In 1933 my parents moved me away to Paducah, Texas for two years and in 1935 we came back to Cotonwood. In 1940 my father again purchased the Blue Arrow station and Bill and I renewed our friendship for a brief spell before old friend.

## New Immunization

 Requirements Told
## Along with new schedules, dif-

 ferent room numbers and an-other teacher's name to learn, parents enrolling children school facilities will face some new immunization requirements for the 2004-05 school year. And there's a new way to find
local information about how to meet these requirements. Just dial 2-1-1. Parents should be sure their children are in compliance with
all school-enrollment vaccina tion requirements for the students to attend school, said Monica Gamez of the Texas De partment of Health (TDH) immunization division. quire that school students be vaccinated against nine illnesses diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis (whooping cough), polio titis B and varicella (chicken
pox). "New requirements affect
hepatitis B, varicella, polio and hepatitis B, varicella, polio and
diphtheria/tetanus/pertussis vaccines," Gamez said. Students in kindergarten
through fifth grade and through fifth grade and seventh through 1oth grade will need to hepatitis B vaccine. Students in kindergarten through fourth and seventh through 10th grade will
need to show proof of one dose need to show proof of one dose
of varicella vaccine. "Subsequent grade levels will be added each school year until $2006-07$ when all students in
kindergarten through 12 th grade kindergarten through 12 th grade
will be required to show proof of hepatitis B and varicella vaccinations," Gamez said.
In adddition, children In addition, children entering
kindergarten must show proof kindergarten must show proo
of five doses of a diphtheria/ tetanus/pertussis vaccine (DTP) DTaP/DT). One dose must be
on or after the child's fout on or after the child's fourth
birthday. "Students in othe birthday. "Students in other
grades will not need to receive grades will not need to receive had a fourth dose on or afte their
said. Childrenenterin also will need proof of four doses of polio vaccine, one of which must have been received on after their fourth birthday.
"Children who attended kin dergarten last year and received the third dose on or after their fourth birthday are not required
to show proof of a fourth dose," to show proof of a fourth dose,
Gamez said. Students in kindergarten through third grade and those attending child-care facilities who live in one of 39 specific
Texas counties also need proo of two doses of hepatitis A vac cine. In the past, some schools hav
