THE WHITE HOUSE
WASHINGTON
May 21, 1943

Dear Mr. Aldrich:

The body is at the Wylie Funeral Home awaiting the arrival of two sisters. Funeral services will be held Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock at the Church of Christ and burial made in Ross cemetery.

Billy Boone Nichols was born Dec. 11, 1929 in Dickens county, coming to Callahan county when quite a small boy with his parents. He has been a student in Baird public school for several years and was a most popular boy.

Besides his parents Billy is survived by an older brother, Coleman and three sisters, Mrs. W. L. Stockton and Mrs. Roy Cluck of Phoenix Ariz., and June at home. Billy was the grandson of Mrs. M. B. Nichols of Baird.

Girls from practically every state in the Union are enrolled in the new class which started training Oct. 4.

There is a complete ground school hospital, canteen, theatre, barracks, mess halls, laundries, hangers, etc., at the field.

Miss Owens attended a night pre-flight school in San Antonio and also had approximately 45 hours flying time. One of the requirements is that each girl must have a minimum of 35 hours flying time before entering training.

He said that he felt like he had been home on a visit. Being assigned to a convoy hospital points to Hooper's transfer toward the states, his sister believes.

Sgt. Hooper is the son of Mr. and Mrs. S. D. Hooper of Baird. Sgt. Hooper wrote his parents some weeks ago of making a trip over sea. He said: "Dear Mother and Daddy when I was on the great ocean by thoughts all the way were of Fred who went down with his ship. Take care of yourselves, Mother and Daddy. When this war is won I am looking forward to coming home someday. Love forever, Winifred."

Fred Hooper with the Merchant Marines lost his life some months ago when his ship was torpedoed off the west coast of Africa.

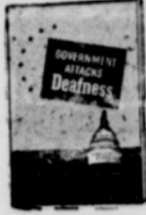

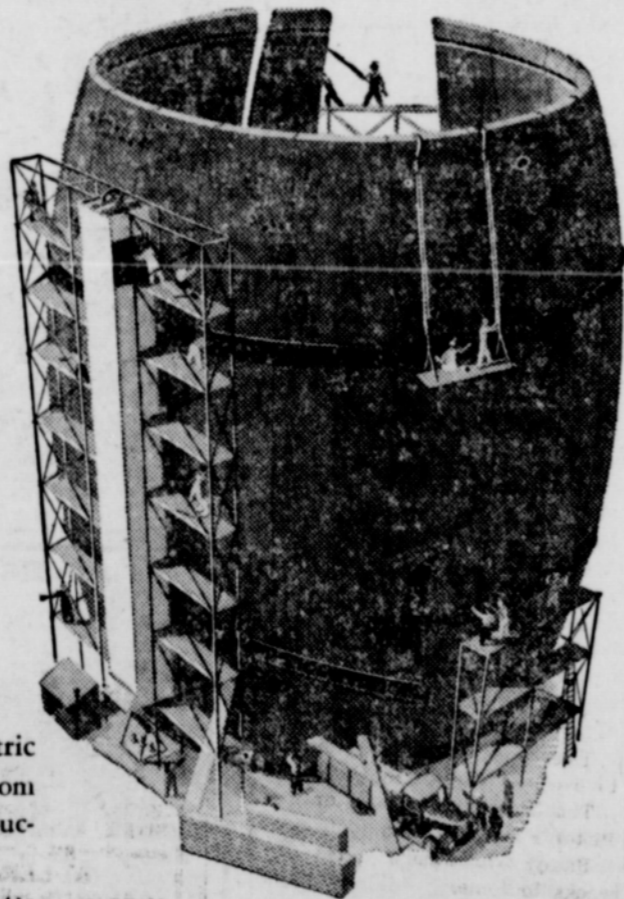
