"Penny Candy, A Quilt and A Bear"

It used to be so much fun! They still did it in Abilene in the early 60's in the neighborhood in which we lived.
It was not It was not so far from the H.S.U. Rodeo Grounds when our sons were small. Late in the afternoon a group of neighborhood kids
