## Oil Drilling Activity In County Picks Up

Oil activity continues in north-eastern Lynn county as one well has been completed and six new tests have been announced within the past week.

A new wildcat test has also been announced for the extreme south-western corner of Lynn county.

The new test southwest of Newmoore is the Liedtke 59, Ltd., No. 1 Unity Trust and is located on an 80 acre lease 660 feet from the north and east lines of Section 14, Block C-41, Public School Lands survey, two miles south and two miles west of Newmoore. Contract depth is 5,200 feet.

The venture is 7,000 feet north west of Stanolind's North Welch Field opener, sole producer, and the No. 1 Gregory Mississippi discovery, now abandoned. It is a mile and one-half west of the 11,942 Stanolind discovery which was completed as a 52-barrel a day producer and later abandoned.

In the Suniland San Andres field, eight miles east of Wilson Wheeler Oil Co. and Suniland have announced completion of their No. 3-S-S. G. Wilson well which tested 25.75 barrels of oil per day with 72 percent water, gravity 25.8, after acidizing with 4,000 gallons. Location is 1,292 feet from the north and 990 feet from the west lines of Section 16, Block J, EL&RR Survey. Production is through perforations at 3,821-25 feet.

Suniland Glorieta: Earl Wells Jr. No. 3 Kiesel, 1650 feet from south and west lines of Section 1273, Block 8, EL&RR Survey, 4,500 feet.

Suniland Glorieta: Earl Wells Jr. No. 1 Davis, 2310 feet from north and 990 feet from west lines of Section 1278, Block 8, EL&RR Survey, 4,500 feet.

Suniland Lower San Andres: Earl Wells Jr. No. 3 Ken Davis, 1802 feet from north and 330 feet from west lines of Section 1273, Block 8, EL&RR Survey, 4,300 feet.

Suniland Upper and Lower San Andres: Earl Wells Jr. No. 1 Kiesel, 1650 feet from south and west lines of Section 1273, Block 8, EL&RR survey, dual well to complete in Upper San Andres, presently completed in Lower San Andres.

The Texaco No. 1 Macha test, northwest of Tahoka in the Dixie community, was reported drilling below 5,000 feet Wednesday.

### Car Registration Is Slow Here

All Lynn county car and truck owners should buy their license plates in Lynn county, states J. E. (Red) Brown, county tax assessor and collector.

Money derived from license plate sales go toward the improving of present roads, and the building of new roads in the county where the plates are bought. Therefore, if a Lynn county vehicle owner buys his plates in Lubbock county, or some other neighboring county, he is helping build roads there instead of near his own home.

For the convenience of the people of the county, vehicle license plates may be bought at four places; the county tax collector's office in Tahoka, Moore Insurance Agency in O'Donnell, Framers Co-op in Wilson, and Farmers Co-op in New Home.

Brown states that license plate sales are going a little slow this year. Vehicle owners are requested to bring their titles and 1958 license plate receipts with them when making application for 1959 plates.

Other new officers installed include Roy McQuarterm Sr. of Littlefield, vice president; J. R. Belt of Lockney secretary-treasurer; and new directors John Gammon of Lubbock and T. L. Sparkman Jr. of Hereford.

Blankenship was vice president of the board before his election as president recently having been re-elected to the board as Lubbock-Lynn county representative. He is also a member of the Board of Supervisors of Lynn County Soil Conservation District, and is active in community, county, and church affairs.

Committeemen from Lynn county are Weldon Bailey for Precinct 1 (Wilson) and Robbie Gill for Precinct 4 (New Home).

### State Will Take Over Farm Road

The remaining six miles of Farm-to-Market Road 1656 will be taken over by the State Highway Department for maintenance purposes when right-of-way easements are presented, states County Judge W. M. Mathis.

Curtis Morgan, commissioner of Precinct 1, began right-of-way easements signed this week for the 80-foot right-of-way, the existing width. The six miles from US 380 six miles east of Tahoka, north toward Wilson and to New Lynn was built by the county, and the State later finished out the road to connect with FM 211, the Wilson-Post road.

For some time, the State has been demanding a 100-foot right-of-way, or 20 feet more than the present roadway, which the county had refused to furnish due to the fact that this would have necessitated moving an electric high-line.

When the State reduced their demands to 80-foot right-of-way recently, the county readily accepted. Signing of the right-of-way easements does not call on any individual land owner to furnish any more than is now being used by the road.

## County Stock Show Set For March 7th

### Burglars Enter Four Buildings

Burglars entered two Tahoka business houses and two schools Wednesday night of last week, took approximately \$140.00 in cash and did considerable damage to property. In each instance, doors were badly damaged by the burglars in gaining entrance to the buildings.

