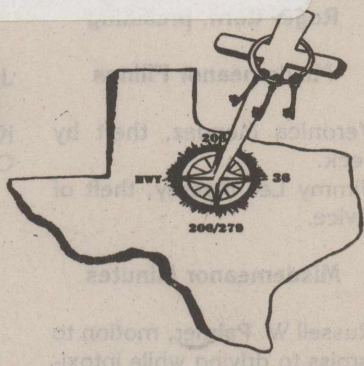

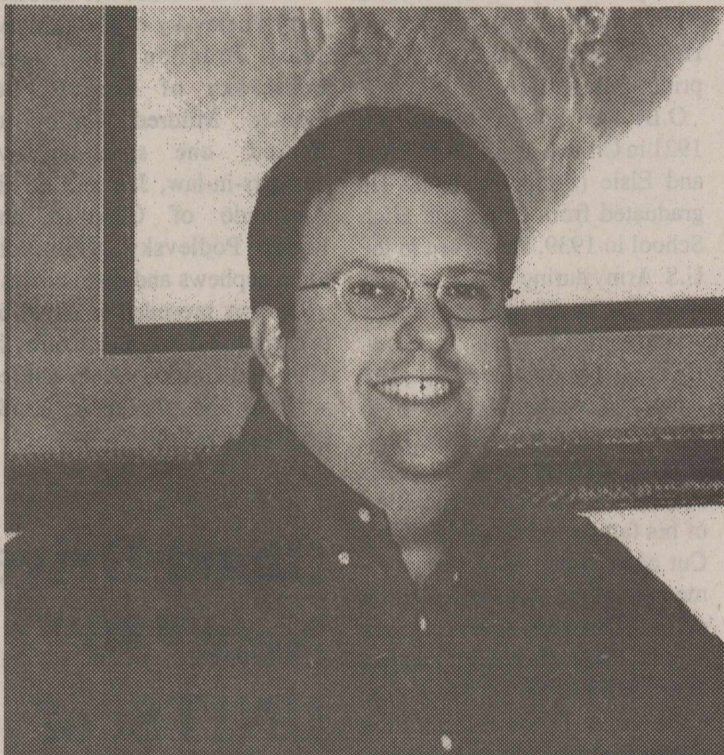
Although things are not perfect

"Meet this Author" Tuesday, May 18

The Friends of the Cross Plains Library invite you to **Meet the Author** Donald S. Frazier on Tuesday, May 18, 7:00 p.m., at the Community Center in Cross Plains.

Don is Chair of the History Department at McMurry University and Executive Director of Grady McWhiney Research Foundation. He co-authored, with Robert Pace, **Frontier Texas, History of a Borderland to 1880** which focuses on Texas history from 1780 to 1880 with stories about Indians, buffalo hunts, cavalry forts, cattle drives, outlaws, and the settlement of Texas. **Frontier Texas** was written and published to coincide with the opening of the Frontier Texas Museum in Abilene, and Don was honored as a West Texas Author of the Month for April. As a historian, he has specialized in Texas and the War Between the States. His 1995 book, **Blood and Treasure: Confederate Empire in the Southwest** (Texas A&M Press) was a History Book Club selection for that year. **Cottonclads! The Battle of Galveston and the Defense of the Texas Coast** was published in 1996, and in 1998, **The U.S. and Mexico at War: Nineteenth Century Expansionism and Conflict**.

Don Frazier is a creative and entertaining speaker and

teacher—he has even had his students participate in close order drills so they could better understand the life and training of soldiers during the War Between the States. A member of the Cherokee Nation of Oklahoma, he has received many honors, including an award for the best book on Trans-Mississippi Civil War history, and he has been staff writer for the *Fort Worth Star-Telegram* and a publications analyst for General Dynamics in Fort Worth.

Be sure to join us on Tuesday, May 18, 7:00 p.m., at the Community Center in Cross Plains. There is no charge for the program and everyone is welcome. Don will be happy to answer questions and visit with you after he speaks, and copies of his books will be available for purchase.

