
# **Howard Days Declared A Success**





# **Community Residents Met** with AEP Representatives **About Tree Trimming Issues**

An emergency meeting was called at the Cross Plains City Hall on Thursday, June 9, at emphasized the fact that the 3:00 p.m. to discuss the trimming of trees by AEP. Mayor Ray Purvis, Councilmen Gene Dillard, Audrey Purvis and Terry Lichty, and Debbie Gosnell, Secretary, were present.

Mayor Purvis called meeting to order. Greg Blair, Manager of Community Affairs with AEP addressed the group of approximately 30 people.

Mr. Blair explained that the trimming was an obligation of AEP to serve the public. The project was related to safety and liability, as the trees were the leading causes of outages. He noted that Cross Plains fell in the 10 percent worst performing feeders and most frequent electricity outages. Mr. Blair stated that AEP had the right to trim trees and maintain reliable service.

Rolan Jones asked if the trimming crews had been professionally trained. Cody Magruder, ISA Certified Arborist for AEP, introduced at this time. He stated that they had hired Aspluenda Tree Expert Company to trim the trees and the trimmers operating out of buckets had been certified to work around the lines.

Several community members asked why the trimming was so radical this particular year. He explained that the trees were cut back to a branch that would sustain the tree, or otherwise it was cut down completely.

Arlene Stephenson asked how

half a tree (many have been trimmed one sided) could even sustain its weight in a storm or the Texas winds.

Councilman Terry Lichty community residents had never complained of tree trimming before. However, the cuttings were never so radical. Lichty performed a physical demonstration with a small tree branch to make his point concerning the complete destruction of some trees. Lichty drew the conclusion that labor cost and maintenance was the determining factor leading to the drastic cuttings.

Nancy McGough stated that Cross Plains residents were proud of their trees and wanted to protect them.

VonDell Bailey asked why they were trimming at the wrong time of the year and emphasized the fact that some of the large oaks, etc. would probably die.

The AEP representatives stated that the trees must be 15 feet from the line according to their requirements. Their goal was to have fewer outages and to get the electricity back on quickly.

The trimming project in Cross Plains would last for three months and it was a concern to residents that many trees would be damaged and destroyed in that time period. They have already been working in the area for about a month.

Ann Beeler offered information she had obtained via internet stating that the City Council had legal authority concerning the trimming. The attorney for the City of Cross Plains could be contacted about the matter.

## Commissioners approve order prohibiting fireworks in County

Callahan County Commission- Callahan County Commissioners voted Monday, June 13 to ers Court. approve an order prohibiting the use of fireworks in unincorporated areas of Callahan County for the upcoming Christmas and New Year's holiday season.

On a motion by Commissioner Bryan Farmer and second by Commissioner Harold Hicks, commissioners voted 4-0 to approve the motion. The order follows:

Callahan County **Order Prohibiting Fireworks** in Unincorporated Areas of Callahan County

A. The order states a person commits an offense if he or she intentionally, knowingly, or recklessly detonates, ignites, or in any way uses fireworks on a county road or in the right-ofway of a county road.

B. If the landowner's permission is obtained prior thereto, persons may detonate, ignite, or use fireworks on private property in unincorporated areas of the county, as long as:

1. The person using the fireworks is not intoxicated as defined in Vernon's Act. Civil Statues Article 62011-1 (a) (2).

2. Reasonable precautions are taken concerning proximity to structures and flammable vegetation.

3. Children are adequately supervised by adults.

4. Water is readily available for extinguishing fires. C. An offense under this order

## The healing power of laughter

It has been an ongoing question in the medical community for years: What effect does humor have on healing? Some researchers focus on the strictly scientific aspects of the debate, noting that there is no direct evidence indicating that humor heals illness. Yet other medical experts have demonstrated how laughter can bring specific health benefits. For instance:

· Laughter boosts the immune system, increasing natural disease-fighting cells.

· Laughter lowers blood pres-

 Laughter increases tolerance to pain, as reported in the 1989 Journal of the American Medical Association. Laughter increases heart rate

and pulse rate.

of heart disease.

