identification or following the Reasonable Impediment Declaration procedure.

The seven forms of approved photo ID are:

- Texas Driver License issued by the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS);
- Texas Election Identification Certificate issued by DPS;
- Texas Personal Identification Card issued by DPS;
- Texas Handgun License issued by DPS;
- United States Military Identification Card containing the person's photograph;
- United States Citizenship Certificate containing the person's photograph; and
- United States Passport (book or card)

With the exception of the U.S. Citizenship Certificate, which does not expire, the acceptable photo ID must be current or, for voters aged 18-69, have expired no more than four years before being presented for voter qualification at the polling place. A voter 70 years of age or older may use a form of acceptable photo

to ID listed above that has expired for any length of time if the identification is otherwise valid.

If a voter does not possess one of the forms of acceptable photo identification listed above, and the voter cannot reasonably obtain such identification, the voter may fill out a Reasonable Impediment Declaration form, which will be available at each polling location, and present a copy or original of one of the following supporting forms of identification:

- a government document that shows the voter's name and an address, including the voter's voter registration certificate;
- a current utility bill;
- a bank statement;
- a government check;
- a paycheck;
- a certified domestic (from a U.S. state or territory) birth certificate; or
- a document confirming birth admissible in a court of law which establishes the voter's identity (which may include a foreign birth document)

The address on an acceptable form of photo identification or a supporting form of identification, if applicable, does not have to match the voter's address on the list of registered voters.

If a voter meets these requirements and is otherwise eligible to vote, the voter will be able to cast a regular ballot in the election.

Voters with a disability may apply with the county voter registrar for a permanent exemption to presenting an acceptable form of photo

to identification or following the Reasonable Impediment Declaration procedure at the polls. Voters with a religious objection to being photographed or voters who do not present an acceptable form of photo identification or follow the Reasonable Impediment Declaration procedure at the polls because of certain natural disasters may apply for a temporary exemption to presenting an acceptable form of photo identification or following the Reasonable Impediment Declaration procedure.

seal the Lions' victory.

With 28 seconds left in the game, Forsan would get the ball to the Ozona 40 yard-line. Buffalo Quarterback Kobe Richardson would throw the ball, but on the receiving end would be Ozona Lion Zachary Talamantez.

This second interception by Talamantez would seal Ozona's win, and was one of the few bright defensive spots of the game.

The Lions' defense would give up 342 total yards with 192 of those being in the air. Abraham Rodriguez, Lazaro Rodriguez and Joe Perez each had nine tackles and Fuentes had a sack.

"We need to keep improving and eliminate our mental errors. We have a young team and we need to mature in the bye week," Freeman said.

Ozona (2-5, 1-1) will get a week off before they face Winters (5-3) on Nov. 2. The Blizzards lost to Stamford Friday 49-30. The game will be Senior Night for the Lions. Kickoff will be 7:30 p.m. at Lion Stadium.

The OHS Senior will be performing the part of the "Cave-man" one of the ancestors.

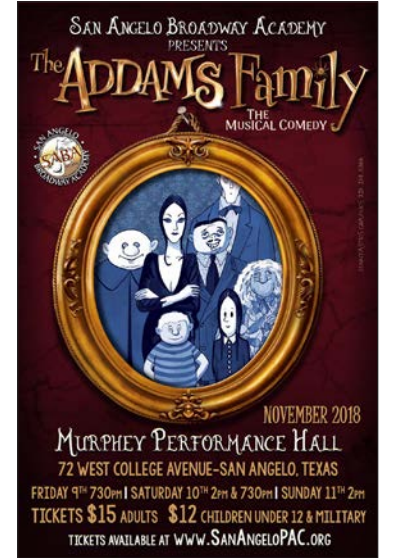
Landin is the son of Amanda and Havis Landin.

# DPS bolsters efforts to increase school bus safety

AUSTIN - In conjunction with National School Bus Safety Week (Oct. 22-26), the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) is urging Texans to comply with laws prohibiting drivers from passing stopped school buses.

The moments when a student is entering or exiting the bus can be one of the most dangerous times of a child's trip on the school bus.

It is illegal to pass a school bus that is stopped and operating a visual signal — either flashing red lights or a stop sign — and those who violate the law could face fines of up to \$1,250.

In an effort to increase the

safety of student passengers, Troopers will also be patrolling areas where school buses are picking up or dropping off passengers.

In 2017 and year-to-date in 2018, Texas Highway Patrol Troopers have issued 1,394 citations and 685 warnings for passing a stopped school bus.

According to Texas statute, a driver — traveling in either direction on a roadway — must stop when approaching a school bus that is stopped and operating a visual signal.

The driver may not proceed until one of the following occurs: the school bus resumes motion; the operator is signaled by the bus driver to

proceed; or the visual signal is no longer activated.

If a road is divided only by a left-turning lane, drivers on both sides of the roadway must stop for school buses with alternating red flashing lights activated.

However, if the lanes are separated by an intervening space or physical barrier, only motorists traveling in the same direction as the bus are required to stop.

(As a reminder, school buses, by law, must stop at all railroad crossings.)