At Dale Thuren Farm Store where about \$122.00 in cash was reported missing, the culprits peeled a safe door to gain entrance, doing considerable damage to the safe. Opening the safe also released a tear gas bomb, which in turn killed about 500 baby chicks in the store.

At Kenley Grocery and Market, only \$12.00 to \$15.00 in cash and two cartons of cigarettes were known missing.

Tahoka High School lost \$3.00 or \$4.00 from a coke machine, which was badly damaged, as well as the door through which entrance was gained. North Elementary building had a battered door, but nothing was found to be missing.

Sheriff Norvell Redwine said he had no definite leads on the burglaries, but a wave of similar burglaries here has been committed over the South Plains and several suspects in some of these are being questioned and investigated closely.

### Claude Conway Dies Suddenly

Claude Conway, 71, former well known citizen of Tahoka, died suddenly of a heart attack in Seminole, his home for the past ten years, Tuesday morning at about 10:45 a. m.

Funeral services were conducted at 2:00 p. m. Thursday in the First Baptist Church of Seminole with the Rev. H. D. Christian, pastor, officiating. He was assisted by Rev. Levi Price, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Monahan, and a former pastor at Tahoka. Grave-side services were conducted by Tom McLaine American Legion Post No. 204 of Seminole.

A barber by trade, Conway lived in Tahoka about 23 years before moving to Lamesa and later to Seminole. He had been a member of the American Legion 38 years, having served with the Army in France during World War I. He held several offices in Marion G. Bradley Post of Tahoka, served as commander of the Lamesa Post, and had been chaplain of the Seminole Post of the Legion the past six years.

An avid sports fan, practically all during his life in Tahoka, he followed the Bulldogs as one of their most loyal fans. In fact, he "carried the chain" at all football games for nearly 20 years.

Mr. Conway had been a barber all his life. Although he retired about four years ago, he still worked at the trade on occasions.

He was born at Blooming Grove, Navarro county June 27, 1887.

Survivors include his wife, Rosa; a son, C. W. Conway, who is manager of D&H in Tahoka; two daughters, Mrs. Dan Davis of Seminole and Mrs. A. D. Harvick of Odessa; one brother, George Conway of Los Angeles, Calif.; two sisters, Mrs. Roy E. Poer of Tahoka and Mrs. Ruth Dunlap of Arlington; and six grandchildren.

### TRAVIS STUART HONORED

T. D. (Travis) Stuart, formerly of Tahoka and a veteran of 24 years in the cotton trade, was elected president of the Lubbock Cotton Exchange at the annual meeting Tuesday. Stuart came to Tahoka in 1925 and moved to Lubbock in 1938, where he became one of the first directors of the Lubbock Cotton Exchange.

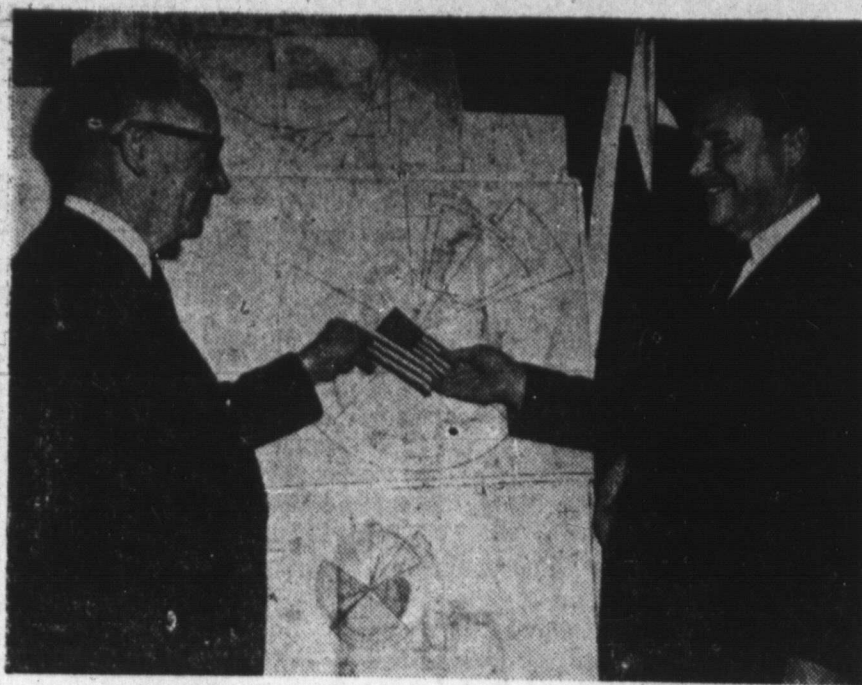

## Cotton Quiz



Grasshoppers are likely to be more widespread in the west and mid west this summer but are expected to be less destructive than in 1958, reports the U. S. Department of Agriculture. However, weather conditions between now and hatching time will have a strong bearing on numbers and a check will be made next spring to determine the areas where control measures are needed.