And probably most importantly, laughter helps to reduce stress. A wealth of research has shown that distressing emotions, such as depression, anger and anxiety, are all related to heart disease. Humor directly changes distressing emotions; therefore, humor may help reduce the risk

"If you can laugh at it, you can survive it. " -Bill Cosby

Illness can be very stressful to patients and their caregivers. Hospitalization, separation from family, invasive procedures, complex technology or an unfamiliar environment can all create feelings of anxiety, loneliness, anger or fear. These emotions are known to produce physiological changes that are harmful to the body.

Laughter can be therapeutic to both patient and caregiver when dealing with illness. Laughter is pleasurable; it momentarily banishes feelings of anger or fear and gives a feeling of power and control. And shared laughter is a uniquely human bond that helps us connect with one an-

Humor and laughter can foster a positive and hopeful attitude. Laughter provides an opportunity to release those uncomfortable emotions which, if held inside, may create biochemical changes that are harmful to the

Researchers say that children laugh about 400 times a day, while adults laugh about 15 times a day. Increasing our daily dose of laughter may help us recapture our youthful spirit - and perhaps become healthier in the process.

**Howard Days** created the genre of heroic fantasy. His fiction has crisscrossed the world, been translated into a dozen languages, and continues to inspire and move new generations of writers and fans some seventy years after his death. Known chiefly as the creator of the world-famous Conan the Cimmerian, Howard's literary barbarian and his world were less the culmination of his writing career, but another notch on a literary belt so varied that it defies categorization.

Robert Ervin Howard was born January 22, 1906, in Peaster, Texas. His father, Isaac M. Howard, was a country doctor, tending to farmers and their families. Dr. Howard moved his wife, Hester Jane Ervin, and their young son all over Texas, hopping from small community to small community. Robert E. Howard leaned heavily on his mother for companionship, and she encouraged his reading and studies. He was an imaginative boy, able to absorb and retain oral stories as well as written fiction, people among which one's lot is reading everything he could get

his hands on. By 1919, the family settled in Cross Plains, just slightly ahead Cross Plains, just slightly ahead of the oil booms of the twenties, which brought huge numbers of people into the area, causing local businesses to thrive. Thousands of people thronged the small town looking for legitimate work in the fields, but with this crowd came the con men, gamblers, drifters, saloon girls, and of course, the fast-talking businessmen and speculators looking to make a quick buck before the oil wells dried up.

These images of sudden civilization, indolent cruelty, thievery, and boomtown decadence indelibly colored Howard's perceptions of the world, and these views of civilization in decay would turn up again and again in Howard's fiction. In a 1931 letter to Weird Tales editor Fransworth Wright. Howard wrote: "I'll say one thing about an oil boom; it will teach a kid that Life's a pretty rotten thing as quick as anything I can think of."

Cross Plains was the largest community that the Howard family had lived in at that time, and, coupled with the influx of people chasing black gold, offered plenty of amusement for young boys. Howard's vivid imagination and knack for making up stories gave him an outlet for acceptance with the local kids, and his love of boxing helped him fit in with the boys.

In high school, Howard was an average student, but his skill at writing singled him out amongst his fellow classmates. At the age of fifteen, he had decided to make his living as a writer when he submitted a story to Adventure, one of his favorite pulp magazines. It was promptly rejected. By the time he was sixteen, Howard was winning prizes for stories and essays in the school newspaper. Howard continued to write stories, working through his reading sources and influences, looking for his

Shortly after Howard graduated high school, he made his first professional sale, a caveman story called "Spear and Fang," to Weird Tales. He had accumulated a number of rejection slips, too,

but that sale rekindled his ambition. During the early 1920s, Howard sent out and sold a number of stories to Weird Tales and other pulp magazines while he worked at a variety of jobs in Cross Plains, everything from stenographer to soda jerk, from errand boy to oil-field reporter. Howard was also an accomplished poet and wrote reams of verse with historical subject matter, much of which wouldn't be seen until decades after his death, though he did sell several poems to Weird Tales. However, Weird Tales paid on publication, not acceptance, and as a result, Howard was forced to find work. His father added to the pressure by wanting Howard to follow in his footsteps, or, failing that, go to college and find a vocation. Howard hated all of these menial jobs. He hated punching a clock, and he didn't like being told what to do by others.

In a letter to H.P. Lovecraft, Howard wrote: "It is no light thing to enter into a profession absolutely foreign and alien to the cast; a profession which seems as dim and faraway and unreal as the shores of Europe." The Howard family enjoyed some prestige in the community, as Dr. Howard was well-liked and took good care of the citizens of Cross Plains. Robert was expected to fit in by either taking up his father's mantle or at the very least contributing to the town in such a way that the family's prestige wasn't diminished. Some folks thought he was sponging off his parents. Others thought that he was just a little strange (an opinion not helped by his bookish side), because he didn't have the same opinions and desires as those around him.