Saturday is Election Day for Cross Plains I.S.D. Board of Trustees and C.P. City Council Seats

Remember Saturday, May 15th, you may cast your vote for the candidate of your choice at the **Cross Plains Senior Citizens' Center, 108 North Main Street, Cross Plains, between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m.**

Appropriate forms of identification will be needed at the voting site according to the Secretary of State as follows:

*A driver's license or personal identification card issued to the person by the Department of Public Safety or a similar document issued to the person by an agency of another state, regardless of whether the license or card has expired;

*a form of identification containing the person's photograph that establishes the person's identity.

*a birth certificate or other document confirming birth that is admissible in a court of law and establishes the person's identity;

*United States citizenship papers issued to the person;

*a United States passport issued to the person;

*official mail addressed to the person by name from a government entity;

*a copy of a current utility bill, bank statement, government check, paycheck, or other government document that shows the name and a address of the voter; or

*any other form of identification prescribed by the secretary of state.

O.B. Byrd, age 83, of Cross Cut, passed away Tuesday, May 11, 2004, at Brownwood Regional Medical Center.

Memorial services will be at 3:00 p.m. Sunday, May 16, 2004, at Higginbotham Funeral Chapel with the Rev. Richard Chaffin officiating. Higginbotham Funeral Home will be in charge of arrangements.

O.B. was born February 13, 1921 in Cross Cut, Texas to Elvie and Elsie (Edington) Byrd. He graduated from Cross Cut High School in 1939. He served in the U.S. Army during WWII and was wounded in Okinawa; he then served 1 1/2 years in Oahu, Hawaii. He married Blanche Howe December 18, 1946 in Brownwood. He farmed and ranched at Cross Cut all of his life. He was the fourth generation of his family to live in the Cross Cut community. O.B. became a member of the Methodist Church at Cross Cut while he was in grade school. Later the church merged with the First United Methodist Church in Cross Plains. He served for many years on various boards of the church as well as treasurer of the Cross Cut Cemetery Association. He has served as chairman of the board for many years.

He used his G.I. Bill from WW II to obtain his Flight Instructors Rating and instructed in Brownwood. He has served as director of Brown County Farm Bureau since it was organized in 1953, and served as president seven different times. He served as director of Brown-Mills County Soil Conservation Service, which later became Pecan Bayou Soil and Water Conservation Association. He has served as chairman of the board for many years.

O.B. was a member and past Master of the Masons in Cross Plains, member of Suez Shrine in San Angelo, and a member of the Oriental Band of the Heart of Texas Shrine Club of Brownwood where he played a drum. He served as president of the H.O.T. Shrine Club of Brownwood and as president of the band.

Survivors include his wife, Blanche Byrd, of Brownwood; sisters-in-law, Joyce Fore and husband, J.B., and Anna Mahan; numerous cousins including Billy Williams and Bonnie Barr, both of Coleman, Betty Klindera of Camdenton, MO, Shirley Marsh, Lynn Lawlis, both of Brownwood; an aunt, Lela Murle Lawlis of Coleman; as well as several nieces and nephews.

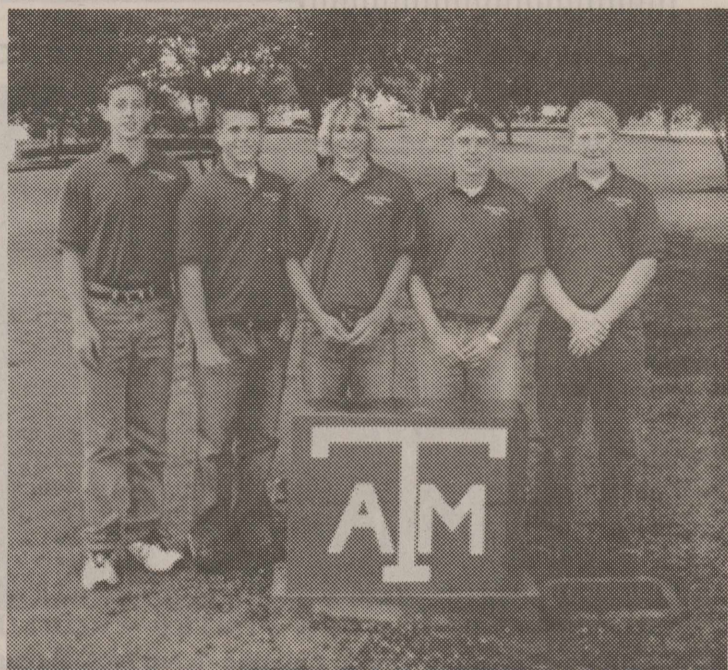

City Council Minutes

April 6, 2004

This was a regular meeting of the Cross Plains City Council. All members of the council were present except for Dean Dillard, who was out due to illness. Minutes of the previous meeting were approved as read.

