
ents for a while, until Mama could work and make enough money to rent us a house.

The Texas & Pacific Coal Company became the Texas & Pacific Coal and Oil Company and turned its attention more to oil production, after a 1915 oil find near Thurber.

The coal mine operated at a reduced scale until 1921, and Thurber died a lingering death. The site is marked today by the old electric plant smokestack on the north side of Interstate 20, about 16 miles east of Ranger.




You know kids say what they feel and they write it, too.

I wish to pay tribute to ALL mothers who have worked hard at raising a child. There is no way to list all the accolades that are due you.


I also wish to pay tribute to a special group of mothers like myself who tried very hard but never were sure that they excelled.