Over two and one-half million dollars, have now been obligated to landowners in the Plains area of Texas through the Great Plains Conservation Program, reports Lynn Pittard, extension assistant soil and water conservation specialist. For a thorough explanation of the program, he advises obtaining L-410 from county agents or the Agricultural Information Office in College Station, Texas.

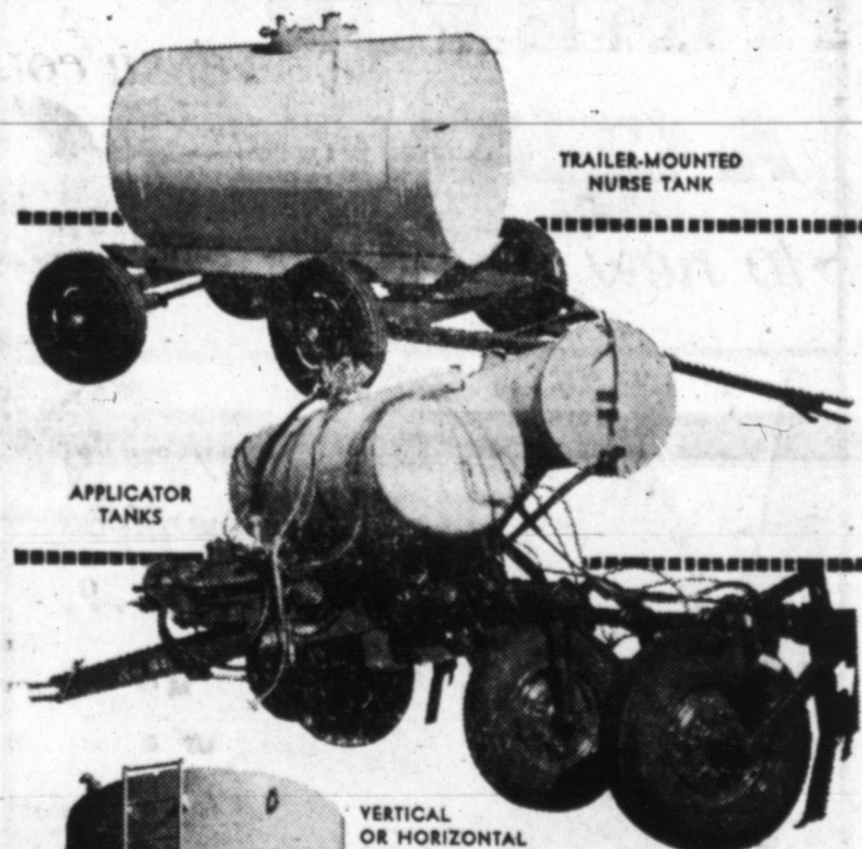

### Lynn County Soil Conservation District News

A Great Plains Conservation Plan is being written on the A. C. Aycox land around the Tahoka Lake. This place includes a total of 1792 acres. The lake accounts for 145 acres and there is approximately 75 acres of cropland in the ranch.

Brush control, range seedings, deferred grazing, proper use and improved water facilities are included in the plan.

Terrace lines have been run for J. B. Ray, R. A. and John W. Lamb.

Preplant irrigation will probably be the most profitable irrigation of the year. An unusually dry

fall and winter has caused almost all of our subsoil moisture to be depleted this year. This must be replaced by irrigation. Water forced below the subsoil layer will be lost by percolation and water in the topsoil will be lost by evaporation if applied now, however this moisture is easily replaced. The important thing is to replenish the moisture in the subsoil layer and control water application to keep the water from getting below the subsoil. To check moisture depth it is best to "probe" or dig about twenty-four hours after watering. If the soil is moist to the caliche, proper water application is being attained.

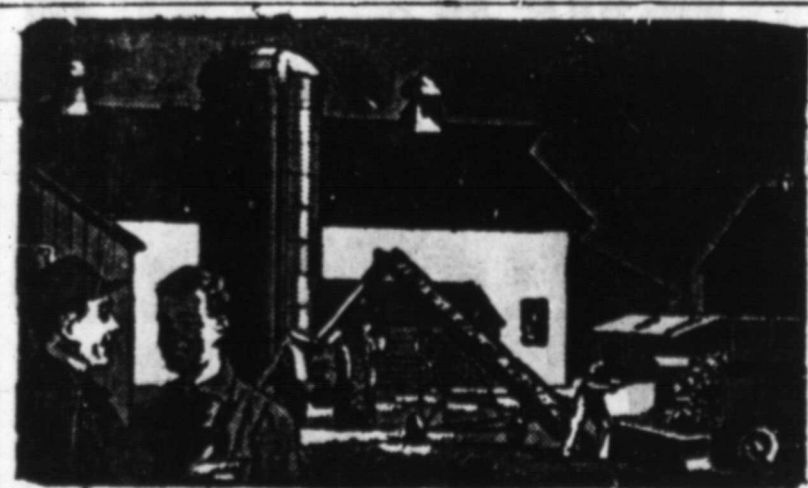

## WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

There appears to be shaping up in Congress quite a hassle over Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Benson.