Mayor Purvis gave the monthly police report. He reported 64 calls for service, 4 criminal mischiefs, 5 thefts, 2 warrants served, 4 assaults, 1 prowler, 1 gas drive off, 2 deadly conducts, 2 terroristic threats, 1 burglary of a vehicle, 2 accidents 1 drug arrest, with 27 warnings, 44 citations. By general consent the council approved the report as presented.

Bob Hill, Municipal Judge, presented the monthly Judge's report. He reported 44 citations for March with 17 remaining outstanding. There are 3 citations outstanding for February and 4 remaining outstanding for January. Collections for March were \$4,997.50. By general consent the council approved the report as presented.

Rodney, with WestTex Connect, Broadband/Wireless Internet Service, met with the council to discuss the City of Cross Plains entering into an agreement with them allowing them to install equipment on the City's water tower to provide high speed internet service to the citizens of Cross Plains. He asked that the agreement be an exclusive agreement between the city and WestTex Connect, and that no other internet service providers be allowed to place equipment on the tower using the same frequencies. By general consent the council agreed to have Debbie Gosnell look into the matter to see if the city can legally give them an exclusive contract for that purpose and to place the item on the special meeting set for April 12, 2004 at 6:00 p.m.

Brad Kuykendall, representative for BFI, met with the council to discuss a 4 percent increase in their garbage charge. Mr. Kuykendall discussed the fact that BFI has not had an increase since 1995 and explained that the rising cost in fuel, financial assurance insurance, health care benefits, and the loss of state fuel tax credit has made it necessary to ask for the increase, and that the increase would take effect May 1, 2004. Jerry Cassle moved to permit BFI to increase their garbage charges to the City of Cross Plains by 4 percent. Gene Dillard seconded and motion carried.

Next on the agenda was bid opening for the purchase of a backhoe. Following is a list of bidders and their purchase price:

Edwin Weiss moved to table the discussion of the bids until council had time to look over all the specifications of each bid and to place the item on the agenda for April 12, 2004 at 6:00 p.m. Jerry Cassle seconded and motion carried.

Judy Porter, representative for the Food Pantry, met with the council to inform them that the pantry did receive their grant and that they needed the City's approval of the floor plan since the building would be sitting on City property. By general consent the council agreed to look over the plans at the called meeting on April 12, 2004 at 6:00 p.m.

Keith Lawrence met with the council to ask them to reconsider opening the south end of Avenue B and to rescind the motion to open the street. By general consent the council agreed that they would not rescind the motion and told Keith that they had already addressed the matter in two previous meetings, and that they were going to open the street at the city's convenience.

John Ivie met with the council to discuss selling the city a 20' right-of-way on the west end of his property. After lengthy discussion, Jerry Cassle moved to purchase the 20' for \$1,000.00 and to build a 4' chain link fence on the east side of the right-of-way to separate the city's property from Mr. Ivie's. Gene Dillard seconded and motion carried.

Discussion was held concerning an interlocal agreement between the City of Cross Plains and Callahan County for the purchase of a 10,000 gallon emulsion tank for the purpose of storing emulsion during the paving season for both the city and the county due to Koch Material shutting down their Brownwood Plant. Jerry Cassle moved to enter into the interlocal agreement. Edwin Weiss seconded and motion carried.

Discussion was held at length concerning the passage of Ordinance #2004-003 concerning the regulation of junked vehicles. It was discussed that not only are there numerous sites throughout the city that citizens are storing an abundance of junked and dilapidated vehicles, but we are also placing these same types of vehicles on city property. Several citizens from throughout the community were present for the meeting to share their support in passage of the ordinance. Edwin moved to pass Ordinance #2004-003 "Regulations of Junked Vehicles" on the first reading. Jerry Cassle seconded and motion carried. It was noted that the ordi-

nance would be read again at the next regular meeting in May and that a public hearing would be held for the purpose of citizen input. The ordinance will not be passed until the second and final reading and publication of the ordinance.

