Except for the Gudalupe Mountains, the Davis Mountains, the Big Bende region, and the Palo Duro Canyon, one does not see much magnificent scenery in Texas. But for sheer rustic beauty, we doubt if Texas can be excelled anywhere. The trouble with most of us is that we do not see or appreciate the beauty all about us.

My daughter and granddaughters of Lubbock, spent Friday night with me in Tahoka, and we started out at 7:00 o'clock Saturday morning, headed east. To avoid the crowded streets and highways in and around Snyder, and in order that the girls might see a portion of Texas they had never seen, we made our way through Post, Clairemont, Aspermont, thence down south to Hamlin and Anson to Abilene. Over that route, we crossed within a few hours all of the four farreaching arms of the Brazos and some of their tributaries.

The Yellowhouse, which we crossed a few miles east of Post. is apparently a mere lengthened bed of sand, running down between low hills, rugged hills in places, after leaving the caprock a few miles above. At the Post crossing, one would not suspect that less than thirty miles above Buffalo Lake, where many people find recreation in fishing, swimming, and other forms of amusement and entertainment; nor that twenty miles still farther up there is one of the most beautiful and popular state parks in Texis, the MacKenzie State Park

Between Clairemont and Jayton, we crossed the Salt Fork of the Brazos, known in Floyd and Crosby courties as the Blanco Canyon, at Plainview and above as Running Water Draw. It comes from far up on the Llano Estacado, some of the maps picturing it as having its head in New Mexico. It does often have running water in it far above Plainview, and down at the Clairemont-Jayton crossing we saw quite a bit of water in it the other day. We

Friady, September 1, 1950 | crossed it again some ten miles down-stream from Jayton, headed north at that point.

> Going south from Asperment a few miles we crossed the Double Mountain Fork of the Brazos, so named from Double Mountain, the first view of which one gets soon after heading east from Post.
