Negro Serves On Petit Jury Here For First Time In 106th District Court

For the first time in history, a Negro sat on a petit jury in a 106th District Court civil case tried here Monday and Tuesday, District Clerk W. S. Taylor states.

Early Lee Lawson of Tahoka is the "colored" man who served on the jury. He is a leader of his race in this community.

Judge Louis B. Reed stated that Early Lee is also the first Negro to serve on a petit jury in this district.

The case on trial was a damage suit, Grady Stewart vs. Rebel Thomas, and the jury brought in a verdict favoring Thomas.

Stewart, who lives at-Graham Chapel, was involved in a head-on collision with an-

Oct. 2, 1949. He alleged that while going east he ran up behind some cotton trailers pulled by a tractor, and in dodging them he collided with the other car. The trailers belonged to Thomas' brother, and were being pulled by a Mexican laborer. The jury decision was based on the fact, among others, that reflectors on the trailers could be seen a sufficient distance for safety.
