## What school districts don't want you to know

## Texas school districts and leg-

 islators are working behind thescenes to make it harder for you scenes to make it harder for you
to know how your tax dollars are being spent. They will be suc cessful unless they hear tha you don't want that to happen. And that would be a huge step
backward for open government in the Lone Star State. Both public school finance bills
pending in the pending in the special legislative
session, $H B 2$ and SB 2 , contain session, HB 2 and SB2, contain
provisions that would limit the amount of information school districts are required to post in newspapers about such
critical matters as ids critical matters as bids, land sale ings. They would allow districts to post minimum information in newspapers and direct them to the district's website for details. this bad idea is that school districts can save tax money by pulling their legal notices from
newspapers. That is not only newspapers. That is not only
penny wise and pound foolish, penny wise and pound foolish,
but it ignores the fact that most Texans still prefer their local newspaper as the source for soup-to-nuts notices of public
meetings or hearings and conmeetings or hearings and con-
tracts offered for competitive bidding.
The ill-
The ill-conceived idea to dras-
tically reduce public tically reduce public notice is
buried deep in this 428 page bill. It was originally added on the House floor by Representative Brian McCall during the regular
session. Both House and session. Both House and Senate
bills died when the regular bills died when the regular ses
sion ended without an agree sion end
ment.
The Senate sponsor of the
school finance bill, Senator school finance bill, Senator Florence Shapiro, stripped of
McCall's amendment during the regular session. According to
Shapiro's office, she has now agreed to take the House position on this bill and keep th
minimum notice provisions. It will be a disservice to the people of Texas if Shapiro's CSSB 2 passes with language
that reduces complete and de. that reduces complete and de
tailed and public noticesinnews tailed and public notices in news-
papers. If legisilators assume that vance notice of an important meeting or the letting of a con-
tract that will obligate them taxwise for years to come, they're making a false assumption. Numerous surveys have shown that many Texans-particularly the poor, rural residents and
minorities-do not have Internet access in their homes, and those who do aren't likely to go to the
school district's web site to school district's web site to
search fordetailed legal notices. A notice in a newspaper, on the other hand, is right there on the page-with all the details in black and white-as the reader browses
through the hometown newspa per. Newspapers, of course, charge money off legal notices. It costs money to buy the paper and ink for the pages on which they're
printed, and to pay the newspaper employees and distributors (who by the way, are also local (axpayers) to print and deliver
those pages to the thousands of peope pages to the read the newands of per. In addition to their print editions, most newspapers also routinely include legal notices on their paper's web site, which means that the legal notices are might prefer to get their information electronically. The bottom line is this: If detailed legal notices aren't in your
local newspaper, chances are very good that you'll never see
all the nitty-gritty all the nitty-gritty on how your
school district is planning school district is planning to spend your money or h
plans to raise your taxes. plans to raise your taxes.
If you care about open gover ment and about how your money is spent, please call your senator
and representative as soon as and representative as soon as lassibe. Urge them to remove
lang SB 2 and 2 that cuts back on public notice and gives school districts permission to hide their complete
