Behind the Books

In wandering through Cherry's work space this week, I came across a brand new book that is just being processed into our system. A very interesting book indeed.

Written by a close family member, it chronicles the life of Rev. S.P. Collins, who served the Presbyterian flock here from 1915-1942. A very busy man, he not only built the big ole' church that still stands, he built a hospital, headed the local Red Cross for years and provided canned goods, fresh produce and second hand clothing for the needy.