Howard had a circle of friends that he hung out and corresponded with, but he was essentially alone in aspirations. These pressures weighed heavily on the young man, and his writing was sometimes sporadic. He blew off steam whenever he could, most notably in the local icehouse, where he boxed with other roughnecks. Bodybuilding and exercise had turned Howard into a heroically proportioned man with a punishing punch. His wins at the icehouse allowed Howard a measure of self-respect, but his job situations and nagging at home persisted.

Robert struck a deal with his father: he would take a bookkeeping course at nearby Howard Payne University. Afterwards, he would be given one year to find success as a writer. If that failed, he would take up the profession

of bookkeeping. The die was cast. He received his diploma for the bookkeeping course in 1927, and set to work immediately thereafter, determined never to rely on it. Howard needed to produce saleable stories. Motivated by the mundane world around him and a fervent desire to make his own way, he dipped into childhood fantasies, European history, and his own rough surroundings to create a host of memorable

While taking his bookkeeping course, Howard came up with a character and a story that would be very influential in his later career. He went back to the manuscript, polished it up, and sent it to Weird Tales. Howard was over-

joyed when it was accepted for publication. "The Shadow Kingdom" was the first sword-andsorcery story ever written, a combination of horror and heroic fantasy starring King Kull. Himself an Atlantean barbarian, Kull ascends to the throne of Valusia and is beset on all sides by conspiracy, weird menace, and diplomatic intrigue.

It was Howard's biggest sale to date, and thereafter he began to sell steadily to Weird Tales. Another Kull story, "The Mirrors of Tuzun Thune," was accepted and published, along with a different character Howard resuscitated from his adolescence—Solomon Kane, the-dour and puritanical swordsman who fought pirates and cannibals along the coast of England and darkest Africa. Seven stories were ultimately published contributing greatly to Howard's income and prestige within the readership of the magazine.

Howard's second big break came in 1928 when he sold "The Pit of the Serpent" to Fight Stories magazine. This sale was the beginning of Howard's most personal and most overlooked character, Steve Costigan. An able-bodied sailor, Costigan roamed the Asiatic Seas with his white bulldog, Mike, in these picturesque boxing tales. Sailer Steve was gorilla ugly, but he had a heart of gold, fists of steel, and a head full of rocks. Costigan was a bare-knuckled fighter and Howard's flair for writing vivid action served these stories well. Conflicts often revolved around a boxing match, but just as frequently took place in back alleys or other unorthodox environments. These were the first humorous stories that Howard would make a living writing, and they were extremely popular in the page of Fight Stories and Action Stories and later, Jack Dempsey's Fight Magazine. The publishing company, Fiction House, paid on acceptance, as well, and by the end of 1928, all discussion about Howard taking a bookkeeping course was

summarily dropped. While the Costigan series provided steady income, Howard gave voice to another pair of childhood characters, Bran Mak Morn, King of the Picts, who clashed with the Roman armies in Britannia, and Francis Gordon, a.k.a. El Borak, the swashbuckling gunslinger who traveled the Orient. These, in addition to various horror, action, and historical stories, appeared mostly in Weird Tales and its companion magazine, Oriental' Tales.

Howard wrote in most every genre, and was able to write well, quickly, and with an economy that the editors liked, since most of them paid by the word. That's not to say that Howard just knocked them out, either. He wrote multiple drafts of most of his stories, often incorporating suggestions from his editors. Howard wrote intuitively, trusting his instincts, and was able to work at a manic rate, writing stories and casting them aside, then picking them up, rewriting them again when they came back, and submitting them to different editors and markets. For all his effort, Howard had yet to create his most famous character, the one that would far outlive him and doom him at the same time.

