Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. Monday, November 14, 2005 at the First Baptist Church in Cross Plains with Ronnie White officiating, assisted by Steve Polaski. Burial followed in the Pleasant Valley Cemetery in Brown County. Mr. Bigbee was born October 5, 1920 in Hamilton, Texas to Arthur Carter and Elizabeth Syndonia (Davis) Bigbee. Jess graduated from May High School in 1938. He married Hazel Myrick on April 25, 1942 in May, Texas. He went into the U.S. Army following his marriage and served during WWII. He then returned to Texas and attended Howard Payne College in Brownwood and graduäted in 1948, then graduated from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in 1954. Appeals. They were "men of 'red Appeals. They were "men of red
blood, instead of spiritus fumenti" coursing through their veins, and a head full of brains with a clear vision of this country's destiny instead of having their cranium filled with scrambles eggs, a vision of snakes, lizards and other creatures of dementia. The
