About five years ago when we first moved to this area, we contracted with Dale Mitchell to renovate the old house on our property. Little did I know what that decision would bring to me and my husband. Dale introduced us to his mother, Dorothy. She shared with me her love of beauty through the paintings and the amazing handmade quilts she created. She gave me plants and flower seeds, hoping in vain I suppose, that I'd someday create a flowering paradise such as the one she maintained in her yard. She took me to church, then she took me fishing. She gave me her recipes, her good advice and her friendship.

She saw these times almost as a sacrament, and I know that she and God had many interesting and informative discussions while she was fishing.

Dorothy was a woman of many facets like the gem she was. She could be funny, opinionated, strong, gentle, tough-as-leather, or sweet-as-pie. I imagine that few who knew her casually ever suspected that truly wicked sense of humor lurking behind her sweet face. She saw the world for what it was, looked it in the eye, and went right on loving those around her and adopting anyone who needed a helping hand. Countless kids, family members and friends passed through her house. All received the benefit of her strength and caring kindness.

Dorothy never had the advantage of much formal education, but she was certainly one of the most intelligent women I have ever met. A voracious reader, she was better informed than most of us and could converse on almost any subject. Talking to her was a delight. You always came away feeling better, as though you'd been given a gift.

She loved all flowers, particularly the wildflowers of spring. More than once I heard her say, as she gently touched a flower she was admiring, "Only God could make a flower."





Republican Shane Deel de- In the Precinct #6 (Clyde) box, feated incumbent Democrat Deel won with 126 votes to 112 Allen Wright for the post of Callahan County Attorney from General Election returns on Tuesday, November 2.

Deel won the Early Voting boxes, and six of the seven voting precincts, while Wright won the Eula Precinct #2 voting box. Deel captured 3,241 (58%) total votes for County Attorney to Wright's 2,313 (41%) total

votes Deel took the Early Voting box 1,501 to Wright's 1,027. Deel won the Precinct #1 (Clyde) box 383 to 280 for Wright. The Republican took the Precinct #3 (Baird) box 421 to 218 for 2,820 (50.3%) of the county

#5 (Putnam) box 52 to Wright's crat Charlie Stenholm. 16 votes. In the Precinct #4 (Cross Plains) box, Deel won appear in next week's newspawith 293 to 192 votes for Wright. per

for Wright. In the Precinct #7 (Oplin) voting box, Deel had 135 votes to Wright's 86. Wright's lone box was won at Precinct #2 (Eula) where he took 382 votes to Deel's 330 votes. Deel will take the oath of office for County Attorney on January 1, 2005.

For the office of U.S. President, George W. Bush won with 4,536 (80%) votes countywide, to 1,072 (19%) for John F. Kerry. The race for U.S. Representative from District #19, Republican Randy Neugebauer captured Wright. Deal took the Precinct vote to 2,708 (48.3%) for Demo-