Jerry Cassle moved to offer Circle D Trucking \$21,800 for the 1993 Mack Dump Truck that the city is interested in purchasing. Edwin Weiss seconded and motion carried.

James Nichols moved to pay Don Gosnell for 40 hours comp time retroactive back to March 15, 2004. Edwin Weiss seconded and motion carried.

Jerry Cassle moved to pay bills. Gene Dillard seconded and motion carried.

Mark Norris, Water Superintendent, read a letter received from TCEQ concerning the annual water system inspection. He advised the council of each item that was cited in noncompliance and advised the council of how each would be taken care of.

Gene Dillard moved to adjourn. Jerry Cassle seconded and motion carried.

The council looked over the bid sheets provided by Abilene New Holland, Warren Cat, Yellowhouse Machinery and CASE, Inc. After lengthy discussion and comparison of each bid, the council voted as follows. Dean Dillard moved to purchase the 420D-02 Kat with the extended warranty and take the money out of reserves. Gene Dillard seconded and motion carried. James Nichols abstained from voting.

Ordinance #2004-0003

An Ordinance of the City of Cross Plains, Texas; providing for the regulations of junked vehicles and items; making findings of fact; providing definitions; providing for notice and impoundment; providing for the City's use of abandoned motor vehicles; providing for the disposition of vehicles and proceeds; declaring junked vehicles a public nuisance; providing procedures for abatement of public nuisance; providing for fines; providing for disposal of junked vehicles; providing for severability; providing an effective date; and providing an open meeting clause.

WHEREAS, the City of Cross Plains recognizes the need to regulate abandoned motor vehicles and junk vehicles within the City in order to preserve and protect the public health and safety and to preserve the quality of life and property values;

WHEREAS, the provisions of the Ordinance are consistent with Chapter 683, Tex. Trans. Code;

WHEREAS, the City Council seeks to adopt such regulations, and give additional emphasis to the regulation of abandoned and junk vehicles by providing procedures for the impoundment, reclamation and sale of such abandoned and junk vehicles in order to maintain the health, safety and welfare of the City; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has held a public hearing to consider the voice and views of the citizens regarding the process, procedures, requirements and conditions provided in this ordi-

nance; NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CROSS PLAINS, TEXAS THAT:

SECTION 1. Findings of Fact. The above and foregoing recitals are hereby found to be true and correct and incorporated herein as findings of fact. The City Council hereby further finds and determines that the rules, regulations, terms, conditions, provisions and requirements of this ordinance are reasonable and necessary to protect the public health, safety and quality of life.

SECTION 2. Junked and Abandoned Motor Vehicle

Regulations Adopted. The City County hereby adopts the "Junked and Abandoned Motor Vehicle Regulations" for the control and regulation of junked and abandoned vehicles within the City of Cross Plains to read as set forth in the attachment hereto entitled "Junked and Abandoned Motor Vehicles", attached to and incorporated in this ordinance as though fully transcribed herein for all purposes.

SECTION 3. Effective Date. This ordinance shall take effect immediately, from and after its passage and publication in accordance with the provisions of the Tex. Loc. Gov't. Code.

SECTION 4. Severability. It is hereby declared to be the intention of the City Council that the sections, paragraphs, sentences, clauses and phrases of this Ordinance are severable and, if any phrase, sentence, paragraph or section of this Ordinance should be declared invalid by the final

judgment or decree of any court of competent jurisdiction, such invalidity shall not affect any of the remaining phrases, clauses, sentences, paragraphs and sections of this Ordinance, since the same would have been enacted by the City Council without the incorporation of this ordinance of any such invalid phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph or section. If any provision of this Ordinance shall be adjudged by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, the invalidity shall not affect other provisions or applications of this Ordinance which can be given effect without the invalid provision, and to this end the provisions of this Ordinance are declared to be severable.

SECTION 5. Open Meetings. It is hereby officially found and determined that the meeting at which this ordinance was open to the public as required and that public notice of the time, place and purpose of said meeting was given as required by the Open Meetings Act.

PASSED AND APPROVED on the first reading this 6th day of April, 2004.

