


The handcrafted furniture produced is absolutely beautiful and sturdy. A secretary desk, four poster bed and a sleigh bed were a few of the items on display.

Commissioners approve Department of Transportation order prohibiting burning

Callahan County, Texas **Order Prohibiting Outdoor** Burning

WHEREAS, declaration with provision of the Texas Disaster Act of 1975, a state of disaster outdoor fire, he or she obtains has been declared based on the imminent threat of disaster from wild fire and.

WHEREAS, declaration of such a disaster authorizes the imposition of controls on activities which tend to increase the likelihood of such fire,

BE IT THEREFORE OR-DERED, that the following emergency regulations are hereby established for all unincorporated areas of Callahan County, Texas, effective November 21, 2005 and further notice,

(1) Action prohibited.

A. A person violates this order if he or she burns any combustible material outside of an enclosure which serves to contain all flames and/or sparks, stance, the Fire Chief or Sheriff

B. A person violates this activity outdoors which could allow flames or sparks that could result in a fire, or orders such (2) Enforcement.

A. Violations of this order may be prosecuted in accordance with the statues and procedures governing misdemeanors, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$1,000 and/or up to 180 days in jail.
