

Commissioners hear from architect on courthouse preservation program

Anyone who's been to the 42nd District Courtroom at the County Courthouse in Baird during the summer months knows how unbearable the courtroom can get. The Callahan County Courthouse was constructed in 1928 before air-conditioning was

Owens made the comment during discussion of a possible courthouse restoration grant through the Texas Historical Commission (THC)

Callahan County Commissioners met for over two hours Wednesday morning, June 15 with Kim Williams and Jason Jennings with The Williams Company at the county commissioners' courtroom in Baird.

The commissioners' court earlier in the month approved a contract for the Courthouse Restoration Master Plan with The Williams Company Architects of Austin. The Williams Company will be paid \$12,500 to complete the master plan and submit the grant application to the Texas Historical Commission.

Under the contract, The Williams Company will complete the master plan by the next round of

grant funding deadline in September 2005.

Williams met with the commissioners' court to discuss the grant application process. Attending the meeting were Judge Roger Corn, Commissioner Tommy Holland, Commissioner Harold Hicks, Commissioner Doris Grider, County Treasurer Dianne Alexander.County Clerk Jeanie Bohannon, District 42nd District Court Clerk Sharon Owens and Callahan County Historical Commission Chairman Reggie

Callahan County has termiand will resubmit a new master pany. Williams told the commissioners' court he believes they will be able to use a lot of the Callahan County's courthouse age and condition, the county would not have received any grant funding from the previous rounds.

Williams said the grant application process is highly objective and rather complicated. He said the THC is not just going to give away \$4 million in a "brown paper bag" to the winning counties to do with the money like they please.





This dusty tan and at times dark green place had come to haunt me. The roles have reversed and now I feel as if I am separated from my family and that my fellow soldiers were just that,

Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) The highest permissible level of a contaminant in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technol-

Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG) The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected health risk. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level (MRDL) The highest level of disinfectant allowing in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants.

Maximum Residual Disin-

fectant Level Goal (MRDLG)

The level of drinking water disinfectant below which there is not known or expected risk to health. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contamination.

Treatment Technique (TT) A required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.

Action Level (AL) The concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.

Turbidity has no health effects. However, turbidity can interfere with disinfection and provide a medium for microbial growth. Turbidity may indicate the presence of disease-causing organisms. These organisms include bacteria, viruses, and parasites that can cause symptoms such as nausea, cramps, diarrhea and associated headaches.

Courthouse-

TxDOT won't get involved with the funding process. Williams said he'll come back to the commissioners' court a second time after July 15. Williams said the THC will call for the fifth round of funding sometime in August or September and will award the grant money sometime in mid to late fall. He said the grant funding will begin flowing to the winning counties early in 2006. He said it would be late summer of 2006 before the winning counties receive their total grant con-

Williams said Callahan County's courthouse restoration project is "modest" compared to others. He said the county courthouse in Baird is a "very sound building." He said the building is in excellent shape for the date of the building.

The courthouse building however does need new mechanical, electrical and plumbing renovation. The building's room also needs new work and the courthouse elevator dates to 1957. He said the courthouse elevator is slow, but still runs. The building also is in need of new wiring to connect all offices to the In-

The courthouse windows are also in need of restoration. The outside entrances to the courthouse have also been remodeled and those entrances should be restored the original architect's vision.

Williams said the entire courthouse, including the elevator and restroom facilities, do not meet the American Disabilities Act (ADA) regulations.

The architect also will recommend the courthouse master plan include a new "wet" sprinkler system for the courthouse.

Williams said if the courthouse is awarded grant funds, he would suggest Callahan County not stay in the building during restoration. He said that would only drive up costs. He said in almost every restoration project, county offices move to another location. Williams also recommends not performing the restoration project in phases. He said county offices would relocate from eight to 14 months during the con-

missioners look for someone to serve as project representative for the county during the construction period.

Williams said the county would face additional costs to relocate the county offices into multiple locations. He recommended the commissioners' court put funds in the budget now for those relocation costs.

Williams said the county would be required to provide 15 percent in matching funds based upon the restoration grant

The architect said there are some items which would not qualify for restoration monies, including landscape and site work, and new computer equip-

Williams said Jason Jennings

will be working with the commissioners' court to obtain most of the master plan data. He said much of the data from the pre-

vious master plan will be used. Williams said the Texas Historical Commission use a scoring system to rank the restoration projects. He said there are 24 criteria used and the maximum number of points a project can receive is 232 points. He said the THC holds to their point system and sticks to it to rank the projects.

Unfortunately, older courthouses receive the higher number of points, while courthouses which are maintained properly don't score as many points. Williams said record management does score points. He also said courthouse with historical markers are also scored higher.

Judge Roger Corn said based upon the previous architect's estimate, the county would have to budget \$150,000 for the restoration project. "That's not going to be close," Judge Corn said based upon the 15 percent match and the possibility the county offices would have to relocate for eight to 14 months. "I have reservations about this project cost," Judge Corn said. Williams said during Shackel-

ford County's restoration project, the county came up with \$50,000, while the county's historical commission raised \$200,000 Williams reminded the com-

missioners' court the building's electrical system "is one scary system." He said there is new wiring hooked to original wiring. Williams said two of the three courthouses in Texas which have burned was simply from "bad wiring." Hill County and Newton County totally burned down because of electrical problems. "Even if you don't participate, you still have serious issues,"

"Do you want the state to help you with 85 percent of the costs, or do you want to do 100 percent later," Williams asked of the commissioners. "This is a fabulous opportunity and hopefully the citizens will rally behind you," Williams said.

Williams recommended forming a county restoration committee and having those individuals see the problem with the courthouse firsthand. He reminded the commissioners' court since 1991, all public buildings should be ADA accessible.

Williams also said public meetings should be called to inform the public about the courthouse restoration project. He said of the 220-plus county courthouses in Texas, at least 70 more are in need of restoration like Callahan County.

Williams said the THC wants courthouse exteriors restored to the original construction. He reminded the commissioners' court this is a "preservation" program, not a "restoration" program. Williams said based upon early estimates, the county is looking at a project amounting to a couple of million, not \$4

"My reservation is coming up with the money," Judge Corn

Williams said Callahan County would not have to come up with the 15 percent matching funds now. "From this time forward, you would have two to two and one-half years by the time it's complete," Williams said if Callahan County was awarded funds. "Ultimately, the citizens have to look at getting this building upgraded," Williams said:
