

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

The Commerce Dept. also reports that in 1958 the U. S. exports of food and farm products to all of Europe declined sub-stantially. This, in the language of the department, "reflected a slowdown in government surplus disposal financing."

Yet in the same year, the report notes, despite the decline in coffee shipments and prices, the imports of foodstuffs into this country, principally in the form of cattle, meat products and vegetables, increased by 6%.

Thus, the whole American farm program, which cost in excess of \$4.5 billion in 1958, gets curioser and curioser.

While it is obvious that it is to the American interest to keep the farms in a healthy shape, the question is "whose farms; family sized American farms or communism's collective farms?"

Or as one wit puts it, "The most carefully laid plans of men, mice and the Secretary of Agriculture can be set awry by the State Dept."

As long as the U. S. policy is to let foodstuffs come in from abroad, and especially communist countries, in direct competition with American farm products, on which there are surpluses, the solution of the problem seems hopeless.

Neither is it policy for two cabinet posts in a government to publicly battle each other.

But it would be interesting to see what could happen if one party controlled the Agriculture Dept. and the other State Dept. It would be mighty interesting.

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



A familiar feature syndicated for many years quoted humorous saying under the caption Famtwo ago of recording and remembering the last words spoken by persons before death.

In our own time there is a last sentence spoken by Dr. Peter Marshall, the Washington minister and Chaplain of the U.S. Senate. In his biography "A Man Called Pe was being carried out of the house on a stretcher with a heart attack he said to her, "I'll see you in the morning." That night he died. But those words are a fine and true expression of Christian faith.

On record are other last words that are neither noble nor words of faith. A famous showman of yesteryear gasped with his last breath, "What were today's receipts?" Another exit line by a nineteenth century essay-writer said, "Well, I've had a happy life." Similarly the last words of an eighteenth century society lady were, "It has all been very interesting." What a summary of life-"interesting!"

But there is more to life than material receipts, happiness and interest. John Wesley said to those weeping about his bed at the end, "Best of all is, God is with us." But the greatest one of all said on his cross, "It is finished." When life is commissioned by God it is lifted out of triviality and selfishness and when the end comes one can truthfully say, "I'll see you in the morning."




