## Pre-Kindergarten and Kindergarten Registration April 29 <br> Parents are asked to register their children who will enter PreKindergarten next fall. Cross Plains Elementary offers PreKindergarten to all children who will be four years of age on or before September 1, 2005. PreKindergarten will be offered if a sufficient number of four-year olds register for the program. Determination of whether Pre-K will be a $1 / 2$ day program or a longer program will be based upon enrollment numbers. Students who will be five years of age on or before September of age on or before September 1,2005 are eligible for Kindergarten. Kindergarten is a full day program. Kindergarten is a basic part of the Cross Plains School system and the service is available to all students. If your child is currently enrolled in PreK at Cross Plains Elementary, you will not have to go through he screening process. By 1900, the town had 200 houses more than 30 stores and shops, a waterworks, churches, schools, offices, stables, an opera house that seated more than 650 people, a dairy, meat market, a 200 room hotel and an ice plant. The Thurber electric plant furmaking Thurber one of the first towns in the state to have full electric service.
The opera house was the first building in Texas used for public entertainment to have ceiling fans.

and if allergies are suspected, get medical attention as soon as possible.
A swarm of honey bees may
cluster temporarily on almost cluster temporarily on almost
any object such as a tree branch, mail box or fence. The swarm may remain for a few
hours or, at times, for several hours or, at times, for sever
days while scout bees searc
for a suitable nesting site. A days while scout bees sear

The possibility of beekeepers
collecting swarms has lessened the past few years. The low value of the bees and other
problems with collecting problems with collecting
swarms have forced many beeswarms have forced many bee-
keepers to quit this service. In areas where Africanized bees are established most beekeepers won't collect swarms. The best alternative is to have the bees killed by a commercial
pest control operator.

keep bees from entering walls and other structures, block all entry ways such as holes in walls where pipes or electric
wires enter, cracks in window framing, knot holes in wood siding, weep holes in bricks, and cracks where wood and brick structures join. Most of
these openings can be filled these openings can be filled
with caulking. If an opening is necessary for air flow, block it with a wire screen. If you find that bees are already in a wall,
do not block their entrance do not block their entranc search for an alternative exit and may find their way to
inside of the building. Honey bees that have moved
into a building should into a building should be re-
moved as soon as possible, before they begin to build combs in which to rear young
bees and stem honey. Only when the bees first enter can
they be killed without having to they be killed without having to
open the wall and remove large quantities of dead bees, wax and honey. If the colony has
been in place for 3 weeks been in place for 3 weeks or
longer, brood and food stores longer, brood and food stores
will be present in the colony and the bees are more likely to be defensive. As established colony must be removed after it
