Upon graduation they will become Ferry Pilots, ferrying planes from factories to differene fields and air bases throughout the United States thereby releasing many men pilots fore ombat duty.

Girls from practically every state in the Union are enrolled in the new class which started training Oct. 4.

There is a complete ground school hospital, canteen, theatre, barracks, mess halls, laundries, hangers, etc. at the field.

Miss Owens attended a night preflight school in San Antonio and alsso had appreximately 45 hours flying time.. One of the requirements is that each girl must have a minimum of 35 hours flying time before entering training.

Beryl is a graduate of Baird High School and also attended A. C. C. in Abilene. She was employed at the First National Bank of Baird for some time before taking a Civil Service position in Washington, D. C. with the War Department.

She obtained a transfer to San Antonio and has done Secretarial work at Fort Sam Houston for the past three years before going to Sweetwater.