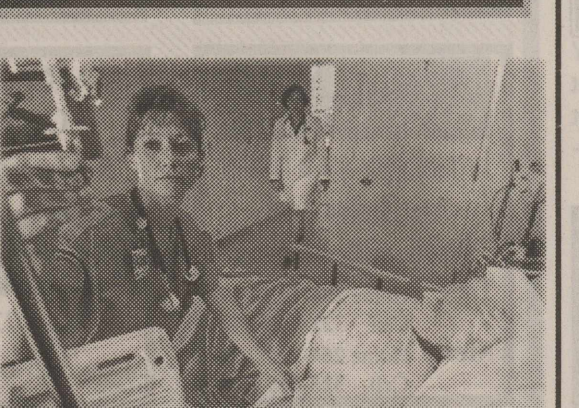

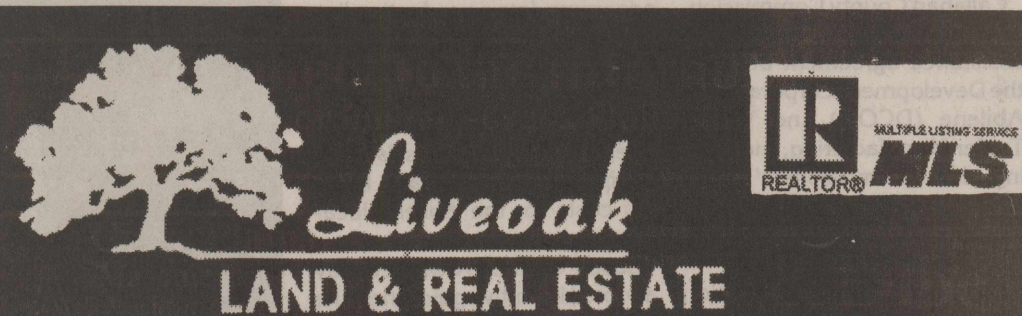

Commissioners approve DCOA assistance agreement

Callahan County Commissioners Court voted to approve an assistance agreement between the Development Corporation of Abilene (DCOA) and Wilson Trailer Manufacturing, Inc. during the commissioners' court regular monthly meeting held Monday, May 10 at the County Courthouse in Baird.

The Development Corporation of Abilene voted at its April 27 meeting to assist Wilson Trailer Manufacturing, Inc. to relocate to 10 acres along Interstate 20 east of Abilene.

Because the property is in Callahan County's ETJ (extra territorial jurisdiction), the County Commissioners for Callahan County are required to approve the assistance before an agreement may be signed.

Wilson Trailer Manufacturing has been in Anson for a number of years and manufactures trailers, grill guards, truck beds, rear bumpers and grill guard combinations. The company has never advertised its products, and much of its sales are generated through word of mouth. The majority of its products are shipped out of the area and out of state. The company has experienced difficulty finding experienced welders needed to meet orders. Trailer production is currently running 6-8 weeks behind schedule. Therefore, Wilson is considering leaving the trailer manufacturing operation in Anson and moving the manufacturing of other products to Abilene.

Wilson owns 10 acres on I-20, east of Abilene near Goin Crane in the Callahan County ETJ, and will purchase and erect a 50x100 foot metal building to

accommodate a production line and offices. Wilson's costs for purchase of land and building construction are estimated at \$131,000. The company requested the DCOA assist with equipment purchase and training costs for the Abilene location.

Based on the DCOA recently adopted incentive guidelines, the DCOA assistance includes:

Projected New Positions: 25-30, Pay Scale \$20,000 to \$30,000/year, DCOA Assistance per new job \$4,000, Total DCOA Assistance new jobs \$120,000.

Project New Positions: 5-10, Pay Scale \$30,000 to \$40,000, DCOA Assistance per new job \$8,000, Total DCOA Assistance new jobs \$80,000.

In addition, the DCOA proposes a \$10,000 training grant to reimburse actual training and/or salary costs during the training period. Payments will be made once the training program is complete at the rate of \$500/FTE created.

The company will have three years to create the 40 new jobs and payment will be made only after certification of jobs created. Payment will be prorated and made annually for three years. If any new jobs are created in years two and three, the payments will be extended up to two additional years to allow the company to realize the full benefit of the incentive for each position created.

Total DCOA Assistance: \$210,000

Total New Employment: 40
DCOA average cost per job: \$5,250.