The arguments pro and con are quite technical, and a full discussion of them would better appear elsewhere.

But there is one unanswered question in the whole debate. That question is somewhat like this:

Can any Secretary of Agriculture do the proper job as long as the U. S. Dept. is allowed to run rampant?

Most of Benson's antagonists are from the Midwest where corn and hogs are the big crops.

Now the Dept. of Commerce reports that due to export-import licenses controlled by the State Dept. in the third quarter of last year, exports to Soviet Russia and the nations behind the Iron Curtain more than doubled in value with \$12.9 million shipped into them, mostly in cold rolled sheet steel and steel mill equipment to Russia.

But imports from Russia and the Iron Curtain nations into the U. S. during the first six months of the year were more than double this, totalling \$29 million, of which practically half was in the form of canned cooked hams and other pork products.

Now, at a time when the taxpayers are paying out money to support the price of corn, the principal feed for hogs, the com-

## Speaker Tells of New Air Force

Sgt. DeWitt Simons, regional Air Force recruiter from Lubbock, brought an informative and inspiring talk to Tahoka Rotary Club Thursday noon of last week.

His talk consisted of two parts, the first covering a report to taxpayers, how the personnel is secured and what the recruiters look for, and what makes up our Air Force of today.

He said the principal interest of our people is security for our homes and country. He defended the American educational system, declaring it is far superior to Russia's regardless of claims to the contrary.

In discussing the cost of defense today, he pointed out that the Air Force of today is the most complicated and most expensive set-up in the country. For example the modern B-52 planes cost \$8.5 million, or five cents each for our 170 million citizens, and a fighter plane costs \$1.5 million. This compares with the B-17 bomber of World War II, which cost only \$140,000. However, the B-52 has 2,000 times the striking power as the old B-17.

He told of the vast change that has come over the Air Force personnel and attitude. Today, the Air Force highly technical, with more rigid requirements for personnel. There has been a vast change in the attitude of the personnel, and religious life, cultural and moral values are emphasized, and the men must have technical know-how, he declared.

The personnel being sought today must have more education and more capability. Men sought for enlistment come from the top 50 percent of the high school graduating class.

The second part of Sgt. Simons' talk consisted of a story, "A Boy and His Books," in which the boy turned out to be Abraham Lincoln.

The speaker was introduced by Alton Cain, joint program chairman for February along with Dr. Skiles Thomas.

A familiar feature syndicated for many years quoted humorously saying under the caption Famous Last Words. More serious was the custom of a generation or two ago of recording and remembering the last words spoken by persons before death.

In our own time there is a last sentence spoken by Dr. Peter Marshall, the Washington minister and Chaplain of the U. S. Senate. In his biography "A Man Called Peter" his wife records that as he was being carried out of the house on a stretcher with a heart attack he said to her, "I'll see you in the morning." That night he died. But those words are a fine and true expression of Christian faith.

On record are other last words that are neither noble nor words of faith. A famous showman of yesteryear gasped with his last breath, "What were today's receipts?" Another exit line by a nineteenth century essay-writer said, "Well, I've had a happy life." Similarly the last words of an eighteenth century society lady were, "It has all been very interesting." What a summary of life—"interesting!"

But there is more to life than material receipts, happiness and interest. John Wesley said to those weeping about his bed at the end, "Best of all is, God is with us." But the greatest one of all said on his cross, "It is finished." When life is commissioned by God it is lifted out of triviality and selfishness and when the end comes one can truthfully say, "I'll see you in the morning."

## Fertilizer Use Shows Increase

College Station, Feb.—Fertilizer use the last half of 1958 increased slightly more than 4 percent over the same period of 1957, reports J. F. Fudge, state chemist.

This increase represents almost a 9,000 ton increase over the 213,800 tons during the last half of 1957. The big increases in the fall of 1958 were primarily in anhydrous ammonia and 16-20-0. These materials accounted for almost one-half of the total fertilizer materials sold.

The big increase in mixed goods were primarily in the 1:2:1 grades. The largest seller was 10-20-10, which accounted for about one-third of the total mixed fertilizer sales.

This large amount of fertilizer represents a big investment. To