It was in 1932 that Howard created and sold his most famous character. "The Phoenix on the Sword" was the first Conan story' to appear in Weird Tales, and it: was an immediate hit. In the story, Conan has already ascended to the throne of Aquilonia and now wears the crown of rule: on an uneasy head. His right-hand man is lured away by a point of diplomacy, leaving Conan vulnerable to an assassination plot (which is helped along by the wizard, Thoth-amon). Conan, tipped off by a ghost, makes ready to welcome his would-be slayers. The conspirators, loyal to the old king, are unprepared for a half-armored Conan and he mops the floor with them in a characteristically fierce battle:

"Phoenix on Sword" has all the primal ingredients of Howard's Conan stories: magic, adventure, swordplay, politics, and most importantly, a little of Howard's own philosophy: barbarism must ultimately triumph. In many of the stories, we see the barbaric Conan behaving with more honor and dignity than the cultivated aristocrats around him. It was a recurring them in Howard's work, one he first explored in his earlier Kull stories.

Other stories followed, each one detailing a different phase of Conan's varied career: pirate, mercenary, thief, wanderer, and even king. In the pages of Weird Tales, Conan was an unqualified hit. Howard was mentioned frequently in the letters page, drawing praise from fans and fellow writers.

Even now Howard is referred to as one of the "three Musketeers" of Weird Tales, along with H.P. Lovecraft and Clark Ashton in Weird Tales, Smith. These three writers set the bar for quality and originality.

> No one had done anything like Conan before. As both a character and a genre, the work was utterly unique. Howard's inspiration was a varied and fickle thing. He told Clark Ashton Smith that: "(Conan) is simply a combination of a number of men I have known...some mechanism in my subconscious took the dominant characteristics of various prizefighters, gunmen, bootleggers, oil field bullies, gamblers and honest workmen I have come in contact with, and combining them all, produced the amalgamation I call Conan the

Cimmerian." That Howard was able to vividly conjure up a historical world that never existed and a character that was the American "everyman"—an orphaned immigrant who pulls himself up by his bootstraps to become a kingall from a small town in Texas, is an astonishing thing. But it was Howard's determination to succeed as a writer without moving to one of the major publishing centers, Los Angeles, Chicago, or New York, that is truly remarkable. Howard was merciless in his onslaught to markets. When one story came back, rejected, he would turn it right around and send it to another market. Farnsworth Wright, the editor of Weird Tales, was most directly responsible for Howard's income, although Howard continued to sell stories elsewhere for the rest of his life. In 1934, Howard turned to his surroundings to construct new stories. He started another popular series in Action Stories in the style of his earlier burlesque boxing sailor stories, this time about a mountain man named Breckenridge Elkins and his

various goings-on. A refined mix of action and comedy, they continued to run in the magazine until two years after Howard's death. Howard wrote modern westerns, serious westerns, as well as weird westerns with ghostly or supernatural trappings in them. Again he returned to the theme of civilization being an inherently corrupting influence, and these played very well within the western mythos. His correspondence with fellow Lovecraft Circle writer August Derleth shows Howard's love of folklore, Texas history, and the tall tales in the same tradition, as both men regaled each other with information about their respective states. In particular, both men were sympathetic to the plight of the Native American people, and discussed local tribes in some detail. Howard's letters with H.P. Lovecraft also show him defending the concept of the

noble savage. In spite of great success making a living as a writer in a small Texas town in the middle of the Great Depression, Howard's home life was less than satisfactory. With his father gone for extended periods of time, Howard was left alone to care for his mother, who suffered from tuberculosis. He was prone to fits of depression, what he referred to as his "black moods." He had many friends and acquaintances and kept a regular correspondence with many fellow writers, but had very few people close to him that he could open up to. When his mother went into a coma in June 1936, Howard wrote a final cou-

May 2005 -- Wishes on Wheels makes available Electric Power Wheelchairs to non-ambulatory Senior Citizens (65 years old & up) and the permanently disabled of any age, if they qualify.

Usually, there is no charge or out-of-pocket expense for the power wheelchair, including shipping and delivery to the home by a technician, who makes the final adjustments to fit the individual and shows them how to use and maintain it. No deposit is required and there is no obligation for determining if they qualify.

Electric wheelchairs are provided to those who cannot walk and also cannot operate a manual wheelchair sufficiently or safely enough to care for themselves in their residence. They do have to be able to safely operate a joystick controller on the armrest and understand the basic instructions.

There are additional qualifications including that their doctor approves and recommends their need for a power wheelchair.

The Wishes on Wheels program's main purpose and goal is to develop public awareness of the assistance options that exist to allow senior citizens and the permanently disabled to remain independent in their homes without incurring extra expense.


