blood clot. The diagnosis was that 97 percent of these types of tumors are malignant and the kidney would have to be removed, too. I told the specialist, "You've given me a 3 percent margin and I'm going to go home and pray about it."

That is exactly what I did. Powerful prayers were also lifted up on my behalf thanks to so many dedicated prayer warriors. Thank you one and all, for your caring attitude and commitment to another human being. I don't think we realize the power of healing that prayer truly has if we only ask. We haven't tapped into the miracles

A third CatScan determined that the tumor had a consistency similar to a blood clot. This didn't bother me, because I felt like the prayers were changing things and this was much better than a tumor. However, the specialist asked me if I was claustrophobic and I knew we were headed toward a MRI. I bravely remarked, "I'll just close my eyes and take myself to another place."

Well, that was a lot more difficult than I anticipated. Even though there is no pain involved, it is like a mental stress test. You definitely have to be able to accomplish "mind over matter" to get through.

At the very first a twinge of fear ran through me and I was tempted to have a panic attack, but-I talked my self out of it. After all, I needed the result of this test. I am very proud to report that I made it through, as many individuals can't cope with the close quarters, noise, non-

movement, etc. The results of the MRI were well worth the process. It turns out that the blood clot is now gone, but there is a benign tumor on the outside of the kidney. They are going to watch it and see if it enlarges or changes. Surgery could be an option, but I won't have to lose a kidney. Another MRI is on the horizon for February, but I have 6 months to psyche myself up.

I just want to thank the Lord for His intervention and for this hopeful diagnosis. This experience has been lifechanging. I think we often take our health for granted, until we

crash into a brick wall. Believe me, it will make you do some deep thinking about what you truly want to do with whatever amount of life you might have remaining. The country western song of Tim McGraw's "Live Like Your Dying" hit home for me. It is a great song with a wonderful message that we all need to keep in mind. We do need to live every day like it is our last,



George W. Steel, 88, resident of Rising Star for 66 years, died Wednesday, August 18, 2004, at Brownwood Regional Medical Center.



William Phillip "Phil" Rutledge



I am more and more becoming a daily reader of the comics; I find so many lessons for life therein - spiritual and real life applications. 



children are in compliance with all school-enrollment vaccination requirements for the stupartment of Health (TDH) immunization division.

State immunization rules require that school students be vaccinated against nine illnesses: diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis (whooping cough), polio, measles, mumps, rubella, hepatitis B and varicella (chicken pox).

"New requirements affect hepatitis B, varicella, polio and diphtheria/tetanus/pertussis vaccines," Gamez said.

Students in kindergarten through fifth grade and seventh through 10th grade will need to have received three doses of hepatitis B vaccine. Students in kindergarten through fourth and seventh through 10th grade will need to show proof of one dose of varicella vaccine.

"Subsequent grade levels will be added each school year until 2006-07 when all students in kindergarten through 12th grade will be required to show proof of hepatitis B and varicella vaccinations," Gamez said.

In addition, children entering kindergarten must show proof of five doses of a diphtheria/ tetanus/pertussis vaccine (DTP/ DTaP/DT). One dose must be on or after the child's fourth birthday. "Students in other grades will not need to receive the fifth dose of vaccine if they had a fourth dose on or after their fourth birthday," Gamez

Children entering kindergarten also will need proof of four doses of polio vaccine, one of which must have been received on or after their fourth birthday.

"Children who attended kindergarten last year and received the third dose on or after their fourth birthday are not required to show proof of a fourth dose,"

Gamez said. Students in kindergarten through third grade and those attending child-care facilities who live in one of 39 specific Texas counties also need proof of two doses of hepatitis A vac-

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

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

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
ABILENE-Annual maintenance costs for the state highway system now exceed the money the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) receives annually from the 20cent a-gallon state gas tax.

State and federal gas taxes, which currently finance most highway improvements, are yielding less and less revenue because the taxes are not tied to inflation, and today's cars use less gasoline per mile. Due to the state receiving less revenue, Russel Lenz, Abilene District Engineer, says the department must look for ways to stretch its transportation dollars.

"One way we have been able to stretch our dollars," Lenz said, "is by relying heavily on our experienced maintenance employees throughout the Abilene District. Additionally, TxDOT supervisor's, like Rudy Rodriguez here in Callahan County, do an outstanding job of identifying, scheduling and performing roadway maintenance needs.'

The maintenance crews in Callahan County have many responsibilities. "For example, in addition to maintaining the roadways themselves by doing such things as filling potholes, repairing cracked pavement, ditch work, delineation and signing," Rodriguez said, "our crews are also responsible for the inspection of jobs being performed by contract maintenance personnel. Some of these contracted jobs include mowing, litter pick up, guard rail repair, maintaining picnic areas, and other roadway maintenance contracts.'

During Fiscal Year 2003, Tx-



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DOT spent \$1,446,955.59 on labor, equipment and materials in Callahan County on work performed by TxDOT employees to maintain the transportation system. In addition, \$1.311,613.84 was spent on contracted maintenance activities administered by TxDOT

"We're perceived as a big roadbuilding machine," says Mike Behrens, executive director, "but the reality is that we spend more resources on making sure the roads, bridges and rest areas that we already have are kept in the best possible shape for the traveling public.

TxDOT spends close to half, or \$2.2 billion, of its total budget on maintenance, compared to one-third of its monies for highway construction. Also, almost half of TxDOT's employees are directly involved in maintaining the transportation system while about half of maintenance operations are privatized.

"In Callahan County," Rodriguez said, "from September 2002 through August 2003, our maintenance crews and contracted forces have resurfaced 102.86 miles of roadway, filled 918 potholes, mowed 11,405 acres of right of way, picked up 27,954 acres of litter, replaced 4,177 linear feet of guard fence and placed 828,329 linear feet of striping. And, if it were not for our Adopt-a-Highway volunteers, the amount of litter having to be contracted out for pick-up would be greater

"Every day, around the clock, the public depends on transportation, whether it be getting to work or play, to transport goods to market or to get our kids to school safely," Behrens said. "The transportation system that allows all of that requires constant maintenance, repair and preservation."

The department devotes some 6,700 employees statewide to that job. The 16 employees in Callahan County are responsible for 750 lane miles with an average daily vehicle miles traveled