Here are several safety measures drivers can take to help keep children safe:

- Be mindful of posted speed limits when driving in school zones and near buses.

- Slow down and watch for children congregating near bus stops.

- Be aware of student pedestrians and watch for children who may unexpectedly dart into the street without checking for traffic.

- Know and obey the traffic laws regarding school buses in Texas.

together." McWilliams said it has become the school's motto.

"Our teachers and students have truly shown what 'Every Step, Lion Pride' looks like in action. Each member of our staff and student body has helped to make this transition happen," McWilliams said.

Leaks are not new to Ozona High School, but since McWilliams was a teacher at OHS eight years ago she said they have become worse.

The OHS Main Building was completed in 1932. It was built with a \$170,000 bond approved by voters on Oct. 4, 1930, according to The Ozona Stockman's Historical Edition. The bond also provided the first unit of the South Elementary.

In 1977, voters approved a \$4.1 million for school improvements that included renovation of the OHS Auditorium, insulating roofs for year-round heating and cooling, enclosing windows and ceiling repairs at the high school.

The OHS Heritage Building was completed in 1912. The Heritage Building received a state historical marker in 1969. The OHS Main Building does not have a historical marker.

The National Weather Service in San Angelo estimated that Ozona received 6-7 inches of rain last week, with more anticipated for this week.

At the Oct. 17 school board meeting, the high school leaks and roof leaks at the 10-year-old elementary school were both discussed.

Superintendent Raul Chavarria said a bid from Garland Roofing Co. for the OHS Auditorium would cost the district \$335,000 to patch the roof and \$565,000 to upgrade the tile roof.

The board requested additional bids and estimates with a metal roof and other options.

Chavarria said the OHS Main Building is not closed down.

"Since more rain is in the forecast, the best option is to move classes around. At this time the only plan that we have is insuring that the kids were not in classrooms that leaked. I want to commend Mrs. McWilliams for moving classes around to other parts of the campus and accommodating those students," Chavarria said. "Our plan moving forward is to repair the roof. How soon is yet to be determined."

The next regular school board meeting is 6:30 p.m. Nov. 14 at the Administration Building, 797 Avenue D. The meeting is open to the public.

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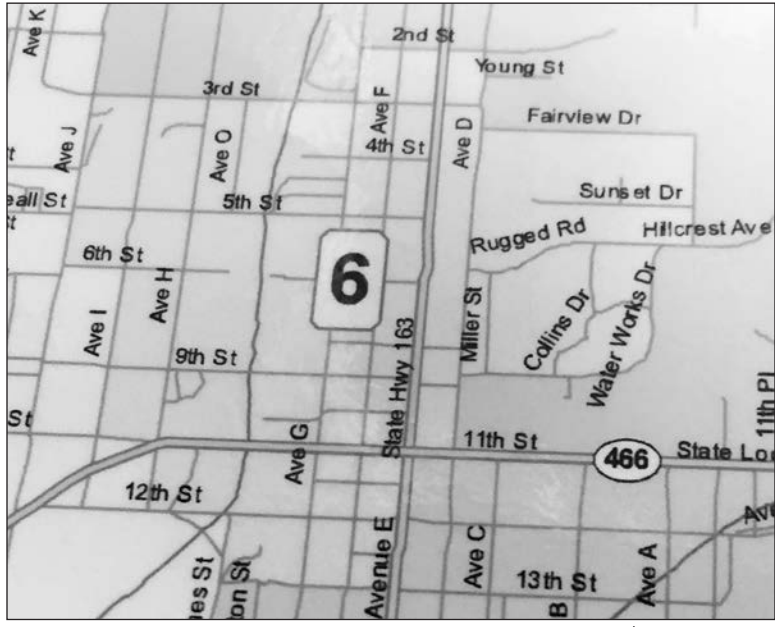

**Jobless rate falls further**  
Texas' seasonally adjusted unemployment rate fell to 3.8 percent in September, down from 3.9 percent in August, and setting a new record for the lowest unemployment rate recorded in four decades.

The Texas Workforce Commission posted the numbers on Oct. 19, also saying the state's economy added 15,600 seasonally adjusted non-farm jobs in September. The annual employment growth was 3.3 percent in September, marking 27 consecutive months of annual growth.

Texas Workforce Commission Chair Ruth Ruggero Hughs


said, "Texas' continued addition of jobs over a 27-month period demonstrates the competitive advantage and market opportunities available to our Texas employers and world-class workforce."

The Midland Metropolitan Statistical Area recorded the month's lowest unemployment rate among Texas MSAs with a non-seasonally adjusted rate of 2.2 percent, followed by the Amarillo MSA and the Odessa MSA, which had the second lowest with a rate of 2.7 percent. The Austin-Round Rock and College Station-Bryan MSAs recorded the third lowest rate of 2.9 percent for September.

**ALAMO PLAN IS FINALIZED**  
After the San Antonio City Council voted for final approval of an Alamo plaza lease agreement and closing the streets in front of the Alamo, Texas Land Commissioner George P. Bush on Oct. 18 released this statement:


