Last year, a total of 87,376,816 meals were served to Texas school children at only a fraction of their normal cost or-for many underprivileged children unable to pay-without cost whatsoever.

These meals, balanced and prepared with dietic care, were served in the 2,844 school lunch rooms over the state which participate in the school lunch program sponsored jointly by indidividual schools, state and federal governments. Importance of the program can be partially determined by its wide acceptance in Texas and in other states.

With all exvept 10 of Texas' 254 counties participating in the school lunch program, total program costs in Texas last year were \$33,021,973.96, which included food, labor, donated services and equipment. The donated services and equipment were from the local school district, which is required to furnish these elements for participation. The money paid directly comes from government sources.
